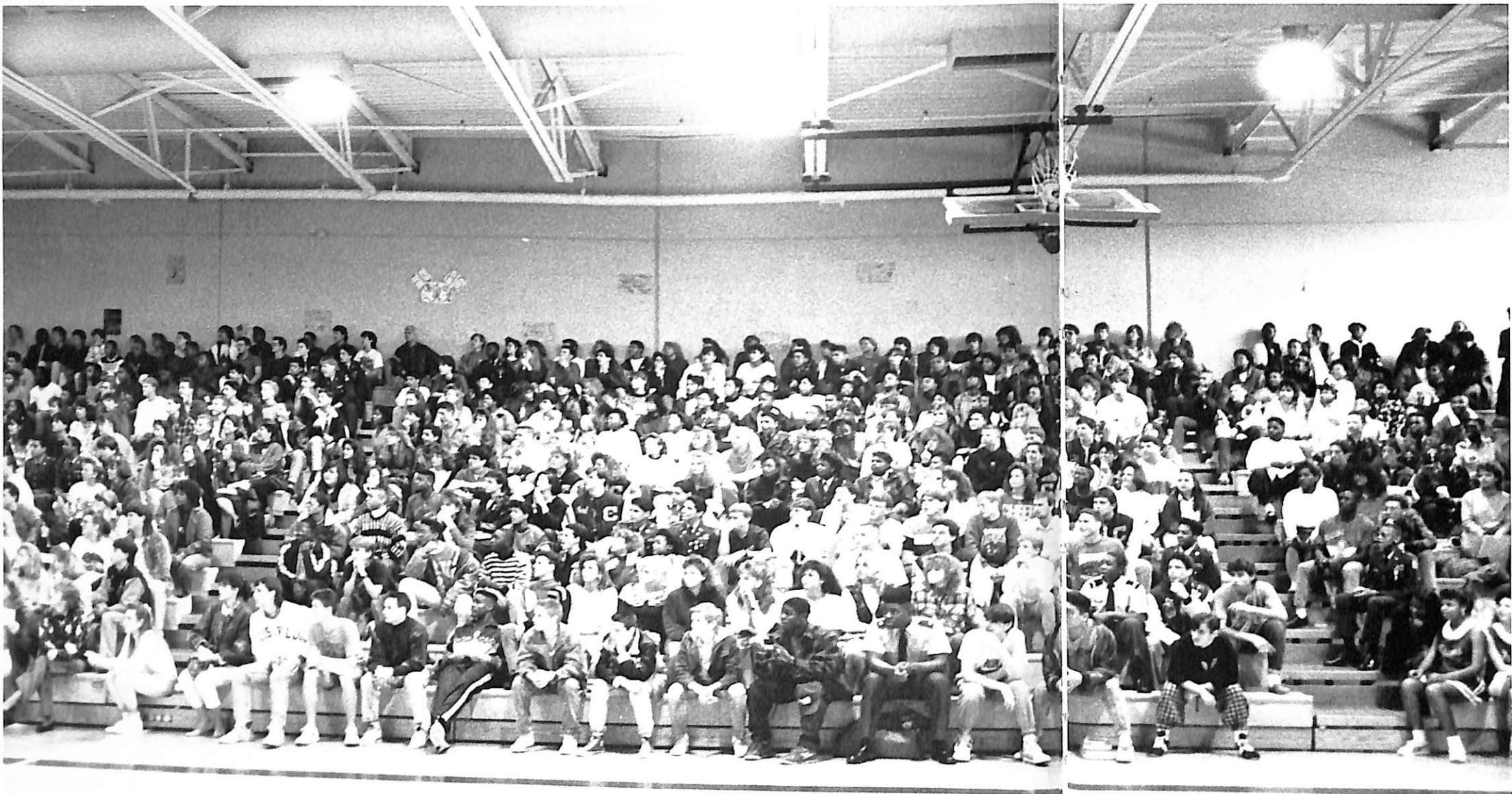

With the thanks of our hearts, we dedicate what we can to you, though it be small for what you have dedicated to us.

