



Chaffee Teacher Interviews Pulitzer Prize Winner!







When Mr. Steven Petsch arrived in Bermuda he got involved immediately. His interests were varied: Model United Nations, Humanities, Advanced Placement English, photography, drama, journalism, and debate start the list. He was also involved in research on one of America's finest writers: Ms. Toni Morrison.

Before coming to Chaffee, Mr. Petsch was on a DODDS-sponsored sabbatical. He spent that time at the University of Minnesota working on a graduate degree. Part of that degree program called for an extensive project. Mr. Petsch decided to do research on Ms. Morrison.

He was elated when he heard that Ms. Morrison was visiting the island. She arrived here on October 28th to speak at the Hamilton Princess Hotel. Ms. Morrison was here for a special reason: the Bermuda Library's 150th anniversary.

Although she won the 1988 Pulitzer Prize for *Beloved*, most Chaffee students have read parts of her first book, *The Bluest Eye.* When Ms. Morrison heard about Mr. Petsch's interest in her work, he was invited to the press conference and had the opportunity to talk to Ms. Morrison about his research.

The Advanced Placement English 12 students have had the opportunity to learn a great deal about literature and about the progress of Mr. Petsch's research project. Toni Morrison now seems like a special writer because of her visit to Bermuda.




Michael Saunders was selected as the valedictorian of the class of 1990.

Chaffee's image as a strong academic institution has increased in the last few years.






































FACULTY


Animal Lovers








The Business Club is a money management club designed to teach the members about stocks. Club members always look forward to the club's annual trip to New York City; this year the students were there from March 8th to the 11th.




