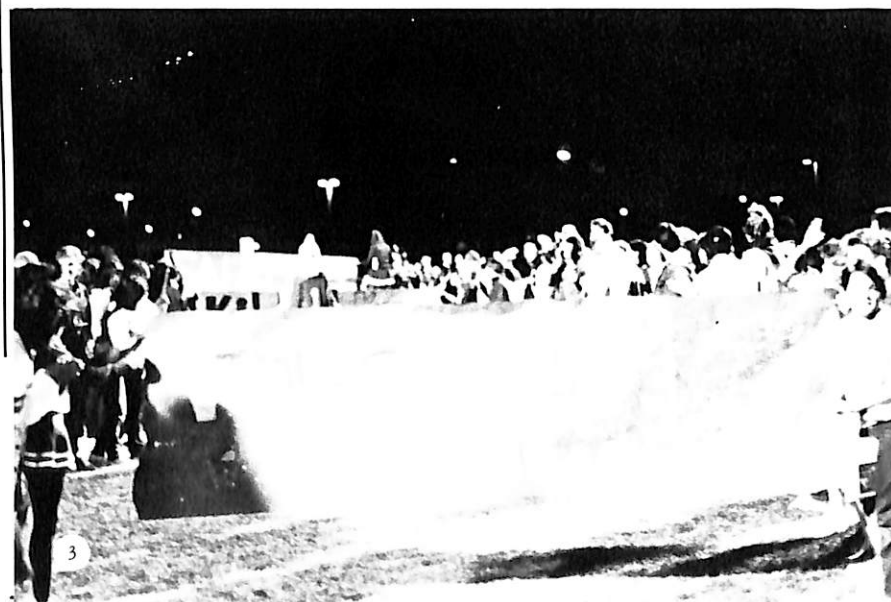


REFLECTIONS ON SPIRIT '87

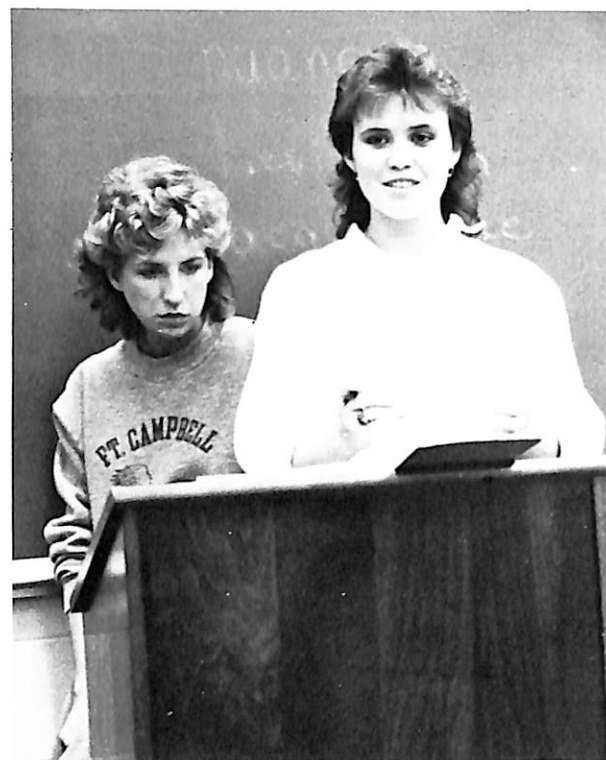

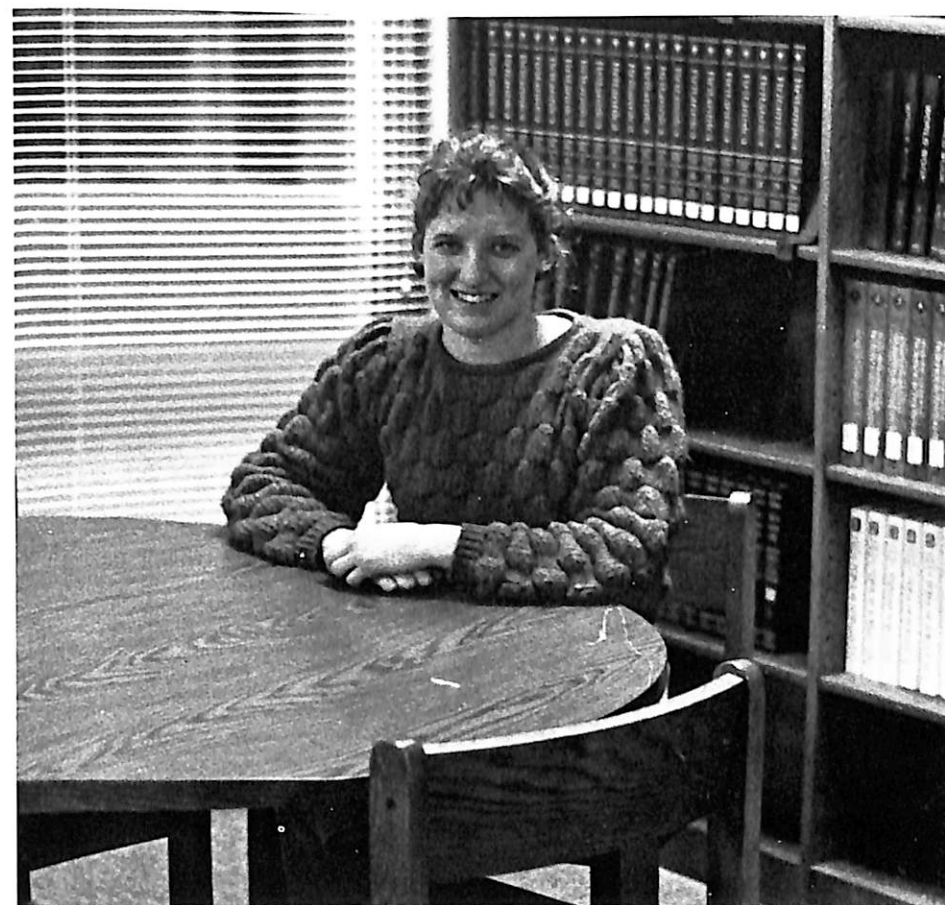


Salutatorian

In the number three spot this year is Janeen Bogue. This was her first year at FCHS.

