It was Coleridge who wrote "Water, water, everywhere, Nor any drop to drink." Coleridge was writing as the Ancient Mariner and was referring to the ocean that surrounded his vessel. However, I felt a little bit like that after returning from my first trip to West Africa.

In many villages in West Africa, water wasn't the issue; clean water was the issue. There were rivers, reservoirs and streams but the water wasn't fit to drink.

I remember a photo taken by our team of a little girl, hardly more than a toddler, carrying a cup of water on

her head in preparation for what her life would look like.

The need for water defines the lives of these little girls. Little girls, who should be in school, make numerous trips a day with their mothers to distant water sources to fetch water that will keep their families alive for another day.

And so I made a commitment that while Cornerstone couldn't change the world, we could change villages.

Our first venture into providing clean water in Africa was a partnership with World Hope Canada and World Hope International to help drill wells in Sierra Leone. For three years at Christmas I would challenge the people of Cornerstone to make sure that at least a part of their Christmas spending would be spent on providing clean water for people they'd never met in villages that couldn't be found on most maps.

And it clicked. Thousands of dollars were collected each Christmas and forwarded off to the United States via World Hope Canada for wells in Sierra Leone.

In 2015 Sheldon Gilmer, from World Hope Canada, approached Cornerstone with an opportunity to provide wells in the Democratic Republic of Congo in partnership with the Canadian Government's Canadian International Development Agency.

A new partnership was formed, between Cornerstone, World Hope Canada and Cecile DeSweemer (an 80 year

old doctor who runs a mission in the DRC) to cap fresh water springs.


Our donations have been matched by another donor resulting in a dozen springs being capped to provide clean water sources to the villages of the Kananga area of the DRC.

Why do we do it year after year? Because I am convinced that it makes a difference: a difference to villages, to families, to women and to little girls. And because they don't have to spend their days carrying questionable water to their homes, those little girls will learn to play, will receive an education and will eventually change their worlds.

This year's contribution by Pastor Denn's Church will provide clean water for approximately 10,000 people. Not bad for a church that "couldn't change the world"!

WHAT IS SPRING CAPPING?

The Democratic Republic of Congo is mostly tropical rain forest with an abundance of rainfall. There are many places where water bubbles right out of the side of a hill but when that same water comes in contact with the ground, it quickly becomes contaminated. Livestock wade into the water to drink and defecate, and people do their laundry in it; micro-organisms and parasites can grow and the water becomes dangerous with unseen bacteria. An unprotected water source leads to water borne diseases that are often life threatening.

To provide a clean water source requires a protective structure built of cement, and stand pipes that spout uncontaminated water. Spring capping is more cost effective than drilling wells as you are certain to have water. When you drill a well, you may or may not strike water. Since spring water is free flowing, it eliminates the need for

a pump and further reduces costs and maintenance. The community is trained in how to maintain the capped spring by making sure that trees stay around it for shelter and erosion prevention, broken pipes get repaired, the soil around the capped spring is managed and that the trail leading to the spring is kept in good repair to ensure safety for women and children carrying the water.

Before spring capping

A capped spring costs \$4000 and can serve up to 2,500 people. That means clean water for one person can be provided for less than \$2/person. That's a good deal, if you ask me!!





"HOW **ASTOUNDING** IS THAT FOR \$31/MONTH'? These girls age-out of orphanages into the real world at age 16: poor, alone, and scared. They cannot only be plucked off the streets for good and not for evil intentions but can also be rescued from the dominion of darkness and brought into the kingdom of light as God's children, eternally safe. How astounding is that, for \$31/month?

Have you ever been in as frightening and desperate a situation as these precious girls? Have you ever been scared? Have you ever been in a place where, unless God intervened, you didn't know how you could possibly survive? My husband and I were there. And two faithful people listened to God and acted on our behalf. Stunned does not begin to describe how we felt. INTERVENTION - it is a form of mercy, from one on behalf of

another. The very heart of God. It's not shaming, it's not emotional manipulation, its love! It has to express itself. It has to find ways to demonstrate how much the heart bursts with this love. It has to

We support seven girls a month and World Hope Canada because we love that World Hope Canada prevents poverty, pain, harm, hunger and being cold rather than letting the girls suffer, and then trying to heal the damage. And World Hope Canada teaches the Gospel!

