
The Leaders of Our





At Ankara EHS, mathematics is taken seriously. From elementary classes that drill multiplication tables to AP Calculus lessons that test the very boundaries of logic, mathematics extends beyond the classroom environment, applying to everything we do and see in the world around us. Mrs. Kadioglu, one of the school's main math teachers, realizes the importance of not only helping students to understand the concepts covered, but encourages them to enjoy the learning process itself. "I like math because it is a science that is constant and always tells the truth" Mrs. Coruh said.

Many students are also challenged to take courses that they would have otherwise run in terror from, simply because of the fantastic faculty. 

The English Department

From Hamlet to Dickens and from Frost to Brontë, English teachers and their students spend all year disecting great works of literature as they attempt to understand the deeper meanings embedded within them. Additionally students at Ankara EHS learn to mimic these styles and develop their own unique voices in their writing.

The ability to communicate with one another is a foundational skill that transcends all classes and subjects. "Students need the skills taught in English, and all students can improve. If it is possible to write well, it is also possible to write better. If it is possible to comprehend, it is possible to own and reconfigure that which you comprehended," Mr. Tim Redden explains. In order

to perfect this trade, most students take two AP English classes during high school, Literature and Language, both of which emphasize the importance of composition as a means of self-expression. Mrs. Carder and Mr. Redden share the honor of teaching these rigorous courses.

However, much learning takes place before the rigor of Advanced Placement classes comes into play. Mrs. Lynda Hayward prepares her Honors students to write detailed, organized and concise essays that prepare them for their workloads ahead.





While dates can be difficult to memorize and essays laborious to write, students from across the board insist that their teachers are always there to answer questions and smooth the often rocky learning process. 8th grader Gideon Hansen expressed his feeling about US History with Mr. Redden, "Even though he's an English teacher, he really understands his subject and makes sure none of his students are left behind." Despite the challenges of our rigorous curriculums, students love learning about history.



















We are all excited to see their successes and growth and are hoping that they go on to represent our high school in future tournaments and teams!







that made you want to dance.


The students voted the Thursday before prom for the prince, princess, king and queen from the junior and senior girls and boys.


have to say they came a long way since the first day of practice. This was a group of hard-working girls who put together a well-organized team on the court in a short two months. I am very proud of how much they improved over all."


"Coach Parham always motivates us and Coach Pike keeps us on task and on track. We wouldn't be the team we are without them," said junior Jaela Bills, a returning player.







Pep Rallies and Spirit Week