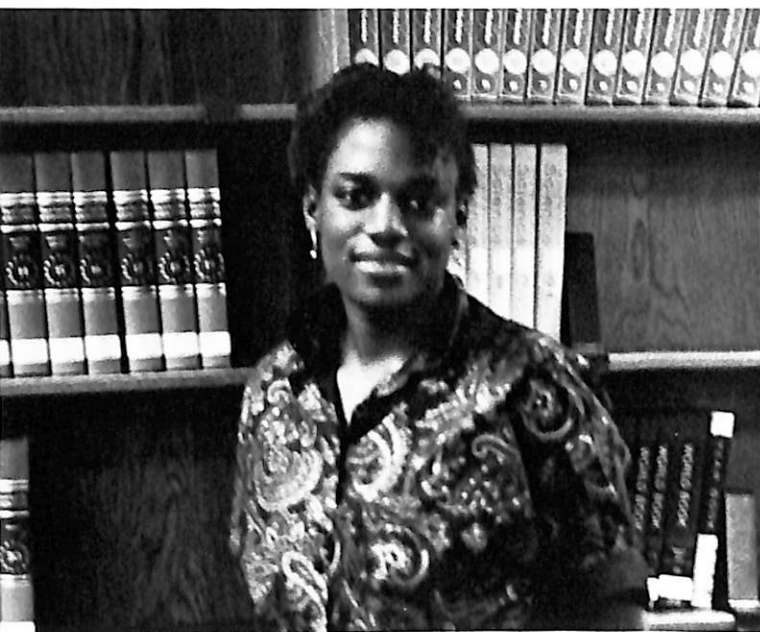
Janeen was a member of the Key Club and the National Honor Society her senior year. She is a hard worker and is determined to do her best.

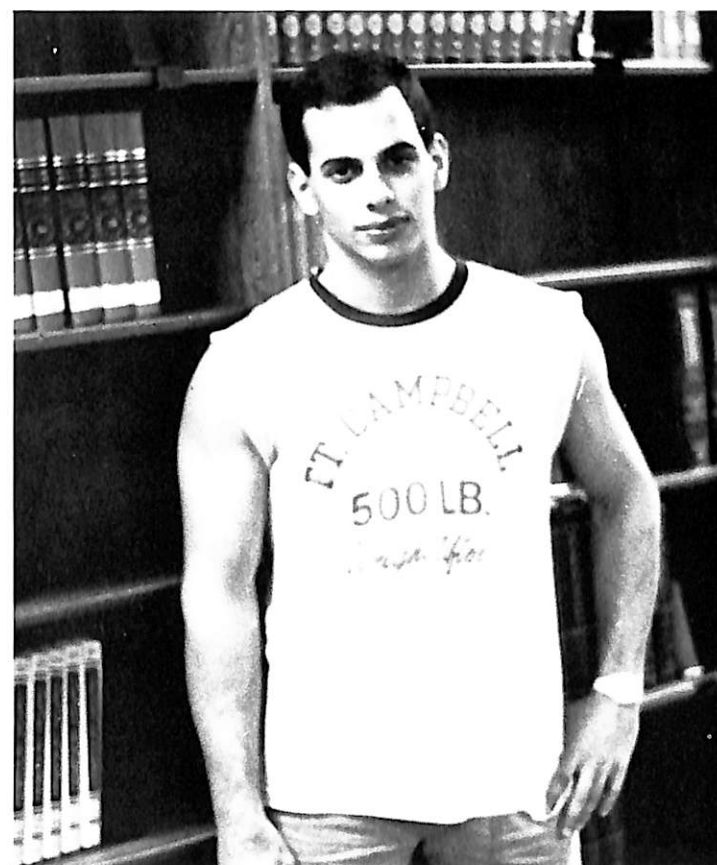
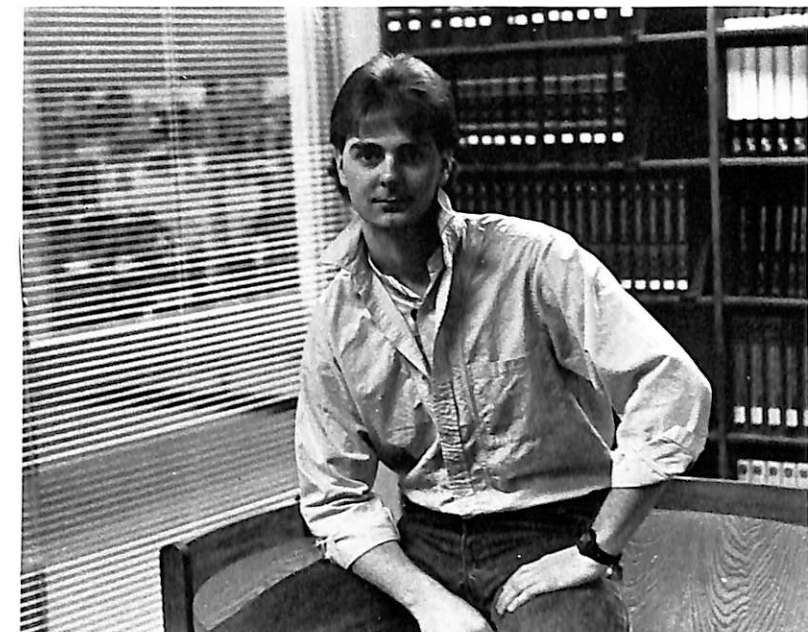

