















Dear Parents.

On Saturday, an engineering analysis of the Andersen School complex, prompted by the discovery of some hairline cracks after past earthquakes, was completed. The analysis indicated a remote possibility of structural damage to the Middle School building in the event of a severe earthquake.

All the other Andersen school buildings were also examined and no potential problems are present.

The safety of the students is my number one concern. With this in mind, I have directed immediate repairs to the Middle School building to ensure there is absolutely no possibility of endangering our children. I regret to inform you that the Middle School classes will not be held Monday through Wednesday this week, while classrooms are being temporarily relocated. These repairs require moving the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade classrooms to temporary locations on Andersen for the next four weeks while these repairs are completed. Students are to come to school on Thursday, February 26, at the usual time. Staff members will assist getting students to their new classroom locations.


