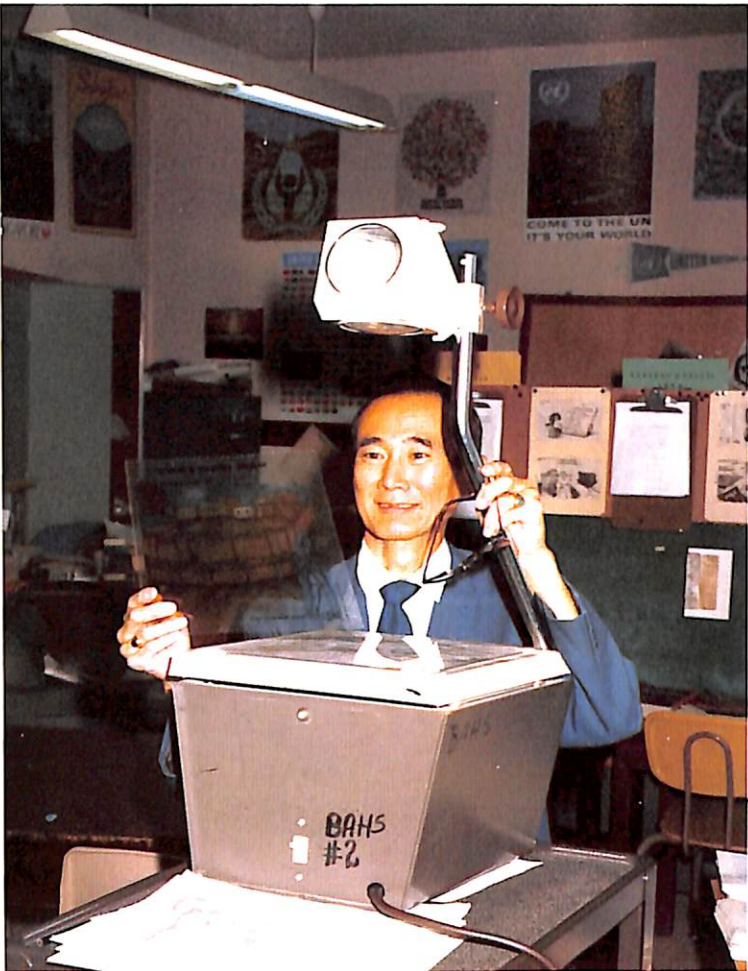
The Future Looms As Seniors View Beyond BAHS

With eyes on the future, the Class of '81 looked to June, as they found that the year zipped by all too fast.

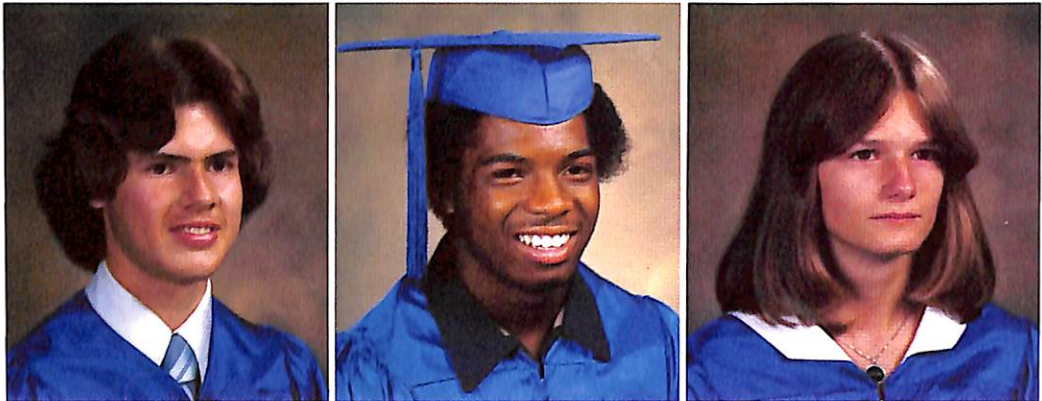
Class elections, Homecoming, the presidential election, and counting graduation requirements held most of their attention. Still, they found time to have a good time. It was a year filled with social obligations also.

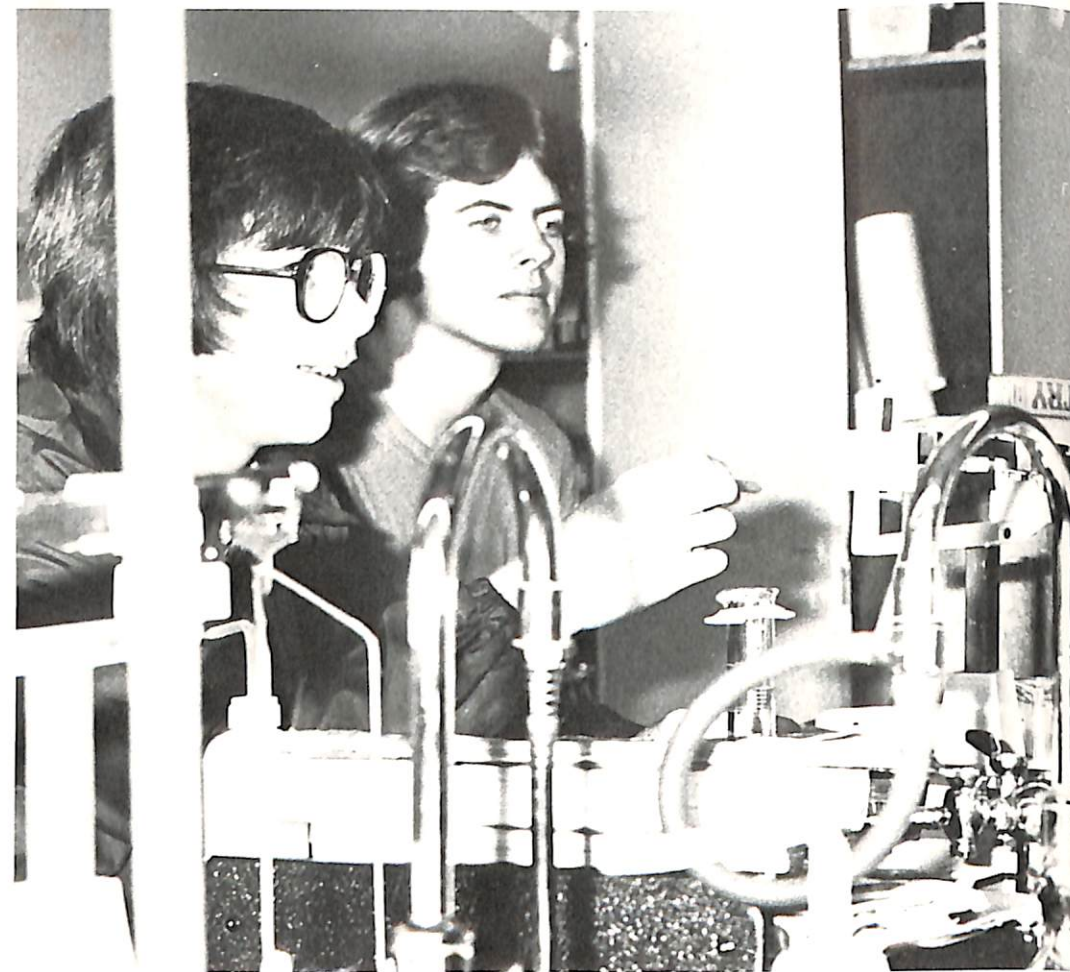
In October, the Prom Committee was formed. This committee oversaw the money-raising activities. This group showed that students who cooperate with one another could build a strong, constructive class.

