Band Fun Fact #1: Many players seem to be under the impression that the Bb rotary trumpets are larger in bore size than a standard American piston valve trumpet. The truth is that Austro-German rotary valve trumpets have a much smaller bore than the piston valve instruments commonly in use in the United States.

Ms. Meyers-Band Director conducts the AMS Annual Christmas Concert. Historical Fact #1: The history of brass instruments prior to the sixteenth century is largely a matter of assumption; it is clear that trumpets have existed since ancient times and that trumpets and some primitive slide trumpets, the forerunner of the trombone family, were used during the late Middle Ages. The later sixteenth and early seventeenth centuries saw the development of an entire family of trombones. The most common four-part ensemble consisted of an alto, two tenors, and a bass, much as did the flute family.

Historical Fact #2: Instruments of the cornet family are in fact mixture of woodwind and brass instruments, having the toneholes and fingering system of woodwind instruments but the cup mouthpiece of brasswind instruments. Their tone quality is a unique blend of woodwind and brasswind properties, very pure; it was considered to be the instrument that sounded most like the human voice. It is not at all surprising that these instruments, throughout their long and distinguished history, were used to support choir voices.

History of the Saxophone: Adolphe Sax, a Belgian instrument maker, created the saxophone in the early 1840's. It was introduced by Sax's close friend Hector Berlioz on June 12, 1842, in a Parisian magazine. It was patented in 1846.



Ciena Calvo profoundly concentrates on her music during concert time. The term "flute" refers to a broad number of instruments that are found in many different cultures. There are many names for different types of flute. Some of these names include: cross flute, German flute, transverse flute and flauto traverso. Practice your jump serve. Level of difficulty, average, time required 8 seconds. Position yourself 3 long strides from the end line. Take one long step forward with your left leg. During your second step toss the ball high and in front of you. You should toss the ball high enough so that you can hit the ball. After your third step, take your third step and then plant your right foot behind your left and jump. Make contact with the ball on its decent and hit the top-center of the ball. Allow yourself to land on or over the end line with your momentum, moving you straight towards the net. Focus on balance. If you find yourself falling on your landing or landing off the right then you are overthrowing the ball. Tips: 1. If you are landing short of the line you are under tossing the ball. The most important thing in this serve is timing. 2. Try tossing the ball with backspin to get the desired topspin at contact.



Here are the directions for the AMS Set: Set up with your feet staggered with dominant foot forward. Move to the ball. Your shoulders should be square to your target, arms and legs bent with your weight on your toes. Your hands are placed above your forehead with the palms up. Your hand should form a window with the thumbs forward and index fingers, close to each other. Contact the ball on the lower backside with fingers and thumbs and push up with your arms and legs. Fully extend your arms and point your hands toward the target. Transfer your weight towards the target and move in the direction of the set.

AMS Pass-Attack-Block-How-To: First, stretch and warm-up that simulates game movements. One line is on the left sideline at the base line. First player sprints to 10ft line and mocks a pass (good body position-arms to target) then approach and mock attack (full swing) then block jump from the landing of attack (keep hands high). Land block and open quickly to center and transitions to middle position at 10ft line. As first player is moving to middle, the second player sprints to 10ft line, and they then mock pass-attack-block-transition together. From player three on, there will be 3 players passing-attacking-blocking each time until the end. Make sure that when the player gets to the right position and lands the block that they open in to the setter, not to the sideline. Players start from at least 15 feet off the net so that they get a full approach and swing. This also means that they have to get off the net further on transition. Push the basics and pour it on AMS!



Volleyball, first known as mintonette, found its beginning in 1895. William G. Morgan, an instructor, at a YMCA, developed a sport for young businessmen to keep in shape yet not be as physically demanding as another new sport, basketball. It was first played with tennis net raised to a height of 6 and 1/2 feet off the floor and combined many of the rules of baseball, tennis, handball and basketball. Can you believe that during the birth of volleyball, the teams could have any number of players, each game was played for nine endings; there was no limit to the number of hits on each side? There were quite a few crazy rules. This quickly changed as the sport gained in popularity. In 1890 the first ball designed for volleyball emerged, and the net was raised a foot. In fact it was not until 1916 that through a series of rule changes, that a rule set that resembles today's emerged.

AMS Girls Nitty-Gritty Shooting Tips: 1. Shooting improvement starts with technique. 2. Technique must be practiced close to the basket. 3. To improve your shooting range start close to the basket and gradually back off. 4. To improve shooting you must shoot in a game-like situation. 5. Every shooting move, as well as every other move to dribble or to pass, starts with a pivot. You must be an expert at pivoting.



