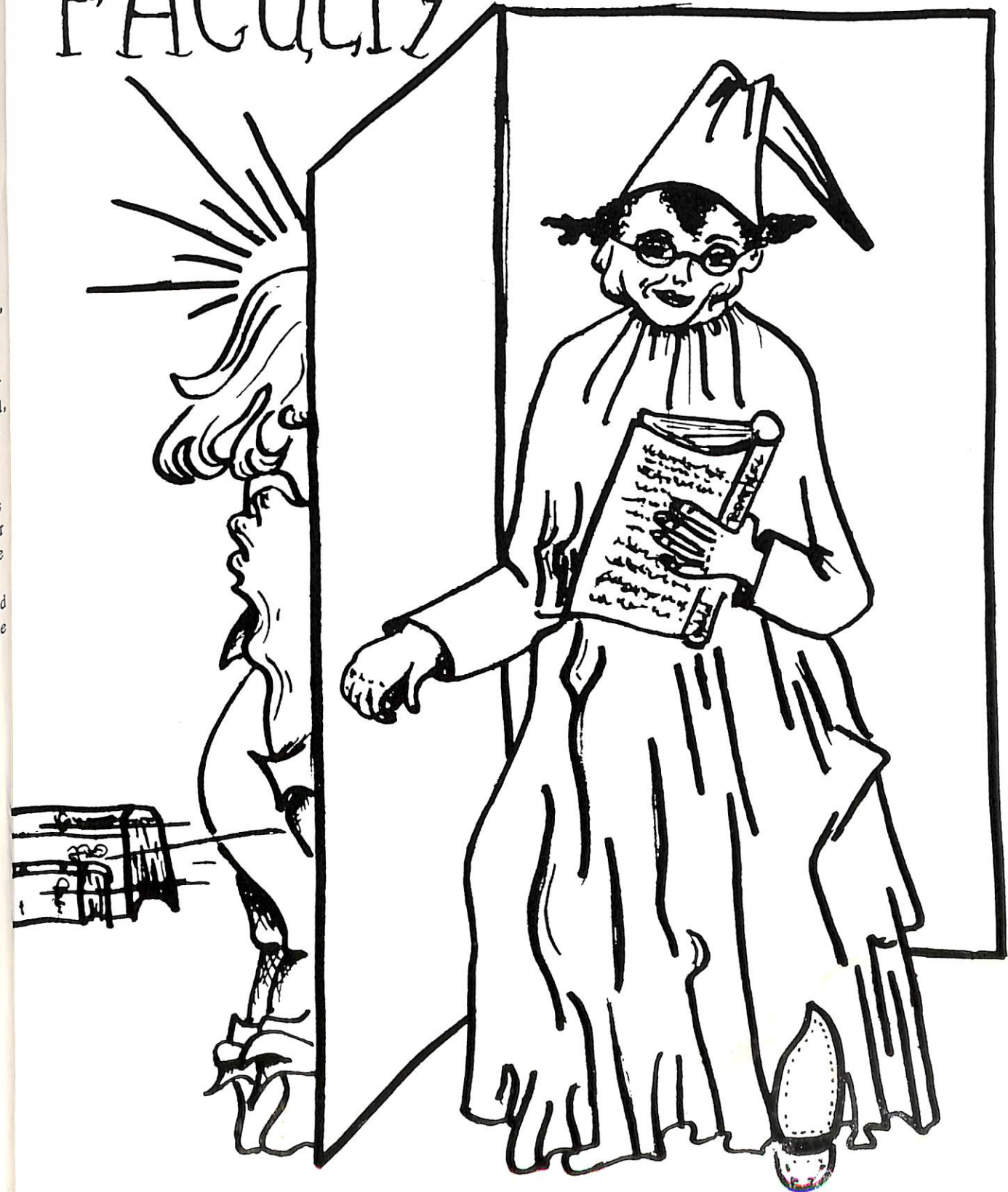
FOREWORD

After a disappointing season of football, the Bear-Kats pepped up school spirit during a remarkable basketball season.

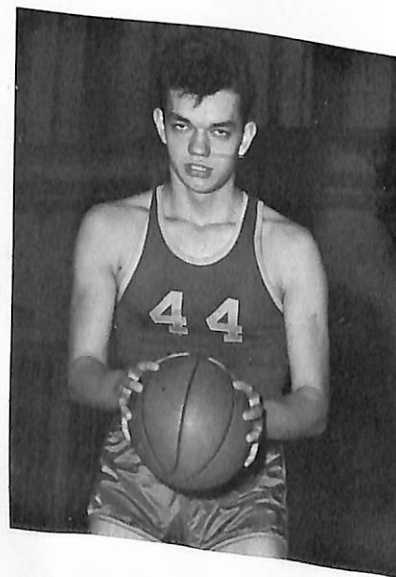
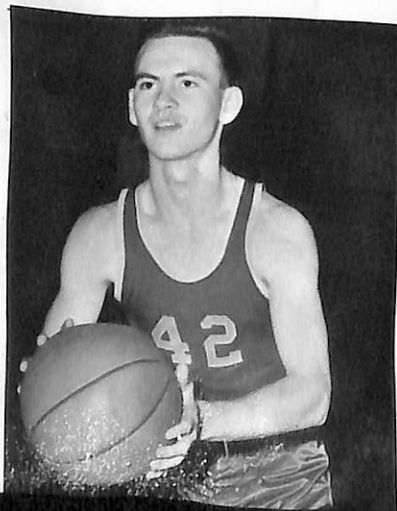
