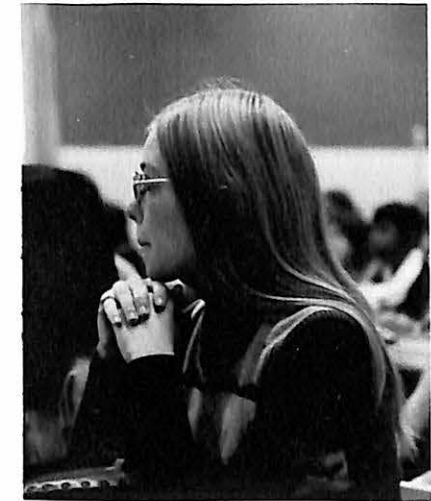
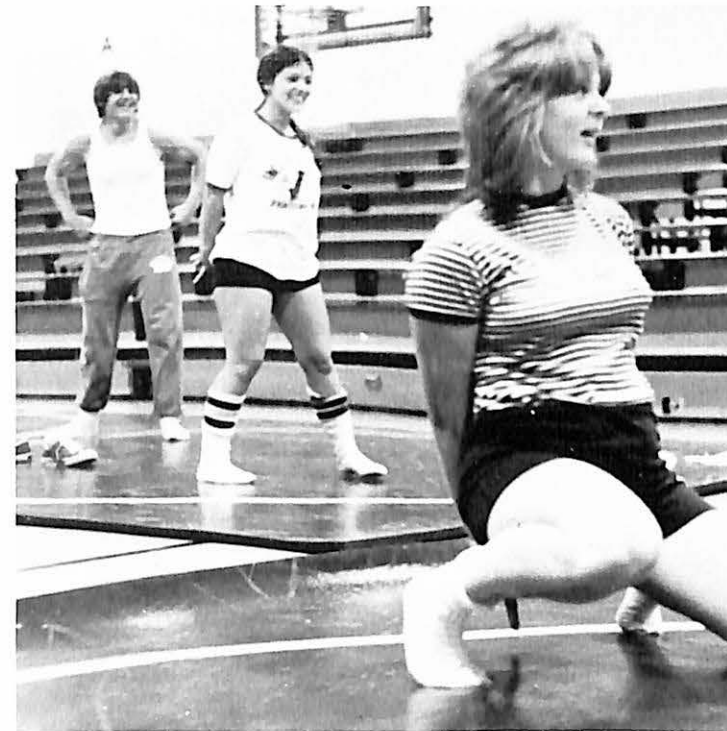
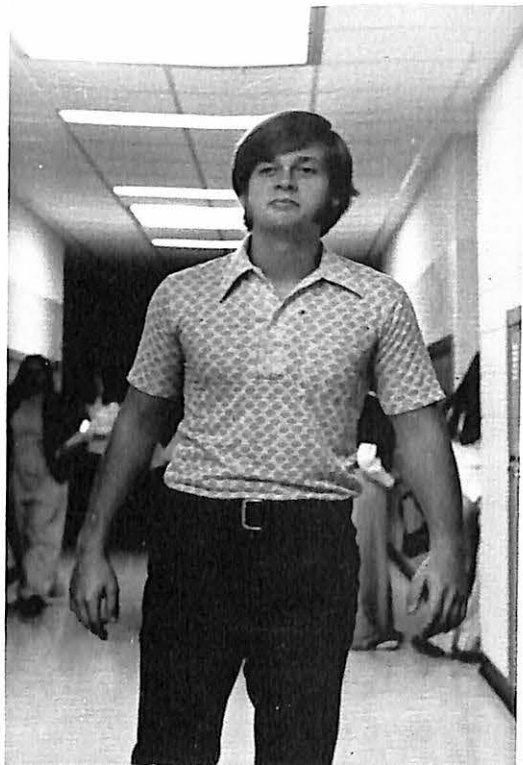
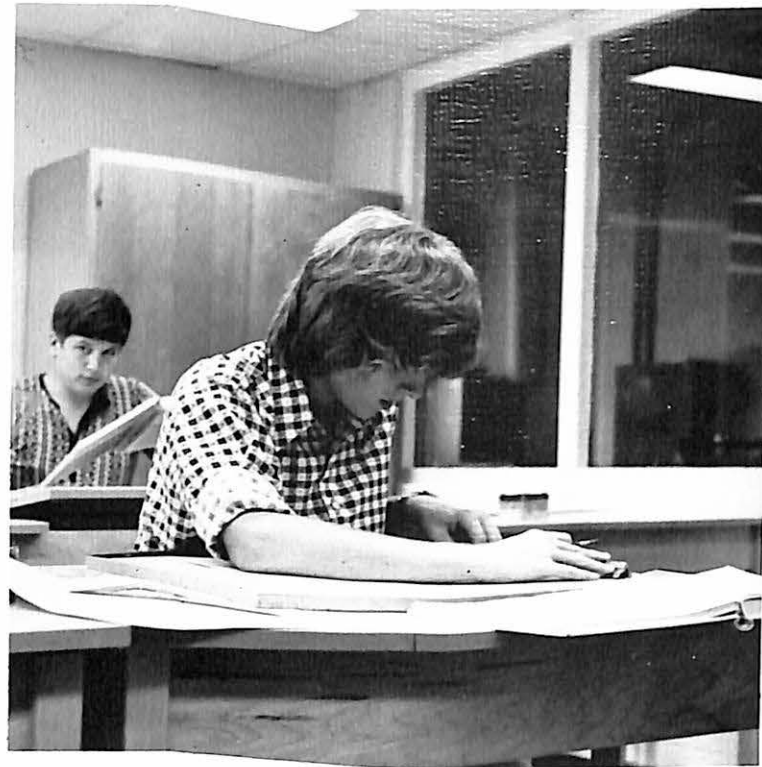
THOSE WERE THE DAYS

