



































































Always In Need

All "Jack"ed Up





















Win, Wrap,& Weigh-ins

Fort Campbell High School's Escapades






Got Grammar?


Fort Campbell's Finest



ESL takes the place of a normal high school English class for these students. Many of them work twice as hard as other students, since it doesn't come naturally to them and they are motivated to really learn the language.



























































The Monets and Haydns


Got Civil Engineering?

Ryder Suda Dodson likes tinkering with little projects. Naturally, this design was right up his






