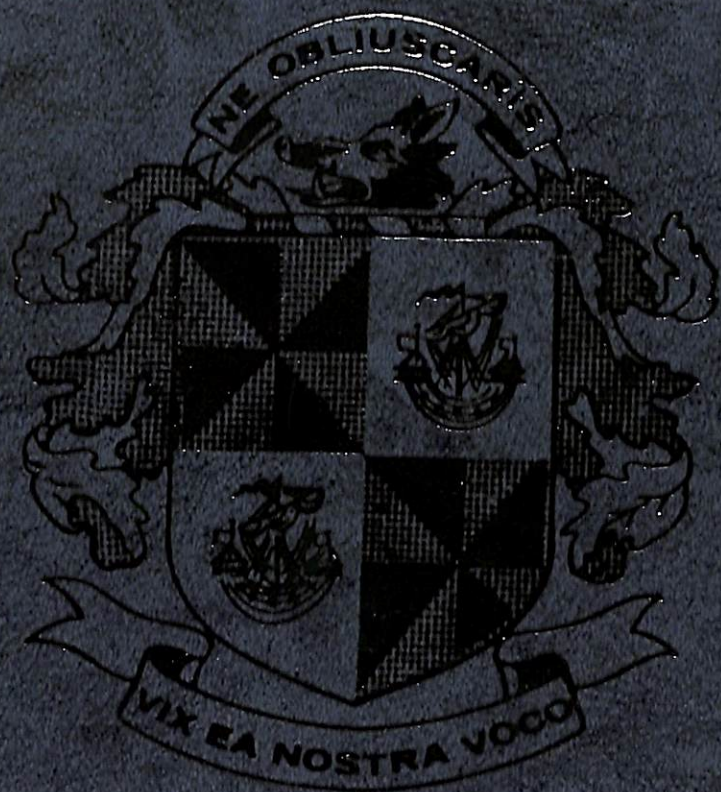
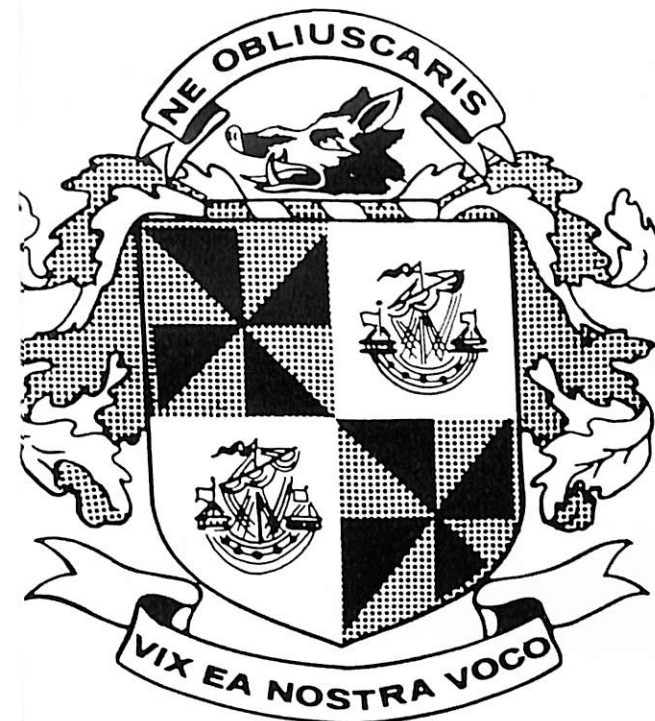

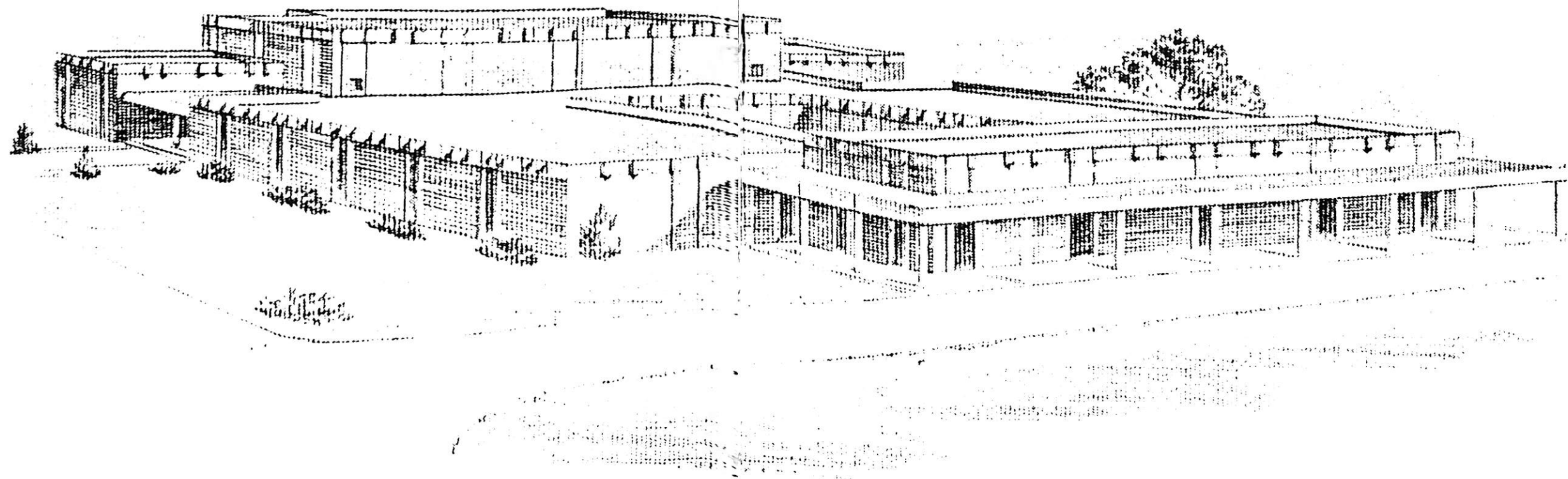

## Twenty-two Years Of Falcon Pride

The Fort Campbell Senior High School was established in 1962. Prior to this time, a Junior High School existed from 1956-1962, compelling students in grades 10-12 to complete their education in the Clarksville School System. From 1962 to 1968, the Fort Campbell High School was housed in the present Junior High School building on Gorgas Avenue.

On November 12, 1968, a formal dedication ceremony was held for the new Fort Campbell Senior High School Building on Chaffee Road at South Carolina Avenue, on a twenty-two acre campus. This modern building of steel, glass, and masonry construction was designed to provide for an enrollment of 450 high school students. It consists of regular classrooms, library, business education unit, art room, home economics units, band and choral room, chemistry physics laboratory, biology, general science laboratory, cafeteria with kitchen, a multi purpose area to be used as a gymnasium and auditorium, and the required service rooms. The U.S. Office of Education provides the necessary furniture and equipment to carry on an approved school program.

Fort Campbell High School was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools during the first year of operation in 1962-1963. Accreditation has continued without deficiencies since that time. In 1974 the Kentucky State Department of Education changed the accreditation rating of Fort Campbell High School from "Standard" to "Comprehensive."

Presently, a new high school is being constructed at the corner of Ohio Avenue and Seventh Street. Construction began in April 1983, and the expected completion is August 1984. Both student and staff are anticipating the new revision of school curriculum, the new facilities, and the reinstitution of grades 9-12 in the new school instead of 10-12 as seen in the present high school. This new school will uphold the twenty-two years of Falcon Pride, and YOU CAN BET ON IT!

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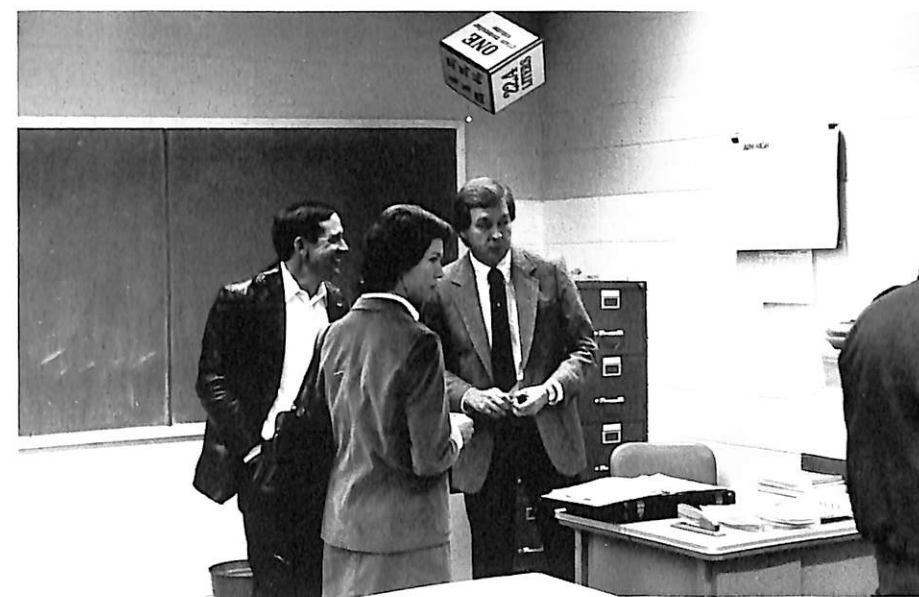