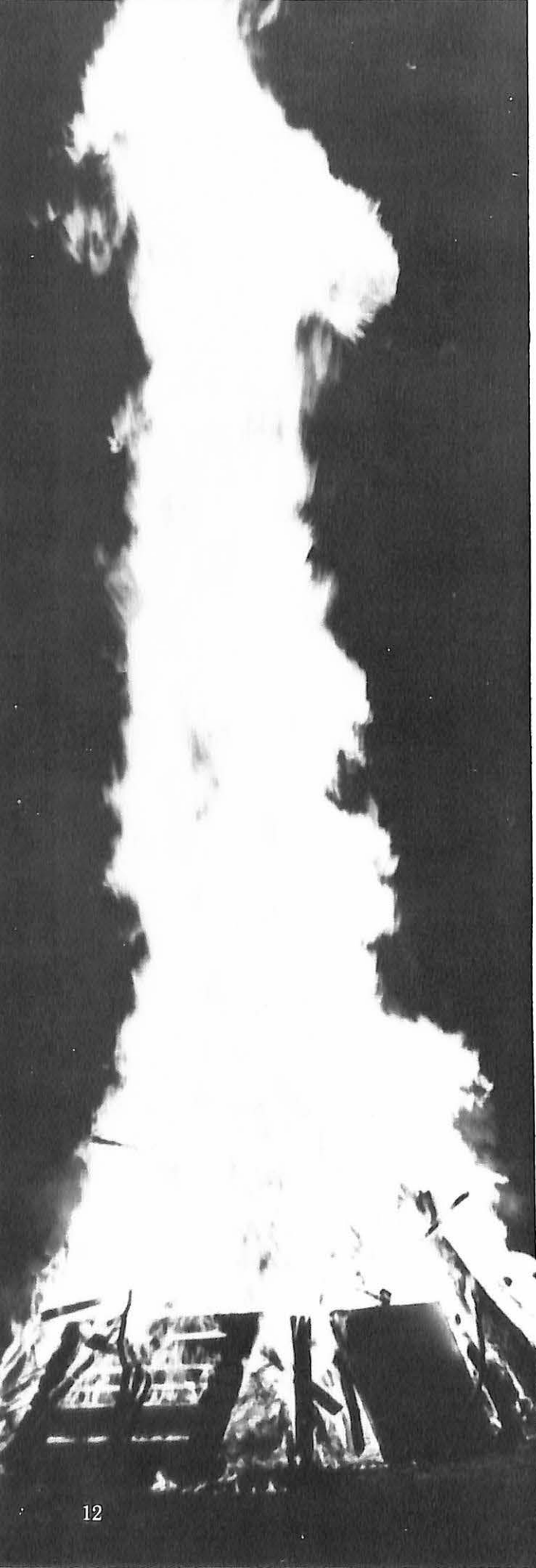
This year has also been one full of student involvement. There has been an increasing enthusiasm to be a part of what's happening and its enthusiasm that's made this year what it is.

The dance ended at approximately 11:00, climaxing a hectic, but nevertheless always wonderful Ft. Campbell Homecoming.



