



for induction and briefing.

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


Practice started off rough as Couch















## Paradise In The German Countryside





## "Abolitionists vs. Southerners"

The great day had come; the slave traders had brought their wares to Augsburg High. But this was not to be a peaceful day, for the abolitionists were being stirred up, and it meant trouble for the Southerners. The sale was to take place at the Reese Theater, where all the slaves were displayed. All the students came, even the abolitionists. The bidding started, and as usual, the abolitionists made threats against the Southerners. Some of the slaves, who had hopes of being freed by the abolitionists, were beaten. The leader, Jim Konyha, was then sold off a pretty penny to the plantation owner, Mike Miller. One slave by the name of Gaye Powell was sold to a bunch of farm boys, believed to be from down South. The Slave Sale went on quite well until the question was brought up, should slaves own slaves? This was answered by Konyha buying a slave to take his place. At this the abolitionists were shocked and began a distasteful action, which was hastily put down by the Southerners. Then with slave trade still intact, the sale ended.






## SADIE HAWKINS DANCE

Three moons and many howls of the coyote later the chiefs, braves and squaws of the Apache tribe met again to celebrate their victories and recognize their courageous warriors. Now it was the howl of the coyote and the stamping of the buffalo that led them to the Apache's just reward ceremony.

On Dec. 5 the tribe set out on the long, rocky trail to their Reese Kaserne encampment. There Chiefs Greenspan and Stephenson, the football coaches, along with Chief King for golf and Chief Katsaros for cross-country, came forward to present the supreme award for the warriors' efforts, the big "A". They also awarded the J.V. letters to those warriors with less game time.

Afterward, the football players presented their coaches with a football apiece and the cross-country boys gave their coach a beer mug. With this over and the tribe quite content with the ceremonies, the pow-wow came to a close and the Apaches prepared for the journey home. Seniors were dismissed first.


## GIRLS' PHYSICAL FITNESS ASSEMBLY
