## Reflecting On Excellence

Serving our post dependents for twenty-three years, Fort Campbell Senior High School was established in 1962. Prior to that, a junior high 956-1962, carried sudents from the seventh grade to the ninth grade. seventh grade to the ninth grade. grades $10-12$ had to attend the Clarksville-Montgomery County school system.

In 1962, Fort Campbell High School opened at the location that is presently Fort Campbell North Middle School. This school served all students in grades $10-12$ until 1968, at which time a new building equipped o hold 450 students was built on a wenty-two acre campus on Chaffee Road at South Carolina Avenue.

When plans were made to reinstall grade 9, the need for a larger and better facility became necessary.
