the colonial legislatures had instructed their delegates to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia to oppose any move toward in-
dependence. The movement for independence was gaining strenth
and following the publication of Thomas Paine's Common Sense and following the publication of Thomas Paine's Common Sense,
which argued for colonial sovereignty, a resolution was adopted and a committee of five appointed to draft a declaration of independence.

if military strategist. It was his decision to take his Conttinentals acros the Delaware River on Christmas night which resulted in the first maJor colonial victory. That victory at Trenton over Hessian mercenaries
gave the raged army renewed vigor. Supported chiefly through the printing of Continental currency, the colonial army also went through
the personal fortunes of many American patriots - among them
Washington, Jefferson, Richard Henry Lee and John Adams. These fortunes were donated to the cause of liberty-a cause supported by about one-third of the American population which was near $2,000,000$.

managed to keep an resistance, to guarantee a negotiated rather than dictated peace.