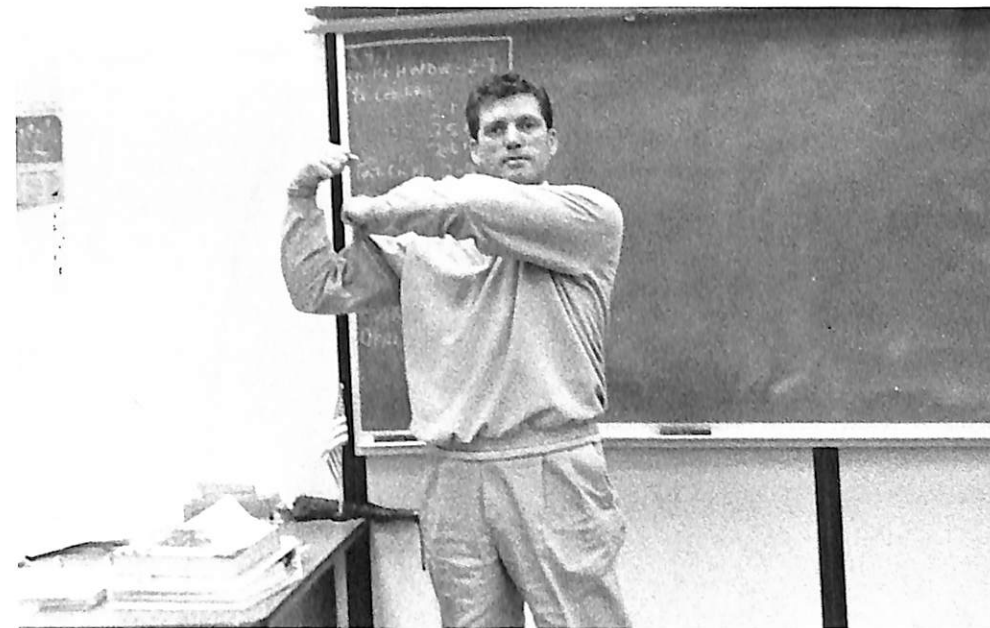
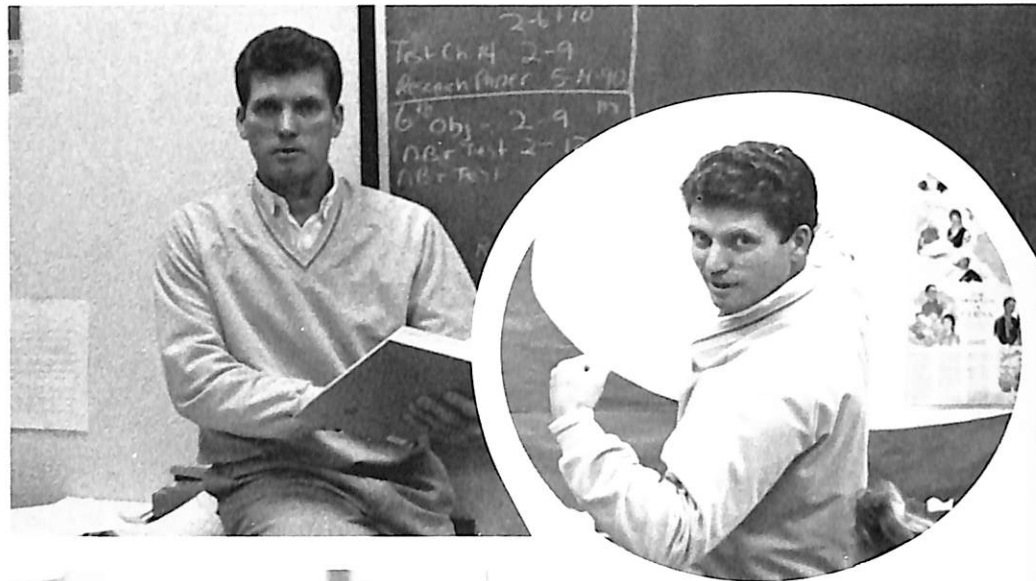