# This Book's For You!!

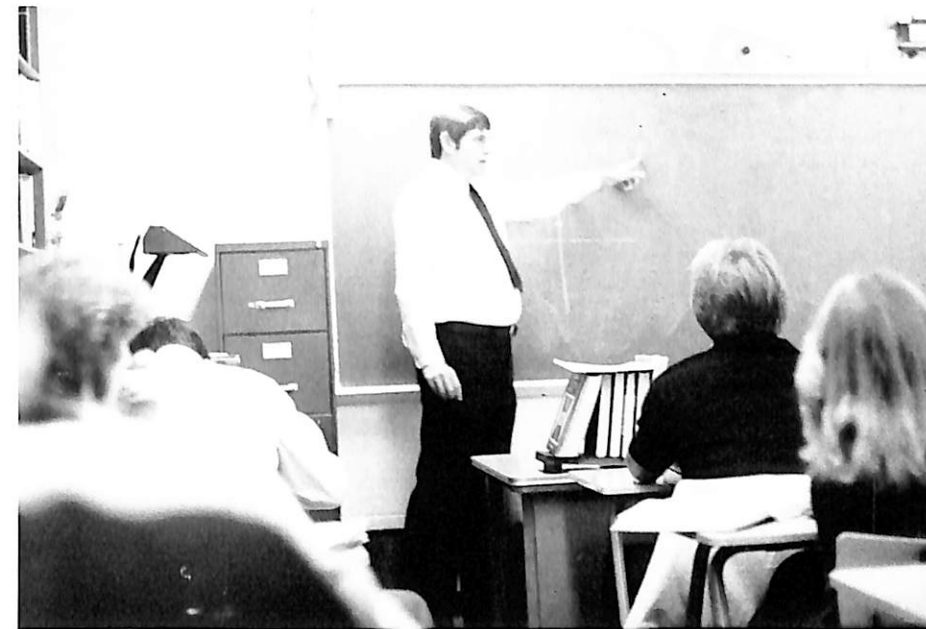
## And Learn To Communicate.

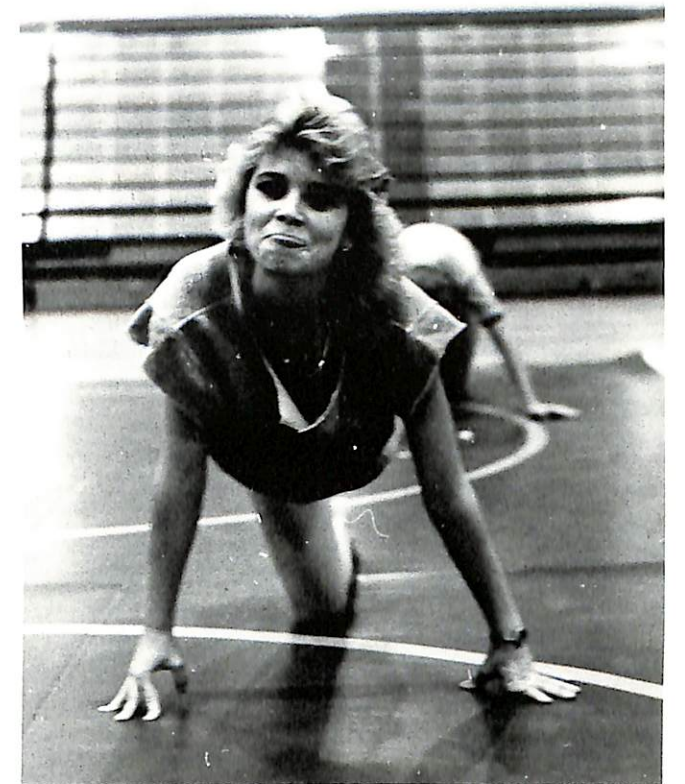
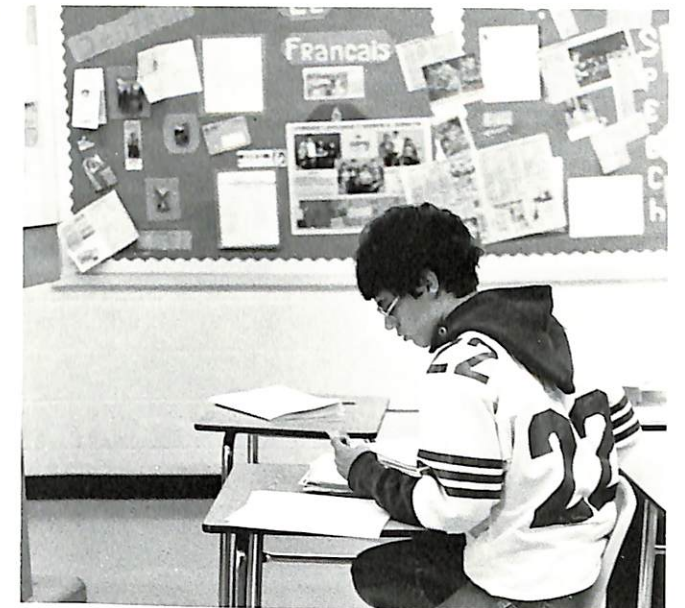
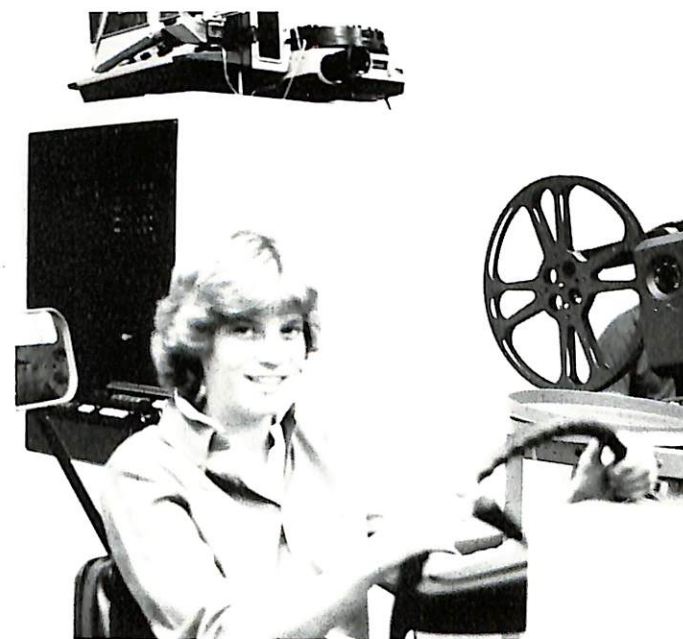
# Students Explore Electives

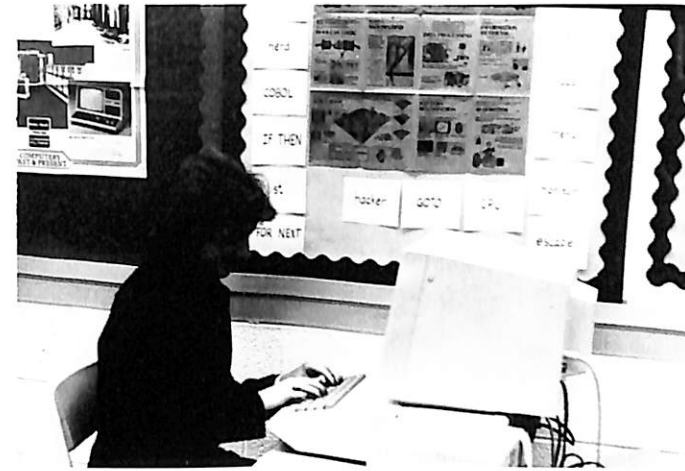

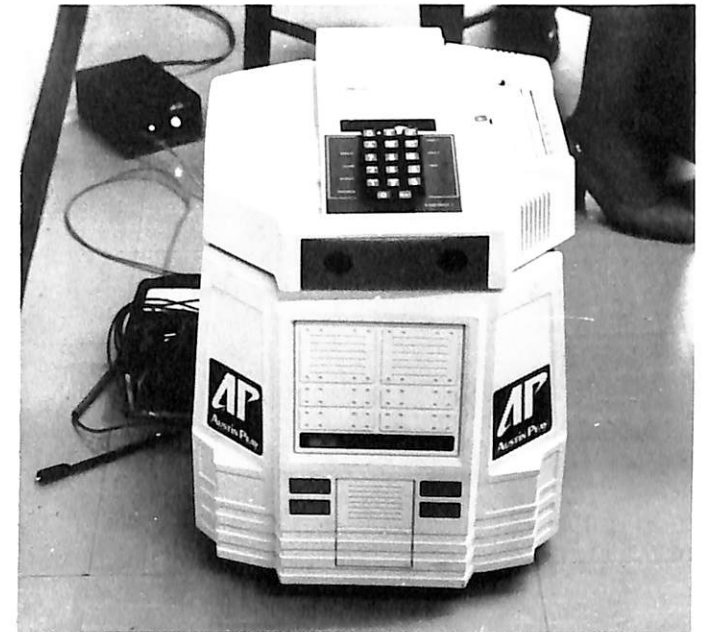

As another Friday afternoon rolls around, Falcons head for home, their heads full of thoughts of the evening's activities



