



"When it all comes together" -




J. Gary Stewart


The 1988-89 FCHS Student Council met with tremendous success. From the start, they lined up a number of exciting and important projects.





MOCK TRIAL







S pring 1989 saw the third Mock Trial season for FCHS. Eight members strong, with only one returning member, a two-season veteran, the team recognized that they had incredible potential to succeed in the season ahead. Mock Trial is a program sponsored by the Kentucky Bar Association, Court of Justice, and Department of Education, which offers students the opportunity to learn about the state judicial process. The team consists of role-players, acting as lawyers and witnesses who build their cases from case materials provided by the sponsoring organizations. Competitions are held in court rooms and rounds are scored by district and circuit judges who look for strong performances, good objections and clever arguments. For the past three seasons the team has been sponsored by John Jennings and coached by Hopkinsville lawver Ben Wright, who have devoted time and effort to the continuing success of the FCHS pro-

FORT CAMPBELL'S TOP 10







I plan on attending Western Kentucky or Transylvania University and upon completion entering law school.



My hardest class was either advanced math or physics, just because I don't really like all the math formulas. I have a hard time making myself do the work.




t loomed ominously for over three quarters of our senior year ... That seven letter word ... College!


his growth encompassed two phases of education — social and academic.


JUNIOR SPIRIT RAGES!

This goes to show that sophomore spirit still shone even through rough times.










































HOLDING OFFICE




Probably the most anxiously awaited and coveted class on the FCHS curriculum is Driver's Ed, and sophomores scramble to sign up for it.




GETTING INTO THE SWING OF THINGS

Sophomores finally have status at FCHS, and while juniors and seniors still rule the school, sophomores are certainly getting into the swing of things.












The band marched in the Veterans's Day Parade in Clarksville and the Christmas Parade in Hopkinsville.






Freshman Break Even . . . Again

THE GREATEST SHOW ON TURF!

Cross-Country 1988 was definitely a season to remember. It was a season of learning, not only for individuals, but for both teams as wholes.

The guys' team, built mostly on returning runners, was perhaps the greatest male team in Fort Campbell history. Their season was marked by seldom wavering dedication and many male squad firsts. At first glance, the womens' squad was not as successful. However, this team, with four first year runners in the top seven, left their mark on region.

The season began with a week-long rigorous day camp, where pre-season conditioning ended and the business of running began. Cross Country coach Lee Lange lectured the runners twice a day and the teams set their season goals. The first major meet was the Fort Campbell Invitational, where both varsity squads took first place and the junior varsity girls took second. The Falcons were off to a great start.

The fourth meet of the season was the Tennessee Classic, which was often referred to as "magical" later in the season. The men ran their best race of the season with their first five finishing in the top 10 — 1st, 2nd, 5th, 6th, and 9th. The women had an excellent race, with their tightest pack of the season. Both teams won first place, taking the first FCHS male team trophy from the Tennessee Classic.

After the Classic both teams went through a period of transition, especially the womens' squad, which changed its sixth and seventh runners several times.

Lexington Catholic, which is held on the state course, was attended by the best AA schools from Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky. The over-night trip wasn't enjoyed until after the race results were in, something which seemed to take forever. When they were posted, they were great! The women finished fourth, defeating all other Kentucky schools. The mens' squad finished first, and set another FCHS precedent with the first male Lexington Catholic title.

The week after Lexington Catholic was Daviess County Invitational, one of the toughest meet to prepare for. The team left the school at six in the morning, each squad preparing for their nemesis. For the men the challenge was the "Raging Red Line" of Daviess County and for the women it was the girls of Warren East. After the race the guys were certain of defeat — two of the top five finished lower than expected. However, both squads were successful and the "Raging Red Line" was broken for the first time in Coach Lange's 12-year career.

The Western Kentucky Conference wound down the regular season for the Falcons in a great way. The meet was special for the ladies because they were able to recapture the "magic" of the Tennesssee Classic and take first place with a pack. The mens' squad captured first place despite running without two of their top five.

Regions were held October 29. The men took first and the women took second. Six days later the team left for state.

The day of the State Meet finally came on November 5. Gusty winds and adverse weather conditions neither deterred the runners nor dampened their spirit of determination; both squads were anxious and excited about the day's run.



The girls ran first, and despite their abundant talent and terrific performance, their lack of experience kept them from taking state. They finished the season in a truly impressive fourth place. The mens' squad ran the last race of the day, and the best of the season! The hard training and dedicated team work paid off with a beautiful race. Their consistency and perseverance enabled them to pull away at the end of the run. Following the new individual State Champion, Jef Scott, the Falcons took places 2, 9, 14, 21, 27, and 52. With the awesome score of 47, they took the highest honor in cross-country running, the 1988 Men's Class AA State Championship.




















































Enthusiasism ran rampant through the 1988 Varsity squad — they constantly supported the team throughout the season.






The 88-89 Falcon Mat Maids really showed their school spirit by supporting their wrestling team throughout the year.