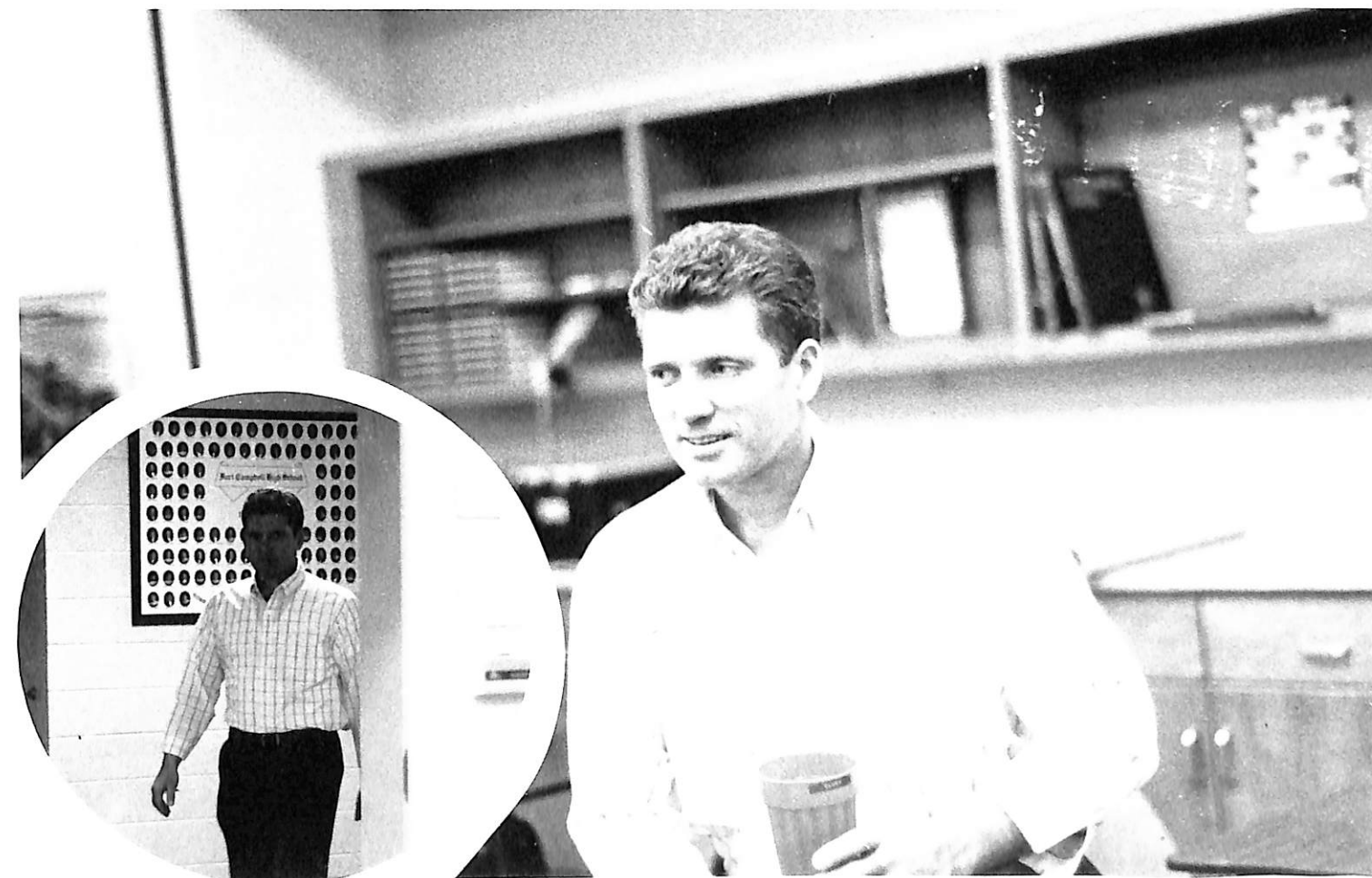
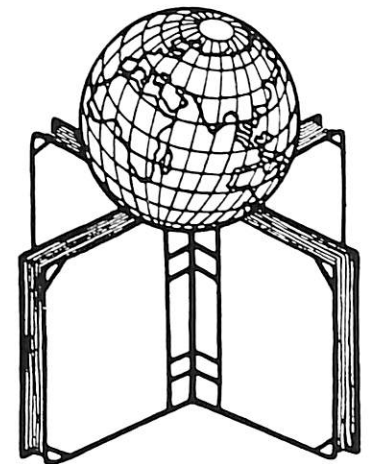
In his spare time, Mr. Johns likes to read by a cozy fire. He also enjoys teaching, listening to his favorite rock groups, and the company of his wife and four children.

The Choir helped close the 1989-1990 school year by singing beautifully at graduation. They helped begin the new decade with a beautiful tune, and helped close old one on merry note.