This has been a journey for us. We thought we were doing well sponsoring one child. We signed up for the obligation and then God spoke to us, it became a joy and exciting! Surprisingly, we found ourselves grateful for another opportunity to give and participate! We started to receive updates about the girls and our hearts were stirred. We realized more and more that these girls had become personally precious to us. We just had to sponsor more girls.

Our prayer life has become more fervent because of these girls. It has been a very satisfying experience for us to sponsor the girls and we are thankful to be part of World Hope Canada's ministry in Ukraine.

Marina also studies part-time at Odessa Theological Seminary to be a youth leader in her church. And again she is doing well there.

She still has some issues from her troubled past but God has changed her a lot. She accepted Christ and was baptized. She is actively involved in ministry at her church and sings on the worship team.

So in conclusion, I can say if not for God and World Hope, Marina probably would have repeated her mother's life. But now she is a wonderful girl who loves Jesus and church and has goals in her life.

She is ready to work and to live independently. She calls all of us her family and I am personally very happy for her.

HAITI IS NOT BEYOND HOPE . . . MIRACLES DO HAPPEN

Time.com states "In Haiti, Hurricane Sandy Leaves behind Death and Destruction". The article says that Sandy "bore down on 50 million Americans after it dumped a biblical deluge of driving rain over Southern Haiti".

When Babaco, Haiti was hit with Hurricane Sandy in 2012, one of the major impacts it had on the community was to wipe out the water source, leaving the local people scrambling to find an alternate source.

Having been on three previous mission trips - twice to Mexico and once to Columbia - I didn't believe this was going to be a big stretch for me, although the stories I heard about Haiti seemed more bleak than the other countries I had visited. My wife, Pearl and I joined a group from our Church in January 2016 and headed to Babaco, Haiti. Our team wired a four room school house that was built by Moncton Wesleyan Church a year before with some donated electrical supplies we carried over. We also wired in plugs and lights for the Babaco Wesleyan Church. What a great feeling to see the pastor and some of his board members light up when we turned the lights on for the first time at the end of our week there!

Before I went to Haiti I was told it was a fourth world country: beyond hope, full of witch doctors, hit with hurricanes and earthquakes. Things were described as hopeless. While those statements had truth in them, I saw that God was in control. He has not forsaken Haiti. Under the leadership of Nathan Adams from Moncton Wesleyan Church, a local development committee has been set up, there have been compound buildings built; a church and school, a well was drilled, land was purchased, and a chicken coop was built. There is a program every Saturday for the children to have a meal and learn about Jesus

What a thrill it was for Pearl and I to help feed the children that Saturday! It's safe to say that Babaco is looking better than ever. Haiti is not beyond hope when God and His people work together. Miracles can and do happen.

I want to thank World Hope Canada for partnering with the Moncton Wesleyan Church in Babaco; that in itself has been a great blessing and a miracle on how it all came together. I encourage you to support Haiti through World Hope Canada's program, "The Tap" and take time to visit the mission field, seeing for yourself the ongoing work that is happening. You will never feel more alive and fulfilled than when doing this work for God and you will have memories to treasure for the rest of your life.

Our little team saw God's hand of provision for us and Haiti. Ask anyone on our team; God is at work in Haiti and He's still performing miracles!

What does hope look like to you? For me, hope is a hug from a friend, the melody of a song, a word God whispered several thousand years ago about His peace, and the warmth of the sun that rose today just like it's risen every morning since the beginning of time. All these things whisper to me, "You have a reason to smile and to trust. God has a plan, which is always beautiful – even when you can't see it. Have hope!"

