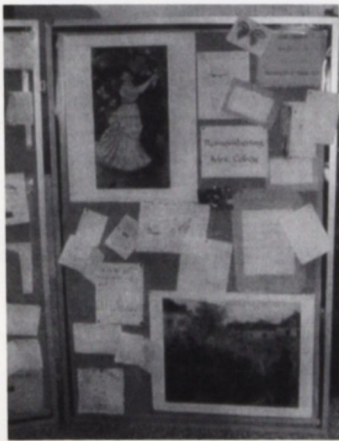
Kip Paul Taylor

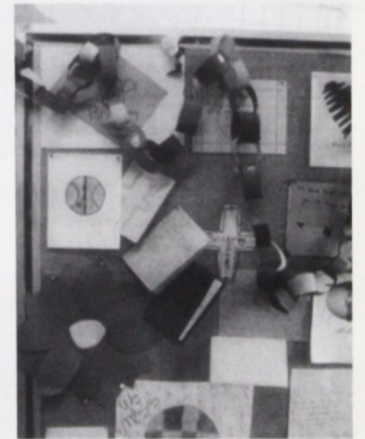
Mrs. Cobey died after a three month bout with cancer. She will be remembered for her dedication to her students and her keen sense of humor.

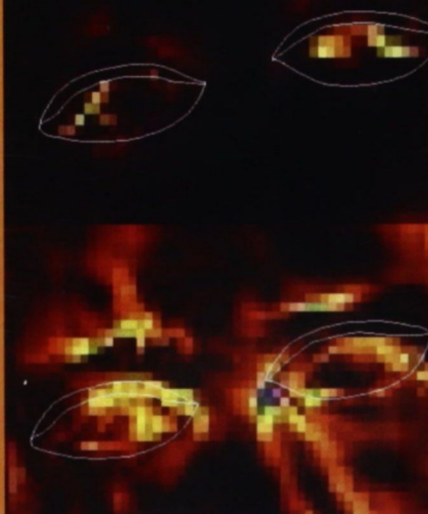

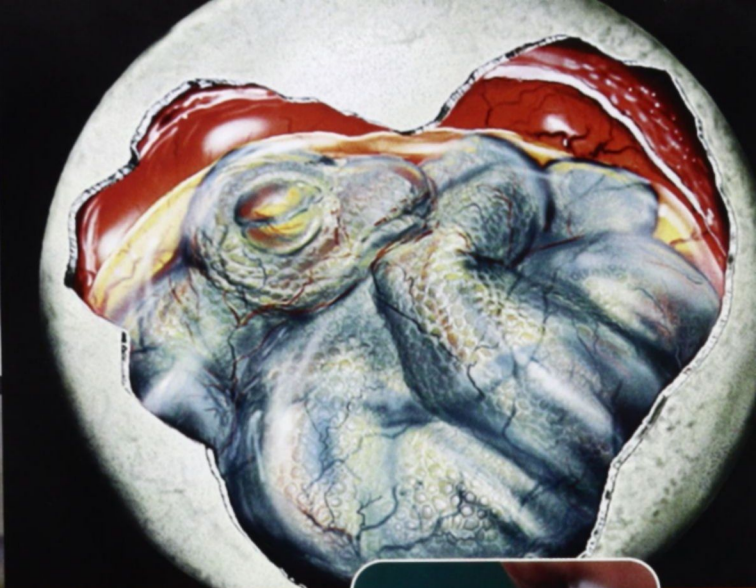

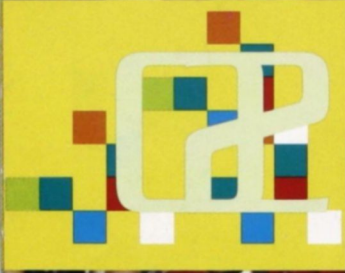

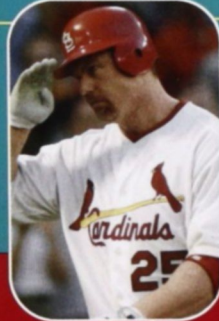
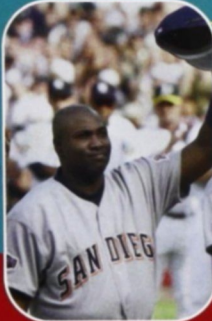