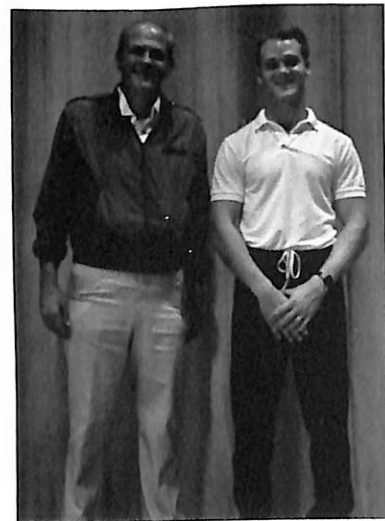

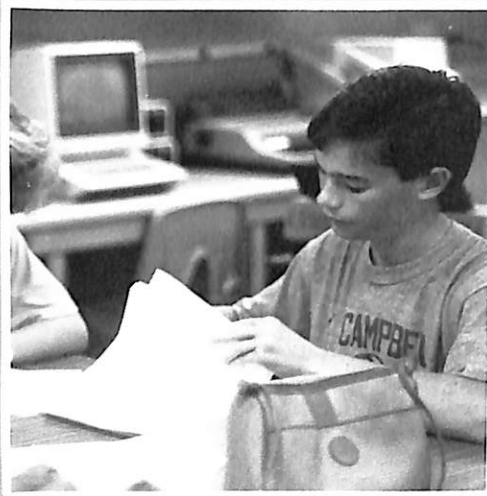


Staff Rocks To

The Falcons continued their winning streak by taking the Army Bowl 21-0, and bringing the Army championship back to its home.

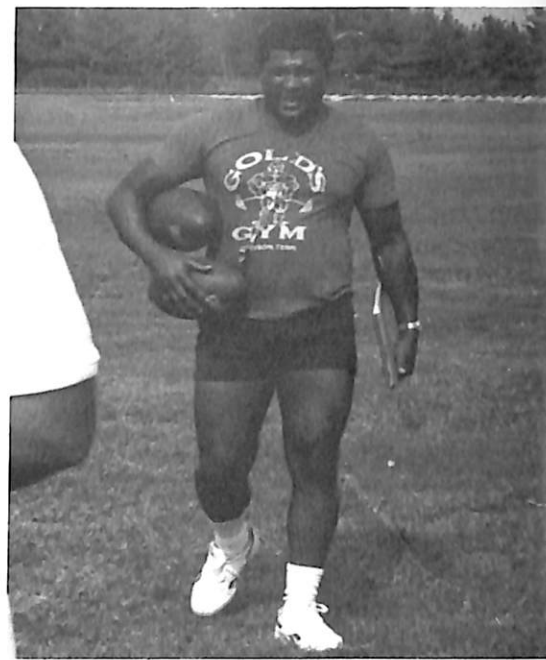

WHAT IT TAKES!!

As we know, in any sport an athlete must give everything he or she has to achieve his goals. In wrestling, the athletes have to give 110% in order to win their matches.

In order to become a successful participant, a wrestler must devote all his time practicing. Before the season begins, the wrestlers spend hours weightlifting and conditioning in an effort to be prepared for the six grueling minutes on the mat.

In practice, one that would last three hours or more, the wrestlers work on their techniques over and over until they have been perfected. Perfection of techniques does not happen overnight! A wrestler must face his opponent with everything he has. (And from his faults in each match, he just gets better).

Maintaining weight is also another sacrifice a wrestler must endure. He sometimes eats only once a day, and most of the time he has to give up his favorite dishes. Often

you will see a wrestler or two in the lunch room skipping their meals so they can cut their weight. "It's not very easy seeing so much people eat," says Chad Corley, a 152 Varsity wrestler. Sometimes when a wrestler does not make weight, he bundles up and tries to run off the excess pounds. Just ask Dion Hyche, a 125 Varsity wrestler!

Wrestling is not just an individual sport, as many people would think. The members must display good teamwork in an effort to win. "Since the Varsity members have been together for two seasons or longer, we stick very close together. Often we talk about how good or bad we did in a match or help each other with some techniques. And when it is needed, we boost up each other's confidence," says Robbie MacDonald, 171 Varsity wrestler.

Junior Varsity members benefit from the Varsity team members because it is usually through them that they get better. "When you're a J.V., wrestling Varsity members really helps you improve on moves

much faster," says Michael Alvin, a 103 J.V.

Another important factor in successful wrestling is having support. Support from Matmaids, parents, and friends really boosts up the confidence of the wrestlers. "Seeing a lot of support friends really fires me up when I'm on the mat," says Keith Small, a 160 Varsity wrestler. "Seeing all the people cheering for our team really makes me want to do all I can for a win so I can show appreciation for their support," says Rafael Marshall, a 135 J.V.