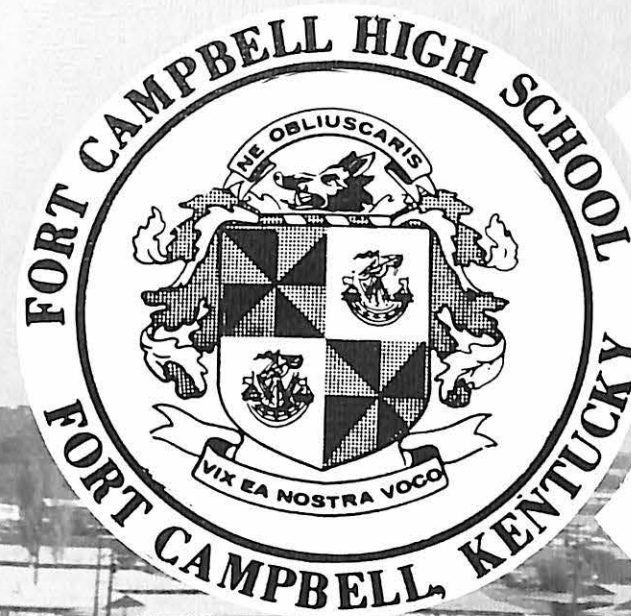
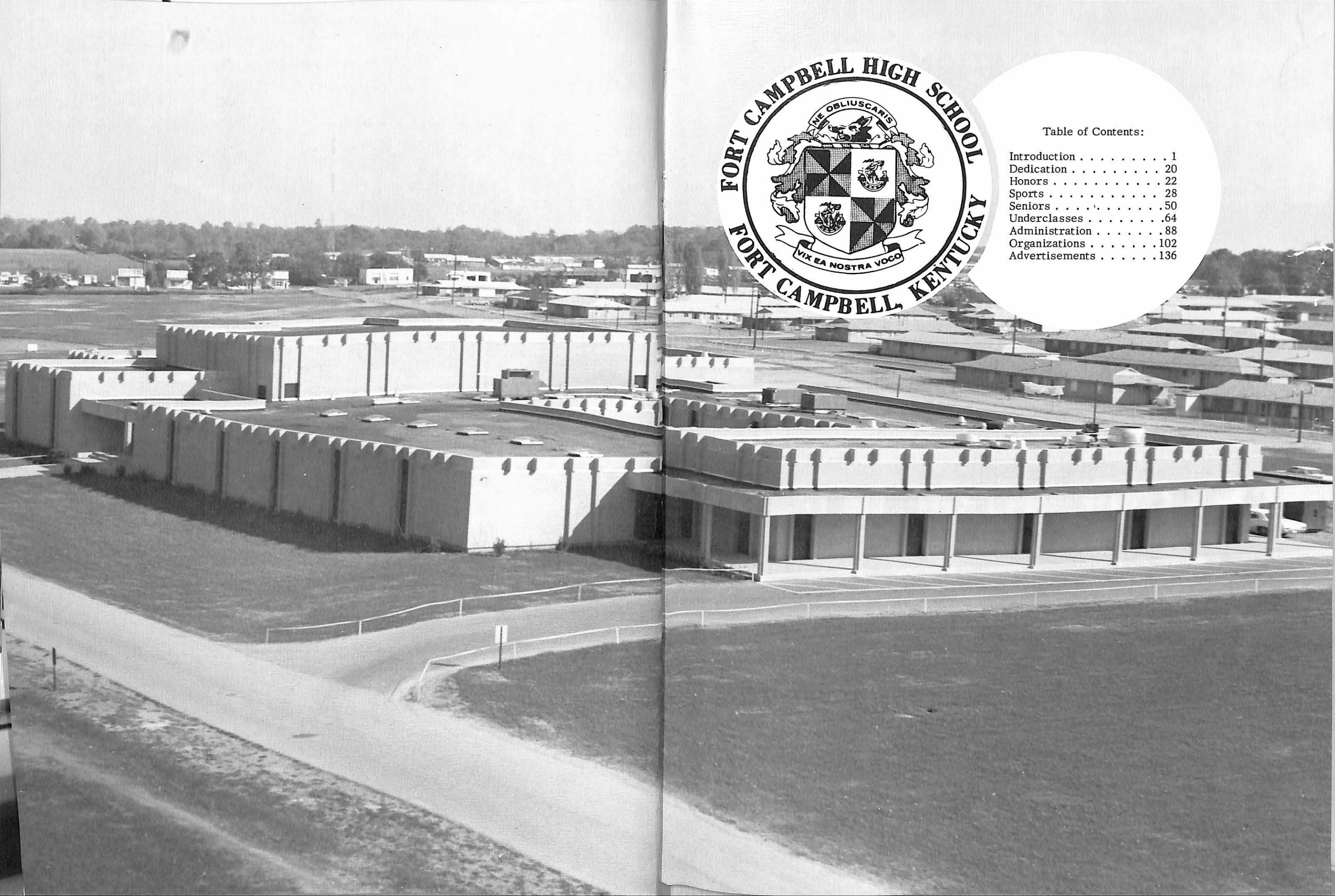


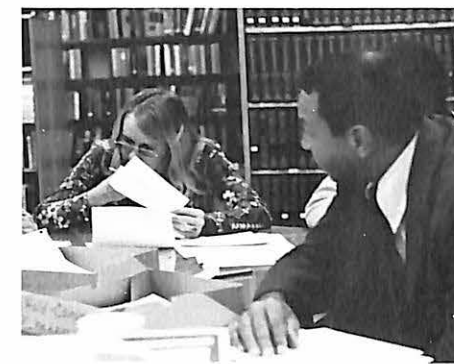

Not many people know Mr. Burnett as he really is: a very understanding man who is always willing to help. He understands that we are human and bound to make mistakes.

