





The Cross Country team had a big day at Hinchingbrook Park. Kamuela Bean finished second place and continued on the European Championship in Germany.






The place may have seemed just a little bit weird to have a dance at first ... but then again, with the knowledge that we were all champions and celebrating, everyone had a great night!


Good Times Rolling Up!



record of 17-5 over three years, and an 8-0 record this year. By winning the Division III crown, it earned the respect of schools across Europe.


The Volleyball team played outstanding in the Division III tournament and lost a nail biter to Ankara, taking second out of sixteen

teams.


The tennis team gave it their all and represented Alconbury well, as did the Cross Country team winning several meets and sending one man to Europe.

Spiraling Championship Season

The Dragons motto was "First we'll be best. then we'll be first!" "We are the champions!" was the song played after the Dragons defeated the Tigers for the Division III crown.

The offensive line was outsized most of the season, but was never out played. Senior Runningback Skyler Lee scored 21 touchdowns and ended up with 1,786 vards for the season.

Senior Quarterback Reather Richard the MVP arabbed award for the title game, and ended up scoring 7 touchdowns, and passing for 3 for the season. Lawrence Aceback Barry said after the championship game "We were the best team that Alconbury ever fielded!"

The Dragons scored about twice as much as their opponents. The first game was at Baumholder, and Alconbury disposed of them 38-12. The

next week the Dragons toasted the Bobcats 44-22. They showed heart the next week by beating Brussels 30-28. A trip to Bad Krueznach resulted in a near mercy ruling of the Bearkats, that score was Lawrence Barry ran his first touchdown of his career. After a week off, the Dragons slipped past the Giessen Griffins 12-6 on Homecoming Day. The Dragons came from behind in the mud-bowl at London Central to claim victory 26-16 and an undefeated regular season record of 6-0.



The girls also had the amount of new players. When the championships at Weisbaden approached, things got a little complicated because player Jessica Arrieta hurt her wrist. The three girls that

















were eating pudding without a utensil, fishing for a suspended donut, and Twister.








The Gold Award participants looked forward to completing their final expedition scheduled for June in the Mourne Mountains, Northern Ireland. This was the one they had been practicing for all year.

Lydia Evans said, "The whole experience of MUN has been eve-opening. Seeing how passionate some of the students feel about world affairs is comforting. I am sure there were some future ambassadors present."
