




#### Compliments of a job well done

The yearbook staff wishes to compliment Kent Parrent, 1983 Falcon recipient, on a job well done!






# People Go









#### 31-derful Years





He has served as a teacher, basketball coach, principal, and superintendent in the state of Illinois before coming to Fort Campbell as superintendent in July, 1972. Under his guidance and leadership, the Ft. Campbell school system consistently receives the highest ratings from the Kentucky Department of Education. Dr. Sitter is a strong supporter of our high school and is an ardent Falcon fan.



#### Mr. Perry




#### **Location Technicians**


This marked the first year that the band attempted field formations. Field Commander Kim Coleman also added her over kind of margin when the walked


#### Strike Up the Band

The managers and trainers are the nucleus of the team. The trainers repair the players while the managers repair the equipment. Without these people, the season would be a failure.




































































#### Cheerleaders Add Sparkle and Spirit

At the meets, the loyal supporters would gather to assist Coach Lange in marking the course, helping in scoring, and cheering on the runners. The team, in turn, provided another outstanding performance throughout the season. The men's overall record was 14 wins and no defeats. However, the most important event is the state championship. Only the top two teams in each region go to the state finals in each class. So all the sweat, the wind sprints, the 6 mile runs, "cardiac" hill, the advice and pertinent coaching from Coach Lange all come down to an afternoon race in Lexington, Ky. - the state championship. Again, for the third year in a row, the men's squad returned with the biggest prize - the men's championship in class A.

The ladies' team was paced by captain Roberta Becerra and Debra McLemore, the ladies' number one runner. The Lady Falcons finished another winning season with an overall record of 6 wins and 2 losses.

Although called "The Other Sport," the cross country team's hard work, dedication, and superb coaching, placed in the school trophy case another state championship trophy and on the gym wall another banner that says, "State Champs Men's Cross Country 1982."








## A New Beginning































#### Different Strokes for Different Folk










Ft. Campbell's individual sports excelled again this year with a number of Falcon athletes attending post-season competition in their respective sports.