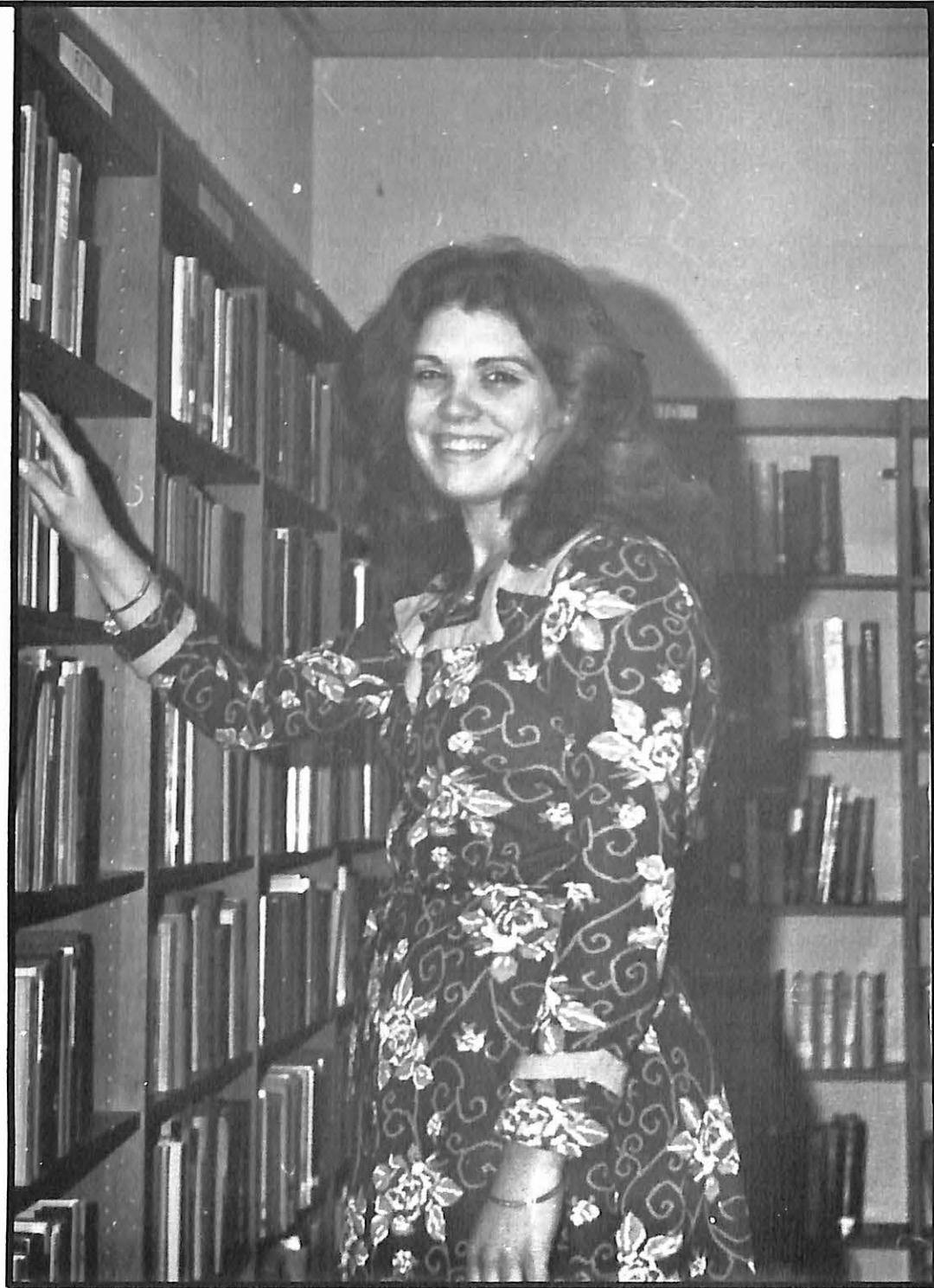

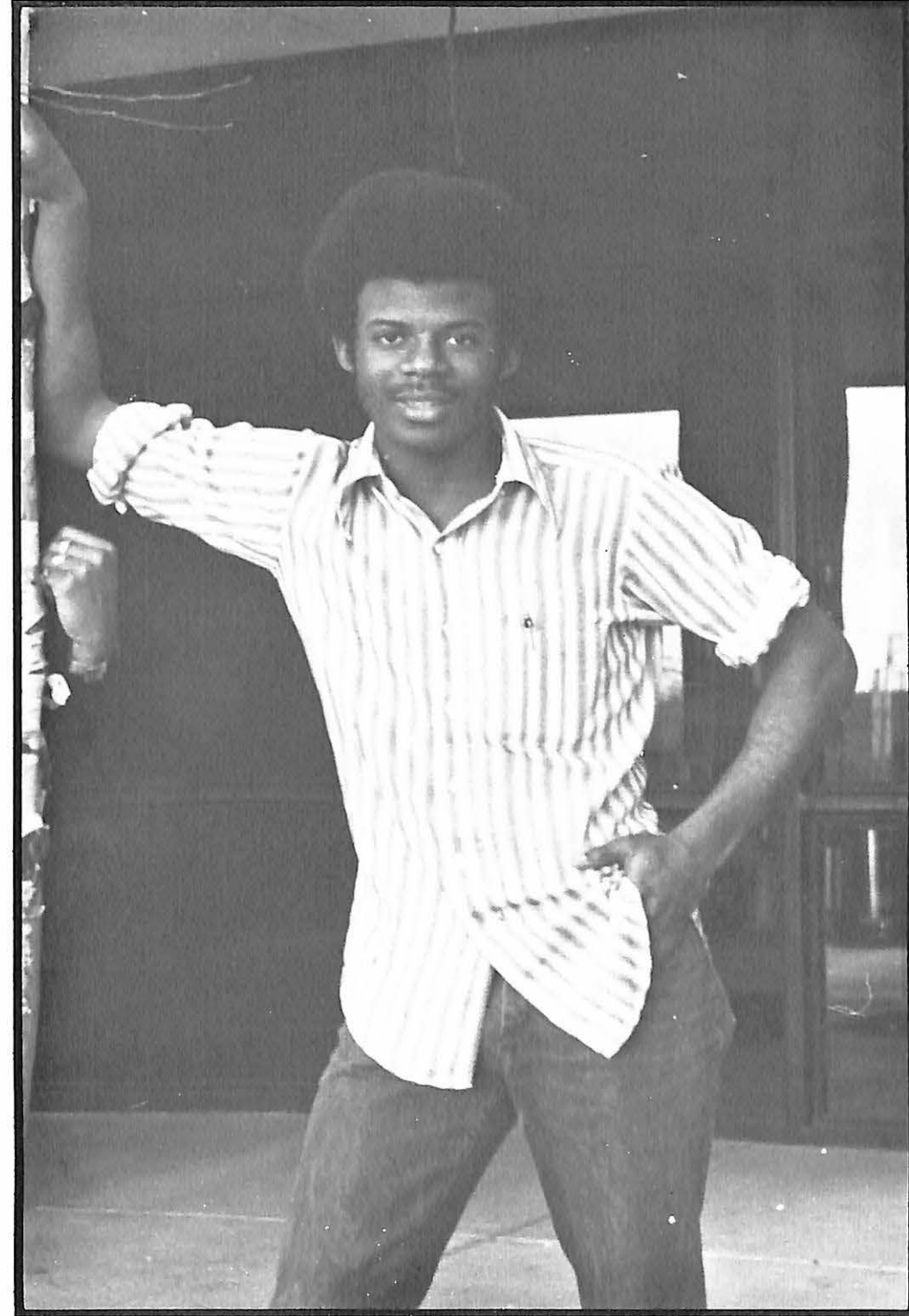
TOP TEN SENIORS

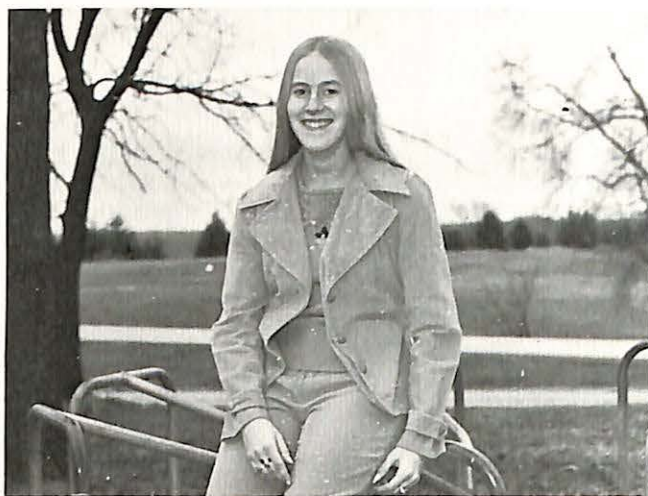
Once the results were received, 10 students were selected to be acknowledged as the top 10 Seniors of Fort Campbell High School.

