

As an American high school student in Europe, you have a unique opportunity to travel and to enjoy a culture quite different from yours at home.


What rests before you is a treasury of the past which will inhance your memories of the contributions which you have made to life at Bitburg High School.


















Staff Tries to Keep Thing in Perspective








1980 Club Posts 18-2 Mark During Rebuilding Year; Greatest Frosh Class Ever






Barons Place Fourth Among 18 Schools

























Bitburg Soccer Team Wins Silver, North
