The Last of the Seventies












The First of the Seventies





We Wiped Out the Rebels!



A Kick Off to Victory



The third game of the season went much better against the Crittendon County Rockets in a 39-12 win. Darrell Perkins was the main man with 74 yards on 12 carries, 3 touchdown runs, and an extra point run. Tony Block was the leading rusher with 88 yards on five carries.

The next week evened out the Falcons record at 2-2 as they lost 28-0 to the Triple A power, Brentwood Academy Eagles.

Next on the Falcons list were the Russellville Panthers. FCHS won this key district game 41-14. Don Felder and Steve Brown were once again in control of the ball as Don had 109



yards in 20 carries, and Steve had 104 yards in 10 carries. Steve Cornell also had a good night as he intercepted the ball and ran 73 yards for the touchdown.

The Trigg County Wildcats were next to taste the agony of defeat as Fort Campbell rumbled to a 28-0 victory. Steve Brown collected 152 yards on 16 carries as well as two touchdown runs. Don Felder had 92 yards on 10 attempts. This included a 72 yard touchdown run, two extra points, and a two point conversion pass to Gerald Hood.

Onward bound were the Falcons as they played the traditional "Army Bowl" and emerged victorious for the fourth time in five years. Don Felder had 74 yards in this game including three touchdown runs as well as three extra point kicks. Our faithful quarterback, Steve Skelton, had a 20 yard scoot for the fourth touchdown, and Dave Cabrinha made the fifth and final score on a 16 yard run as the Falcons took an easy 33-6 win!

"Take State 78" are familiar words to all people of FCHS.


Football: A sport demanding the upmost of experience, concentration, and most important, SPIRIT! This year's football season was a successful one even though it was not a perfect one.

 Don Felder made the only score with 74 yards in 18 carries. The score topped off a 70 yard drive.



Those famous words "Take State 78" were transformed to "We took State in 78" on the afternoon of November 24 as the Falcons beat the Paintsville Tigers 15-13.




The Greatest Show on Turf

"Good morning," Mr. Perry speaking. The job of principal keeps Mr. Perry very active, but he still has time to take a personal interest in the




Mrs. Martha Allensworth, our guidance councelor, appears to be contemplating senior ranks, college and scholarship applications, student records, or the scheduling of classes.

Academic Honors










Brains Have More Fun . . .
























Artistic Honors

FCHS does not yet have a strong Drama department so there aren't any dramatic award winners that we know of, but Fort Campbell High School students are active in many post productions.


