
Thank you all for your strong support and contribution to our base and its mission.






### A Day On The Field












#### A Junior's Life










The Future Teachers of America, FTA, is an organized club geared toward showing students and giving them the experience of what being a teacher includes.





A member should show exemplary citizenship qualities along with a dedication to scholastic excellence, service, and leadership. A member should always strive for the best for himself and his fellow classmates.









Putting together a yearbook may seem like an easy task. However, ask anyone on a yearbook staff, and they will tell you otherwise.




















