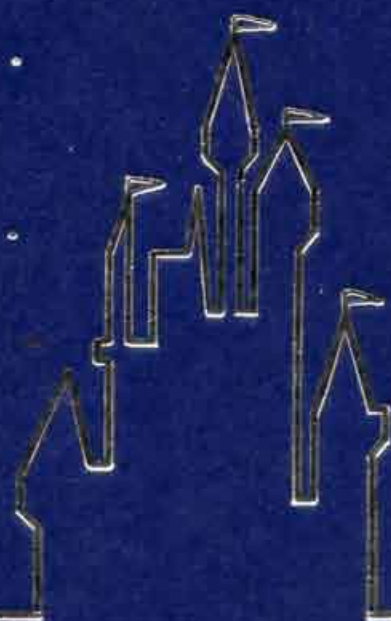

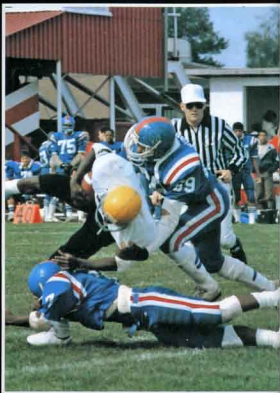

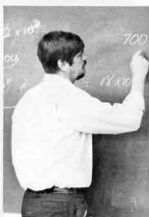

Mrs. Reyes — Cleopatra. I would kill the asp before it would kill me.

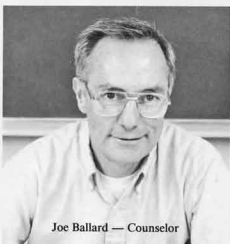

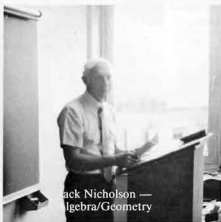


John Williams — English

Drama director M. J. Awalt sums it up: "Two and a half years ago, pole-vault cushions were stored on the sadly deteriorated stage, and the torn curtains kicked dust trails across the apron. Now, the stage is maxed out by theatre, music, and fashion, and you can't even tell that the boards were sanded down and re-shellacked not much more than a year ago, 'cause it looks mighty beat again. The wear and the tear on the performing area testifies to the tears and laughter of the many talented kids who've entertained this school and community. Theatre is alive and growing in Bitburg, and this was a great year!"

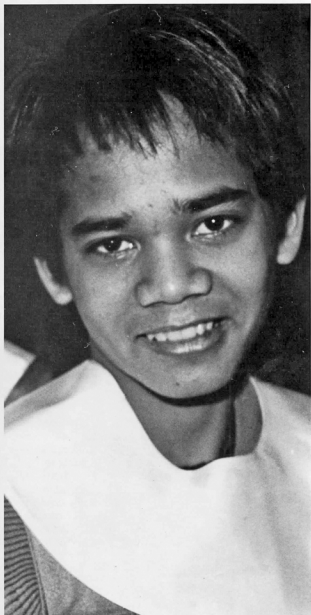

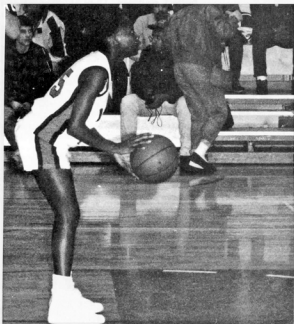

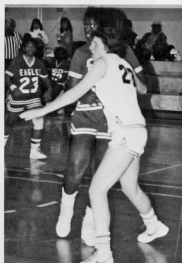
Under the direction of a new coach, Bob Gaittens, the Varsity girls put forth more effort which resulted in a successful season for the six senior players.