AMS Guard Play Tips: 1. While dribbling keep the head up, constantly looking for an opening. 2. Always look long first. Always look inside during half court play. 3. Never stop dribbling until you pass the ball. 4. Never dribble into a trap; when you recognize a trap pass, do not dribble. 5. Never dribble in place, only dribble when you are going somewhere fast. 6. Start the half court offense as soon as possible, even from mid-court. 7. Don't be caught in never-never land; on the shot either go towards the basket for the rebound (if another player is back) or move towards the other basket as a defense against the fast break. 8. You beat the defense with looking, passing, and communication skills.

AMS GAME KNOWLEDGE: Know what's going on: the score, fouls. Study your opponent, right handed or lefty. Do they like to drive? What's their defense like? Who's in? Who's hot? Study offensive plays. **PASSING TIPS:** eye contact, crisp two handed passes, pass to target-outside shoulder, step to receive. **SHOOTING:** Lay-ups-they are not easy-off the back board, concentrate, jump off the left foot for a right handed lay-up, and vice-versa. **JUMP SHOTS, ONE HANDED:** Elbow in, release ball up-not out! Use of wrist-finger flip with forefinger being last to touch the ball. Eyes on the spot over the front of the rim. **BE NICE AND READY:** Be ready to rebound and "Thank" the passer when you score!

REBOUNDING: Remember the ball will more than likely bounce back toward the shooter. **TIPS:** block-out, between man and basket, flex knees, eye on ball, timing, long rebounds on 3 point attempts. **DRIBBLING TIPS:** Push ball with fingers, head up, lower dribble when closely guarded, body between defender and ball, use both hands, elbow close to body. **OFFENSE:** Eye on the ball, don't force shots or passes, shoot if open, put offensive rebound back up, get back fast on turnovers. **DEFENSE:** Eye on the ball, between man and basket, never rest on defense, hands up, watch the highs, slide, don't cross legs, **BE AGGRESSIVE; GO FOR STEALS!**



GIRLS SOCCER GO SKY-HIGH



Good team camaraderie and sportsmanship go hand in hand. AMS Soccer Tip: You can improve your ball control by juggling with your laces during your practice time. First, hold the ball out in front of you—arms extended, elbows locked. Drop the ball and let it bounce. Use your right laces to tap the ball up, then your left laces to tap the ball up. Your goal is to go from right laces to left laces, without a bounce! **IN-STEP JUGGLE AT LEAST ONCE EACH DAY!**

Good foot motion! AMS Soccer Tip #2: There are 3 main aspects of dribbling: Dribbling, moving the ball, faking, moving your body without touching the ball, Shielding, using your body to protect the ball. Important points to remember when moving the ball: keep the ball close to your body, keep the ball under control, use the inside, outside, instep, and sole of your foot to move the ball, when you want to dribble faster do not kick the ball farther away from your body, instead move your feet faster pushing the ball with the instep.

AMS Soccer Team Insight-Juggling the ball helps you improve control and confidence. Keeping the ball up in the air only using your feet, thighs and head is a very cool trick and only more advanced players do it well. It's also a great way to practice learning how to control the ball which increases your confidence. Juggling the ball helps you learn how to keep the ball close to your body with control. Of course, you'll never juggle the ball 50 times before you take your shot, but being able to control a ball out of the air is a skill that may help you defending and/or scoring. You may be attacking your opponent's goal some day and a ball may come to you through the air. Just as it comes down to your foot, you quickly and swiftly flick it in the air just high enough for the defender to run right under it! As the ball comes down again, you hit a perfect volley right into the back corner of the net to win the game for your team!



THE HISTORY OF SOCCER-A TRIP TO THE PAST. The first recorded soccer (football) game took place in England in 217 A.D., and by the 12th century the annual Shrove Tuesday contest was a regular event. Various forms of soccer-style games have been around since Roman times, and America was the first British colony to start playing soccer-style games. Some form of football was played in the Colonies as far back as the establishment of the original Jamestown settlement in 1609. The rules are unclear, but they most likely resembled the sprawling Shrovetide games then popular in England. It was soon banned by ordinance as a reputed bad influence, and for the next two centuries appeared only in the least restricted of colonial communities. The modern form of soccer originated in England in the early 1830's. The sport grew among working-class communities and was seen as a way of keeping young and energetic kids out of trouble at home and in the school; they could let off steam and learn the values of teamwork.