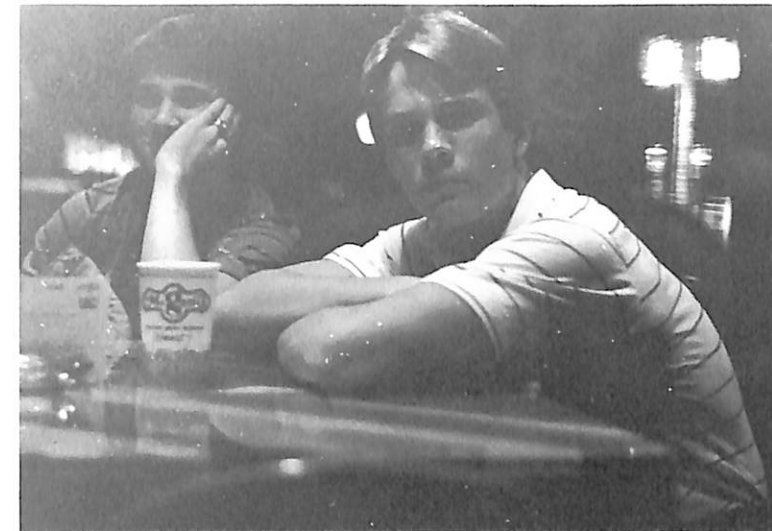
## Where Do Students Go?

# In The News, 1983 . . .

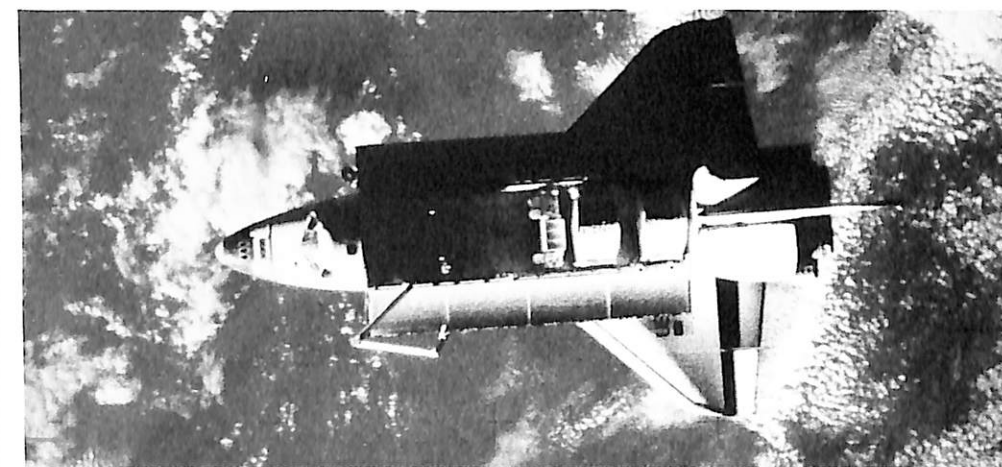
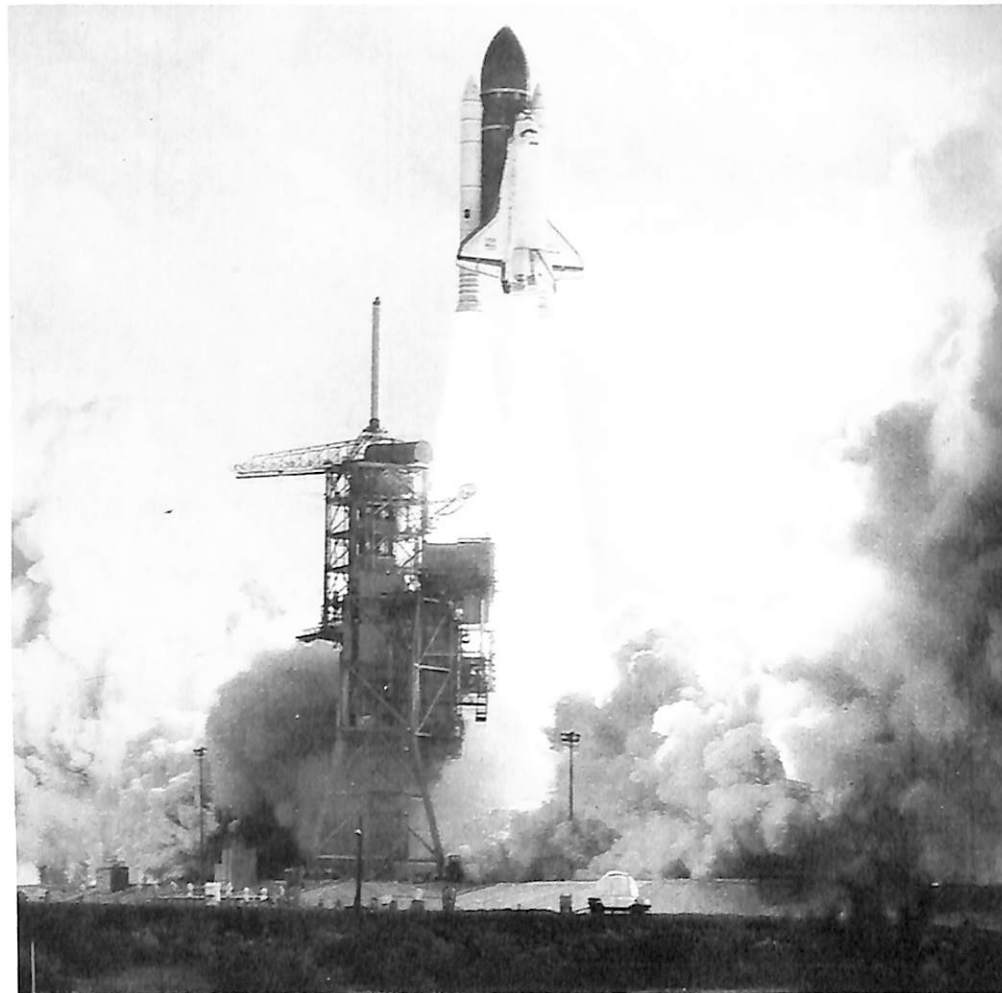
The year 1983 was truly a year of "firsts". Many of these "firsts" took place in space, sports, politics, and religion.

This past year the National Aeronautics and Space Administration was quite busy. The space program launched a new Space Shuttle named the Challenger which became the sister to the already-functioning Columbia. Sally Ride became America's first woman to travel in space. Guy Bluford was the nation's first black astronaut to go on a mission. 1983 was evidently a big year for the space program.

Many new and exciting events took place in the world of sports this past year. First, one of the most astounding events of the year took place in yachting. The Australian yacht, Australia II, beat the United States yacht, Liberty. Before 1983, the Australians never beat the Americans in the America's Cup Race. Second, Calvin Smith set a new world's record of 9.93 in the 100-meter dash. Also, the Washington Redskins won the Super Bowl, the Baltimore Orioles won the World Series, and the Philadelphia 76ers won the NBA Championship. 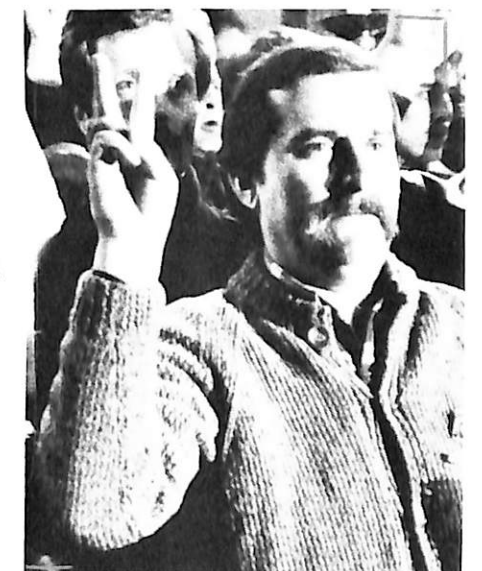

Fortunately, the troops were pulled out after 60 days. Also, soldiers from the 101st were deployed to Central America for a training exercise. One of the greatest tragedies of 1983 was the unprovoked Russian attack upon a commercial South Korean jumbo jet. The 747 was shot down, and there were no survivors. Several Americans were included among the missing passengers. 1983 was a grim year concerning world politics.