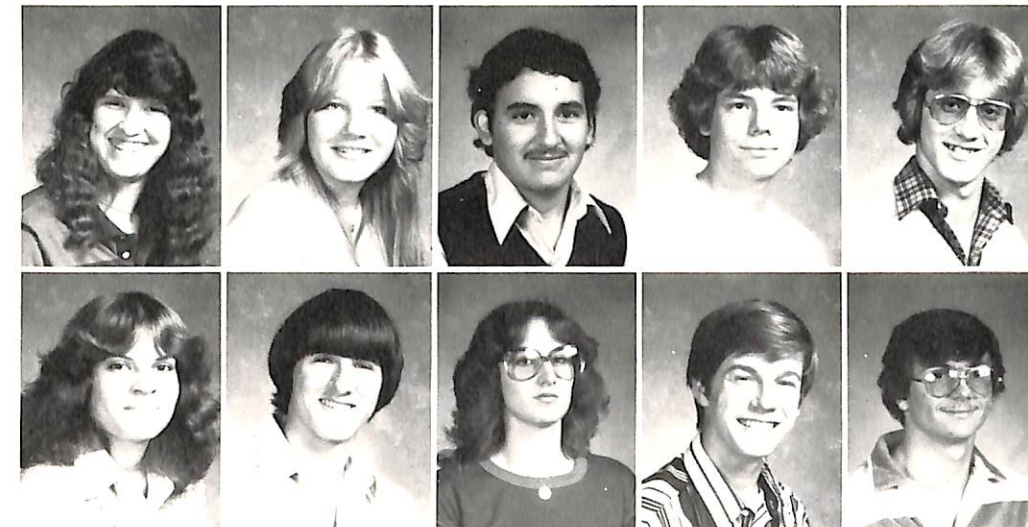

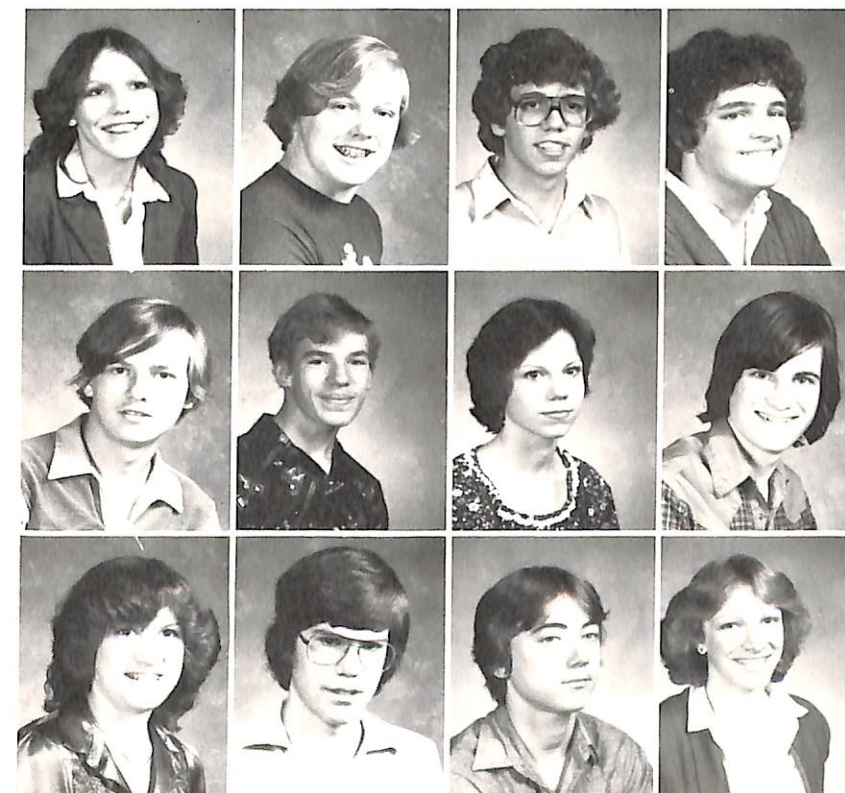

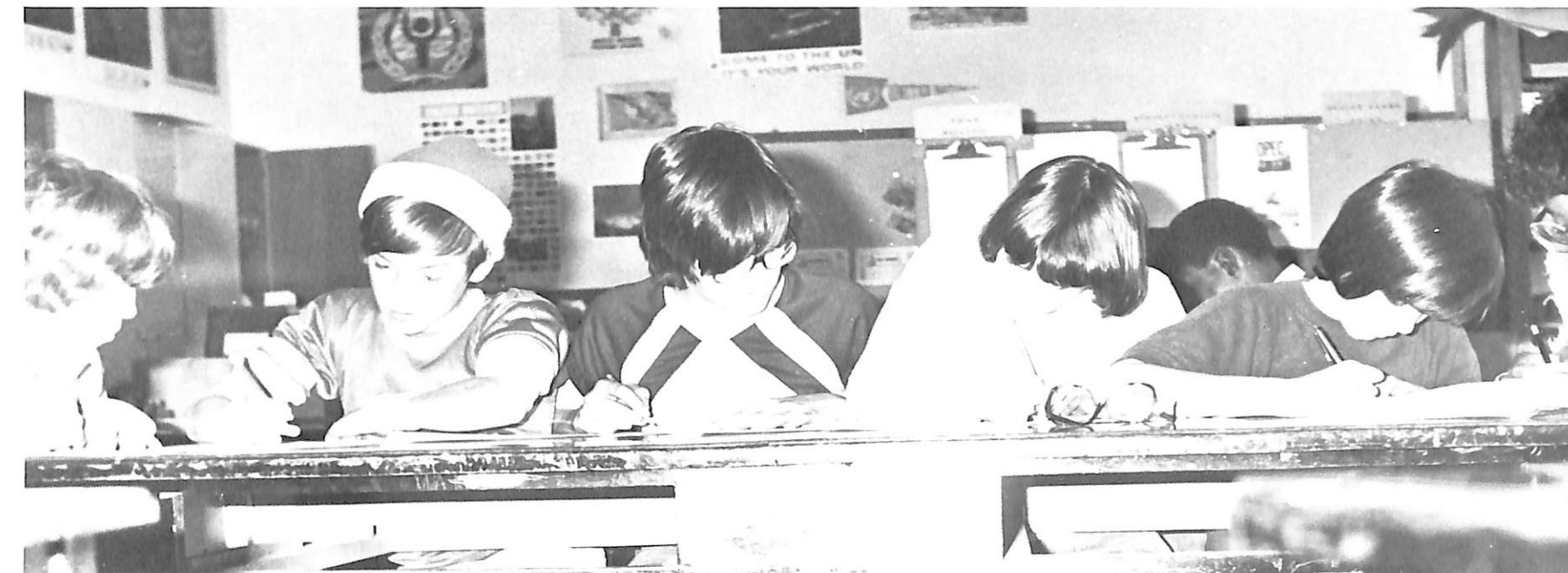

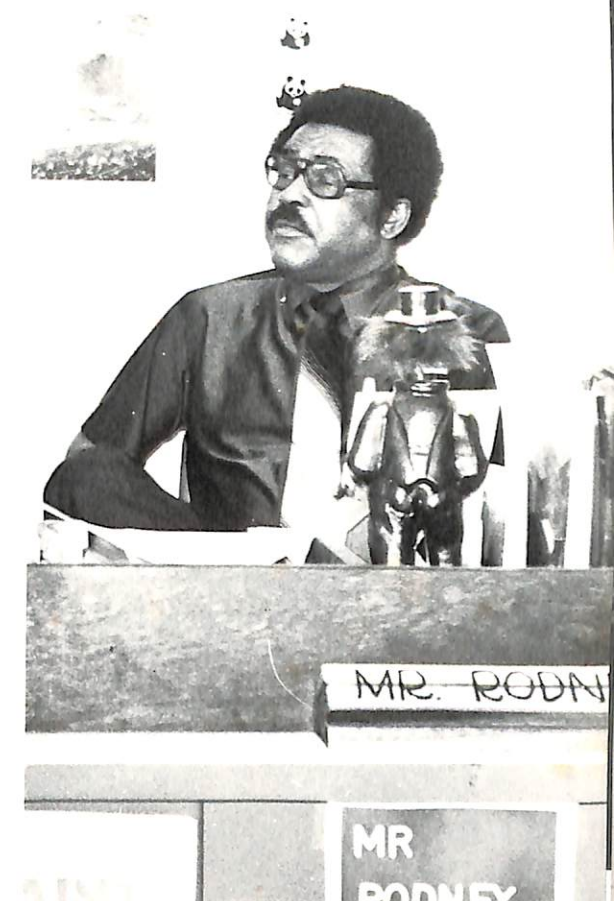
were held without Dr. Davis' presence and sincere support.

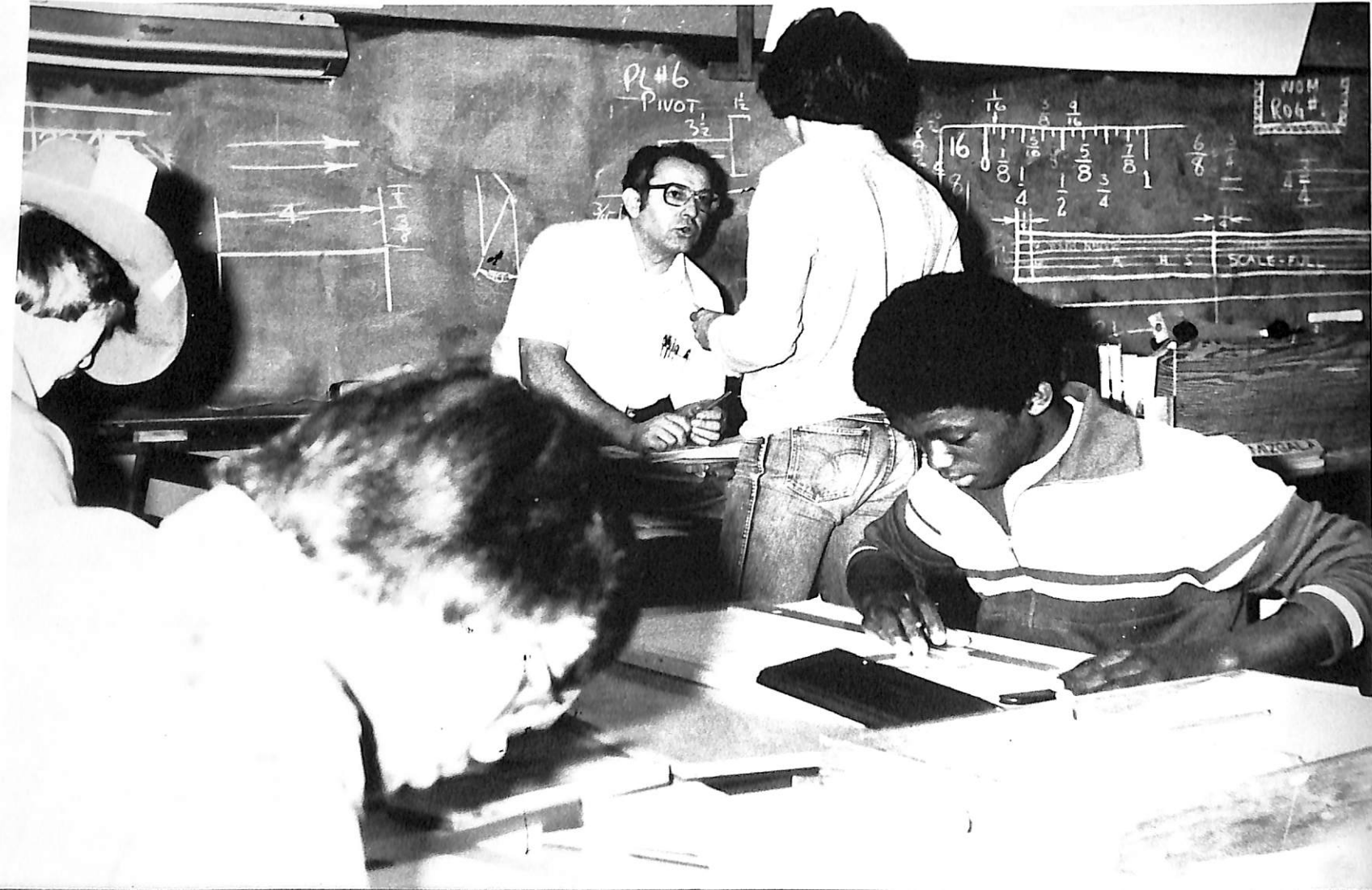

sist of an heiress from the East; a couple of crooks with \$65,000 in a shoebox; and an "incognito" Hollywood glamour girl.

