




The Big Dig






Getting Educated


And so it begins....




Getting Hands-on in Human Anatomy


Spirited fans wear white at first Falcons home game












Teachers Can Be Fun Too


Lunch Time





Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT/NMSQT)

After fall break with an additional day off to commemorate Columbus Day, the underclassmen returned in time to take the 2015 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test this week. Four hours of arduous testing were spent in a classroom organized by grade level and students' last name. The test was given to DoDEA students in grades 9-11 free of cost. Junior scores could lead to National Merit Scholarships, opening the door for many college opportunities; while the 9th and 10th grade took the test for future preparation. This test replaces the traditional TerraNova test students had taken in previous years. 
Hands-on Learning

Physics Can Be Tasty

It's a dessert and a science project in one!

In Mr. Mac's Physic's class the students made ice cream. They learned that salt lowers the freezing point of the ice and makes it become extra-cold. It becomes so cold that it absorbs heat from the milk mixture, causing the mixture to freeze.

Put the milk, sugar and 1 tablespoon of salt into the smaller Ziploc








Singing, dancing and some magic




Black History Club

THE REALITY STORE OPENS EYES by Angel Ortiz

The Reality Store is a DoDEA-wide program designed for ninth graders. The simulation program is sponsored by the University of Kentucky Foreign Extension Service, which visits the school the day before the event and gives a presentation to the freshmen. For preparation, the students were given their GPA by the counselor and based on that, they picked a major/profession from a list. Depending on their choice, they were given a monthly salary and told how much schooling was required. Next, the students had to draw a slip out of a box that determined their life scenario, including how many children they had and their marital status.

On the day of the event, in the gym, the first thing students had to calculate was how much money in taxes they had to pay based on multiple factors in their scenario. The students were given 45 minutes to visit a variety of tables that had different themes.

A checklist had to be followed and money had to be spent. The stations included housing, transportation, child care, insurance, taxes, and entertainment. The activity centers around individual choices; the participants were on different plans with different costs for each of the stations they had to evaluate.

The main goal of the Reality Store is to teach freshmen how they will have to handle their finances and make the best choices for themselves based on their income which translates from their GPA. The overall hope is to open the eyes of the ninth graders to how the real world works. Although this is a simulation, the majority of the students come to understand the importance of keeping their grades up and doing well in high school. Some lessons can't be taught early enough.


























The Scoop on








Student Life
