# WAR ERUPTS

## Air armada hammers Iraq

CENTRAL SAUDI ARABIA — The United States and its allies hurled a mighty air armada against Iraq early Thursday in the first step to crush that Arab nation's military power and drive it from conquered Kuwait.

Wave after wave of warplanes streaked north from Saudi Arabian bases on a starlit night to punish Iraq for its five-month defiance of the rest


of the world. In Baghdad, reporters said bomb explosions shook the ground of the Iraqi capital. An oil refinery 10 miles away was in flames, and flashes of light — apparently anti-aircraft fire — brightened the night sky, they said.

"Operation Desert Shield" became "Operation Desert Storm" around 12:50 a.m., local time, as F-15E fighter-bombers took off from the largest U.S. air base in central Saudi Arabia.

The air offensive, aimed at strategic sites in Iraq and Kuwait, included U.S. Air Force planes, British Tornado fighter-bombers, 150 Saudi Arabian F-15s and Tornados, and aircraft of Kuwait's exiled military, allied officials said.

U.S.-led forces launched a second wave of air attacks on Iraq Thursday morning from air bases around the region, a Western military officer said.

With the cold war coming to an end, talks of peace were in the air. But on August 2, 1990, all hopes for peace ended. Iraqi president Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait. After many talks with Hussein, President Bush sent in the Armed Forces. Declaring war on the 16 of January, 1991, the planes headed for targets in Iraq. Everybody was shocked as the world's mouth opened in terror. Protests were held banning war, but President Bush's word was upheld. In the now unified Germany terrorism was a great threat. Some schools closed and everyday life was changed. Guards roamed the hallway and we all felt protected. Even though their guns weren't loaded, they still would scare any intruder who didn't have one (a gun that is). We asked some guards questions, question 1 being "What is your objective?" Answers were, "We are to guard the outside and inside of the high school, to look for any suspicious things or people and to keep students spirits up. In case of a bomb threat, everybody would be evacuated and the Military Police would be contacted." I asked, "What would you do if a terrorist came in and started shooting at people?" Sgt Phil Simms of HHB 6/43rd Battalion said "If your life is threatened, who knows what will happen."

On Sunday, February 24, 1991, the ground war came into effect. Many Iraqi soldiers surrendered in the first day of the ground war. The war continued on and we all felt for the soldiers and prayed for peace. I say we nuke 'em. On February 28, 1991, Allied forces called a cease fire. Everybody was happy here that the president was victorious. What is war and why does it have to exist?

I wasn't disappointed.











## SENIORITIS STRIKES AGAIN

brain was in la-la land and on a trip?




# BACK FROM BEIRUT





"I would probably buy a car that talks, a house somewhere in Virginia," said junior Richelle Patterson, "and I would put the rest of it in the bank."



One student knows exactly how he would spend every cent of his money.


But not everyone thinks of themselves. As senior Emmiline Daiz said.

"I'd give half of it to my mother and the other half to my husband."



# THE 1991 COUGAR AJROTC RIFLE TEAM






# Academic Games




touchdown. This sadly ended the game.


## TENNIS TEAM






## SHORT — HANDED