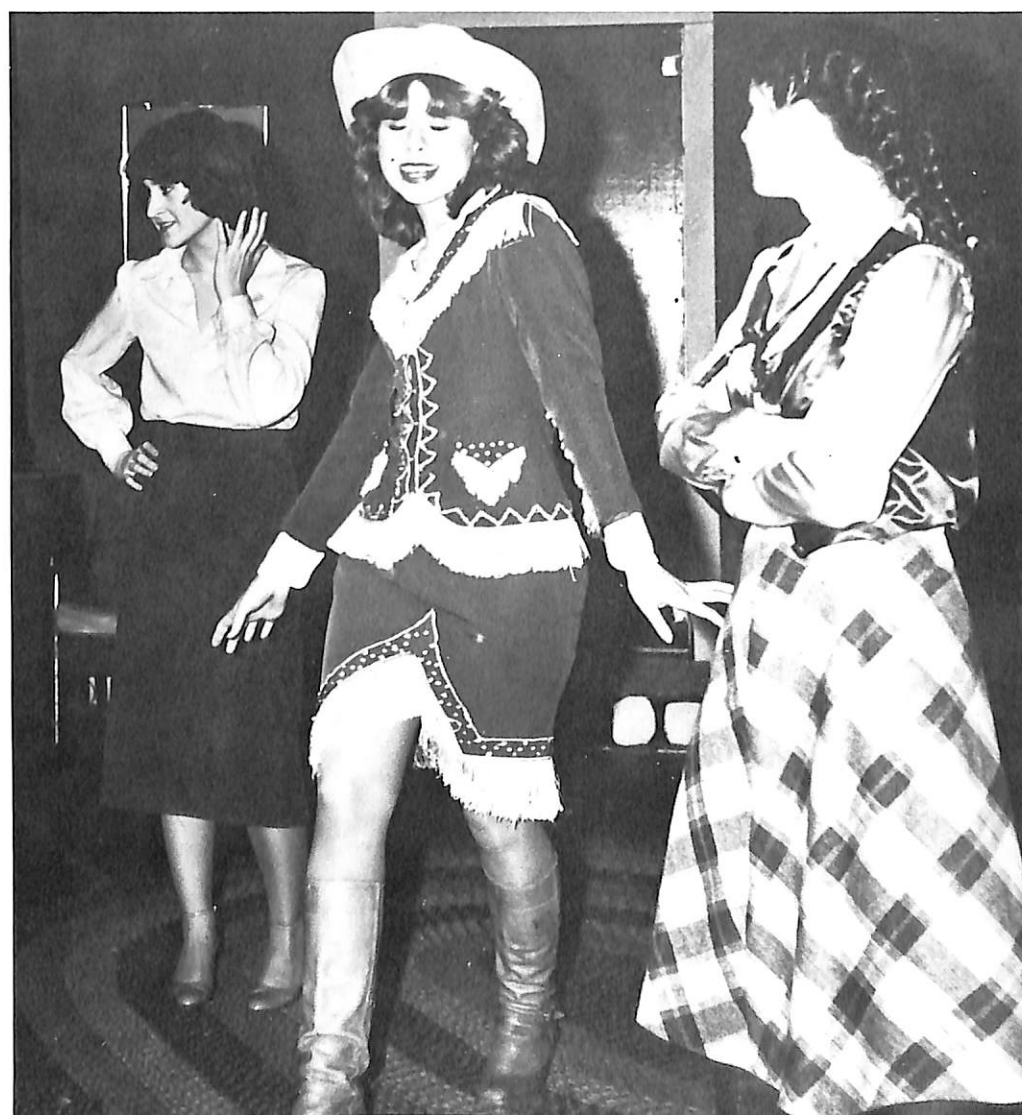
The play ends, of course, with the hero, Freddy Buck, wooing and winning the heroine's heart, but not before "complications" take place.

Defying the actual nationwide trend for Ronald Reagan, Baumholder students' views did not reflect those of the voting age public.

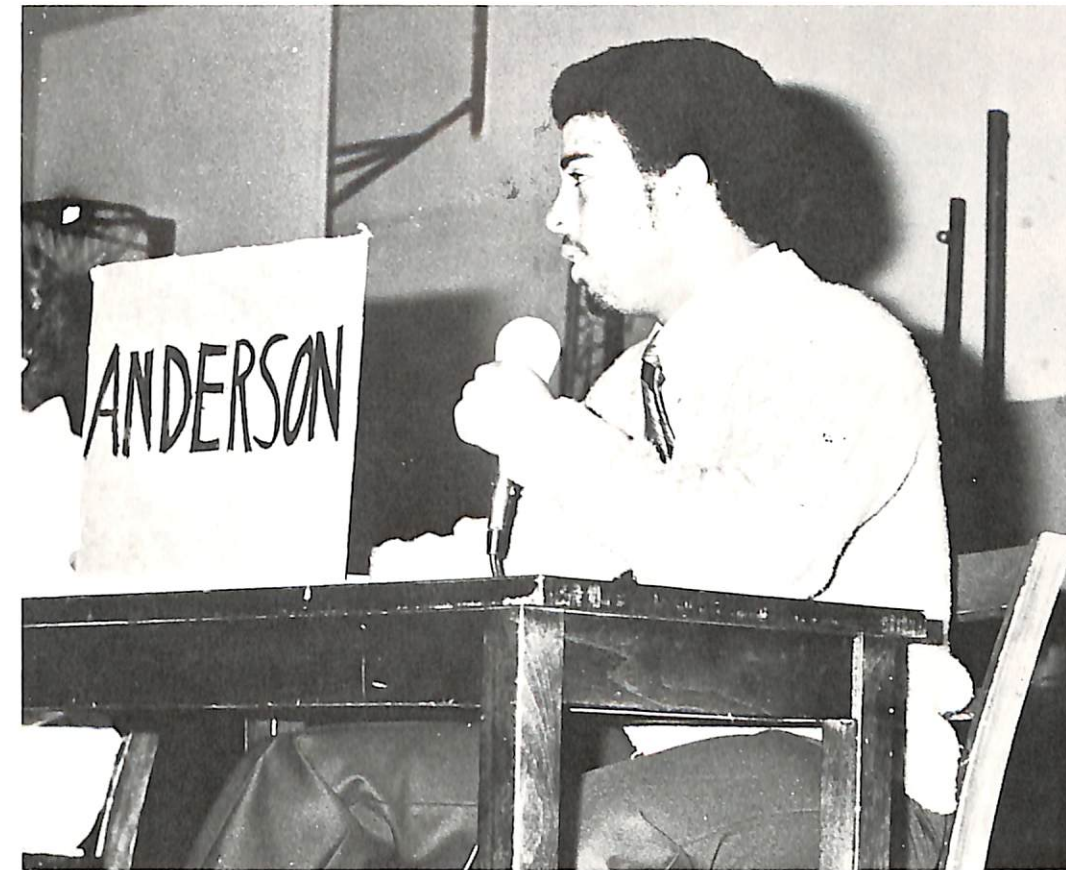
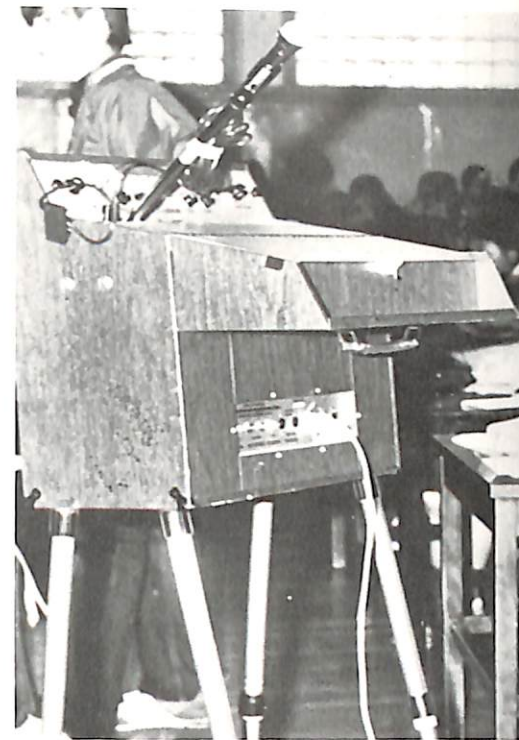