The 1974-75 Wrestling season has been a good one this year, as usual. The returning lettermen, along with many new faces added up to a mighty team.

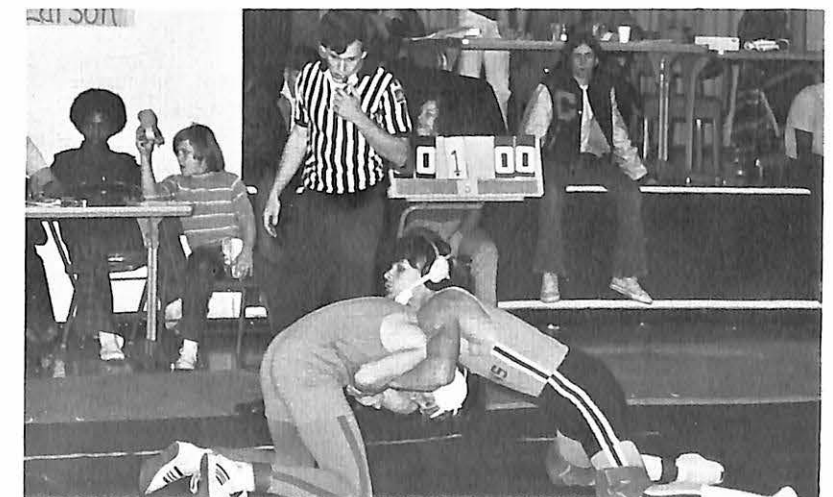