Although wrestling demands many sacrifices, a successful season makes the wrestlers forget the hardship and difficult obstacles they faced and concentrate on the glory.

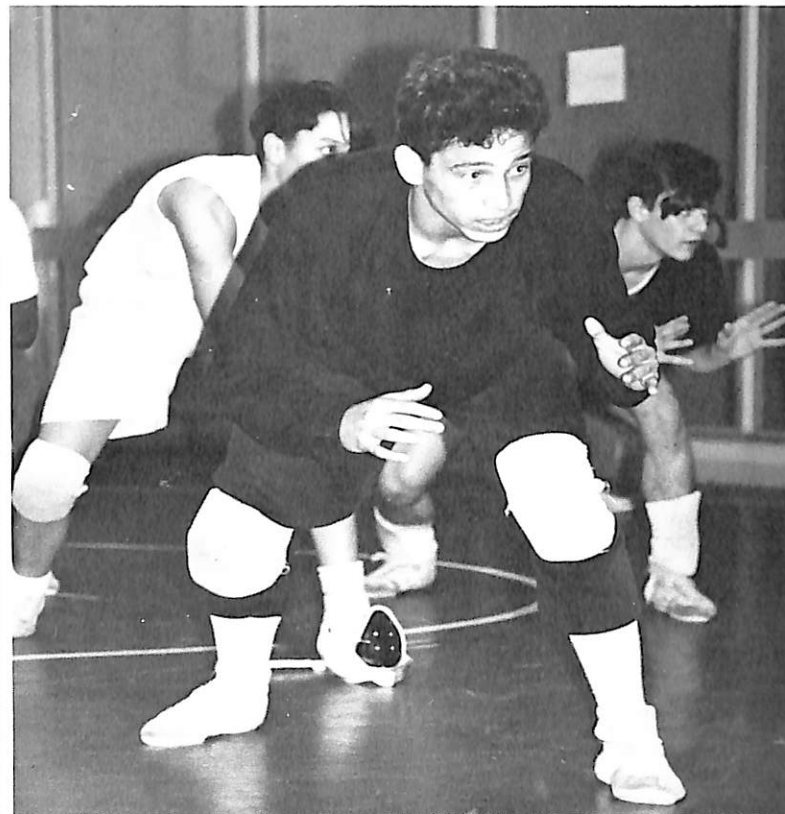

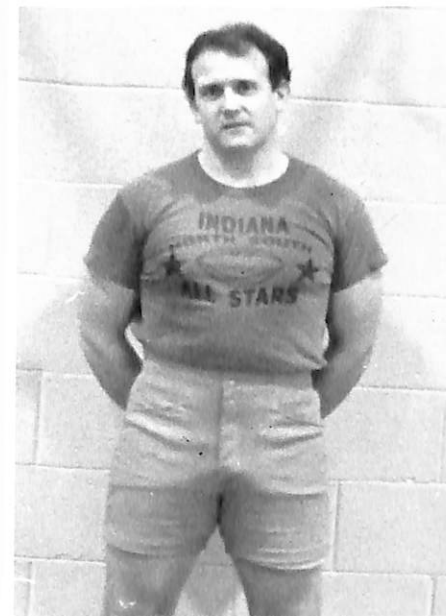

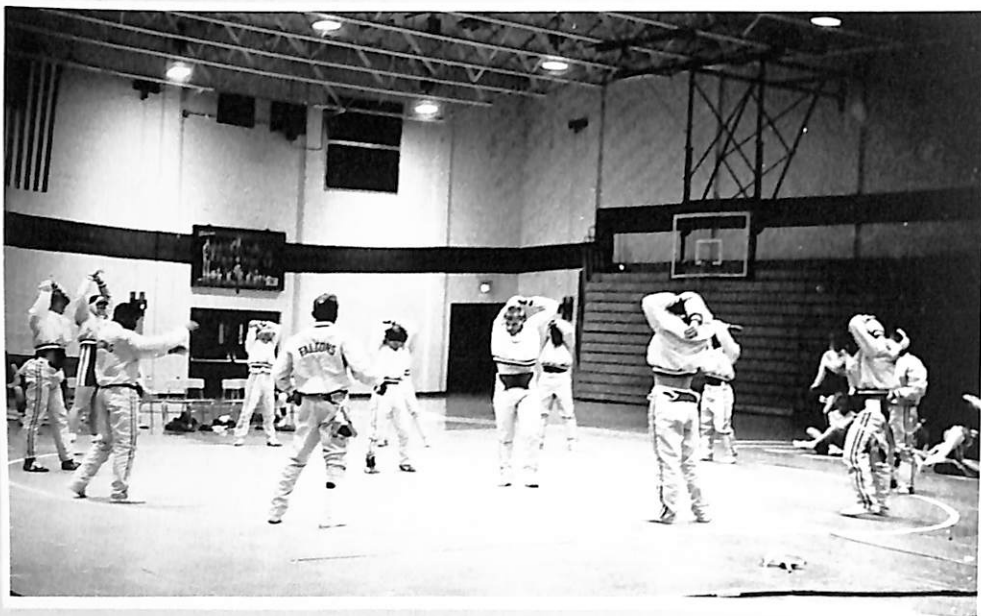

