But what does all this happiness mean? Sure it's great that people who have separated for so long can now come together, but why is that so significant?





ave you ever smelled Freedom? Have you ever smelled an empty field in spring, or the endless sky or an open highway? Have you smelled the concrete and steel now lying crumbled under the feet of Freedom? Do you know what it smells like? Do you know how it sounds? What does Freedom look like?

Although Freedom and liberty don't take on definite shapes, you can see, hear and smell the results of freedom. The most poignant example is the Berlin Wall, a 30 year old symbol of oppression and hatred.

On January 17th, the Ansbach basketball team got on the duty train and began an experience they probably will not soon forget. Friday morning they went on a tour of Berlin, which included a stop at the Wall.

Disregarding the fences, the teams ran towards the wall, the coaches behind carrying chisels and hammers. As the coaches chipped, the students stuffed their pockets, some going so far as to buy some graffitipieces from vendors.

After they had gotten their fill of rocks, they walked along the wall. Some felt the pieces of concrete and thought of what they stood for. Others went to border patrols to watch snake-like lines of people, all happy, and all waiting to get a taste of the West. They chattered and laughed, shaking hands with border police as they made their way back to the bus.

Many people will never hear, see, and feel what they did that day. They had experienced Freedom in its most basic form: the end of oppression. They learned from that short half hour at the Wall the way few others will be able to learn.





What's Next?




RESPONSIBILITIES

If you ever hear someone say, "Do an ollie kick flip to a fakie on a mini quarter (trick ramp)," then you'll know they are what is known as a true skater.



Why all the fuss over the Munich Mustangs? Simply: They are the black knights and we are the white knight and being the white knight, we are compelled to beat them. No matter what!






During the month of April or May the Battalion is usually inspected by a team from USAREUR and 7th Army Head-







And they did. There wasn't enough time in one day to complete all the things that needed to be done so teachers had to take it home.


"The preparation period isn't near enough time. After students leave from getting help - about 3:45-4:00, I work up here for a couple of hours," English teacher Mrs. Meier said.

As a result, while school officially ended at 3:05, one of the hardest parts of the teachers' day had just begun.











horn, and Daniel Aubrey. Willie Luke ran for 206 yards with two T.D's. Ansbach killed Baumholder with a 48-20 victory.








The team started out well, defeating Nurnberg in their first game. Maybe the holidays between games hurt them because they didn't taste victory again until February!

Kent Robertson and Associates received the bid to do the individual Senior portraits and all the underclass photography. The remainder of all the photography was taken, developed, and printed by the Staff of the 1989-90 Onoldia.
