After many talks with Hussein, President Bush sent in the Armed Forces. Declaring war on the 16 of January, 1991, the planes headed for targets in Irag. Everybody was shocked as the worlds mouth opened in terror. Protests were held banning war, but President Bush's word was upheld. In the now unified Germany terrorism was a great threat. Some schools closed and everyday life was changed. Guards roamed the hallway and we all felt protected. Even though their guns weren't loaded, they still would scare any intruder who didn't have one (a gun that is). We asked some guards questions, question 1 being "What is your objective?" Answers were, "We are to quard the outside and inside of the high school, to look for any suspicious things or people and to keep students spirits up. In case of a bomb threat, everybody would be evacuated and the Military Police would be contacted." I asked, "What would you do if a terrorist came in and started shooting at people?" Sqt Phil Simms of HHB 6/43rd Batallion said "If your life is threatened, who knows what will happen."

On Sunday, February 24, 1991, the ground war came into effect. Many Iraqi soldiers surrendered in the first day of the ground war. The war continued on and we all felt for the soldiers and prayed for peace. I say we nuke 'em. On February 28, 1991, Allied forces called a cease fire. 

"We're playing at the Keller tonight and anybody that's not coming is heading to Tivoli Park and later to the Goose."


Jennifer said, "There's a party at Jay Depuy's house, I'm going over there later on with Janer Brumbaugh."


The night was wearing on and I was ready for something a little more mellow. To that end, I struck out for the Y.A.


SENIORITIS STRIKES **AGAIN**

Then there were the expenses that were necessary - the ACT and the SAT tests along with the transcripts and application costs. They added up.








Meetin' britches!


TENNIS TEAM