David plans to continue his education at Western Kentucky University in the fall and possibly major in Biology.

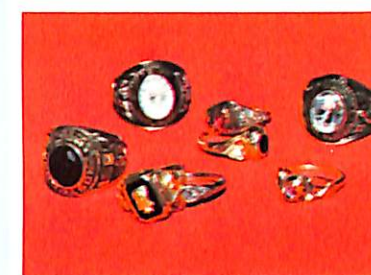
In the number nine spot this year is Valarie Thomasson. With her hard work and determination, Valarie was able to achieve such a high GPA.

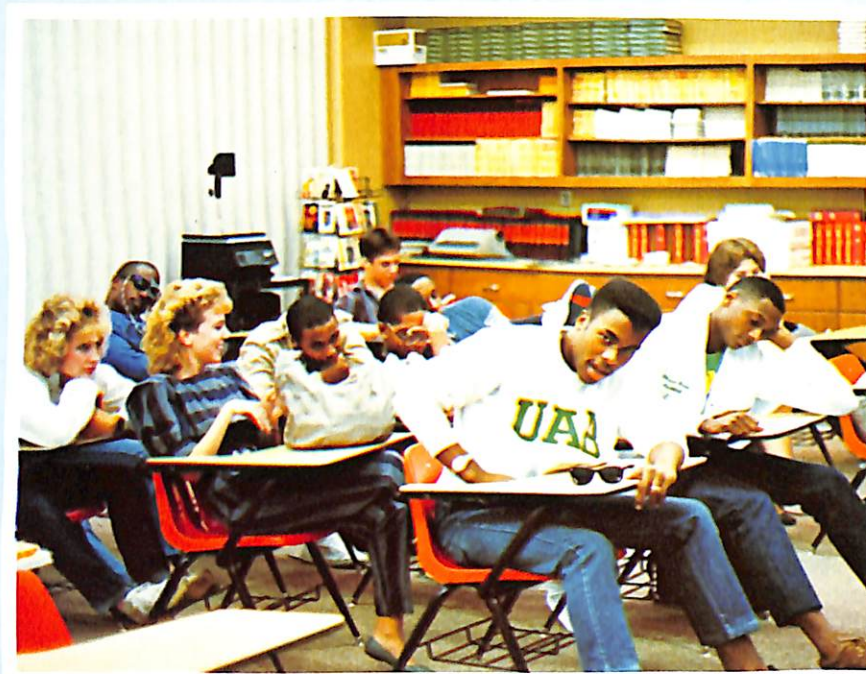

SENIORITIS: Epidemic Crushes Senior Class

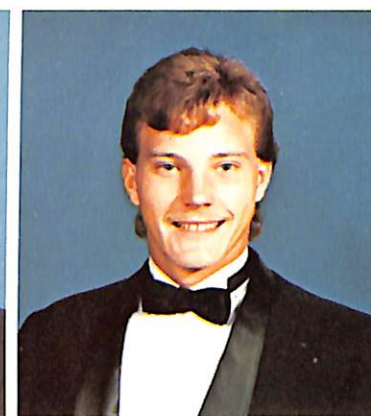
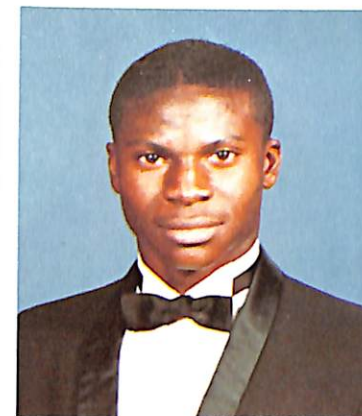

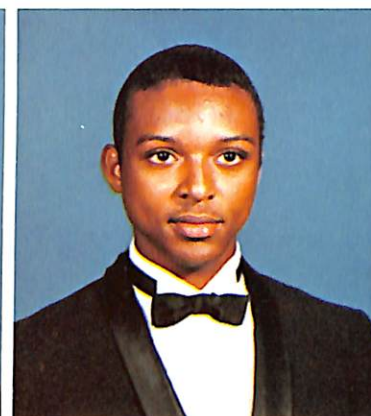

Naturally, our teachers and administration were not fooled by our antics. They stood on the sidelines and shook their heads sadly as our grades plummeted into vast depths.

