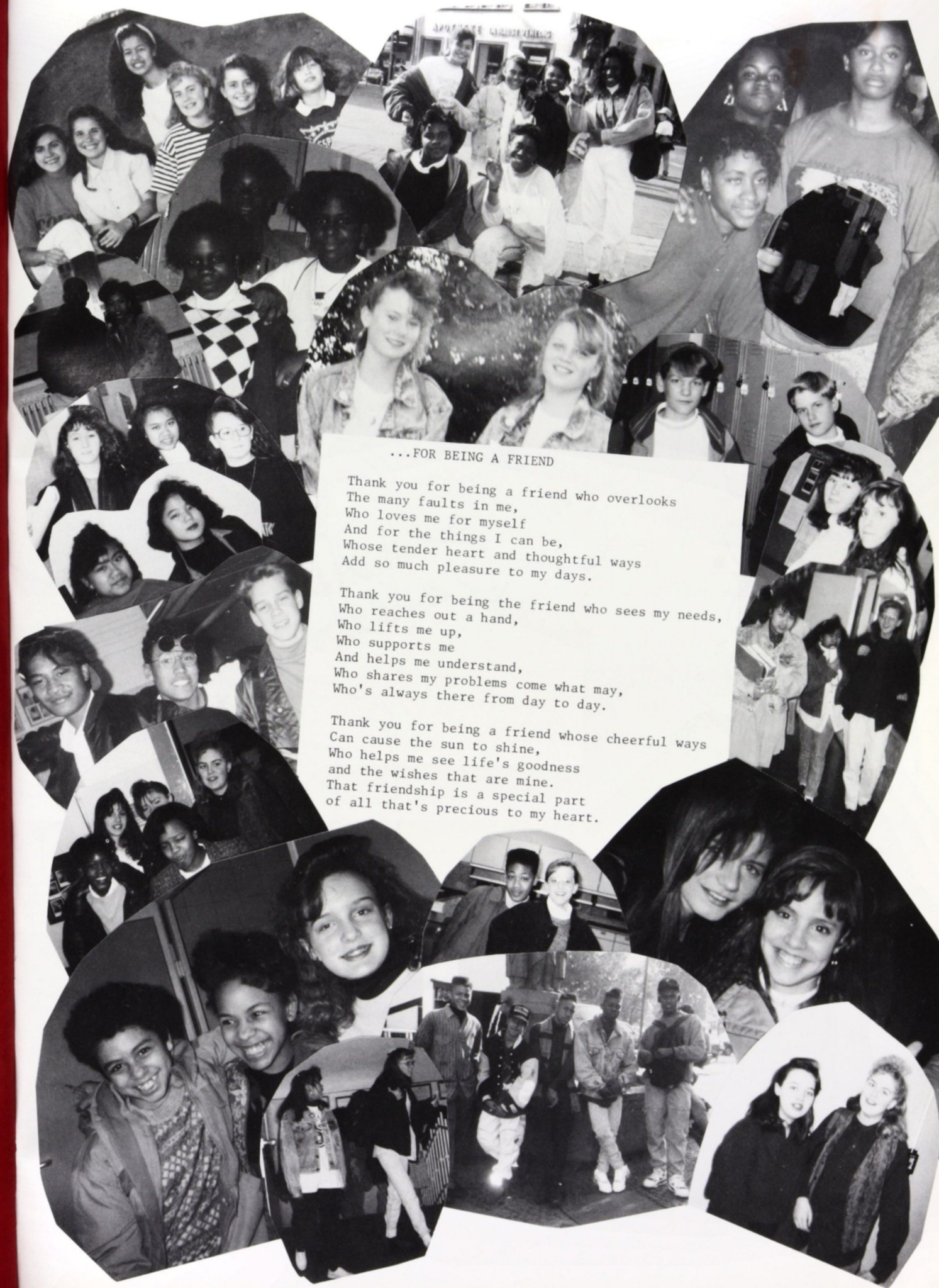

Who's always there from day to day.

