






Paradise In The German Countryside







The sale was to take place at the Reese Theater, where all the slaves were displayed. All the students came, even the abolitionists. The bidding started, and as usual, the abolitionists made threats agaist the Southerners. Some of the slaves, who had hopes of being freed by the abolitionists, were beaten. The leader, Jim Konyha, was then sold off a pretty penny to the plantation owner, Mike Miller. One slave by the name of Gaye Powell was sold to a bunch of farm boys, believed to be from down South. The Slave Sale went on quite well until the question was brought up, should slaves own slaves? This was answered by Konyha buying a slave to take his place. At this the abolitionists were shocked and began a distasteful action, which was hastily put down by the Southerners. 







SADIE HAWKINS DANCE


GIRLS' PHYSICAL FITNESS ASSEMBLY