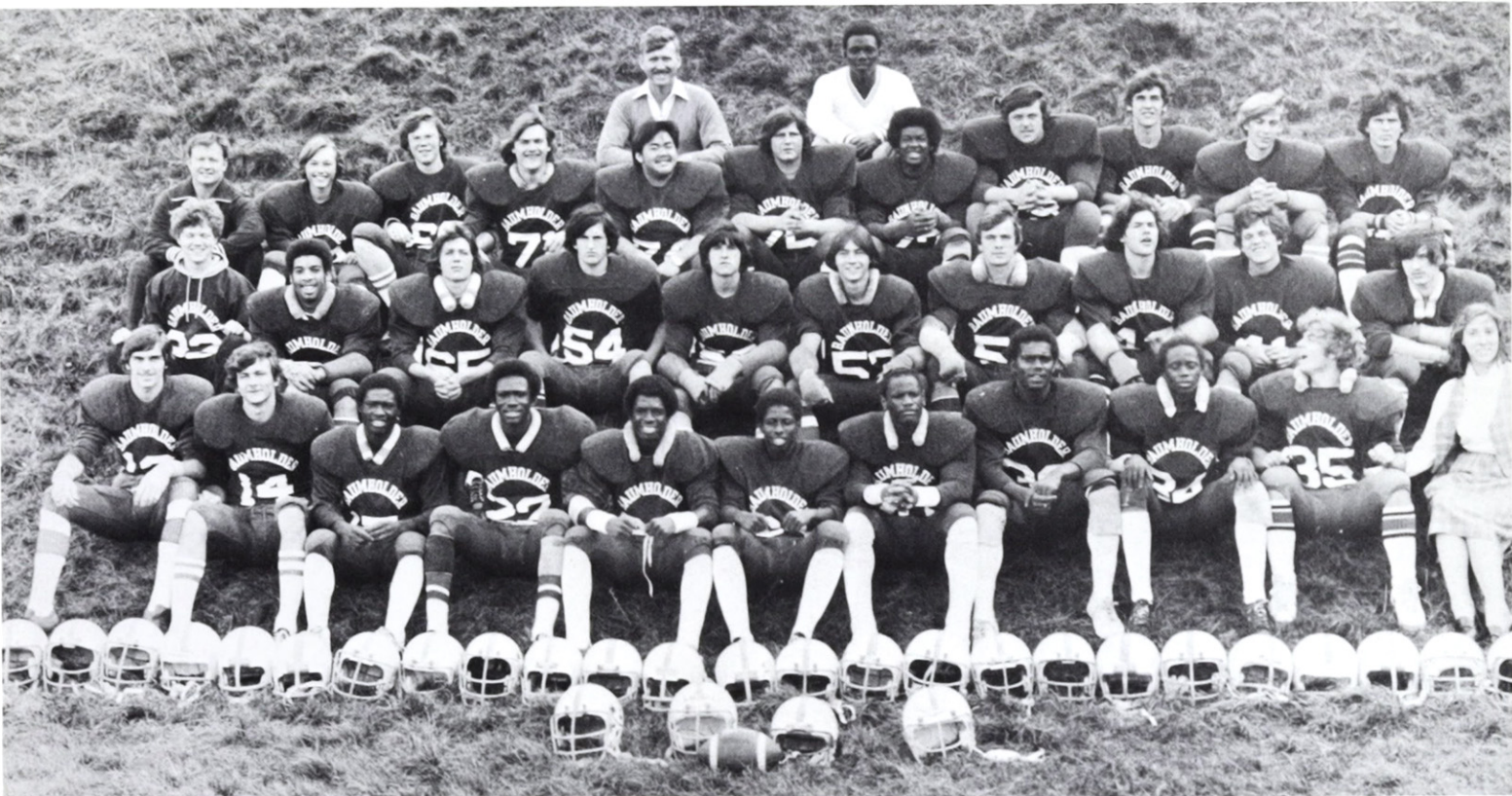

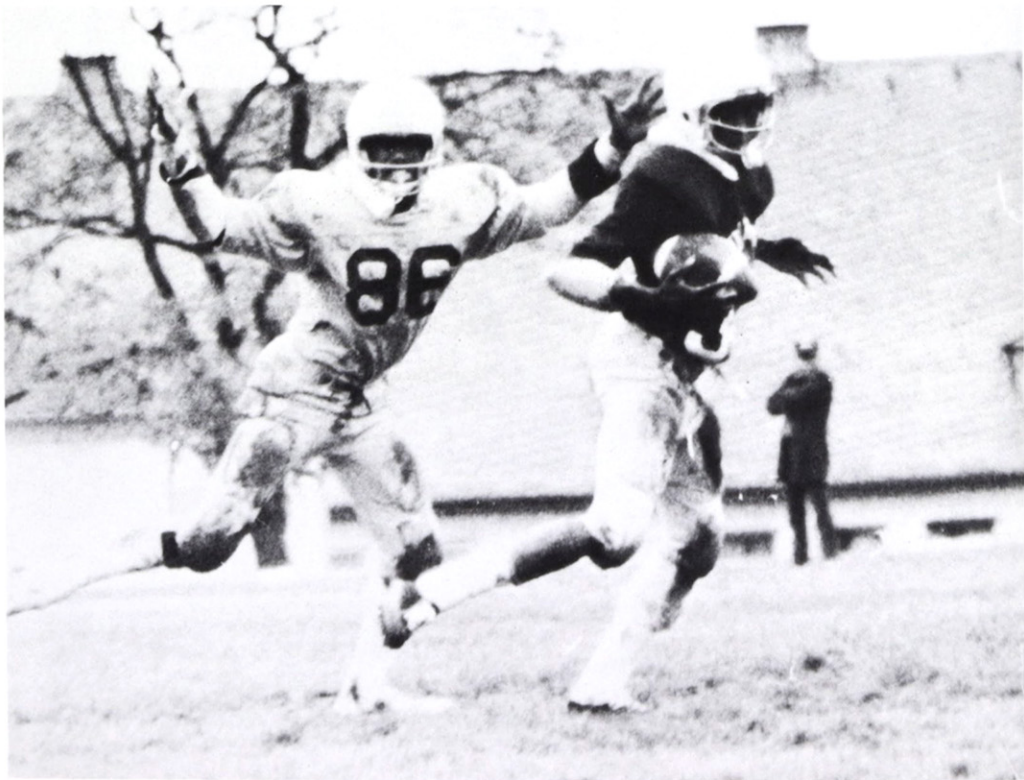

The coach for the team this season was Mr. Don Cornett, whose experience enabled the Bucs to produce a respectable record. This season laid the foundation for an excellent team next year.

