




# Top Ten Seniors


Cori took her best shot and rounded out the top ten Seniors of 1990.

Through my high school career I have learned that in order to succeed in academics or in athletics one must dedicate a great deal of serious time and an unlimited amount of true effort."








"Hey, how does my hair look?"

The Falcons continued their winning streak by taking the Army Bowl 21-0, and bringing the Army championship back to its home.




# Doing What They Do Best