Coach Ray feels that the Wrestling members have great physical abilities. The biggest challenge they have is working to those abilities.

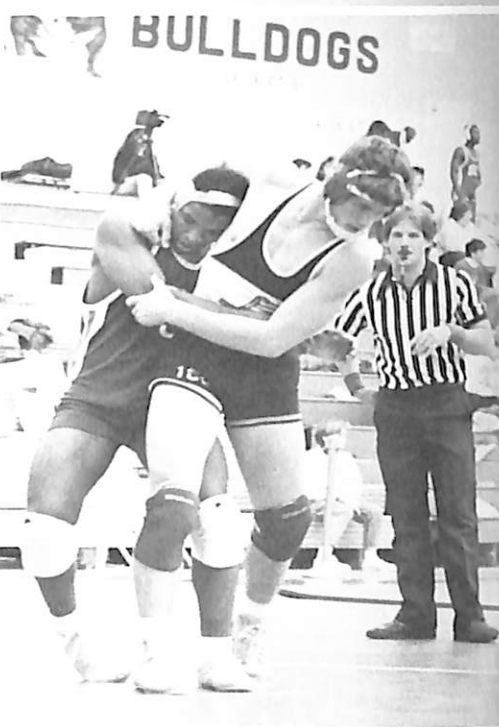

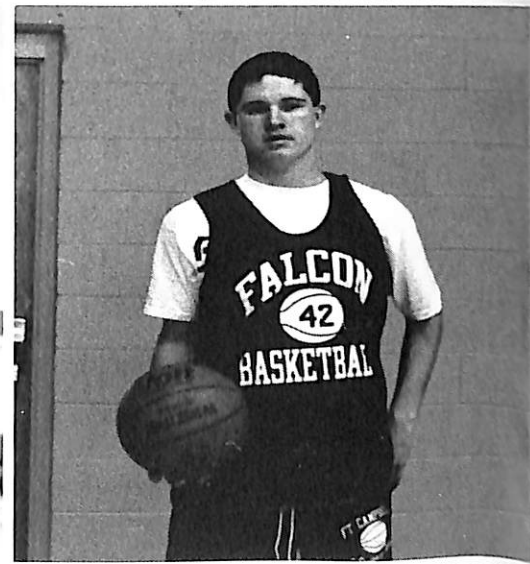
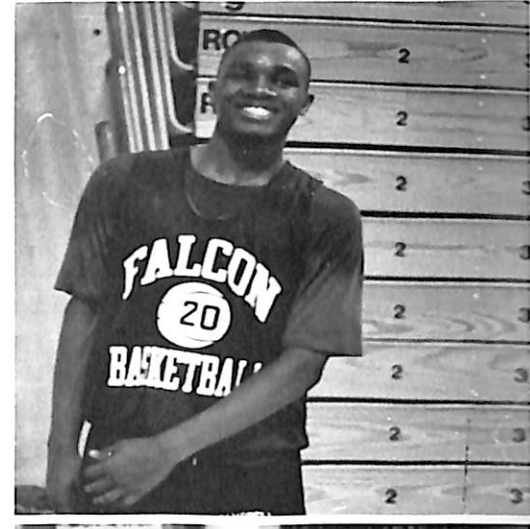

At first Danceline was not accepted by the student body, but now the students have a new point of view.