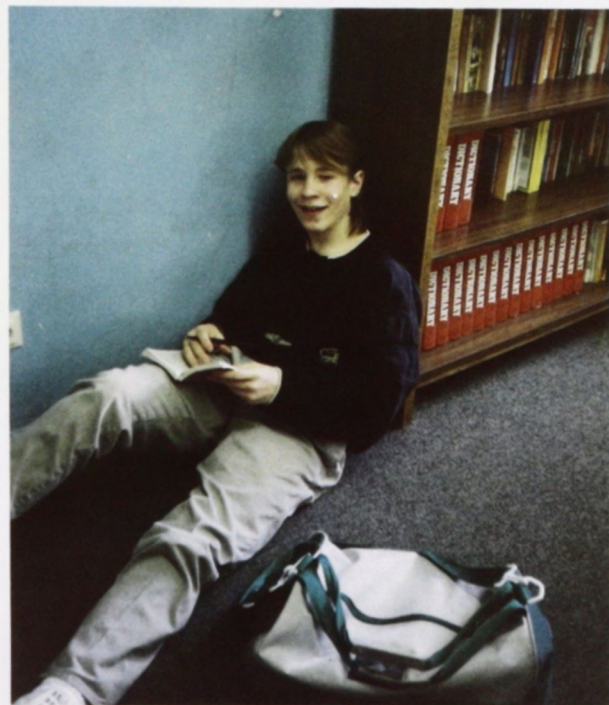
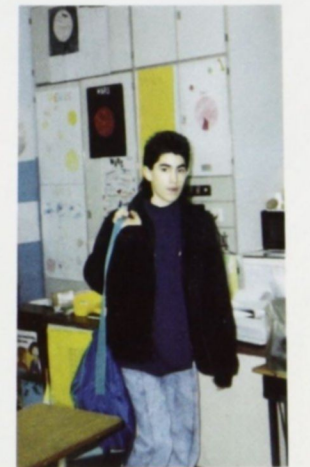

OCTOBER

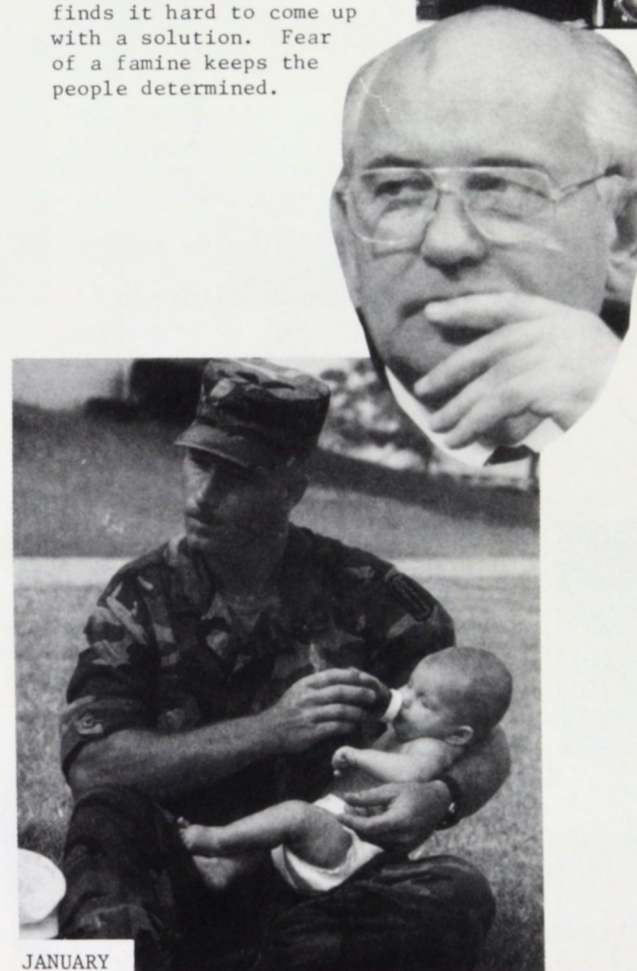

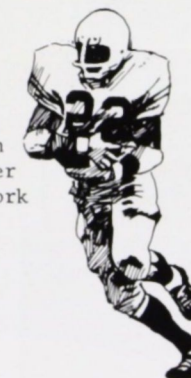
DECEMBER

THE REUNIFICATION OF GERMANY

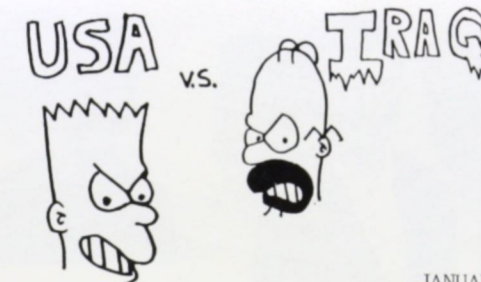
We all know it now. After nearly half a century of being East Germany and West Germany, they have finally united. This is how it happened:

It all began on November 9, 1989, when the Berlin Wall fell. The wall separated the Communist East Berlin from the Democratic West Berlin. For many East Germans, this was their first view of democracy. On the first day of the wall being down, thousands of East Germans fled into West Berlin. Much of the wall is now tiny pieces to serve as souvenirs.

