
















A great deal of care was taken in order to select a worthy individual. Mrs. Sylawa proved to be an obvious candidate for this position because of her traits and qualities.







## Students Learn Valuable Trade Skills






Christian County Vocational Education Center, located in Hopkinsville.



The Christian County Vocational Education Center offers some of our students varied areas of vocational study. The center serves the Christian County area, including Trigg County, Hopkinsville, and Fort Campbell. Fort Campbell has several students who attend this school for the first half of the school day. Students may attend free of charge for a maximum of two years and receive three credits per year. Among the courses offered are heating and air conditioning repair, welding, auto mechanics, auto body repair, electricity, carpentry, masonry, and machine shop. 




#### **ADMINISTRATION AND ACADEMIA**

#### National Honor Society







#### THE BEAT GOES ON ...



#### We're Proud







# WRESTLERS MEET SUCCESS






















## **TOP TEN**

## **Valedictorian**


