The Fort Compbell Senior High School was established in 1962. Prior ro this rime, a Junior High School existed from 1956-1962, compeling studenis in grades 1012 ro complere their educorion in the Clarksville School System. From 1962 ro 1968, the Fort Compbell High School wos housed in the present Junior High School building on Gorgas Avenue.
On November 12, 1968, a formal dedicarion ceremony was held for the new Forr Campbell Senior High School Building on Chaffee Rood ar South Carolina Avenue, on a rwenry-rwo acre campus. This modern building of steel, glass, and mosonry construction wos designed to provide for an enrollment of 450 high school students. It consists of regular classrooms, library, business educarion unit, art room, home economics units, band and choral room, chemistry-physics laborarory, biology general science laborarory, cafereria with kitchen, a muliipurpose area ro be used as a gymnasium and audirorium,., and the required service rooms The US Office of Educarion provides the necessory furnirure and equipmenr to corry on an approved ool program
Forr Campbell High School was accredired by the Sourhern Associarion of Colleges and Schools during the first year of operaion in 19621963 Accrediorion hos continued withour deficiencies since that time. In 1974 the Kenrucky Store Depariment of Educarion changed the accrediration rating of Forr Compbell High School from "Srandard" ro "Comprehen sive"
Aresenily, a new high school is being construcied ar the corner of Ohio Avenue and Seventh Streer. Consiruction began in April 1983, and ihe expecied completion is August 1984. Both student and staff are anticiparing the new revision of schoo curriculum, the new facilires, and the rensirituion of grades 912 in the new school instead of 10.12 as seen in rhe present high school This new school will uphold the iwenty rwo years of Falcon Pride, and YOU CAN BET ON IT!