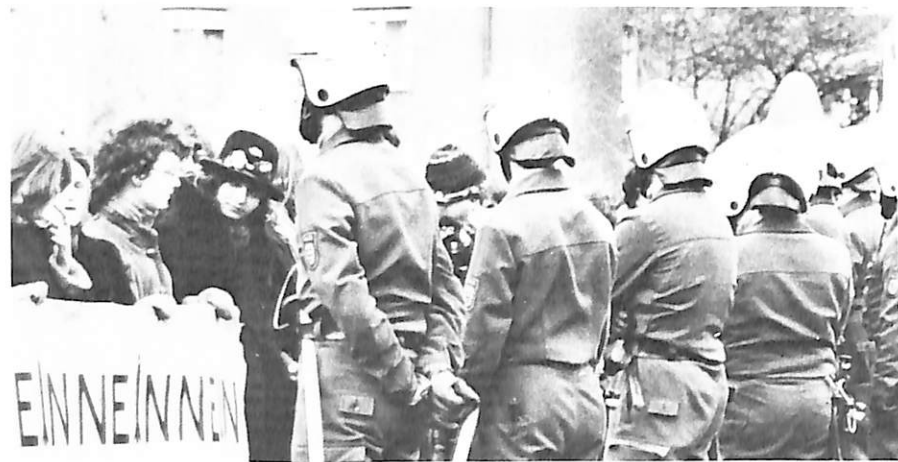

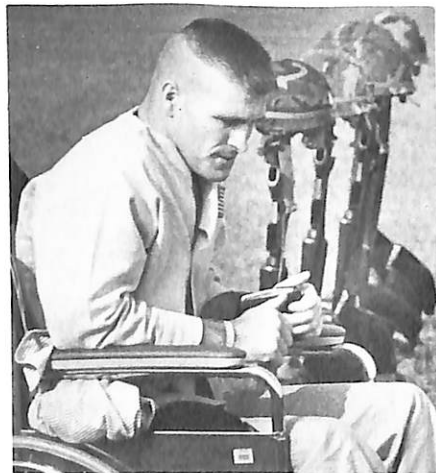

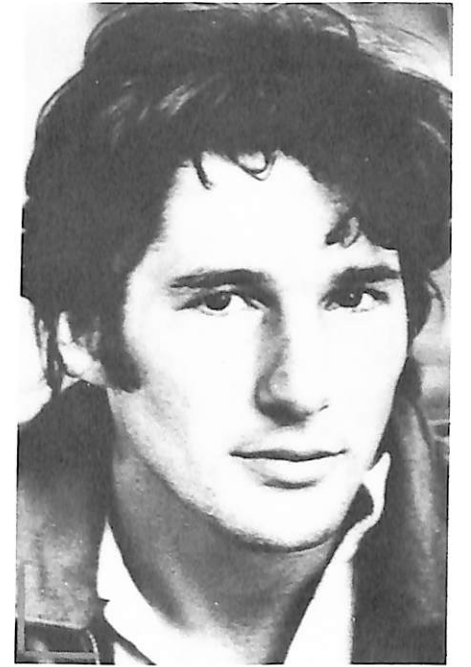

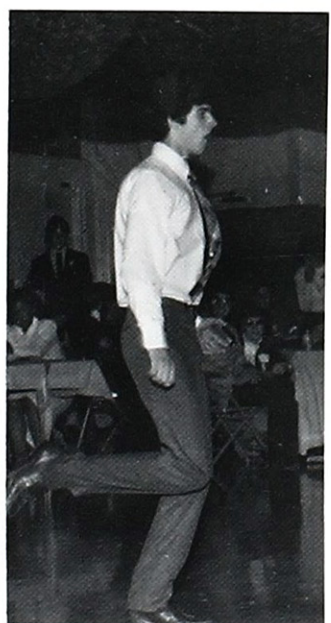
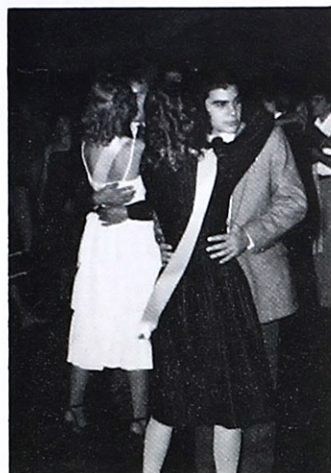


## Senior Candidates

# The Movers And The Shakers

At FCHS, we rarely see a person who does as much for the school as Mr. Bill R. Perry, The principal of Fort Campbell High School for the past 16 years. He is a very educated and skilled individual, as shown by his frequent attendance at many of the area colleges and universities. For example, he attended the University of Louisville, the University of Tennessee, and Peabody College. He currently holds a rank 1 in Education Administration.

Mr. Perry came to FCHS because he was very impressed with the potential of the people of Fort Campbell and felt that they were doing a lot of important things. He began teaching here as a P.E. instructor at Lincoln Elementary School and became a football coach at the junior high. From 1962-1968 he was the principal of the joint junior high and high school. Ever since 1968 he has served as the principal of FCHS.

Mr. Perry feels that his immediate goals are to organize, equip, and staff the new high school and to make it very successful. A major problem of the present high school, according to Mr. Perry, is that the teachers have been limited in course offerings due to lack of space. This problem, along with many others, will be solved with the completion of the new high school in the fall.

Mr. Perry believes that today's students are more mature, sophisticated, better organized, and serious about educational pursuit than students of the past. He has developed a deeper appreciation of the students and teachers at FCHS and a better understanding of the objectives of the Fort Campbell Dependent School System.

There are many people who strive to make FCHS the best school in the area. Assistant principal Gary Stewart works especially hard to reach this goal.

A native of Waverly, TN, he received his undergraduate degree from Austin Peay State University, where he was recognized by Kappa Delta Phi as an outstanding student. He earned his Eds from Peabody College.

After he graduated from APSU, in 1970, he came to Fort Campbell. He taught social studies and reading at the junior high school and was an assistant coach for that school's football team. In 1977 he ascended to his current position as assistant principal of FCHS. Because he loves this job, Mr. Stewart will remain as the assistant principal until, "I find a job as a principal . . . that is as pleasing as this job."

Mr. Stewart said that the students have developed better attitudes and that the faculty is improving each year. He hopes to become the assistant principal of the high school and believes that along with the many advantages the new high school will bring, such as new course offerings and better student-teacher interaction, the new building will raise the student's and teacher's morale.

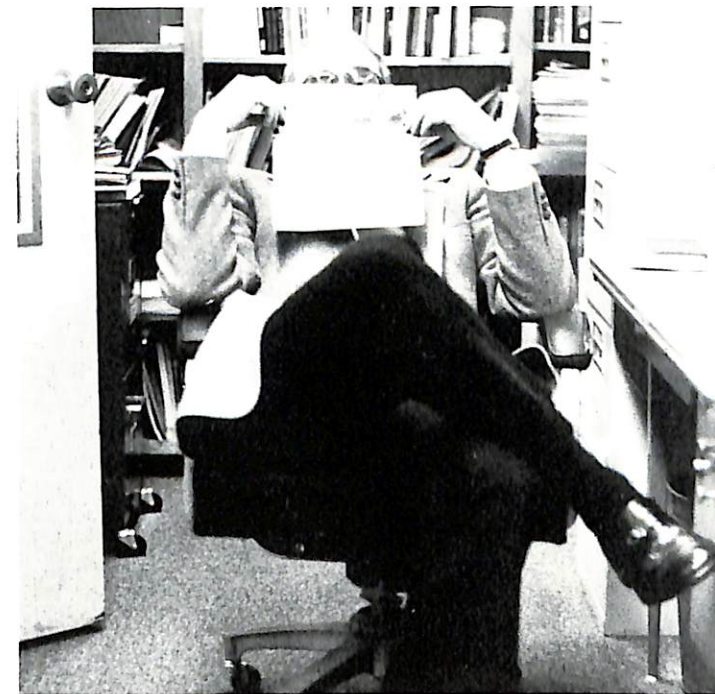
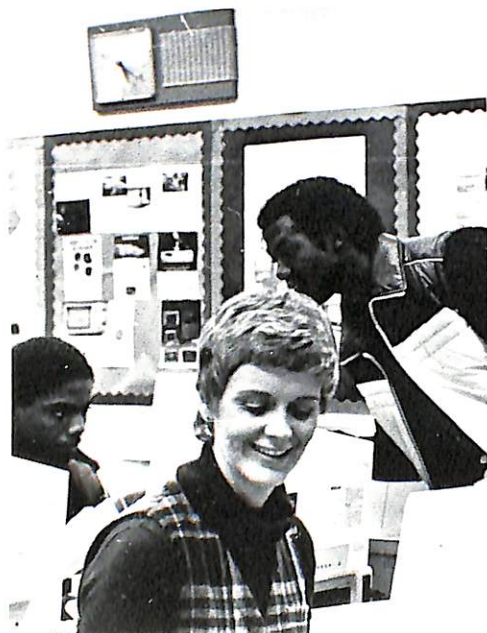