The hope I have has always inspired me to offer hope to those who cross my path. For the last fifteen years, my life's work has been traveling to places far and near to share that

hope through music – songs into which I've poured as much hope as I can write. My prayer is always that people walk away from my concerts encouraged and comforted that they are not alone; that there is Someone greater guiding them. Perhaps they mean well, but their words and actions suggest that their ' thought is, "Poor girl. Life must be hopeless without her sight." But it isn't, and I long to change their minds in that first moment of meeting – to say with my actions and my attitude that even where there is darkness, the light of hope is radiant and beautiful.

Our life circumstances never need leave us hopeless. I've learn this not only from my own life, but even more so from brothers and sisters whose life work is to bring hope into the darkest places.

I first discovered World Hope Canada two years ago, when Richinda Bates reached out to me about using my song, "No Borders," behind a video chronicling their mission work in the African countries of Swaziland, the Congo, and Ghana. As we emailed, I learned more about the depth of this organization - fighting against human trafficking, and fighting for education, clean water, health care, and community development around the world. I particularly fell in love with their Hope House project in the Ukraine. As I heard Richinda and her partners share about these wonderful houses where orphaned and abandoned girls have their basic needs met, and are offered education, life skills, and love, I knew I had to get involved.

I run a campaign called Love Be The Loudest, where a portion of each of my album sales goes to support organizations that are loving the world in a powerful way. So far, we have sponsored one girl with World Hope Canada through this campaign, and I can't wait to sponsor more! WHAT IS A MAMA-CLOTH?

It's another Wednesday afternoon and a dedicated group of ladies are together at Centennial Road Church in Brockville, to put their sewing and crafting skills to good use. They make dresses, shorts, pants, bandanas, tapestry bags, baby sheets, blankets, diapers, reusable sanitary products, pillowcases, handkerchiefs and baby hats. In the past 9 years many children around the world have been gifted with a total of over 1100 dresses and over 700 sets of boys' shorts and T shirts.

The Sew N Sews started in June 2008 as the brainchild of their leader, Rachel Hoekstra. It has flourished and grown from five ladies wanting to use up their stash of fabric to a vibrant group of nineteen ladies who enjoy getting together each week to sew.

Rachel recalls: "At a Bible study I attended, the question was asked: If God asked - What would you like to do for Me? - What would you say? I had a stash of fabric, so my answer was 'Sew for kids in need'. When I voiced that idea, someone else had that same desire. Our mission statement became "To clothe a village, one child at a time".


Women who are involved in Sew N Sews say, "It is a blessing to be a part of this ministry. We all share the same goal, which is to help those who are less fortunate.

Sewing day is the highlight of my week. This is a tangible way for me

to show God's love for me and the world by making items to help one child or one family at a time. The missionaries who distribute the items we sew, tell us that to the children, it's like Christmas and then we know why we do it! God gave us a gift!"

Menstruation is a natural experience that women and girls around the world have in common; yet it remains a taboo subject in many countries. Because it is a taboo subject, the negative effect on women and girls can be devastating. Inadequate privacy to deal with your period, lack of supplies, and stigmas all serve to make the lives of women, especially young women, very difficult. The stigma associated with menstruation and the lack of education causes women and girls shame. Shame that keeps them out of school. Many counties in Africa, girls have little to no protection for their period. They try to use leaves, cloths or old rags and this is unhealthy, unsanitary and an embarrassment to them. Girls are often shamed if they leak and never return to school.




for menstrual supplies by sewing re-useable menstrual pads and assembling 'Mama Cloth Kits'. The kit includes a drawstring bag that has two shields with five tri-fold liners; a washcloth, panties, and a Ziploc bag. The material used is dark coloured flannel so it is very absorbent and it has a leak-proof barrier. This ensures that a girl is prepared when she gets her period and she doesn't have to be afraid and stay away from school and other social activities.

So far, World Hope Canada has distributed Mama Cloth Kits in Ghana and D. R. Congo with plans to take them to Sierra Leone this Spring.

PROJECT REACH OUT GHANA SUPPORTS GIRLS EDUCATION

Project Reach Out Ghana (PROG) understands two things very well: (1) education plays a key role in helping people rise above the grinding poverty that plagues so many in our world; and (2) many people require assistance in order to access education.