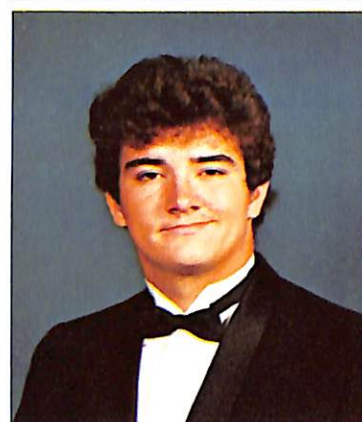

CARS ARE A NECESSITY

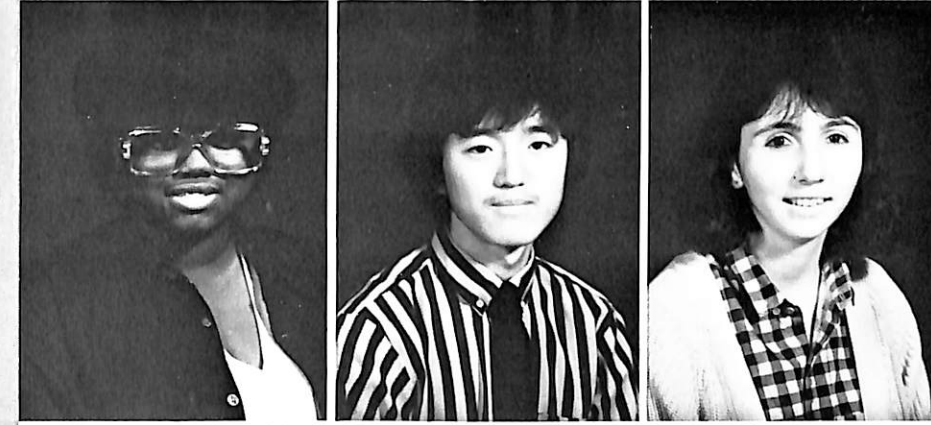

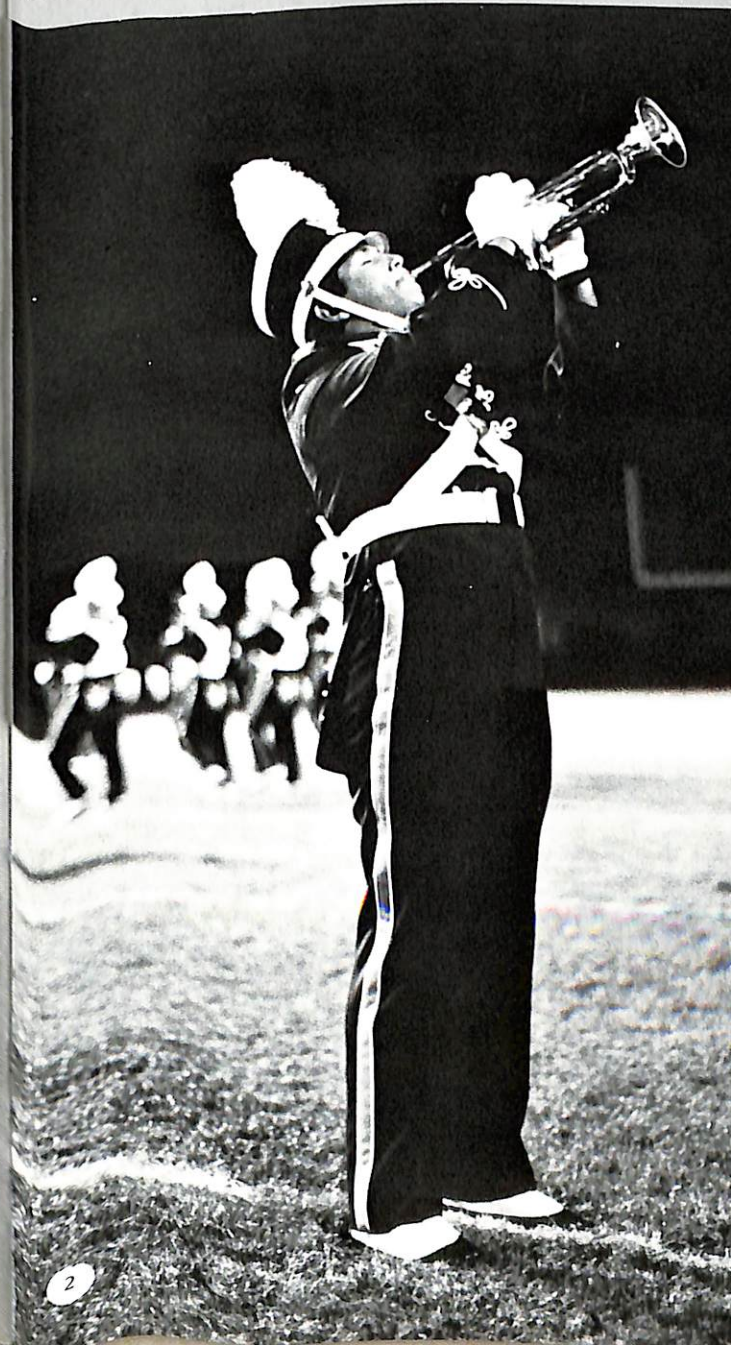


STEPPIN' IN STYLE