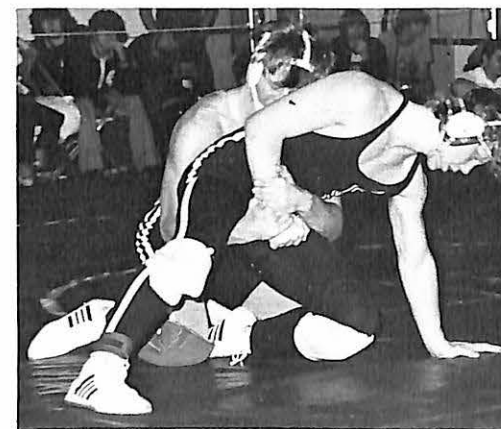
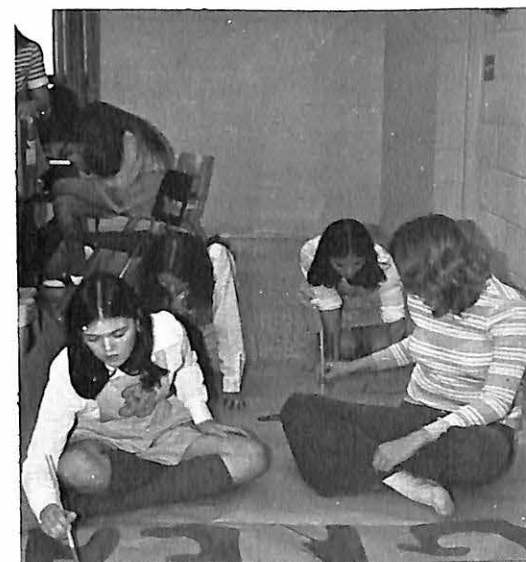
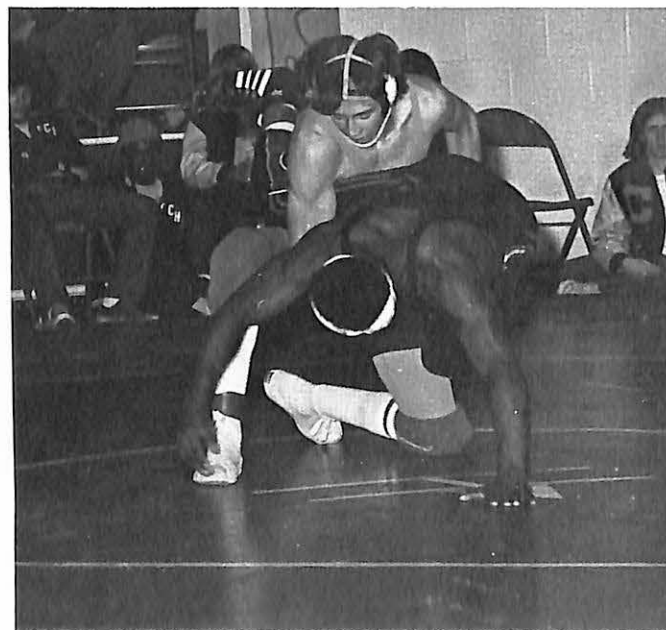
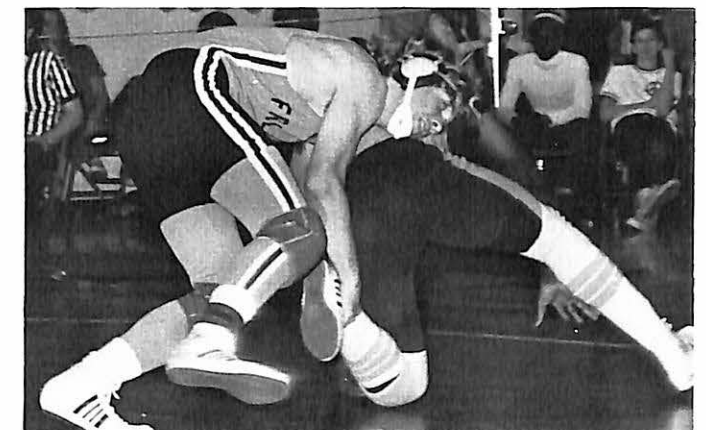
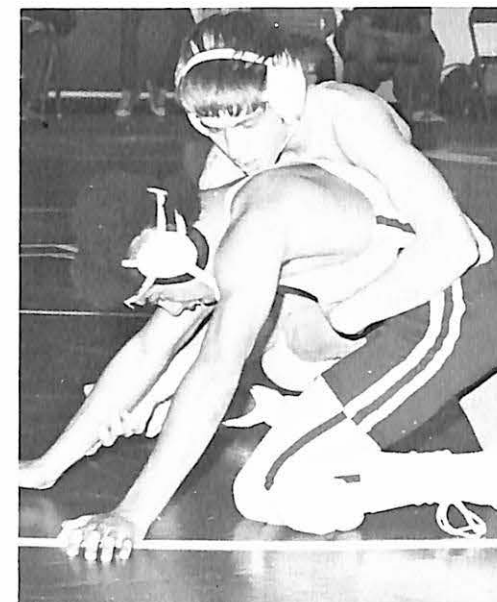
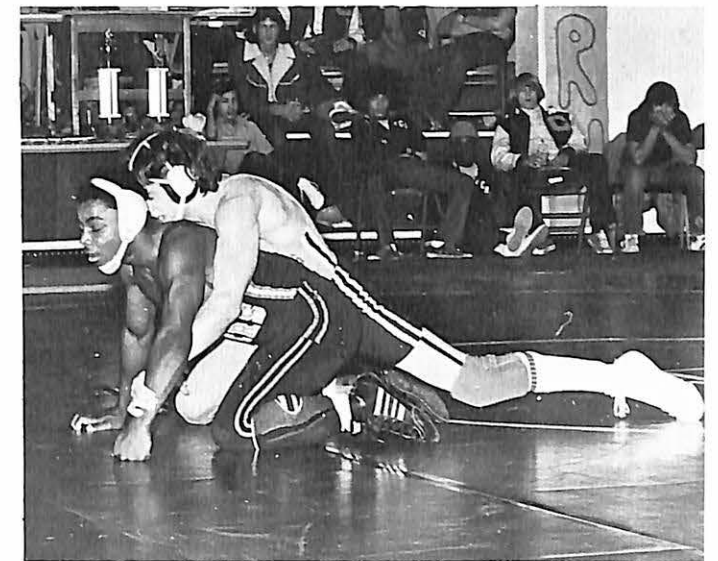

