Mrs. Elinor Martin is retiring after 28 years of dedication and service to the Fort Campbell School System and its students.




Mrs. Martin enjoys collecting frog figurines, which can be seen decorating everything upon entering her room.

























#### FALCON FEVER AT ITS HEIGHT DURING SPIRIT WEEK


Spirit week continued as Thursday brought on more nerds than




# '`Time for the music to come alive.''




## **PUBLICATIONS**

Ten years from now, Laura sees herself teaching exceptional children with a Master's or Doctorate in Special Education.






Politics is Laura's long term goal. She has a positive outlook on marriage and hopes to have a family of her own someday.


## Junior Favorites

Carolina and served as assistant principal for five years.



# We Salute Our Fallen Eagles

Holiday spirits were dampened on December 12, 1985 by the tragic plane crash in Gander, Newfoundland, which claimed the lives of 248 Fort Campbell soldiers. The soldiers, members of the MFO (Multinational Force and Observers) Task Force were returning from a 6 month peace keeping duty in the Sinai to join families and friends for the holidays. The soldiers were primarily assigned to the 3/502 Infantry Battalion but almost all other units on post shared in the loss of fellow

With Fort Campbell and surrounding communities feeling the full impact of the loss the rest of the world expressed their sympathy by flying flags at half mast, starting relief funds for the families, and marques everywhere read, "We Salute Our Fallen Eagles."

Numerous memorial services were held. The 101st Airborne Division Air Assault and Fort Campbell was visited by President and Mrs. Reagan at a memorial service for the families of the victims. At the service President Reagan said the soliders had a rendezvous with destiny. Both he and Mrs. Reagan offered condolences to each family member. Marjo General Burton D. Patrick also expressed his sorrow for the fallen

In years to come this tragedy will be forgotten but the courage and pride of the 248 American soldiers wil live forever.


# Visions of Lexington


Expecting to return all five starters from the previous season's 12-5 squad, the Falcons were recognized as a region powerhouse. However, military transfers claimed two of those starters, leaving Coach Tim McDougle and assistant Mickey Fisher with the task of finding replacements to support the nucleus of seniors Reggie Odom, Jeff Welch, and Andre Witherspoon. The players decided on were seniors Jeff Hillard and Hayward Davis, along with junior Andre Williams. Senior Jimmy Hill, junior John Crawford, sophomore Troy Lance, and freshman Scott Kurtz provided depth by contributing when coming off the bench. Junior Jimmy Doyle and freshman Randy Green were added to the varsity roster later in the season.

The Falcons finished the season with a record of 13-10, with seven of those losses coming by five points or less. Fort Campbell competed in the tough second region, eighth district, playing against two top ten teams, third ranked defending state champs Hopkinsville and tenth ranked Christian County.

Leading the Falcons in scoring was Jeff Welch, who averaged 19.2 points per game. Next was Reggie Odom, who poured in 18 points per contest. In the rebounding department, it was Odom leading the way, hauling down 17 boards a game. Next was Welch, who averaged 7.1 rebounds an outing. The defensive leader was 5'5" point guard Andre Witherspoon, who hawked opposing ballhandlers all season. He averaged 9.1 points per game and led the Falcons in assists.







# FALCONS FLY TO REGIONALS

After a mediocre 9-10 record in 1984, the 1985 Falcon baseball team did not foresee a birth in a regional tournament. However, their visions quickly changed.

With the motivation of a 4-0 record the first week of the season. Fort Campbell went from an average team to a respectable contender for the district championship. The Falcons finished the remainder of the regular season, including the Northwest Tournament during spring break, with a mark of 7-8-1, with four of those losses coming only by two runs or less.

The first game of the district tournament pitted the Falcons against host school Christian County. Newcomer pitcher Joe Dalessio shut out the Colonels on twelve strikeouts as Fort Campbell breezed to a 3-0 victory. This qualified them for at least a district runner-up honor and a spot in the first round of the regional baseball tournament. Game two was a different story. With ace Dalessio throwing for the second straight day, the quiet Falcon bats could produce no offense to support him, managing only one hit in a 4-2 loss to the Hopkinsville Tigers.

The next stop for the Falcons was Murray State University,

site of the regional baseball tournament. They faced Calloway County in the opening game. Nothing seemed to go Fort Campbell's way as the hot hitting Lakers forced the Falcons to use four different pitchers and commit multiple errors. When the final out was made, the scoreboard read Calloway County 20, Fort Campbell 7. The Falcons exited

the tournament and ended the season with a 12-10-1 record.

The leading bitter for the Falcons was third baseman Mike Caver, who bit .328, slammed 7 homers, and drove in 21 runs, all team highs. John Dalessio and Mike Suddoth followed with a .279 average, with Dalessio stealing a team high 13 bases.

Leading the Falcons on the mound was southpaw Joe Dalessio. He had a 5-4 record with an ERA of 2.11. He also fanned a staff high 66 opposing hitters. Jeff Hillard followed with a 4-2 record and an ERA of 5.62.