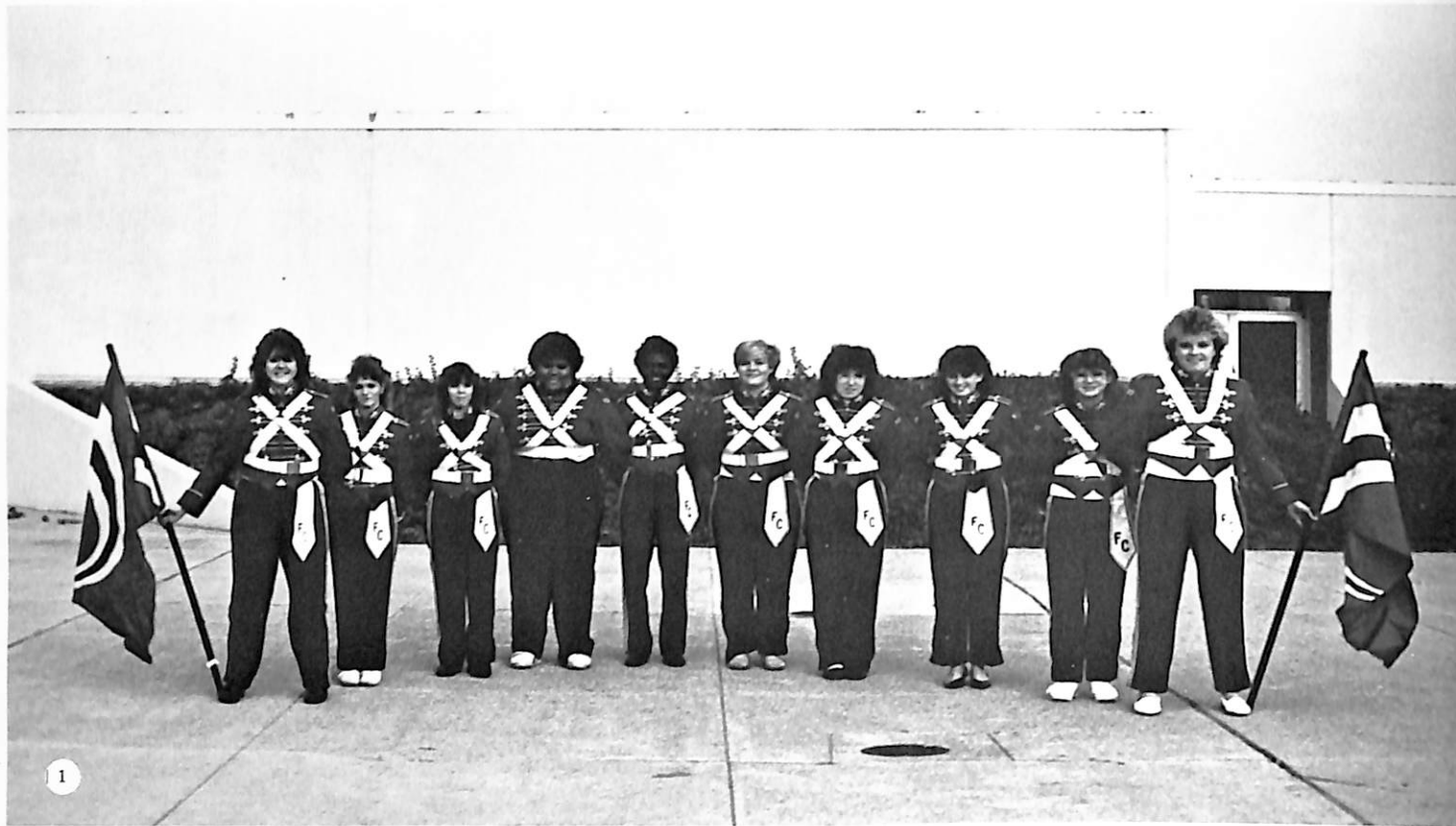

Going into the home stretch with a 2-4 record, the Falcons pulled off three straight wins to capture the sub-district championship.