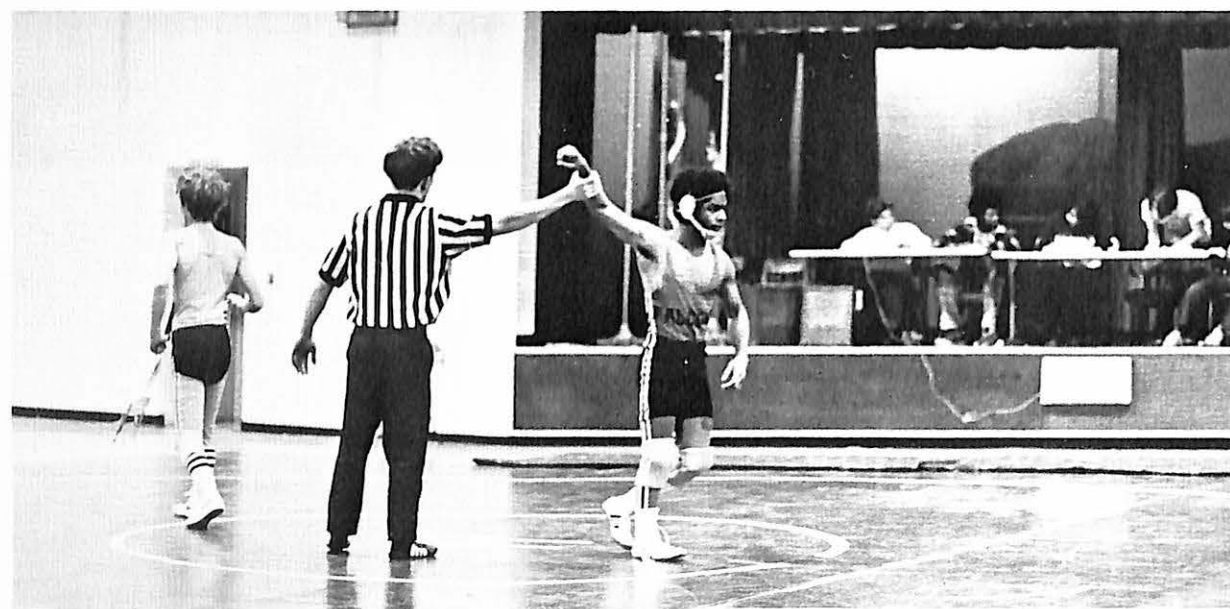
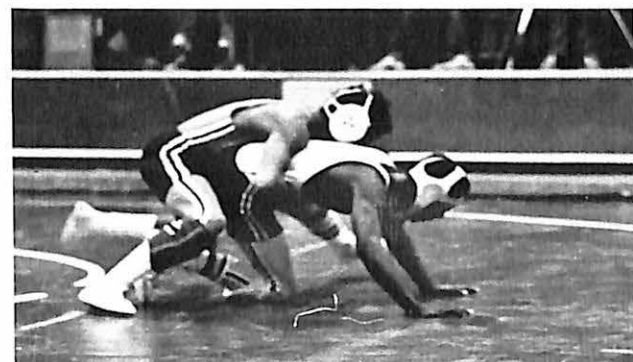
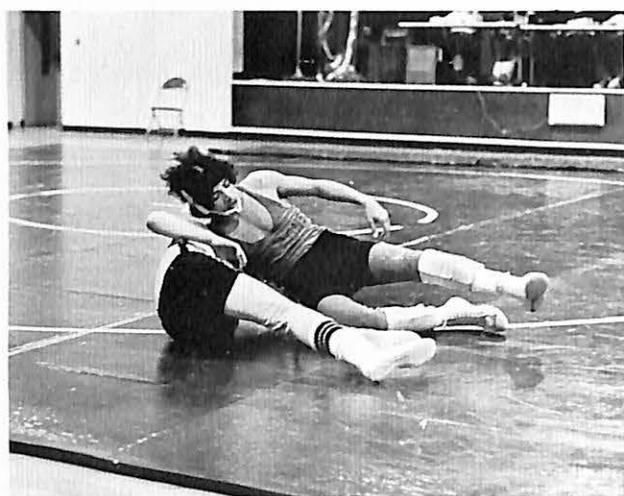
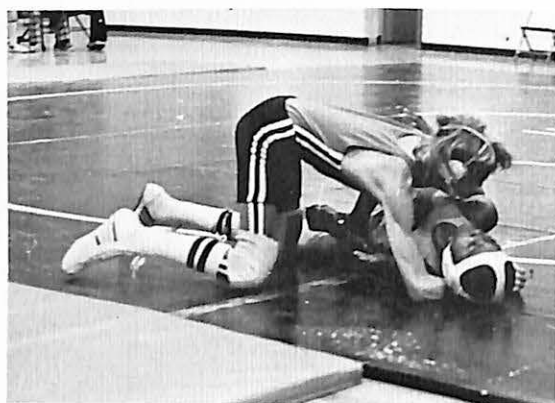