## Senior Advisors

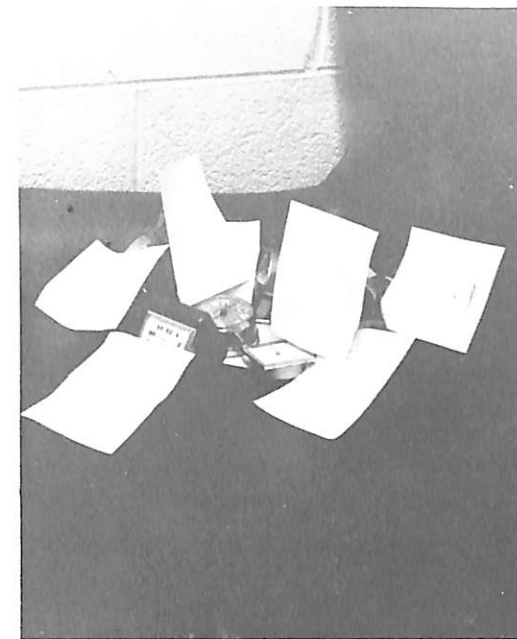

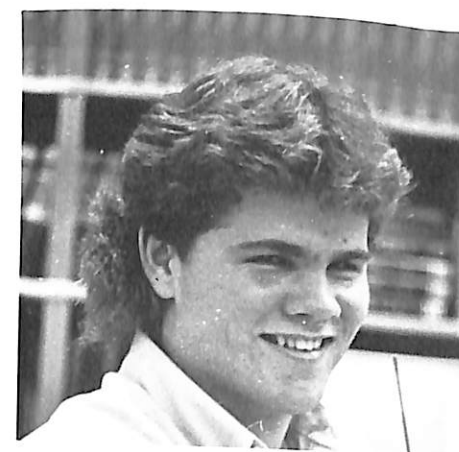

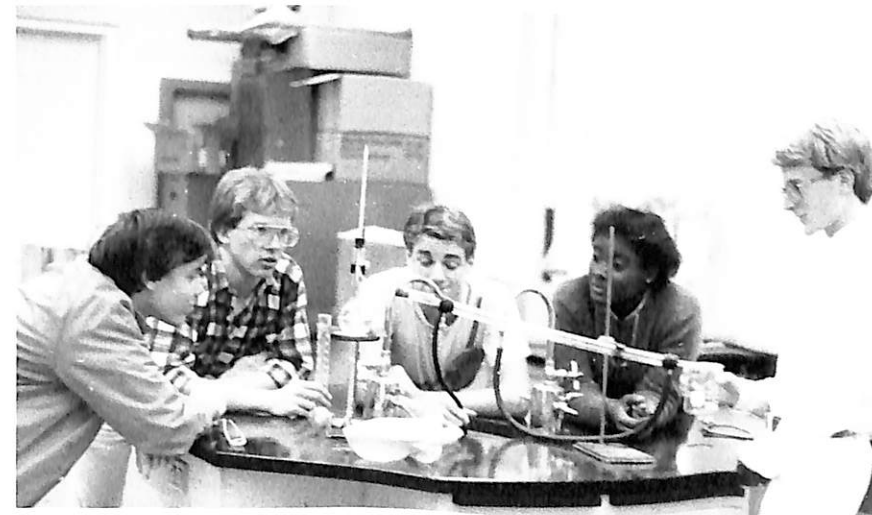

### A Year Of Rebuilding

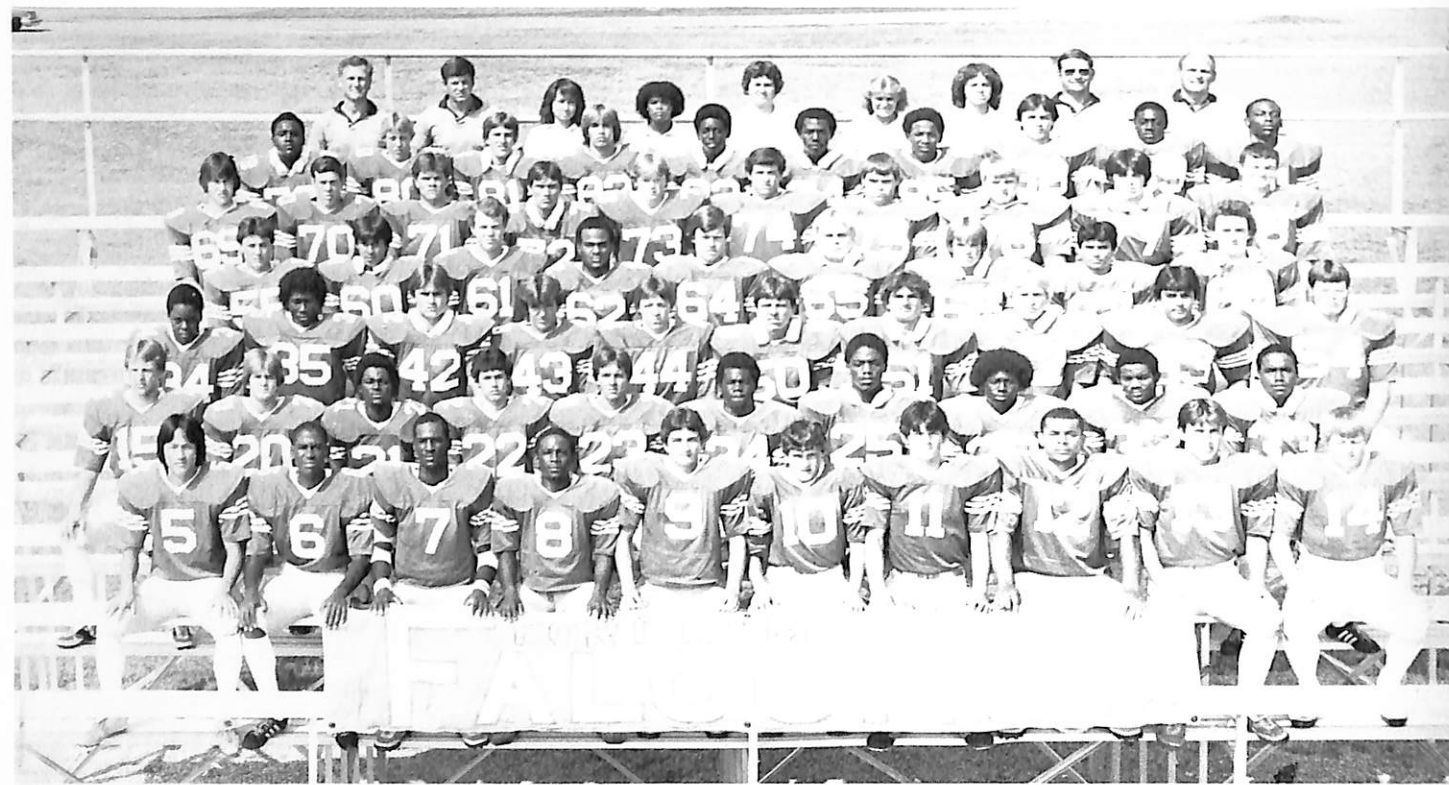
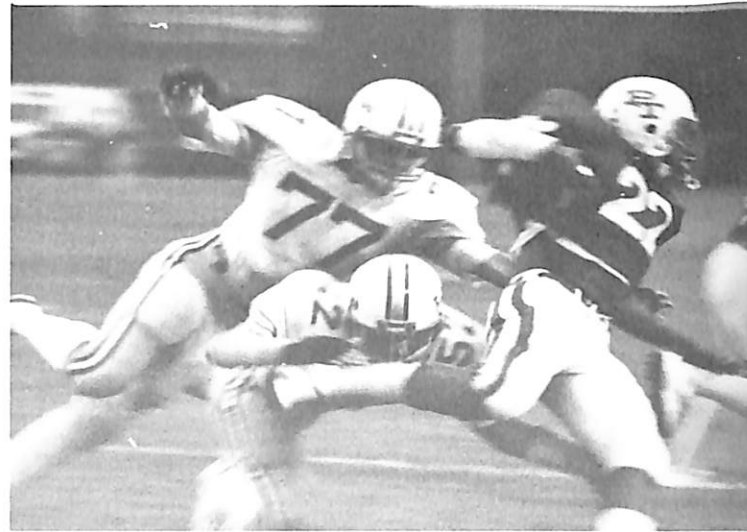
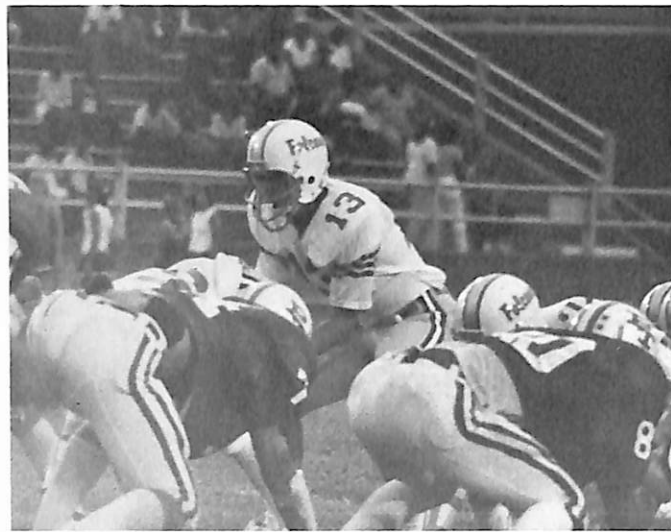

