

Many of this class will assume leadership roles in the communities in which they choose to live during the next century. What they have learned in the last twelve years of formal education will be building blocks toward their future development.
















Students Triumph At Olympics: Chaffee Style




Halloween Extravaganza



The loyal group of musicians had class each fourth period. They enjoyed learning about vocal music and entertaining the members of the NAS-Bermuda community when concert time rolled around.