BLUE GREY TOURNAMENT

As people, they set goals and one of them is to educate the uneducated and they strive to reach that goal not once but every chance they get.

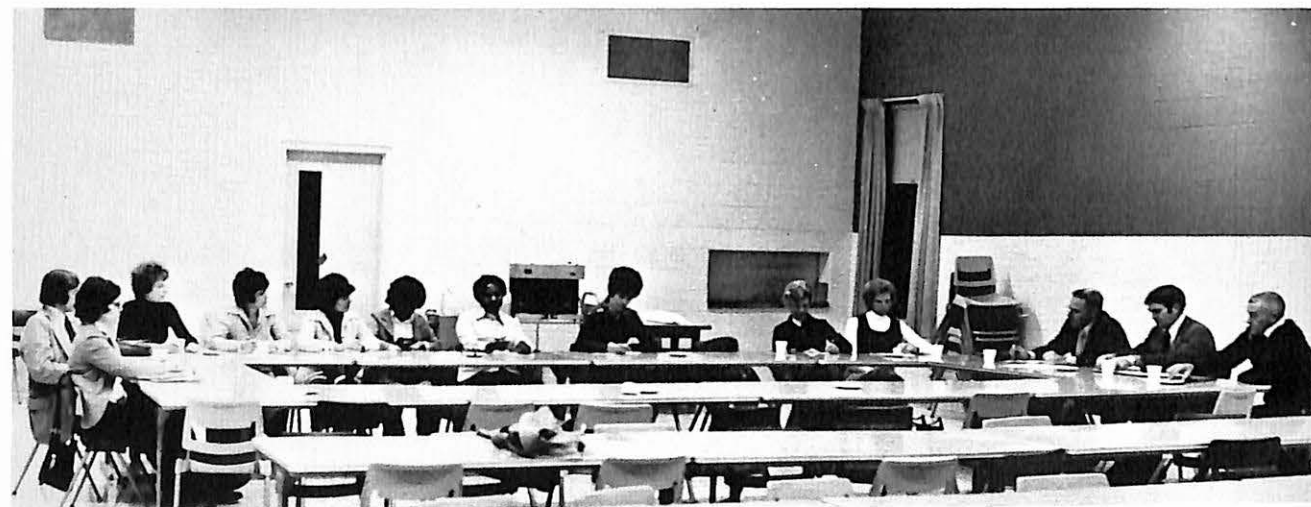


ADMINISTRATION

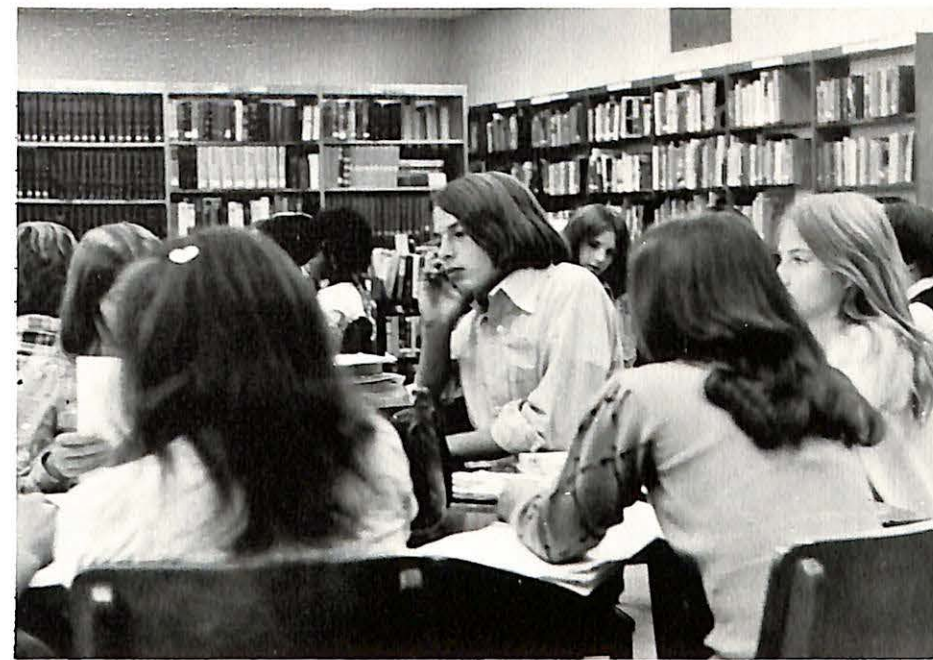


STUDENT COUNCIL

TO SAY GOODBYE . . .

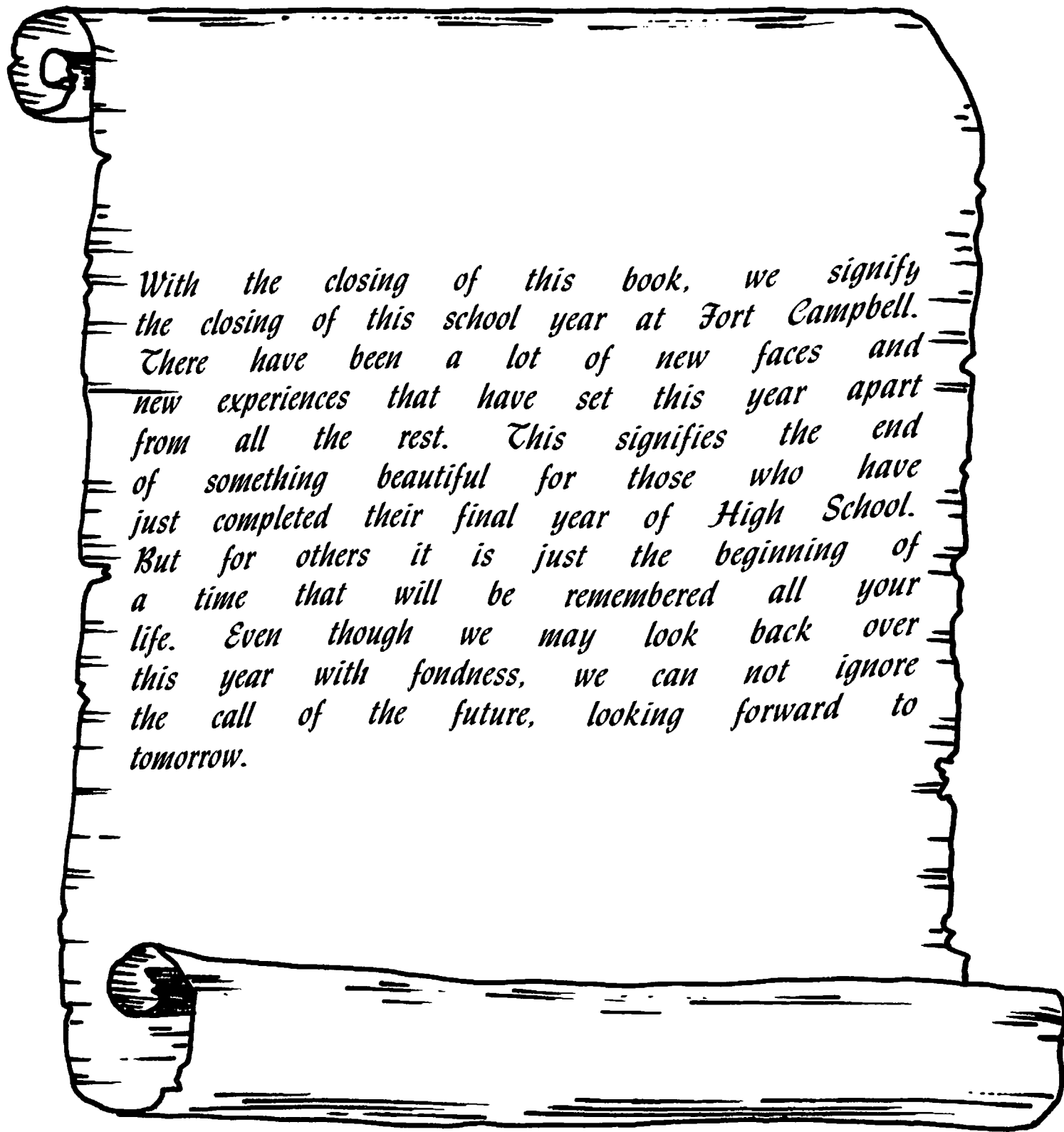