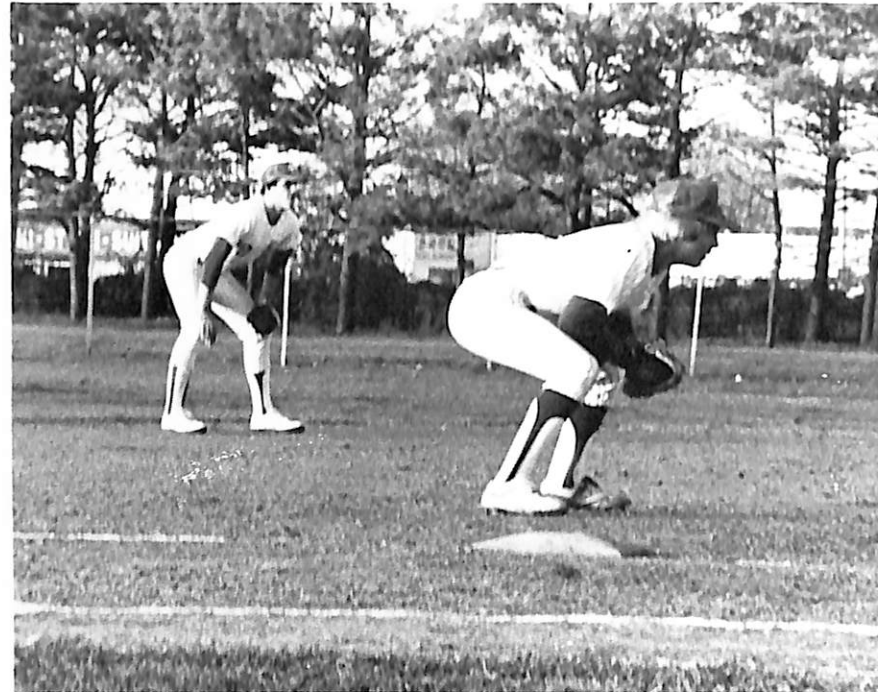




# Morgan's Maulers

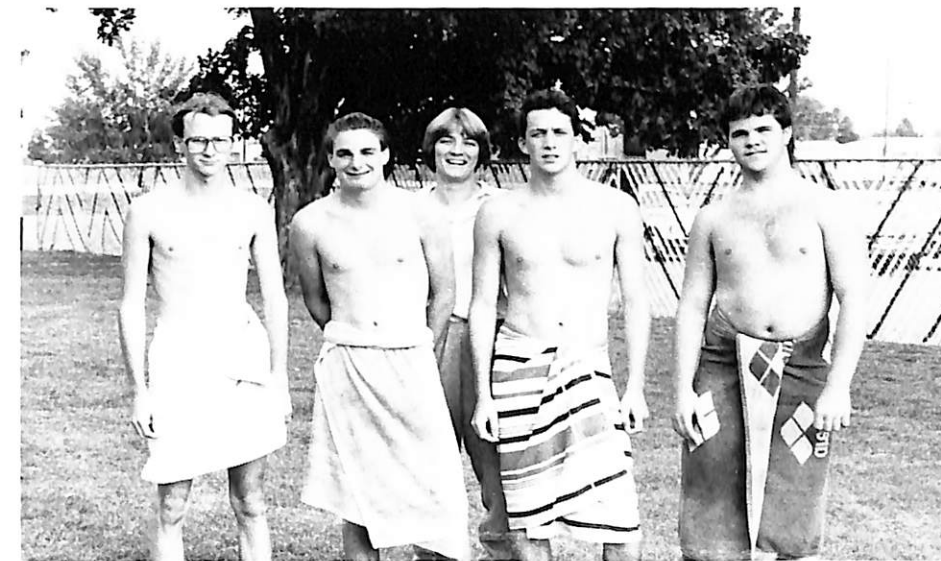
On several occasions, the team was rained out. In the District Tournament against Christian County, rain again tormented the Falcon team. They performed well, but were defeated two games to none.

# Falcons Sprint To Victory

The Boy's Track team got off with the gun as they broke eight school records — First, Kelvin White broke the 1979 school record in the 330 yd low hurdles (38.8) and took two seconds off of the 300 m low hurdles with a time of 38.3.

Amazingly, he also broke the 1980 record in the 200 m dash event. Greg Patton set two records in both the 800 yd. and 800 m events. Darrell Wallace, Ravonni Ward, Patrick Hawkins, and Kelvin White "went for the gold" as they broke the 1975 record in the 880 yd. relay with a time of 1:31.2. To top all of these fine accomplishments Rodney Young, Kelvin White, Darrell Wallace, and Greg Patton broke the last of the long standing records at Fort Campbell — the record set in 1973 in the Mile Relay. With a time of 3:28.1, they smashed the old record of 3:28.3. This same group of speedsters broke the 1981 record in the 1600 m relay.

Other events the boy's team participated in were the Clarksville Rotary Relays, where they were first in the Mile (Young, White, Peyton, Patton), and first in the Two Mile (Smith, Terry, Ramsey, Patton), and the Western Kentucky Relays, where the 880-relay team came in second and the Four Mile Relay team came in third. At this same competition, Smith took second place in the Two Mile event. Another event, the Western Kentucky Conference, also brought in some winnings. Fort Campbell came in first in the Mile Relay and Smith came in first in the Two Mile Run. Young and Patton came in second and

third respectively in the 400 m dash. Finally, in Sectionals, White placed in the 300 m Low Hurdles, and the Mile Relay team (consisting of Young, White, Wallace, and Patton) placed in the Mile Relay.

When one follows a winner, it is not always to "measure up." The old saying that it is hard to follow in someone else's footsteps is often proved true. That was one of the biggest challenges facing the 1983 girl's track squad, because for four years, the girls track team had taken State

This year, the girls team set a record of 9.3 in dual meets. They placed second in Regionals, Sectionals, and State (all of which were lost to Trigg County). In the Western Kentucky Conference, the girls took third, while Trigg County took first and Christian County took second. They also took third at the Madisonville Invitational. In the Clarksville Rotary Relay, the girls took fourth where they finished two places ahead of Trigg.

Some outstanding speedsters were Debra McLemore, who set a new school record in the long jump (17'11"), and who was the girl's state champion in the 400 m run. Wanda Jackson, Michelle Hardy, Kammye Jenkins, and Debra McLemore were the State Champions in the 400 m relay. Lisa Thompson, Kammye Jenkins, Michelle Hardy, and Marlo McLemore took second in the 800 m relay event at the State Tournament. Debra McLemore, Kammye Jenkins, Michelle Hardy, and Dawn Leonard took second place in the mile relay at State.



# Courtside Manner

Marchese Gildersleeve and Cynthia Santa dominated the boys' and girls' 1983 tennis team. Marchese led the boys' with a record of 12-2 and Cynthia led the girls' with a record of 8-6.

Marchese has been participating on the High School team since his eighth grade year. He dominated the boys' tennis team for the third year in a row and was voted Most Valuable Player all three. He participated in the Regional Tournament up to the quarter finals where he was defeated by the number one seed. Regardless, Marchese has defeated several of his opponents 8-0, and he has played in over ten local tournaments in such places as Hopkinsville, Paducah, and Murray. Marchese states that his toughest opponent was from Clarksville Academy.

Lori Sanders proved to be an outstanding linkswoman. She took fourth in the Girls' Regional Tournament and was the first girl from Fort Campbell to qualify for the State Tournament. 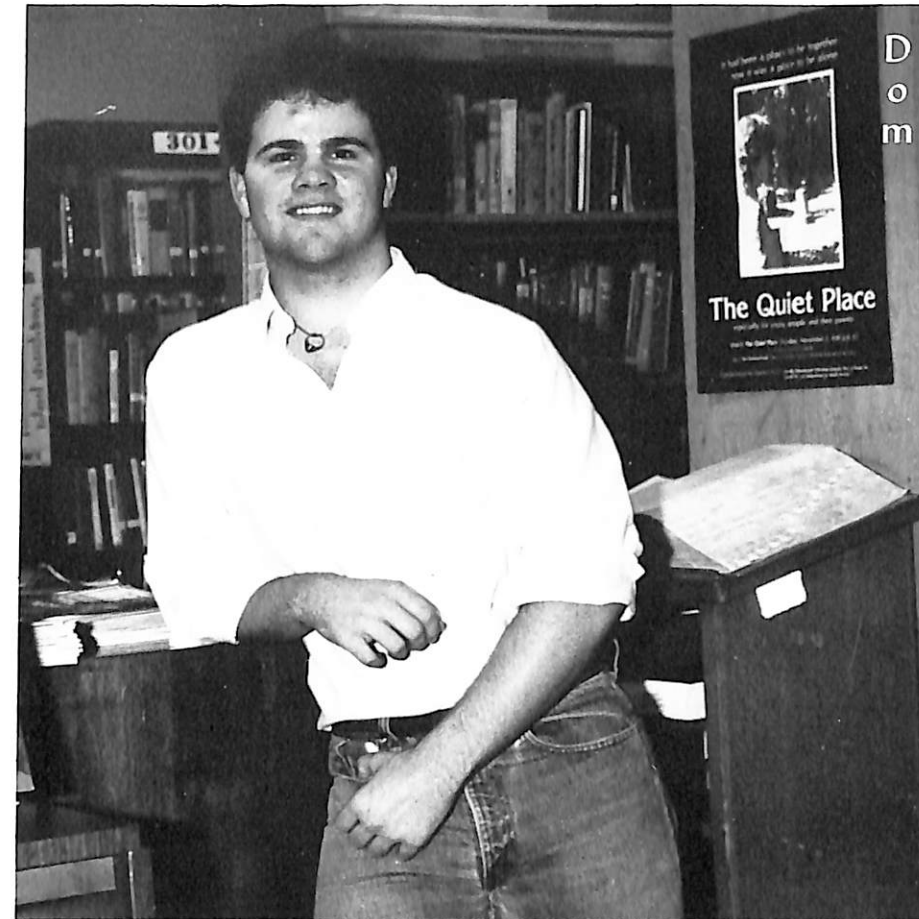
## Salutatorian

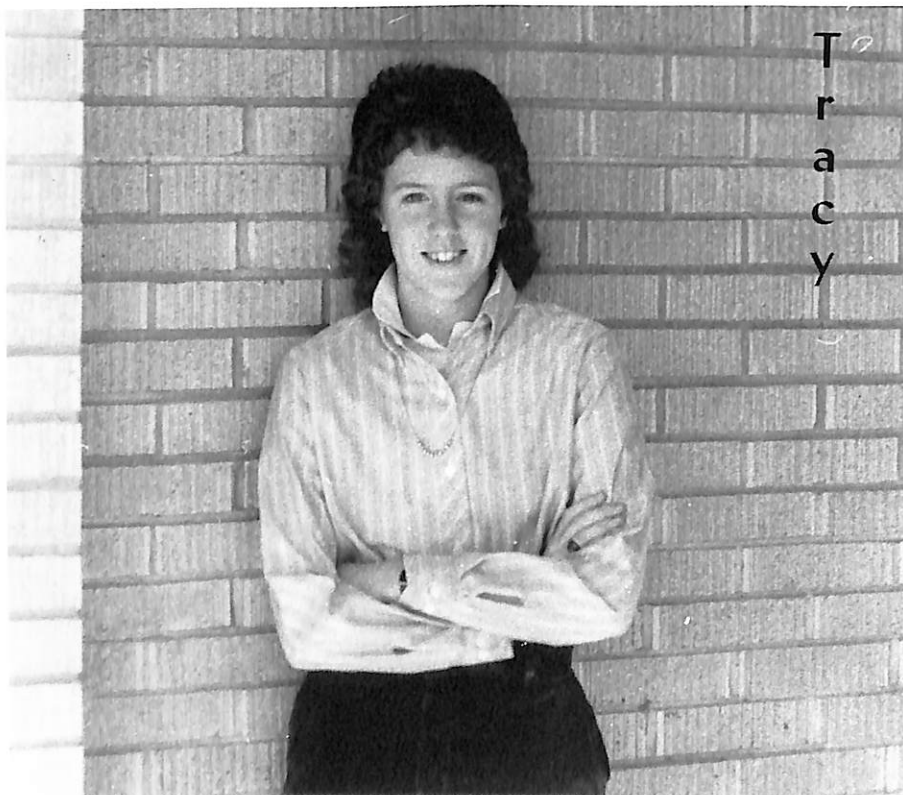
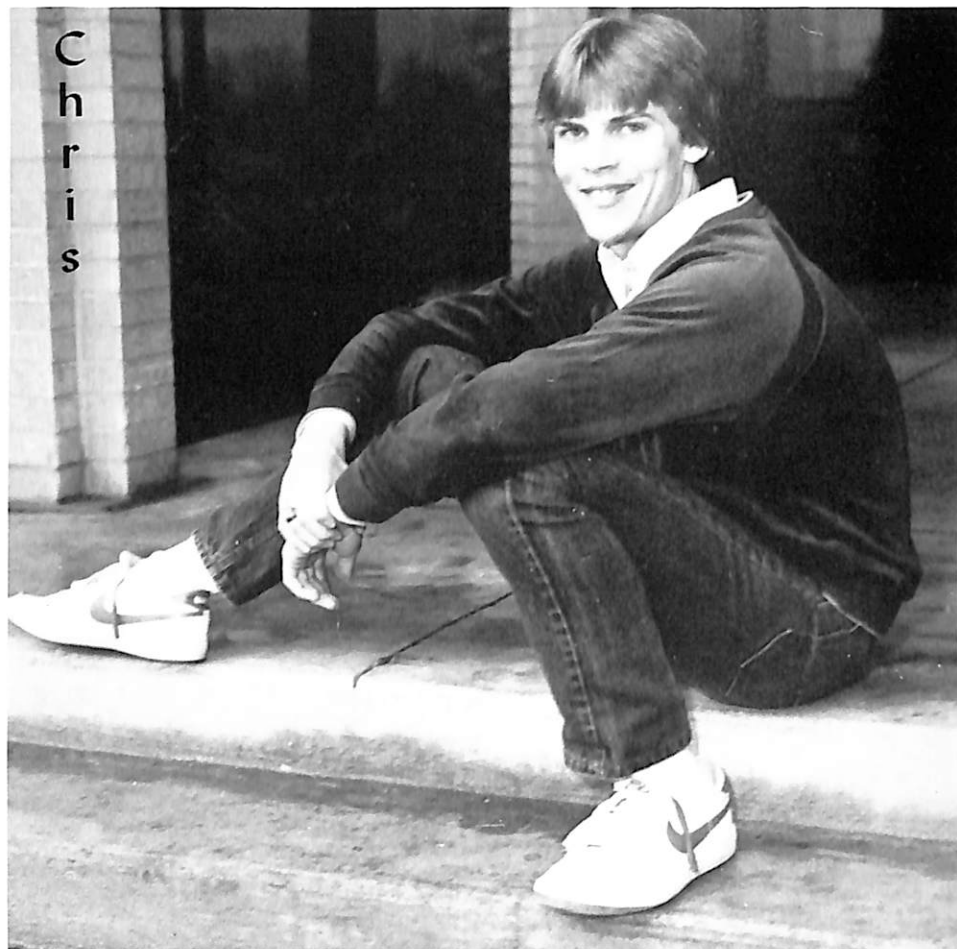

