





Thanks to our beloved Coach Houston Mills, Fort Campbell High School has not only earned respect for its athletic and scholarly endeavors, but it has become a high school that has pride and courage in every feat it tackles, throughout "The Game of Life." This year's publications staff would like to dedicate the 1988 FALCON to Coach Houston W. Mills ... a man committed to excellence through honesty, respect for himself and others, patriotism, responsibility, and loyalty!

For 251/2 years, Coach Mills unselfishly gave much of his spare time to his coaching career, at the high school, never missing a practice of a game. He also contributed to the great progress of the track program, by coaching for several years, and serving as the track coordinator, in 1979, when both the male and female teams won the state title.

Coach Mills began his higher education at the University of Florida on a football scholarship, then he transferred and completed his education at Austin Peay State University, majoring in health and physical education. He is survived by his wife, Betty, and their two sons, Scott and Craig, who live in Clarksville. Mrs. Mills is also an educator in the post school system.

In the words of those who knew Coach Mills best, "He was a fine coach who gave respect and loyalty where it was due."

Coach Marshall Patterson, the athletic director at the high school, says, "He took pride in working with those students who were not necessarily physically gifted. When a kid managed to do one pull-up it was just as important, to him (Coach Mills), as the one who did twenty-five."

Steve Lowe, a Junior at FCHS, says, "He demanded excellence and he got it ... from the whole team!"

Coach Houston W. Mills left a legacy at Fort Campbell High School - athletic excellence. He taught us how to carry the ball. We must continue to carry it well - with remembrance and pride!


Student Council played a vital role in our school this year. The officers as well as the class representatives wanted to make this year a memorable one for FCHS students.

THE BEST OF THE CLASS




The class ranking of every student begins the day they become Freshmen in high school. Class ranking is based on the student's grade point average (GPA).


THE ROAD NOT TAKEN Robert Frost

I shall be telling this with a sigh somewhere ages and ages hence Two roads diverged in woods, and I — I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference.



This year's sophomores joined forces with the upperclassmen in the pep assemblies and enjoyed active participation in all phases of the school life here at FCHS.











This, or a comparable statement, could have been spoken by any of the three girls who attended Kentucky Girl's State from June 8 to 13, 1987.



The purpose of JROTC is to teach good leadership along with learning to read maps, oral communication, marksmanship, and first aid.


















. . . AS DEADLINES CLOSE ON YEARBOOK

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THROUGH ADVERSITY FALCONS POST WINNING RECORD



The Falcon football team, under the leadership of a dozen seniors, posted a 7-5 record as they returned to Class AA play. These seniors are Leon Hill, Pat Moody, Darrin Gile, Pat Isom, Rick Anthony, Terry Moss, Mike Gillies, Richard Grice, Jason Myers, Bart Tragemann, Frank Graves, and Chris Lehew. Of these twelve seniors, eight started on defense and nine started on offense.

A shining falcon defense which recorded three shutouts during the regular season kept Fort Campbell close as the offense was hampered by injuries. Fort Campbell linebackers Richard Grice and Pat Isom, who were also the team captains, led the defense in tackles.

The season started similar to the 1986 season, and the Hopkinsville Tigers scored late in the fourth quarter to defeat Fort Campbell. The next week, Fort Campbell traveled to Todd County and stomped the Rebels 37-6. The Falcons extended their winning streak to three games with victories over Trigg County, 17-12, and Russellville, 6-0.

In the homecoming game, Fort Campbell managed to out do the Heath Pirates in every statistic except the most important one, points scored. Final score, Heath 10, Fort Campbell 3. In the first of three district games, the Falcons defeated Caldwell County 17-6. A disappointing loss to Fort Knox in the Army Bowl was followed by a devastating loss to Mayfield in a district game.

To close out the regular season the Falcons posted a 21-0 shutout over Northeast; and in a key district game, rolled to a 44-0 victory over Reidland to become district runner-up and to send the Falcons into the state playoffs.

In the playoffs, Fort Campbell jumped to an early 21-0 lead before the McLean County Cougars posted 22 points on the board. Pat Moody led a final minute Falcon drive that set up a game winning, and school record field goal of 46 yards off the foot of Bart Tragemann. Fort Campbell 24, McLean County 22.

Once again the Falcons met the Mayfield Cardinals, but this time it was for the Regional Championship. Once again, the Falcons defense kept Fort Campbell close as they headed into the locker room at halftime down by a score of 3-0. Inconsistency in the offense kept the Falcons off the scoreboard all night. A late third quarter touch-down and two fourth quarter touchdowns by Mayfield, ended the Falcons season with a 24-0 loss.



Upper Left — Leon Hill, breaks into the open field. Lower Left — Richard Grice and Pat Isom pursue as Steve Lowe makes the tackle.











The wrestler's success can be attributed to the coaching staff. Coach Parrent and Coach Vorhees invested many long hours in each member of the wrestling team.




A DAY IN THE LIFE OF ...

For three hours each day, the wrestlers drill, practice their moves, and do various exercises that promote strength, endurance, and flexibil-




Through hard work and