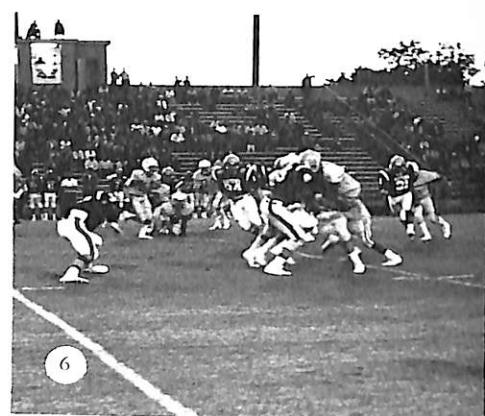
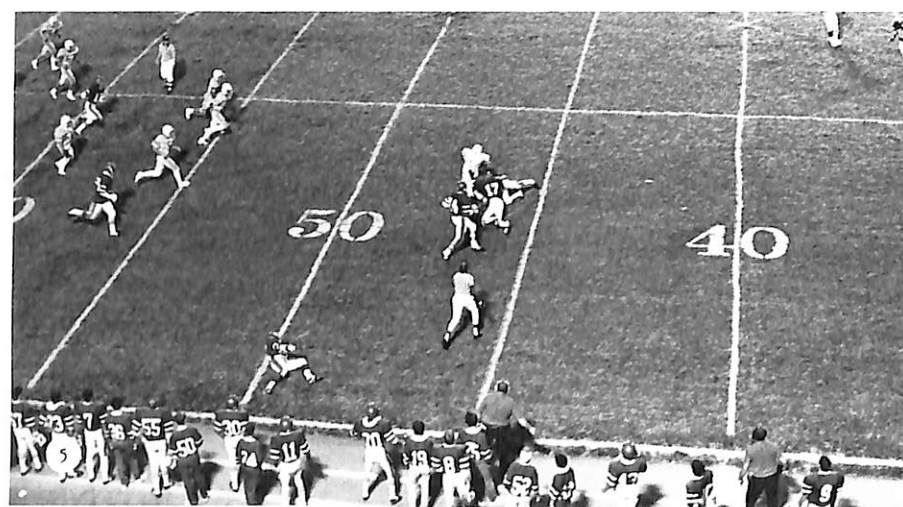
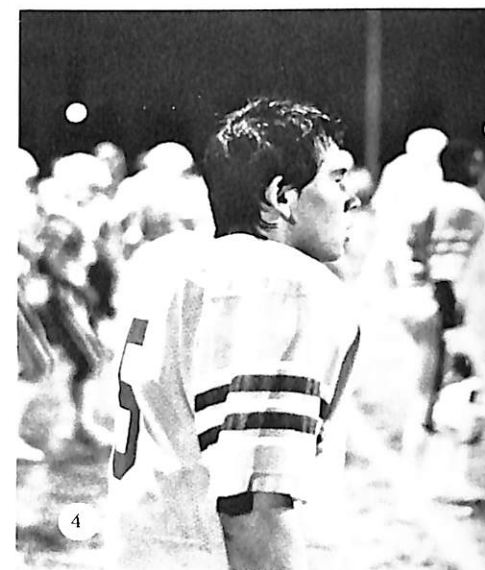
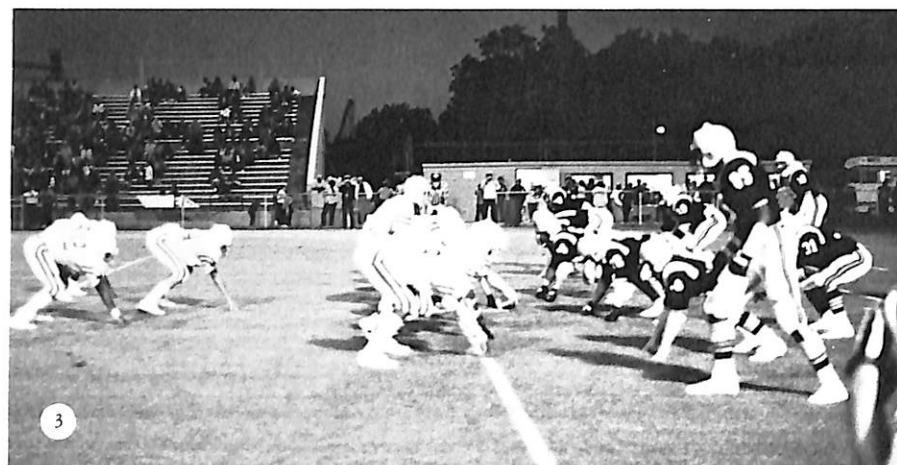


