GOOSE HISTORY

November 1955 was the day. The RCAF notified the Base Commander that at the conclusion of the current year they would be unable to offer school facilities to the American National dependents. What was to be done?

Emergency action to provide a school was necessary if we were to offer our dependents an education from the first through the twelfth grade. Immediately the Base Commander with the Air Installations Officer initiated a long range plan by which a semi-permanent school was to be provided with Military Construction facilities. Command approved the plan and provided funds by which the World War II gymnasium that was in the aircraft apron expansion would be relocated and converted into the classrooms now known as building T-675. In addition three buildings in the old hospital group "on the hill" were to be converted into classrooms. This was a big undertaking even for the Corps of Engineers and the Contractor Drake-Merritt because they had to "sandwich in" this work with the other high priority operational facilities. In fact 1956 was one of the years in which the saying became popular on the Goose—that—"if you wanted to watch the Goose on the move, all you had to do was look out the window, and you would see a building going by."

In spite of the heroic work of the Contractor only the 10 classrooms on the hill were ready for opening of school in September 1956. To care for the overflow building T-895, now known as the Chapel Annex in "G" area, was used until the old gymnasium was converted. Fortunately the modifications to provide an additional 9 classrooms were completed to permit opening of school after the Christmas New Year holidays in 1956-57 so we were in "G" area only a short time. That first school year 1956-57 (or fiscal year 1957) was a real "initiation" in the history of Goose Air Base. Mr. Bodiford and his teaching staff of 18 will always remember those pioneer days as they sought to impart wisdom to 108 students. These early growing pains that Mr. Bodiford nutured proved what a patient man he was.

School year 1957-58 (or fiscal year 1958) was conducted in the same building as FY 57. This was eventful for that year we became accredited by the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. Mr. Bodiford and his teaching staff of 24 are to be commended for this significant achievement for the 450 students that attended.

School year 1958-59 (or fiscal year 1959) was again eventful for that was the year we occupied our new semi-permanent school building S-519. Mr. Bodiford assumed the Superintendencies of both Goose Air Base and the Ernest Harmon Air Force Base School; therefore Mr. Kidd and a teaching staff of 26 had the pleasure of teaching 550 dependent children in one of the most modern AF plants.

1959-60 school year started with an enrollment of 660 students, a teaching staff of 35 headed by Mr. Brier, and with overall supervision by Mr. Bodiford. With the introduction of another 100 families, (an estimated 700 students) early in the FY 1960 the school building was severely taxed for the remainder of the year.

The future is bright for the Goose Air Base Dependent School—more families—more students—school expansion—everything Bigger and Better!







GREETINGS TO THE CLASS OF 1960:


