# 'The war leaves them no peace, even here'

HANAU, Germany - One-year-old Nedim Beslagic left Bosnia wrapped in the arms of his mother, Sajma, sitting in the back of an open truck.

Jammed on the truck with them were Nedim's father, Sadik; his daughters, Leila and Mersiba; and his grandmother, Mina.

Now in Germany, the family of six lives as war refugees in one room of a former U.S. Army post, Hessen-Homburg Casern, in Hanau

Esad Sehic, 45, the man they call "pro-fessor" because he taught Arabic abroad, was also crammed onto a truck in the same convoy with his wife, Edina; his mother-inlaw, Fatima Dzanic, 65; and a sister, Sedina, and her children, Amir, 12, and Belma, 9. "I was fortunate that when the first wave of Chetniks (armed Serbian units) came to our village, I wasn't home, but visiting in another village," Esad Sehic said.

When the Serbs searched the village he was visiting, Sehic said he hid in the attic for 10 days and "was lucky they didn't find "Any Muslim with a so-called intellec-

tual profession was shot upon sight," he Carolyn McCloskey, a teacher at the

Hanau Middle School, is working with the Beslagics, Sehics and other refugees. She started a program between Ameri-

can pupils and refugee children that has led to some genuine friendships. The refugees consider McCloskey a kind of guardian angel for her efforts. The latest issue of a monthly newspaper for Bosnian refugees in Germany has a full-page article

Visiting the Bosnian refugees also means accepting their overwhelming hospitality. It means having a glass of fruit juice; one of their delicacies such as bosanska tufahija, a dish made of baked apple with a chopped nut and marzipan core, topped with cream; or baklava and coffee

"I've learned a lot from the refugees," McCloskey said. "I learned how people survive and cope with extreme situations. I've seen the men from the concentration camps who shy at the sight of a pair of scissors. I've seen the raped women and the mental anguish they go through.

"On a much less drastic level, imagine yourself being forced to live (in) one room in a casern with eight to 12 other persons as they do," she said.

"The war leaves them no peace, even here. The gate to the casern is wellguarded because Serbs try to come to start

Life for refugees in the former casern, which houses 520 adults and 150 children,

is as normal as people like Esad Sehic can

They organize courses in the Bosnian language, hold lectures on cultural affairs and conduct seminars for young people on drugs and AIDS. They also have converted one room into a mosque

Sehic is an excitable man. He wants to be sure Americans understand what happened in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

He spreads a map of the former Yugo-slavia out on a coffee table and circles his

The Chetniks returned," Sehic said. 'First they came through the streets shooting people in groups of tens and fives, looting the houses and setting them afire.

'Then they lined us up on the bridge on the edge of town — men on one side, women and children on the other. They set two great bags at the end of the bridge and told us, 'Put all your hard currency in one bag and all your jewelry and valuables in

"They said if they found anything of home

value on anyone they'd be shot. Then they let us leave — 10,000 from the area of 12 villages called Japranska Dolina were allowed to leave on Chetnik vehicles. My convoy had 380 people on it. They were sick and crying all the way to Germany

The Chetniks transported the refugees to the Slovenian border, where German humanitarian groups picked them up.

Sehic said the official number of refugees from Bosnia in Western Europe is 350,000, most of whom are in Germany.

"Most other countries don't want us," Sehic said. "Our future is uncertain because this war has just begun. In our hearts we want to go back to Bosnia -homesickness is killing us also."

But a more typical feeling was expressed by 17-year-old Leila Beslagic: "It's not so bad. But my friends are not here. It's not

# Youngsters reach out to refugees

HANAU, Germany — For the past year, Chris Godfrey has been making emories that he says will last a lifetime.

"I'll have some great stories to tell my randchildren," said Chris, a student at Hanau High School. "It just makes me feel better to do this. Every day I can see how lucky I am compared to other people in the world. So I've

> started to appreiate what I have." Chris was a pupil Hanau Middle ear when he and is fellow pupils beame friends with refugees Bosnia and erzegovina. The

placed from their McCloskey homeland by fighting among Serbs, Croats and Muslims live at a former U.S. Army post, Hessen-Homburg Casern, just five minutes from the Americans' school.

Chris and other pupils at the middle school, along with teacher Carolyn Mc-Closkey, were the first Americans to befriend the refugees from the former Yu-

In November 1992, McCloskey and four pupils ventured past security guards at the gates of the former casern to deliver clothes to the refugees.

They met two young English-speaking boys and invited them to the American

"Our education about the real world, man's cruelty to man, began then," Mc-Closkey said.

Each week she loads up her van with pupils and bags of clothes and heads for the camp, where about 150 children live. The effort is part of C.A.R.E.2, which

stands for Concern and Respect for Everyone/Everything. The community service group is made up of Hanau Middle School pupils who strive to make the community, school and

world better places. "The Bosnian kids say it helps them forget for a while," McCloskey said of their time together. "For our kids, they have an absolutely unique opportunity to not only get to know the kids and their

families, but to get a glimpse at the reali-ty of this horrible war which no other American kids can get."

Some members of the original American group have moved, and some of the

refugees have begun to assimilate into the German culture, but friendships continue to flourish. Chris, for example, is now in high school, but he still visits the

they were more open about what happened," Chris said while visiting Amir Sehic, his 12-year-old Bosnian friend.

Amir's six-member family lives in a large room in one of two buildings set aside for refugees.

"Some of them had their houses ourned by the Serbs. But they seem to be adjusting, slowly but surely," Chris said.

While Chris and middle school pupil Tristan Ramirez, 12, learned card tricks from Amir, American and Bosnian girls giggled, checked out the boys in a disco recently established in one of the refugee buildings, and compared notes on TV stars such as Jason Priestley from the series Beverly Hills, 90210.

"They're just like American kids," Chris said of the Bosnians. "You can't tell them apart. They like American music, mostly rap, American clothes. They just hope that the war (will soon be) over, and they can go home.

The Americans and Bosnians have participated in such activities as swimming, roller skating and bowling.

The Bosnians attended an American football game and have visited McCloskey's home for snacks and videos.

Community members donated money, toys, clothes, time and energy to C.A.R.E.<sup>2</sup> Under the auspices of the German Red Cross, truckloads of goods have continued to flow from the Hanau American community to the Bosnian camp, McCloskey said.

She has spread the word to her home-town in Oregon, and families there have opened their homes to Bosnian children who might want to live in the United States for a year.

States for a year.

She is now working to send 16-year-old
Dragana "Meki" Marinkovic and 14year-old Emina Biogradlija to Oregon.


Emina giggled when she recalled her
first attempt at bowling. The ball went
over her head and dropped behind her,

rather than rolling down the lane.

She said that she had adjusted some-what to being in Germany and that things were "a little better," but her biggest wish is "to go home."

Helping refugees in the Hanau area is only one aspect of C.A.R.E.<sup>2</sup> Other programs include tutoring, in which high school students help elementary schoolchildren; gathering donated clothing for those in need; collecting money for various projects; and recycling paper, cans

adopt-a-teacher program. Pupils "do said. She recalled the tears that flowed something special every week to make a teacher feel better, just little things to say when one Bosnian family thought the father was dying, and seeing young Bosnian we care," McCloskey said.

But it may be that the effort to help the Bosnians will have the most lasting impact on the Americans, McCloskey

ther was dying, and seeing young Bosnian men arrive in Germany after being released from a concentration camp. Their eyes had the look of "old men," she said. When the Americans first met the ref-

ugees, the Bosnian children "were basically sitting over here in a state of shock. They'd been totally displaced," she said. "So we really shared a time in their lives that was really special."