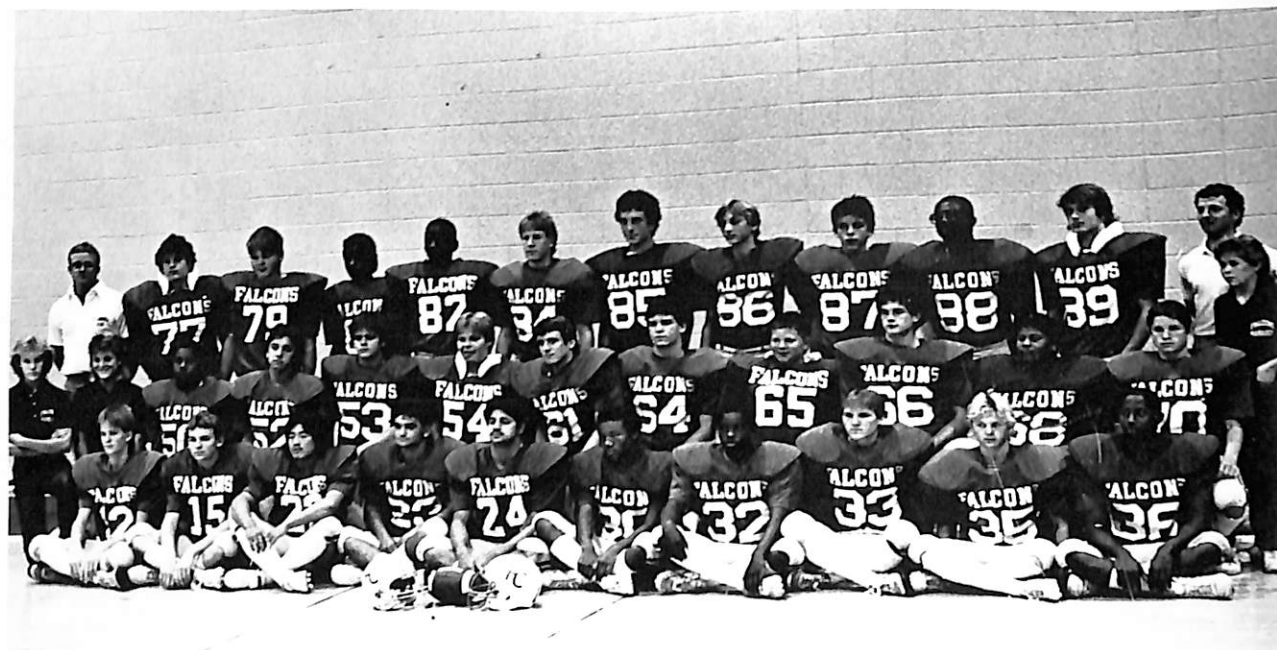

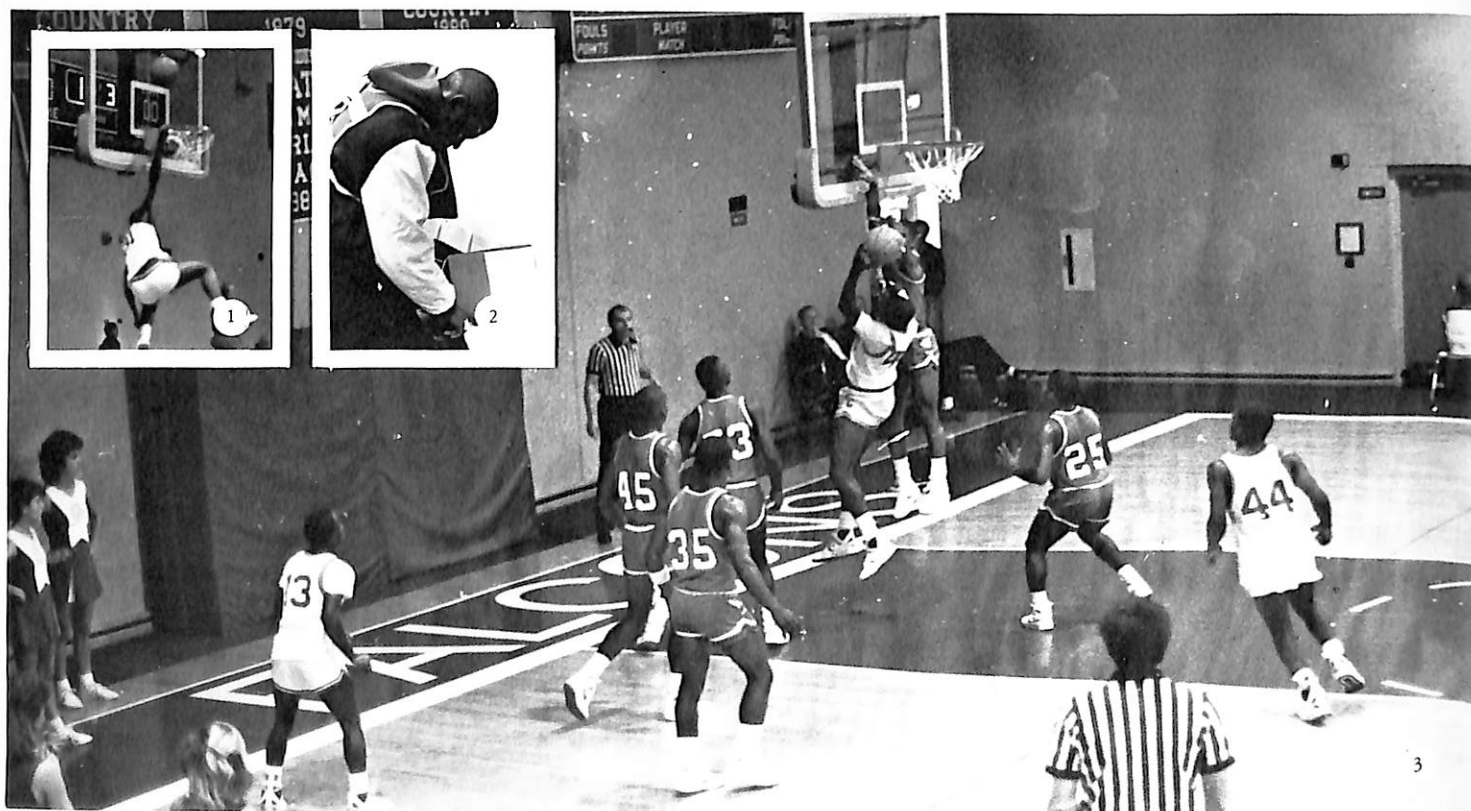

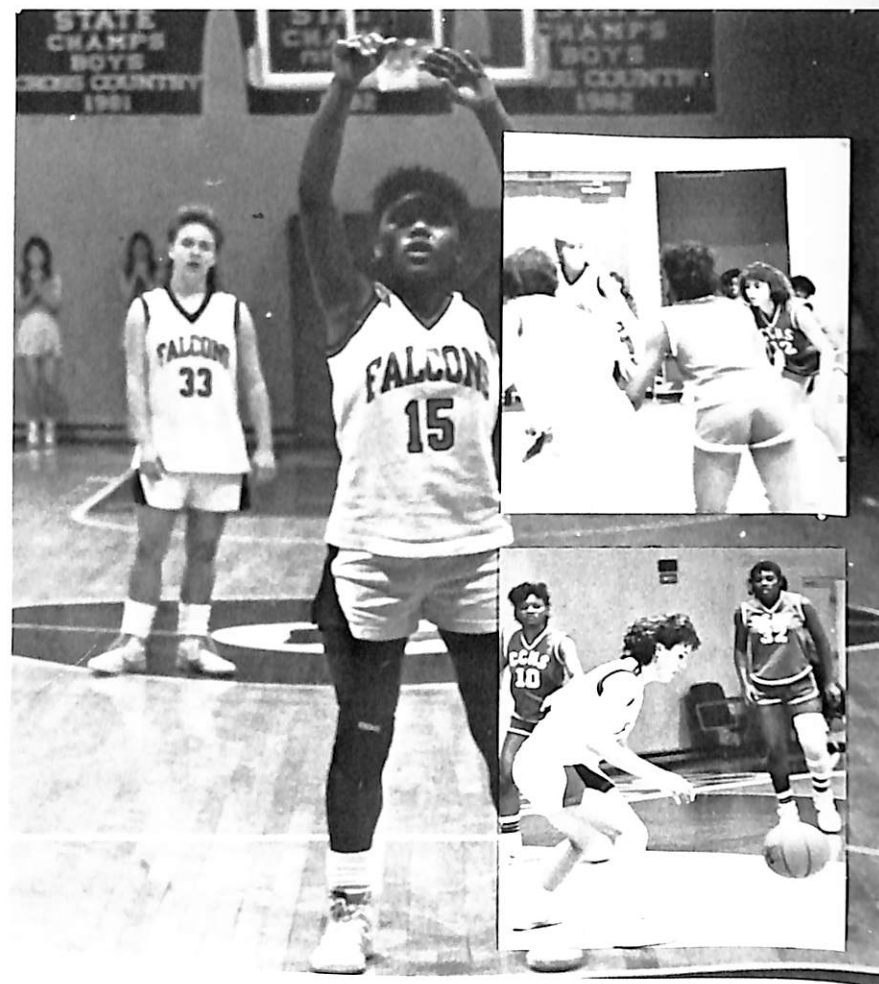

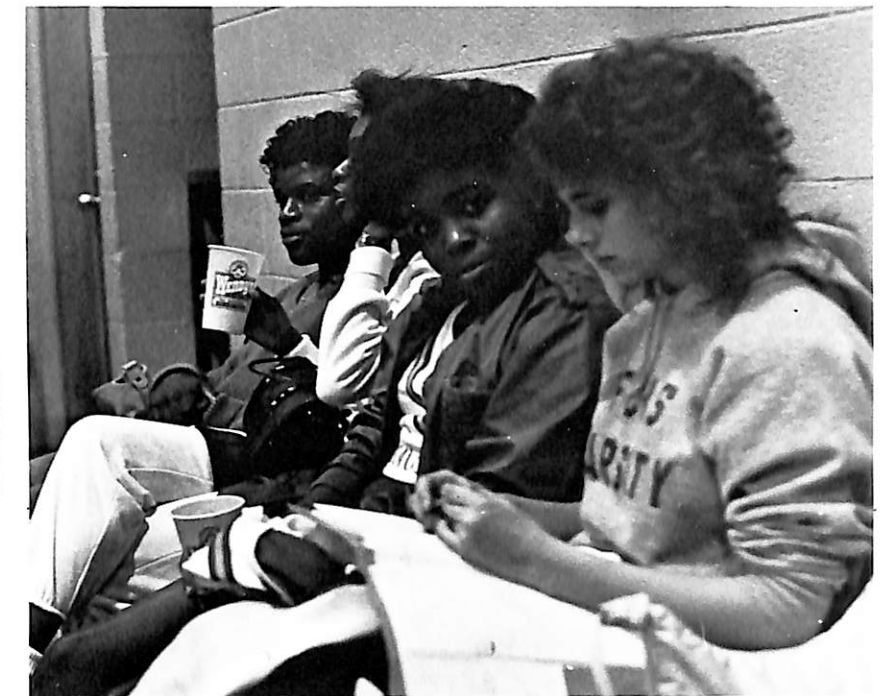