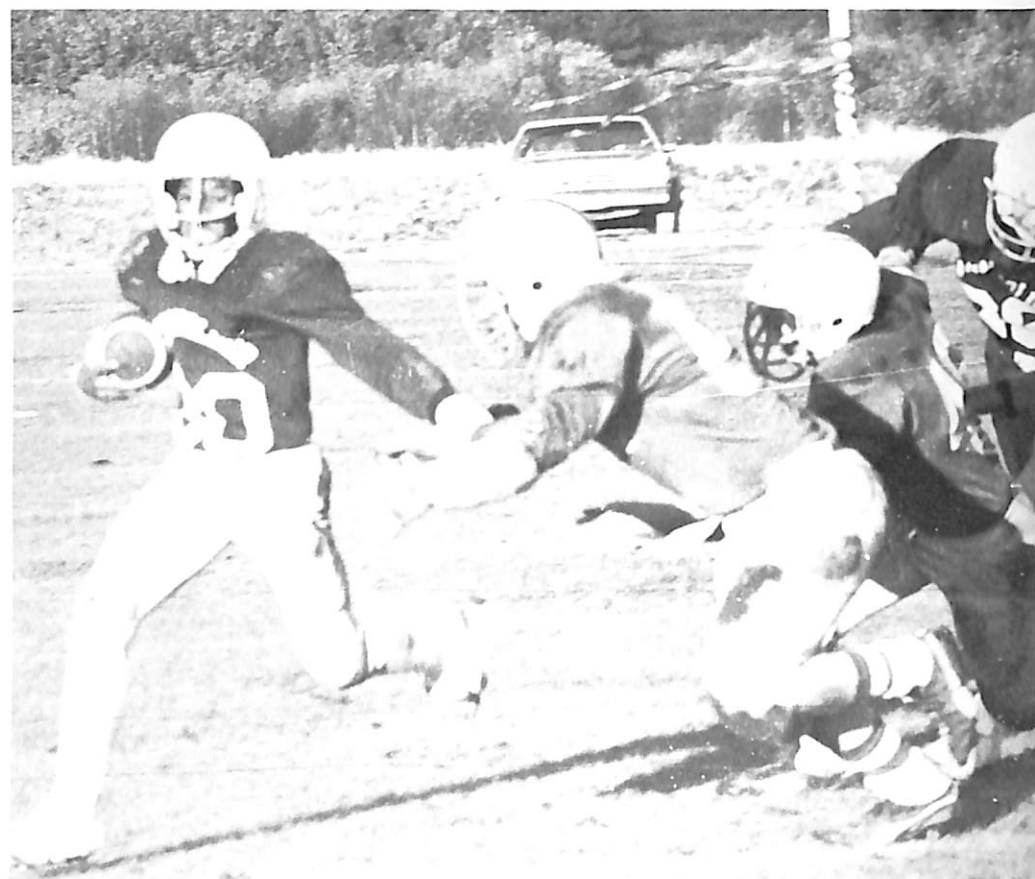

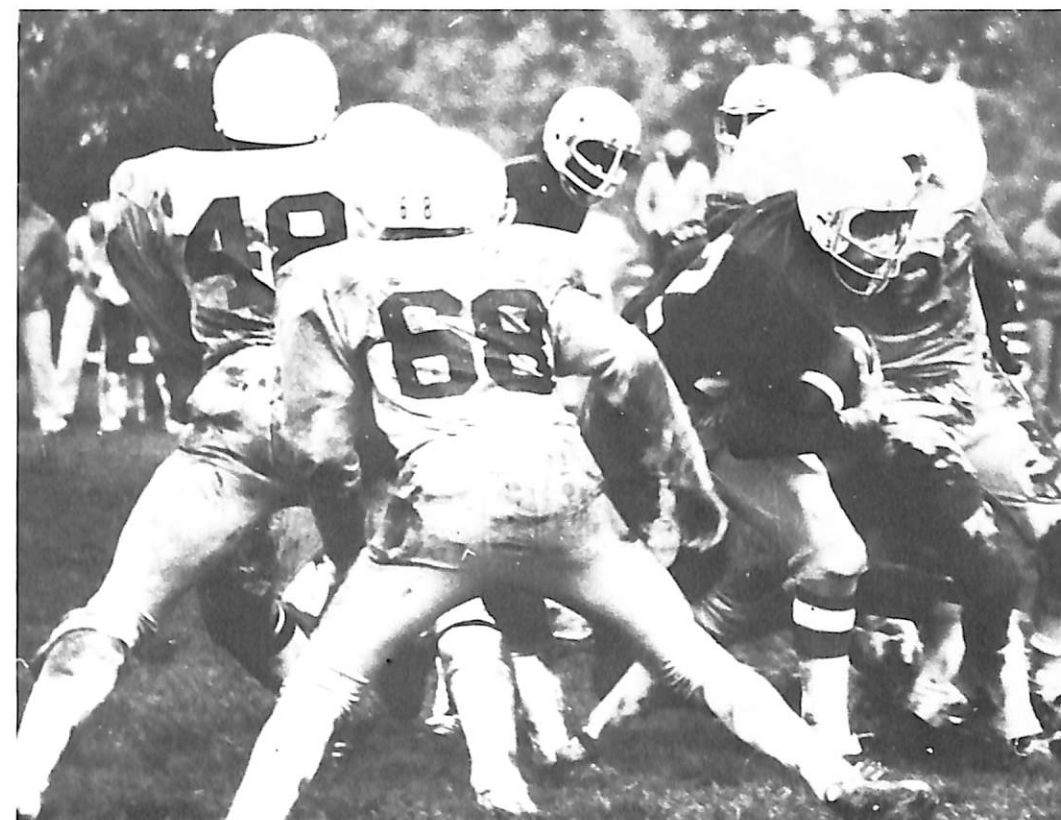

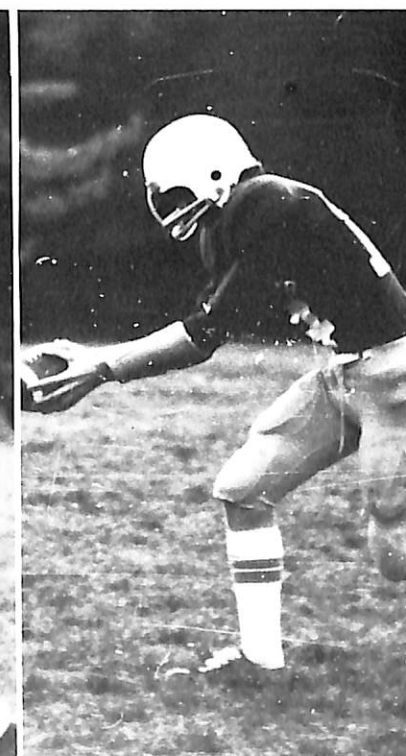

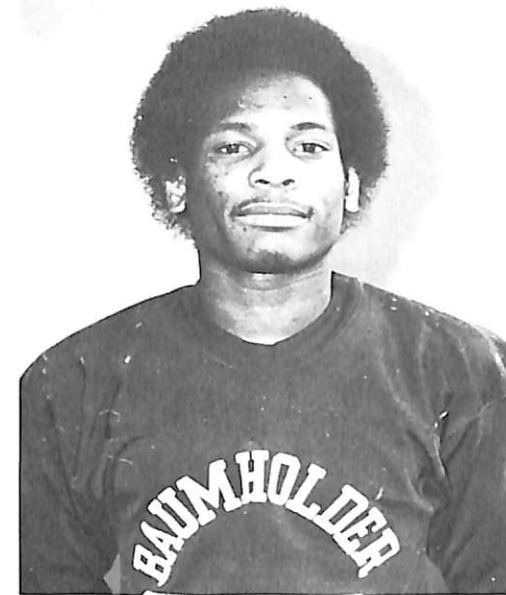

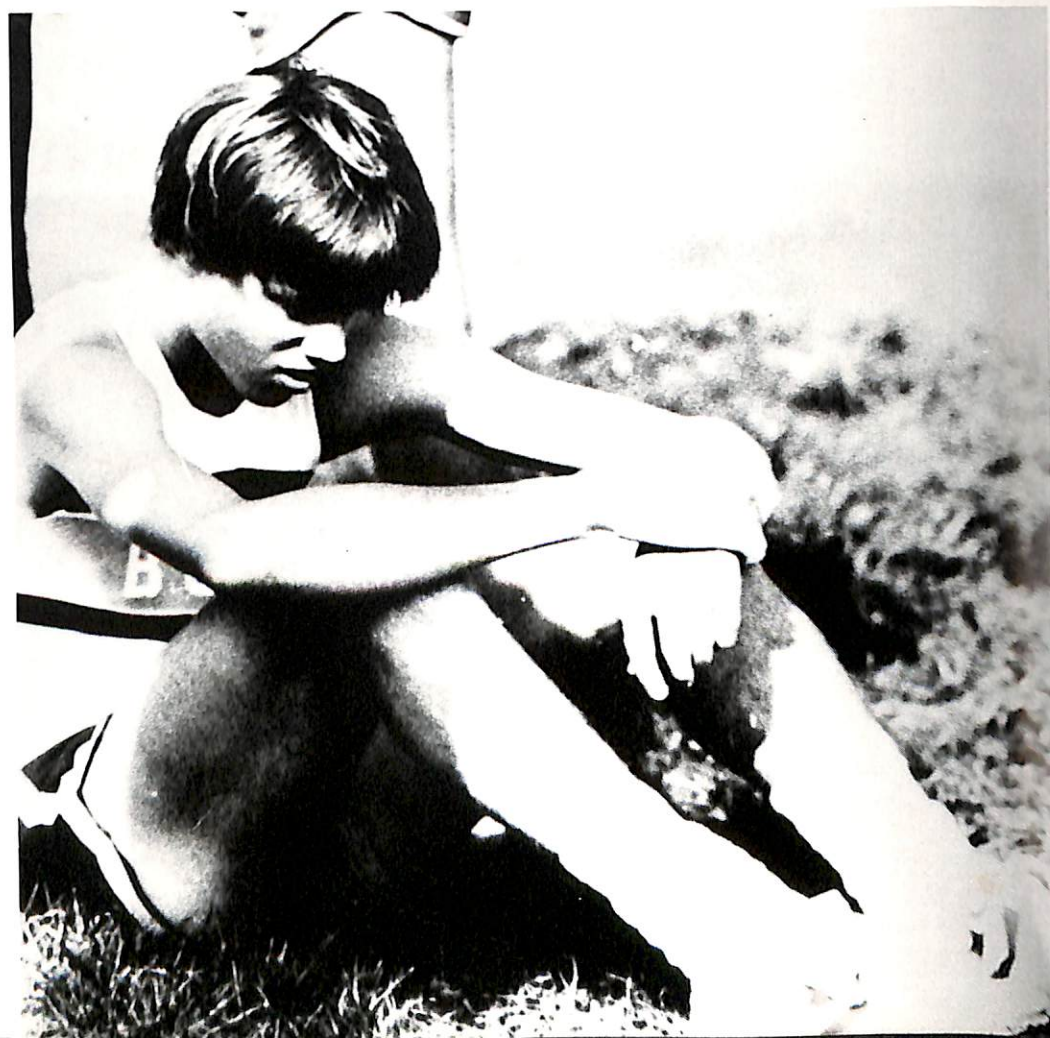

Competing in Mannheim, the Bucs gymnastics team worked its way to a fourth place finish at the finals tournament in the fall.

