THE ISSUE

Being an American overseas is tougher now than it has ever been. Events surrounding terrorism and the Iraqi conflict have impacted the lives of Bamberg High students. Parents are deployed, school-sponsored, off-post activities are limited and the school entrance/exit policy has been changed.

The possibility of terriorist threats to Americans resulted in security measures on the post and school. All but one door of the high school building is off-limits to students, causing many, as Jessica Mayfield admitted, to "go all around to the main doors, [and] then [be] late to class!" 
requested a review of the one door policy with suggestions, but was dismissed.




Middle School Reactivates

Curriculum Changes


Over the past two years several new courses have been offered. These classes include Digital Video Production, Computer Service and Support, Robotics, Reading, and Math Labs.

school year."






Changes are on the way for the PSAT and SAT next year with the elimination of the infamous analogies section and the addition of Some students dislike the more Algebra II material into the math section.












Volunteer Coaches. Coach Peel, Coach Arnie, Coach Horne, and Coach McGill, also supported the Baron football effort.








Training pays off TENNIS