After nearly a year of Germans demanding a move towards a "one" Germany, the German Democratic Republic united with West Germany to form the Federal Republic of Germany. Ten years earlier, this would have been unthinkable, with East Germany held in the grip of a Communist dictatorship.

In the summer of 1990, the East Germans began using the Deutsch Mark instead of the now worthless Ost Mark.

Now, after several months, Germany is holding up well having taken a big step toward world peace.

SEPTEMBER 28 About 175,000 American troops have been deployed to Saudi Arabia. American F-15 fighter-bombers scream across the sky, live bombs strung underneath. One of the Saudi Arabian ports becomes crowded with American Navy and Marine cargo and transport ships. They unload American M1A1 Abrams and Bradley fighting vehicles. The Blackhawks were weighted down with Army G.I.'s and their gear.

JANUARY 15 Saddam Hussein waits in a bunker as the countdown expires. President Bush sleeps in the White House. Only he would know the next day would bring destruction.

JANUARY 16 Bombs fall from coalition fighter-bombers. The bombs have been falling since 2 o'clock a.m..

JANUARY 26 Over 8 coalition airmen have been taken prisoners, beaten and tortured till they confess about the peaceful people of Iraq. They wait in pain for American commandos to liberate them.

JANUARY 30 Iraqi tanks raid an American Marine unit killing at least 8 Marines. Americans promise revenge and so this brings us up to date.



NOVEMBER 17 Americans have started live-fire exercises in Saudi. Royal Saudi Arabian Air Force F-16 and F-15 fighter-bombers drop their payload on fake targets in the Saudi desert. They are preparing for the biggest battle in war history. The Navy has stopped about 345 ships, both Iraqi and other countries. Since Operation Desert Shield began, four carrier task forces have accumulated in the Persian Gulf and Mediterranean Sea. Armed F-14 Tomcat fighters scream across the sky loaded with lethal Aim-54 Phoenix missiles capable of splashing an aircraft over a hundred miles away.

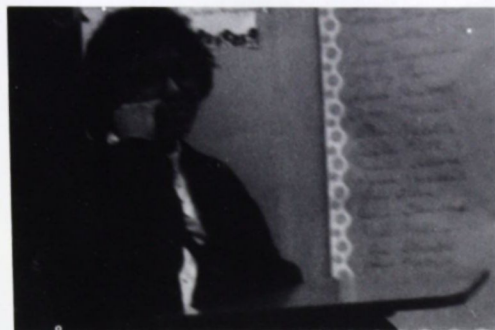

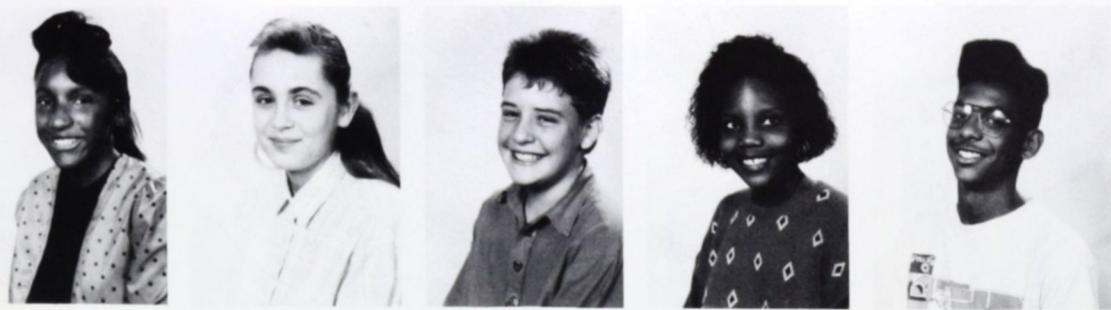

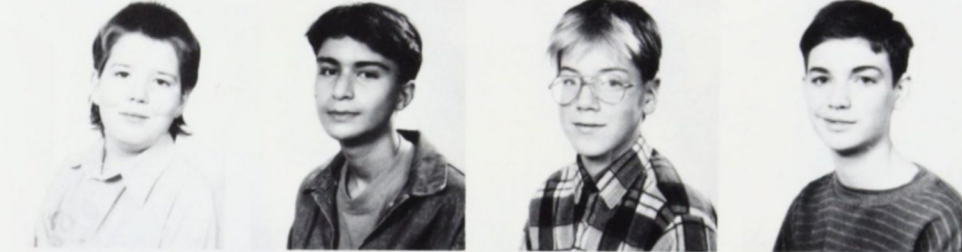

No matter where you go, notes just seem to be "it". Here are a few easy tips to follow:

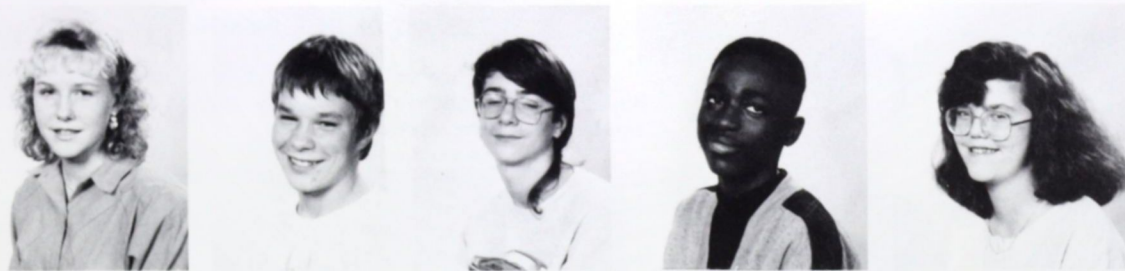
1) Hide the note you are writing under homework or a notebook for quick disguise.

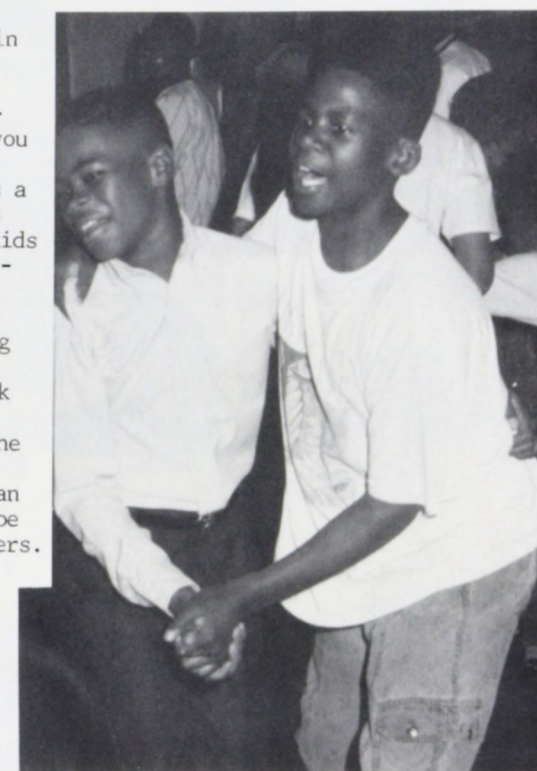
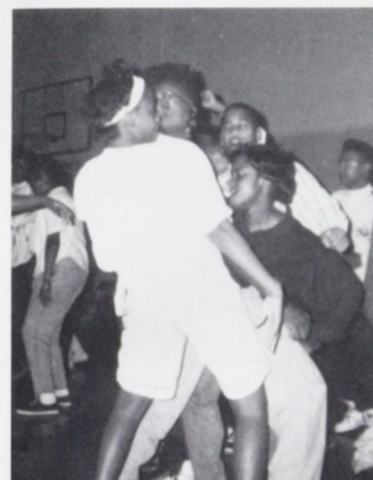


PUBLIC DISPLAYS OF AFFECTION

You know the type. They stand in the halls with their arms wrapped around each other, complaining about how they won't be able to survive another period apart. Enough to make you sick, right?

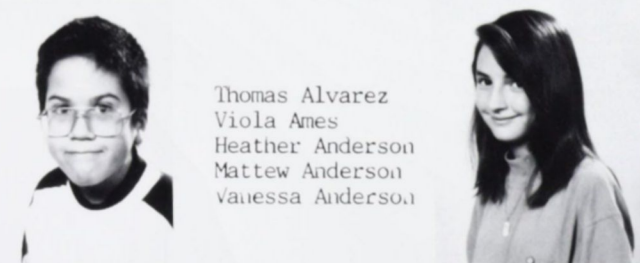

Maybe someday we'll all come to an agreement. Meanwhile teenagers will be teenagers, and teachers will be teachers.





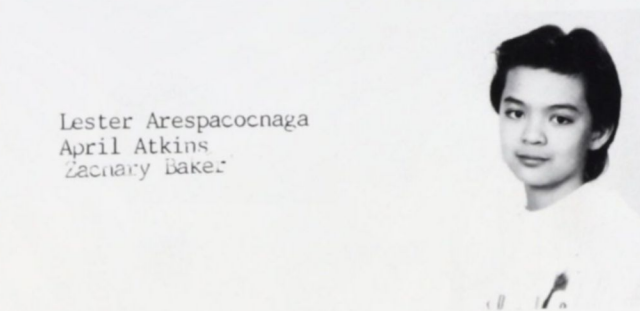