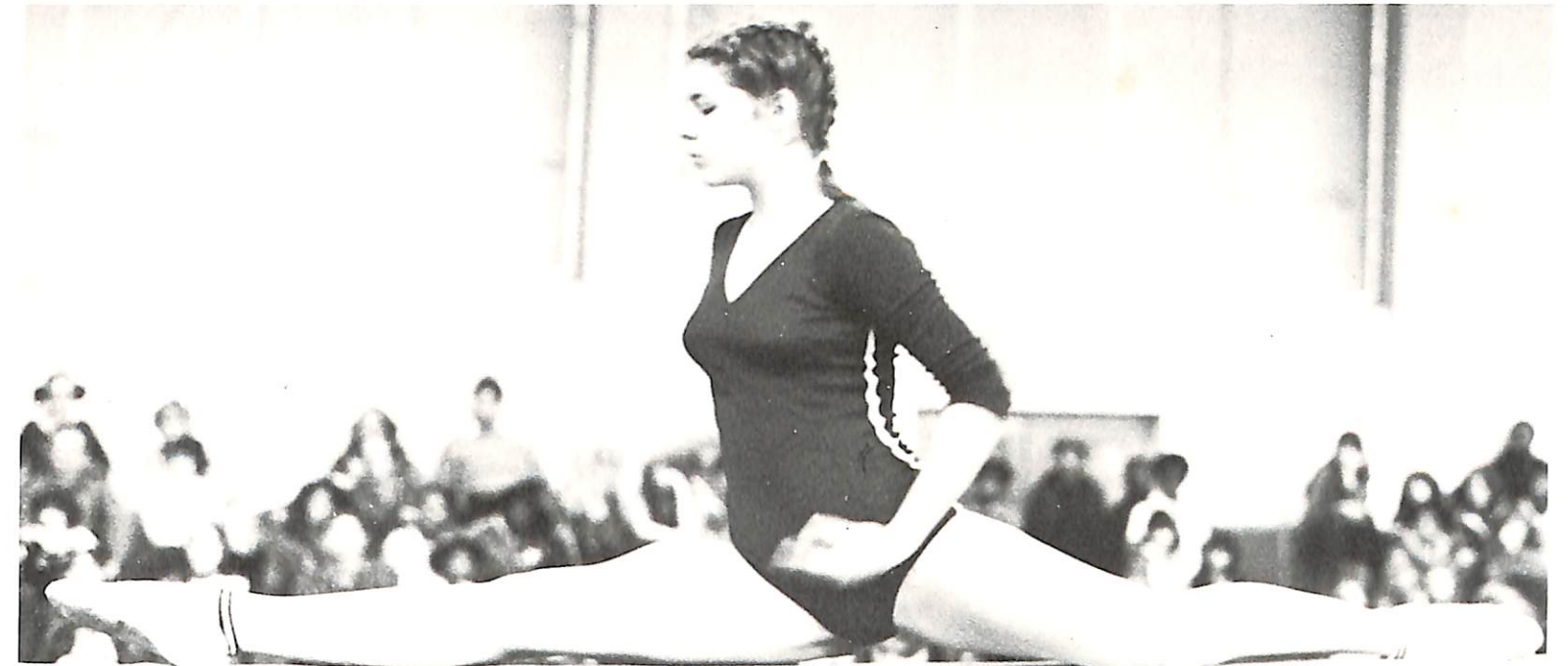

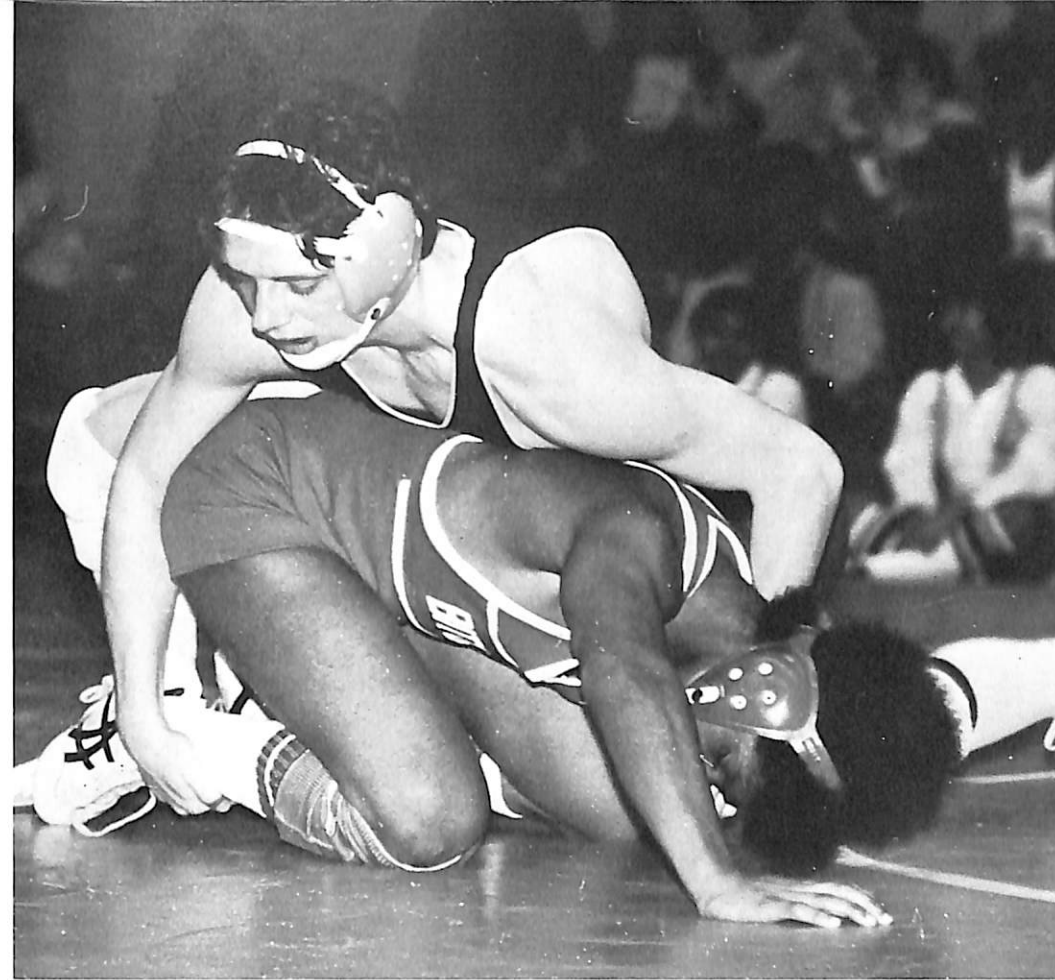

Bucs Clinch' Season Wins, Claim Titles

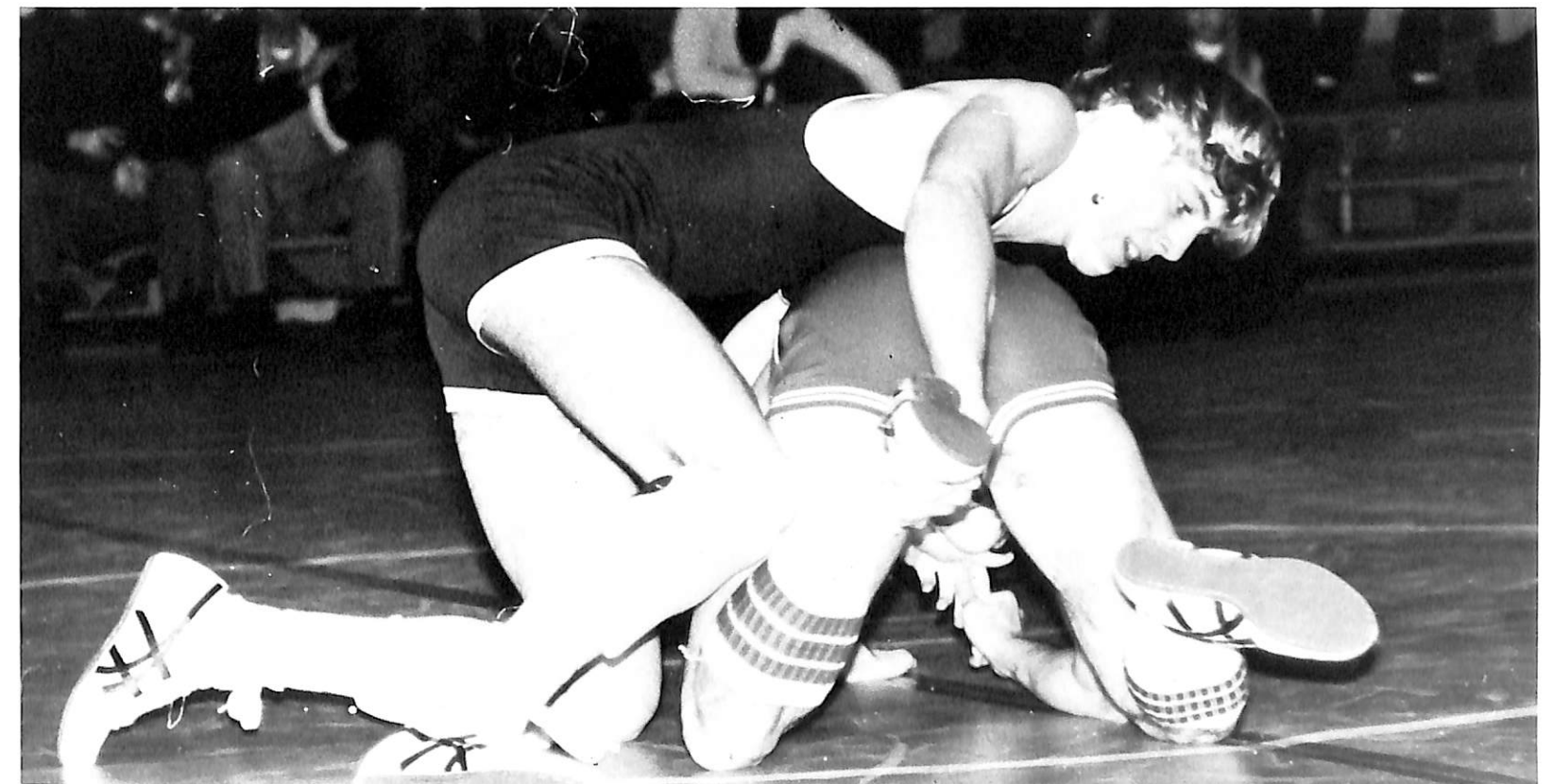
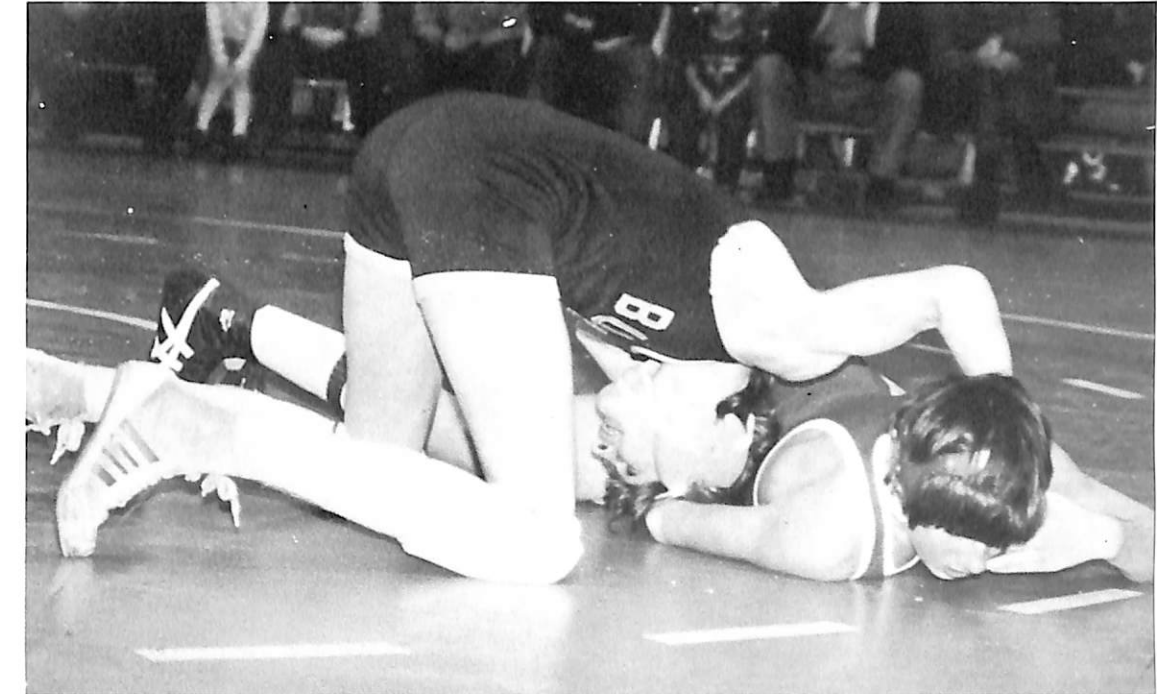
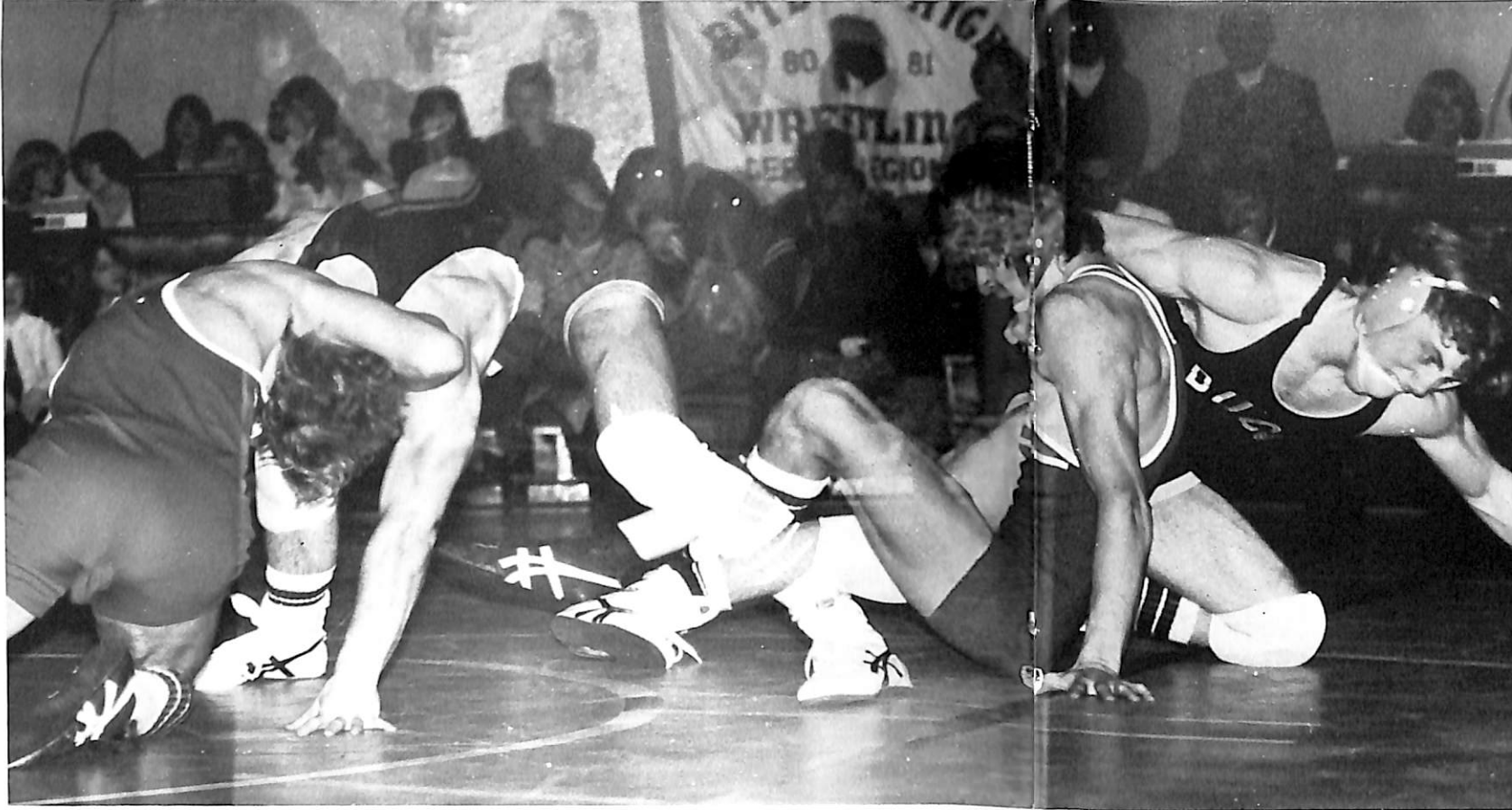
A balance of new talent and a seasoned mentor has produced another impressive wrestling team for 1981.

