

The 36th Tactical Fighter Wing is the foremost fighter wing in the United States Air Force in Europe. Its primary mission is to prepare for and conduct tactical warfare and air defense as directed, and, as a unit of USAFE and the 17th Air Force, support the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. It is made up of the 22nd, 58rd and 525th Tactical Fighter Squadrons, which fly the F-4E. Phantom II supersonic jet fighter. 