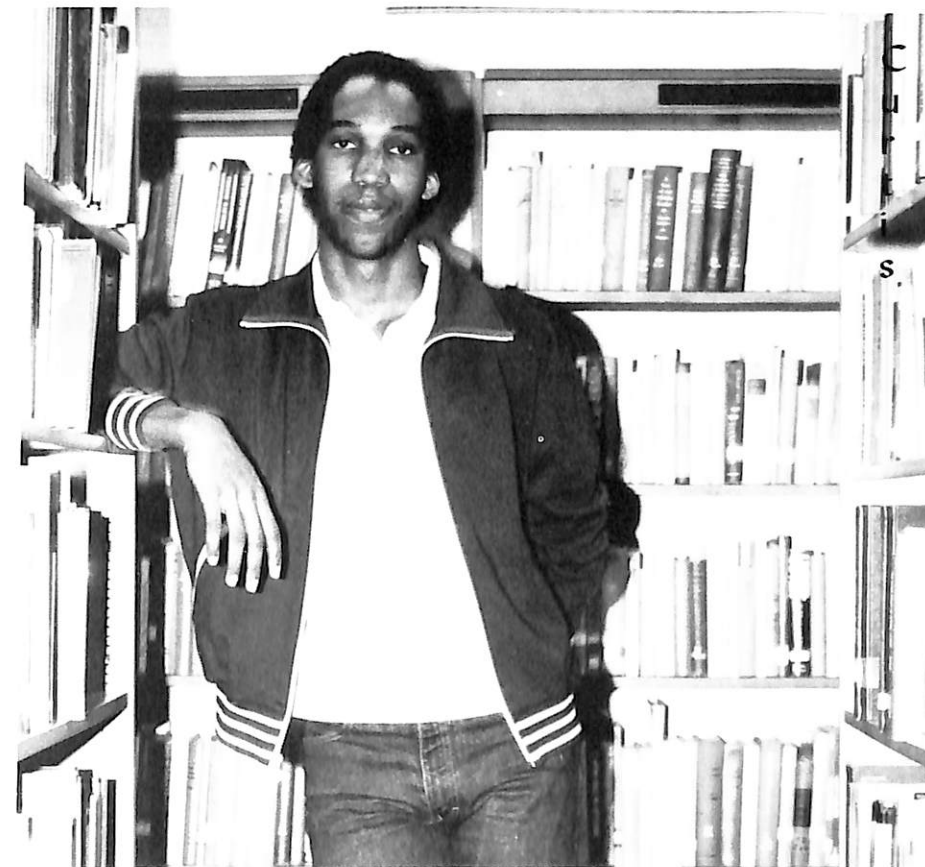
For Liz nothing surpasses her exuberant spirit in school than meeting new students and sharing memorable experiences with old friends.

She characteristically portrays herself by offering sensible advice to future seniors: "Have a good time, be active in school activities, but don't let your grades suffer because of your social life."

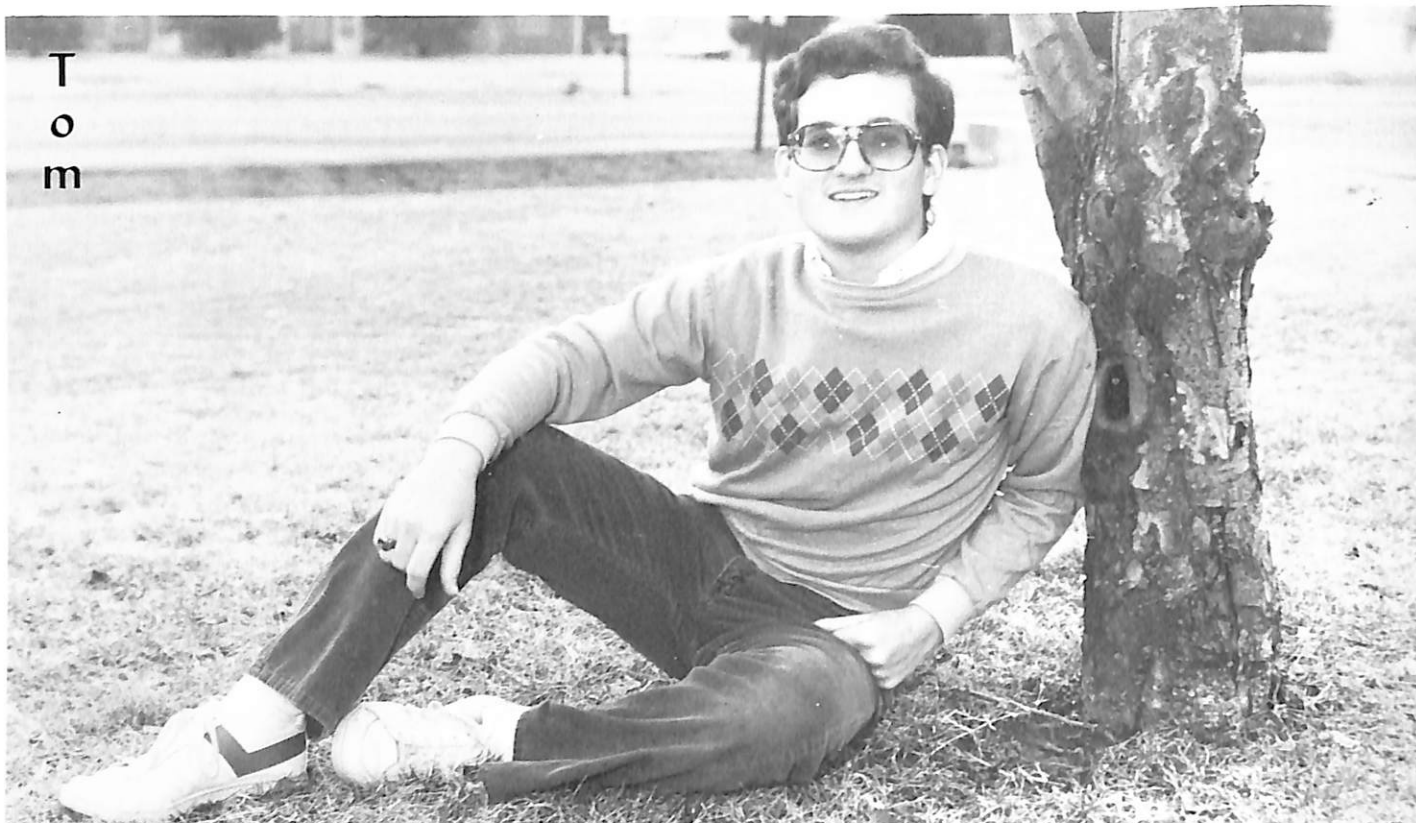
Liz will attend the University of Notre Dame next fall to study Engineering.

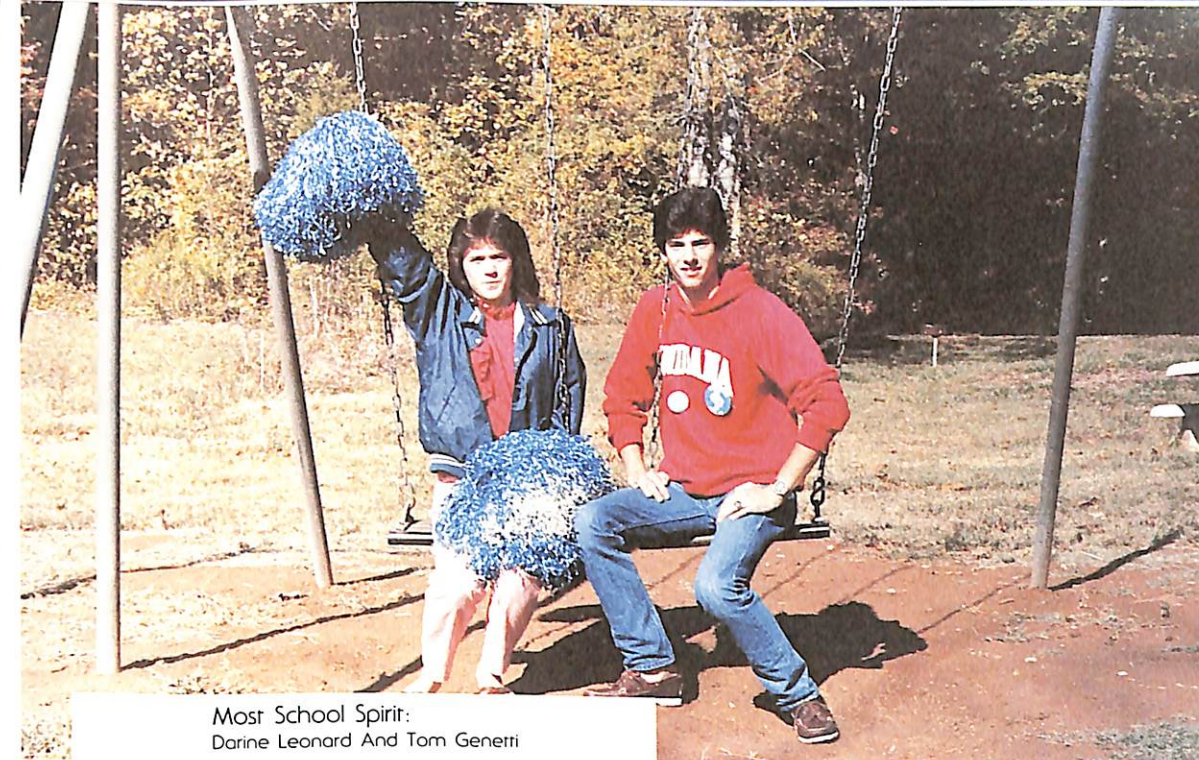
the spirited Seniors at Fort Campbell.