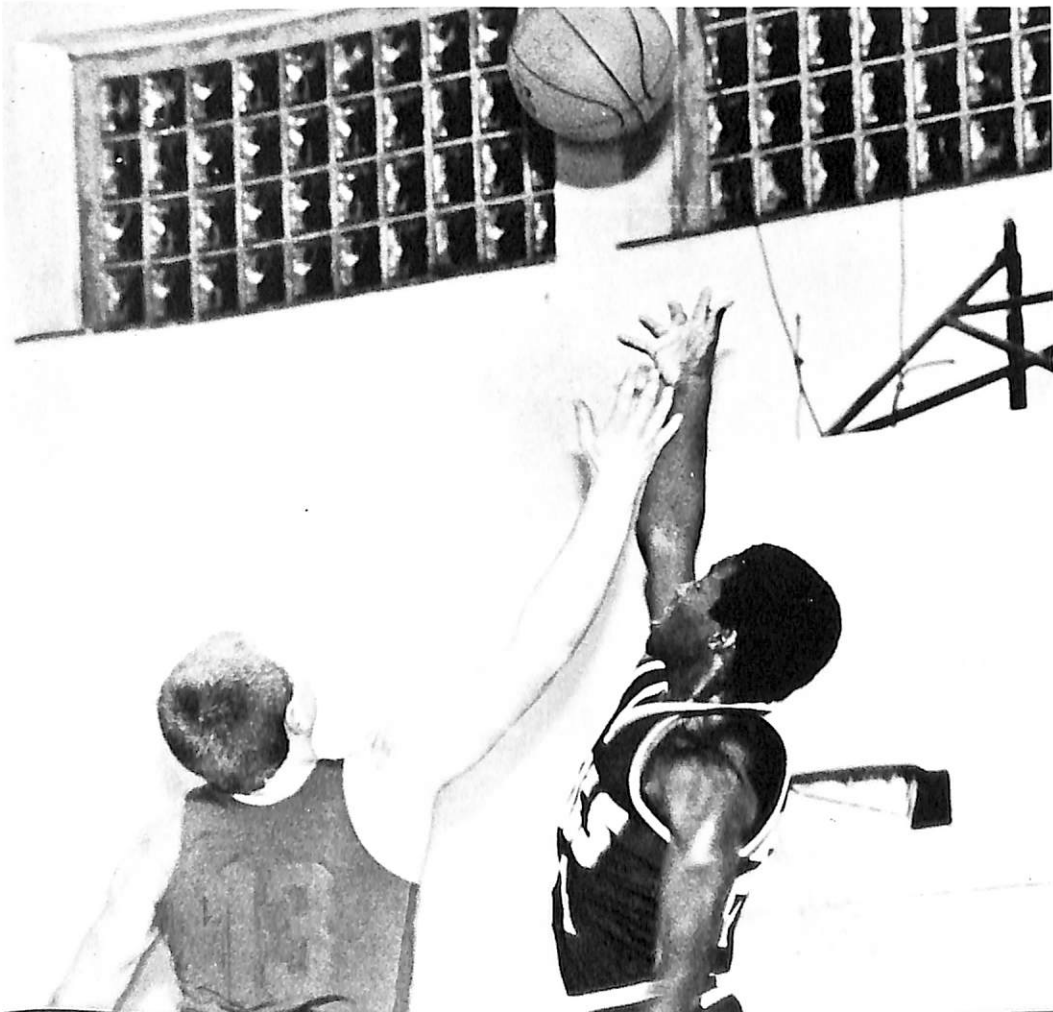

championship.

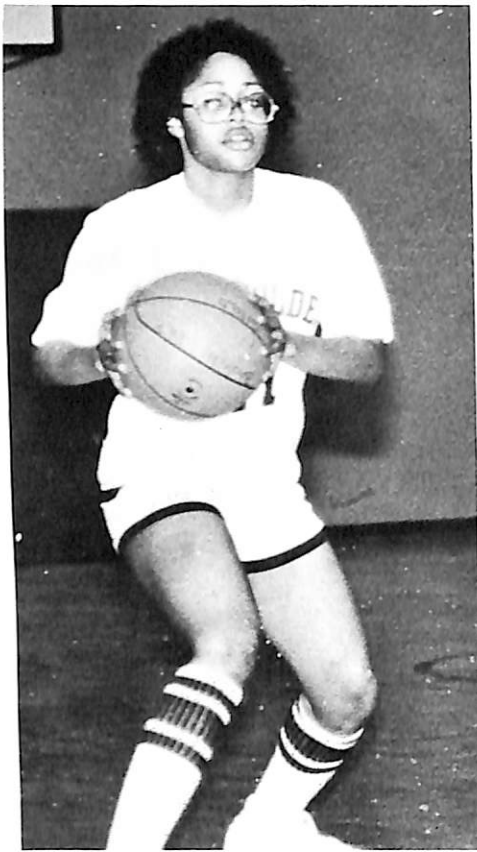
It was a young team, but the squad quickly united and presented a well-coordinated unit. Coach Witte stressed fundamentals and was ably assisted by Miss Mary Larson.

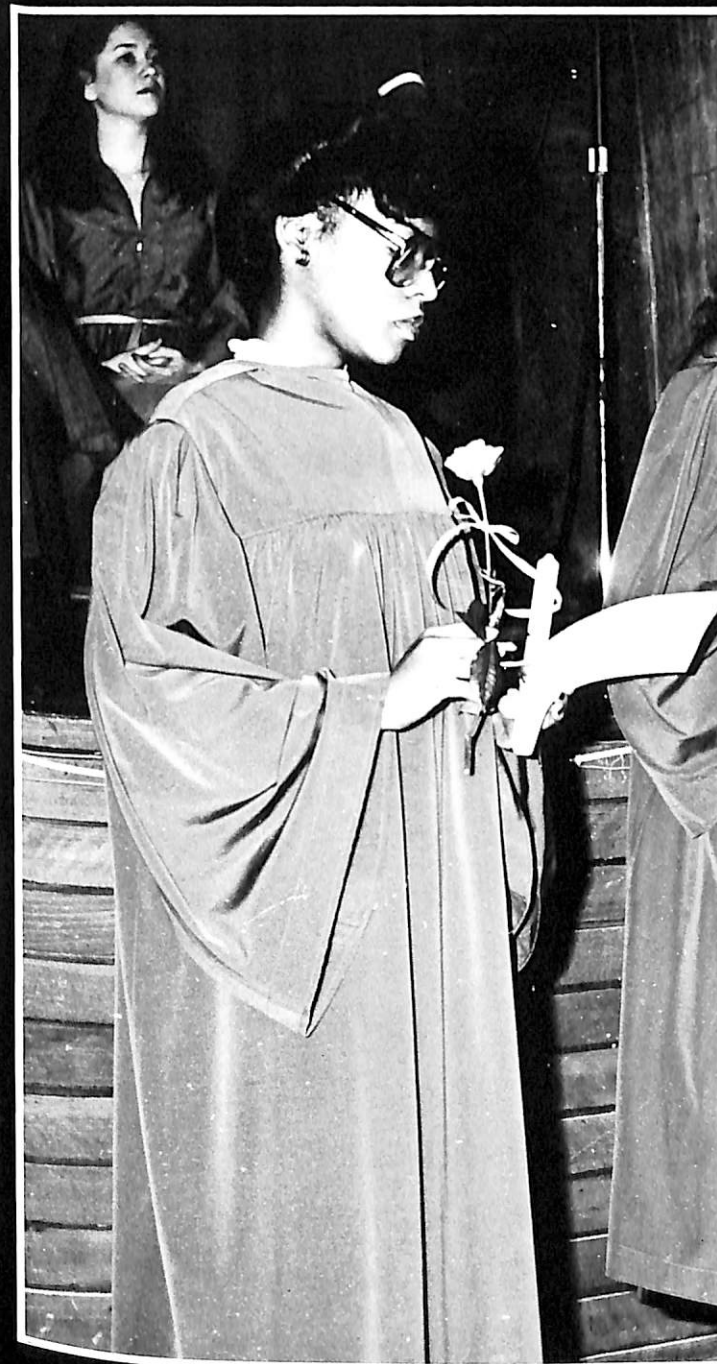
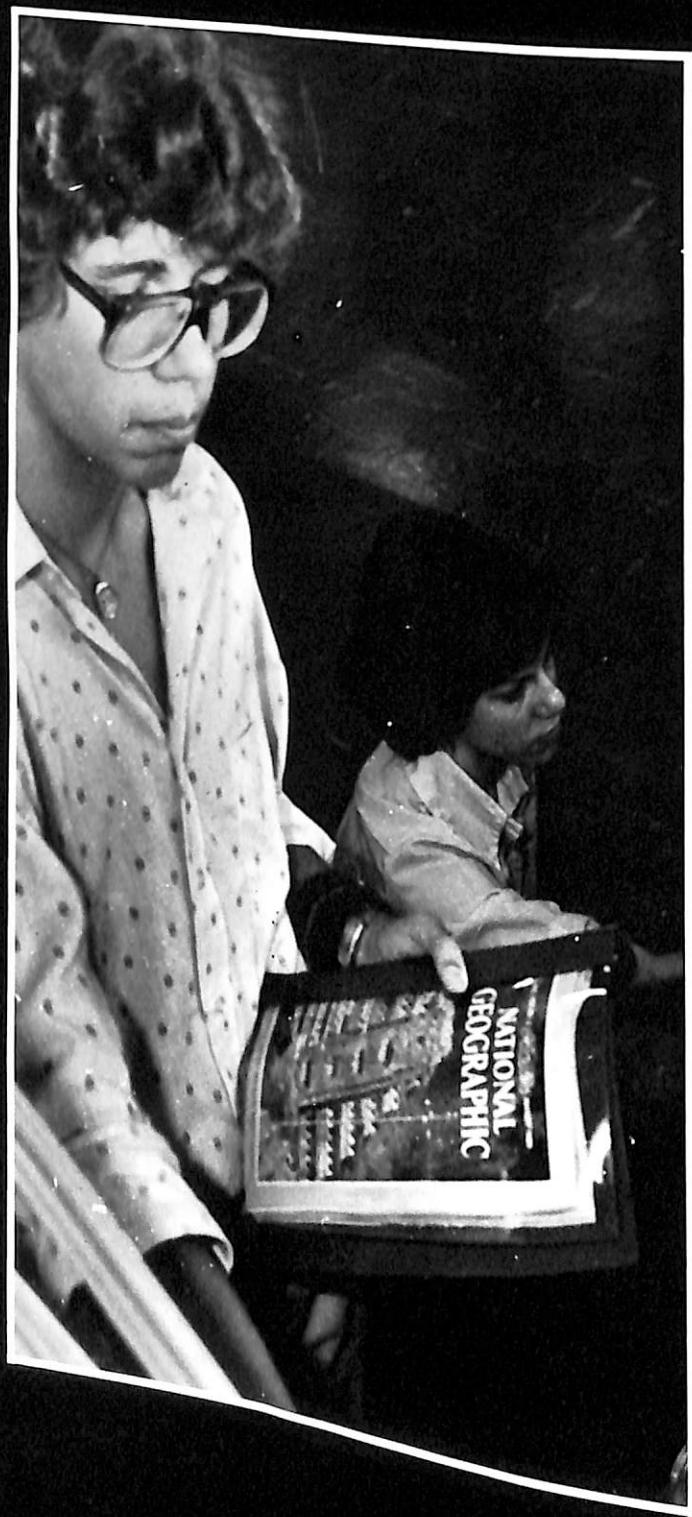