Project Reach Out Ghana supports students in need by paying part of their tuition through a scholarship. The scholarship is accepted with the understanding that recipients will give back to society. The three young ladies pictured above were fortunate enough to receive educational assistance from PROG and in turn, they are gladly giving back out of gratitude for their education.

Sandra Donkor's family has been part of The Wesleyan Church in Ghana from the very beginning. Sandra attended our Sunday School as a child and has grown to be an active member of the Wesleyan Church. Sandra's father suffers from polio which has paralyzed his legs and he is also partially

blind. He needed support for his brilliant daughter. Today, she is a university graduate with a degree in geology.

Victoria lost her father early in her young life and about the time she was entering university, she lost her mother as well. She started attending our church as a child in Sunday school and has remained with us since. She's involved with the worship team and also teaches Sunday School. She has graduated with a

In rural Sierra Leone, the daily reminder of the lack of access to education are school-aged children who are not in school, who will never reach their full potential.

World Hope Canada has been investing in education for a number of years by assisting the community to build a new school building, Kakissy Wesleyan Primary School. Teachers have received training or upskilling and student tuitions have been subsidized. In 2016, six teachers had their salaries paid. The

result is more children receiving a better quality of education; an increased number of children have access to education; and, the teachers are more dedicated to ensuring their students succeed.

When we support education, we can reduce poverty and hunger, end wasted potential and look forward to a stronger society for all!

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COMPELLED TO HELP REFUGEES



In 2016, World Hope Canada felt compelled to respond to the crisis in Syria in some way. After prayer and consultation, we made the decision to provide training and facilitation for those Wesleyan Churches and community groups that wanted to sponsor refugee families.

We shared information with congregations, pastors and the general public on the Government of Canada's Citizenship and Immigration guidelines on the steps required to sponsor a family and the responsibilities of becoming a sponsor. We had the pleasure of working closely with three groups - Refugees in North Grenville, The Brockville Wesleyan Churches and Merrickville Bridge to Canada. The first two groups have welcomed Syrian families to their communities while the third group continues to wait for a family to be assigned to them.

This work is very meaningful to be involved with, especially to appreciate that there are now two young families living safely in Canada, far away from refugee camps and war.

THE 'BREAD' OF LIFE

Effia had a dream of owning her own bakery business but could not raise the money to purchase the equipment and ingredients to get started. She approached Project Reach Out Ghana for a small loan of \$650. Today she employs sixteen women who bake and deliver the bread, each earning around \$5/day in a country where the average income is less than \$3 per day.

Microcredit is a variation on traditional credit service that involves providing small loans to people who would otherwise be unable to secure credit, typically because of poverty. Currently, twenty people (approximately 75% women) are receiving training in business management and Christian stewardship in preparation to receive their loan. Each successful applicant will receive a loan of \$250-\$1,500 to start a small business in trading, cell phone repair and sales, barbershop, tailoring, farming and many other ventures.

After several months they will pay back their loans and those funds will be passed on to another successful applicant. A gift to microcredit changes lives and keeps on giving!!

FEED THEIR HOPE



World Hope Canada helps care for over 80 children per week living with HIV/Aids by supporting the Ebenezer and Ngcina Feeding Stations. The Government of Swaziland gives anti-retroviral drugs for free but you can only take them with food. Many children do not have access to food and so are unable to take their medications.

The Feeding Stations are run by volunteers who care about the children. They cook food, teach the children simple things like the alphabet, their numbers and the days of the week; they share Bible stories with them and they love them. Some of the children walk for several kilometers just to eat.

Swaziland has the world's highest estimated prevalence rate of HIV-infected adults (26% of people aged 15-49). In addition, Swaziland's TB incidence rate is the highest in the world, and 80% of TB patients are co-infected with HIV. As a result of the high incidence of this illness, many people have died leaving behind young children that are also infected. Child-headed households constitute about 10 percent of the population which is 1,304,063. Children in these households have limited access to adequate and nutritious food and basic health services. \$18/month can help these wonderful children through the Feed Their Hope sponsorship program.




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