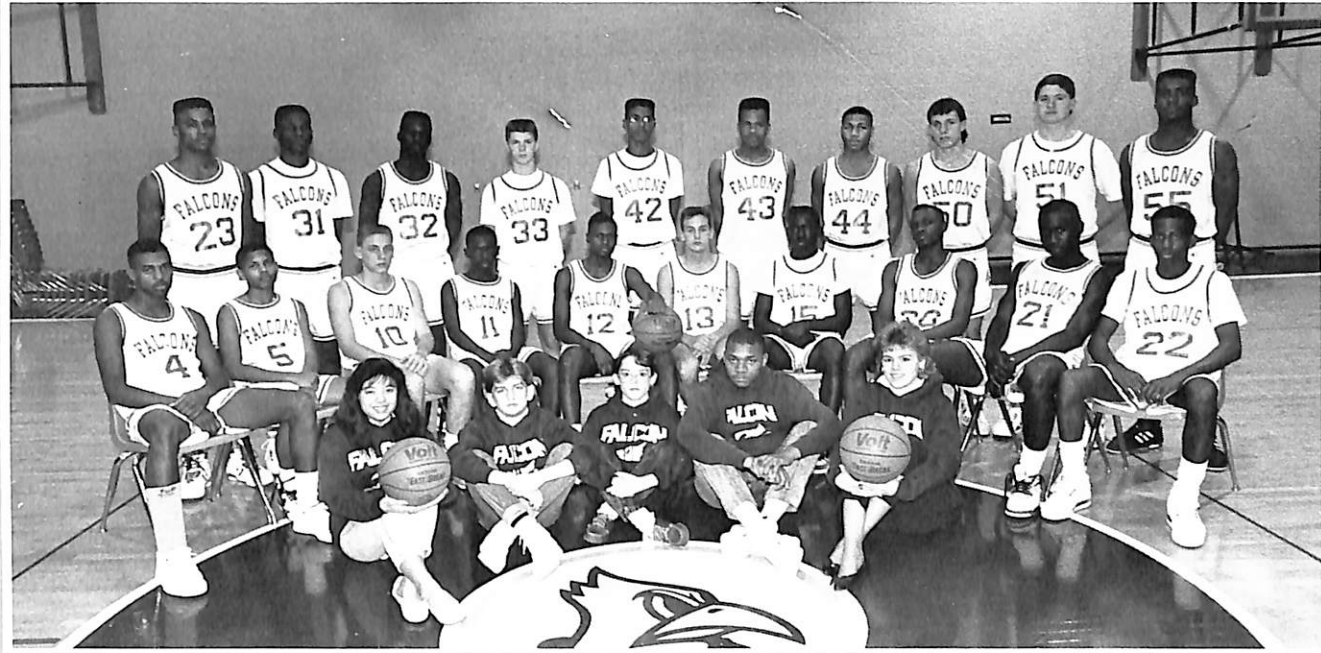

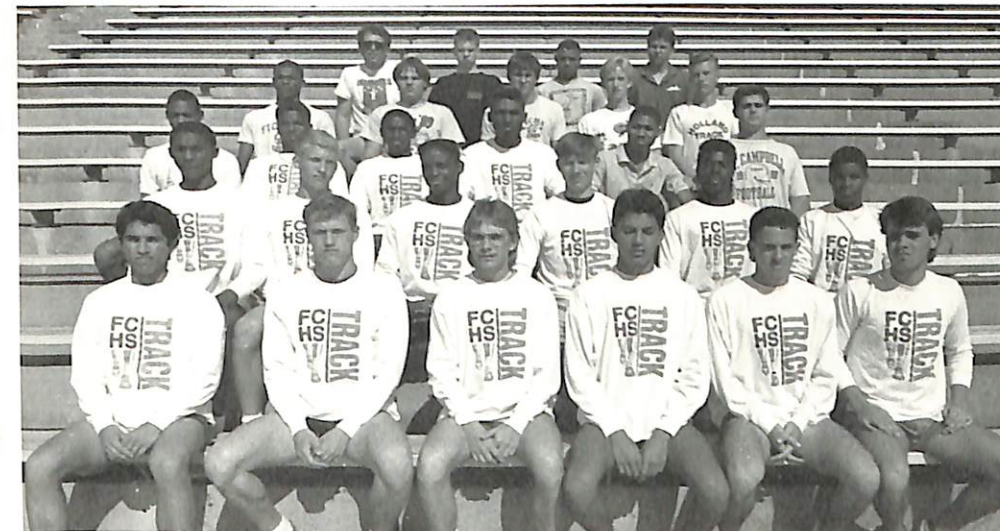