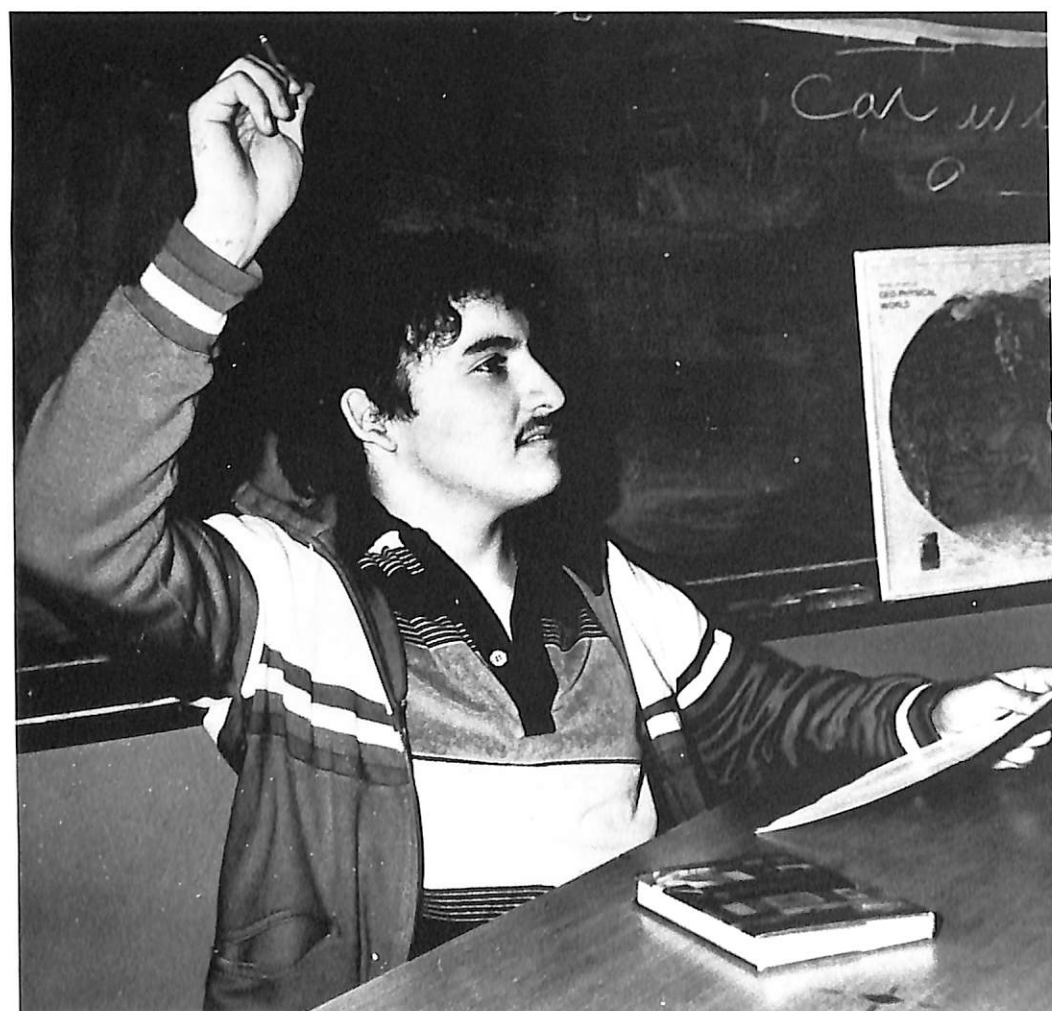

Scholarship, leadership, character and service are the four distinctive qualities of the National Honor Society and BAHs members all met these requirements.

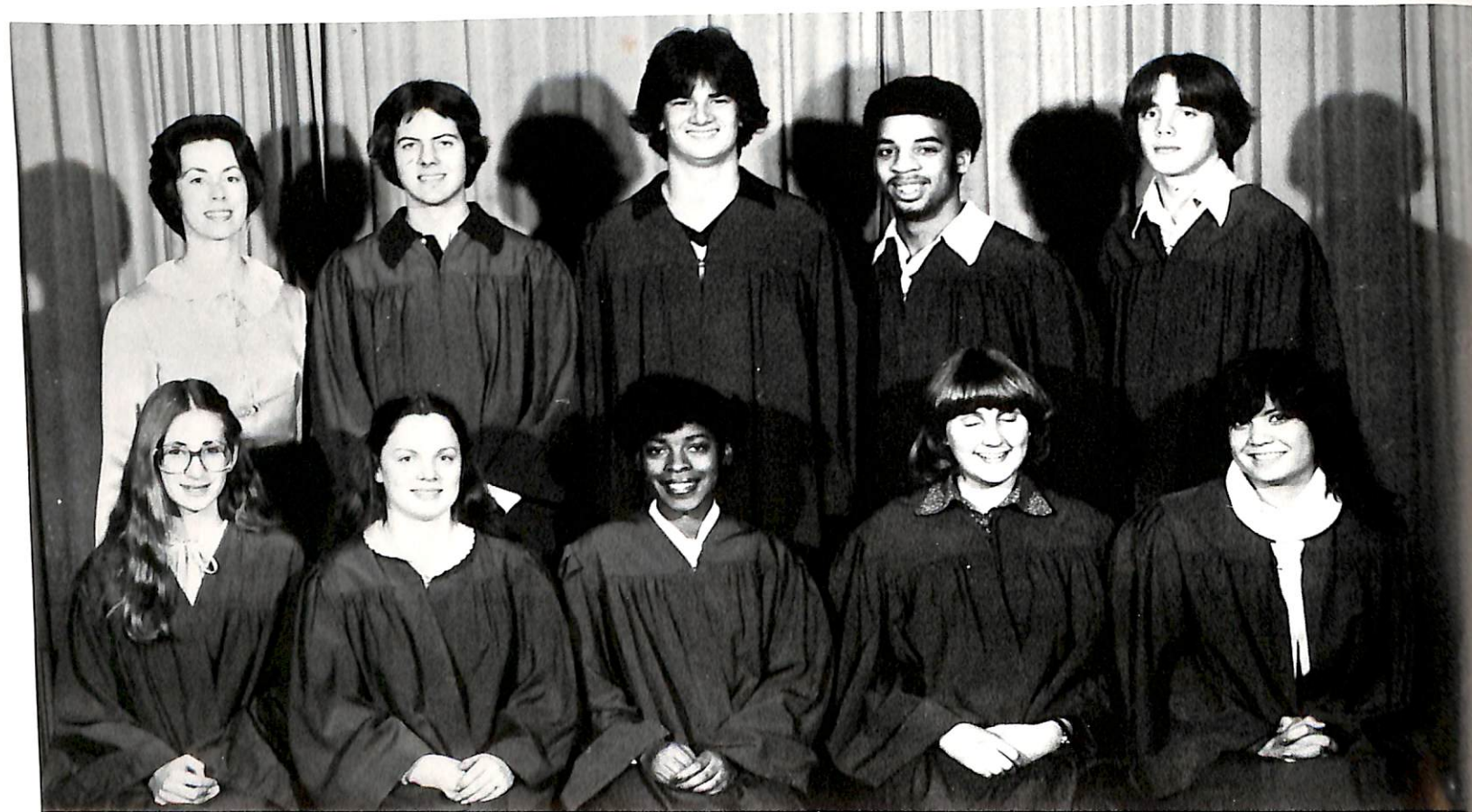

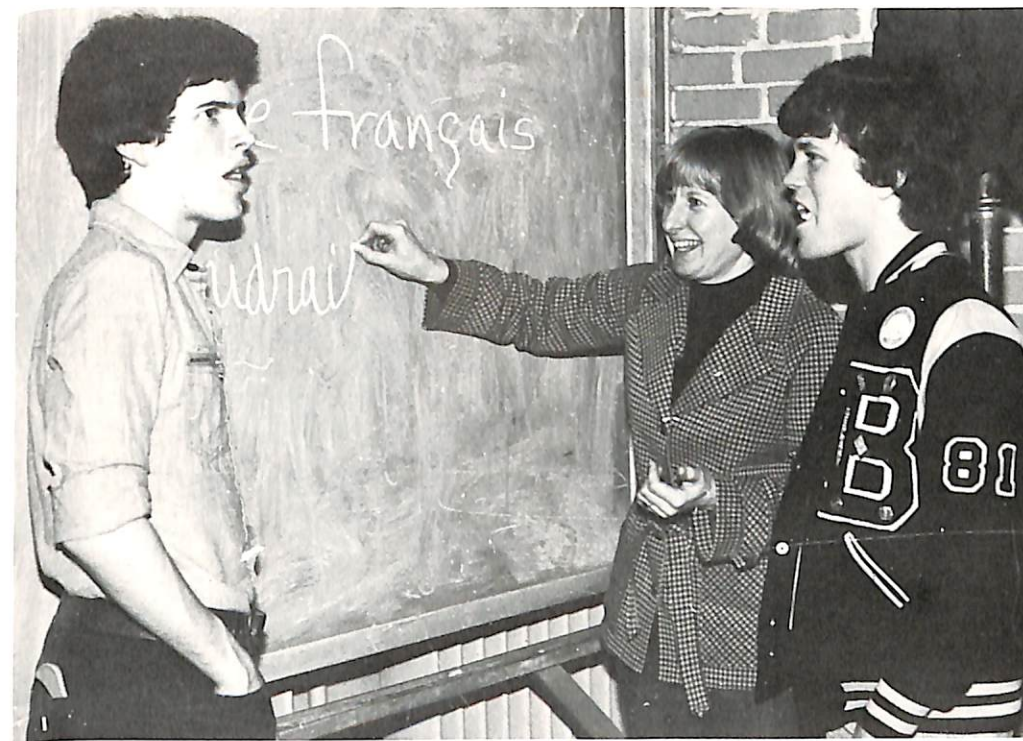

To offset much of the expenses of the book, the staff sold candy, held a raffle, and sold ads.

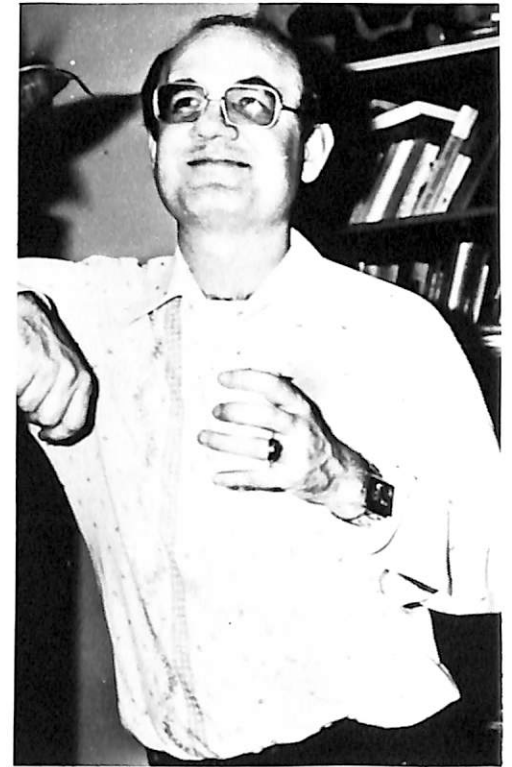
