Mark Twain Village is so named to commemorate Mark Twain's (Samuel Clemens) stay in Heidelberg beginning in May of 1878. Mark Twain wrote at length about his stay in Heidelberg in his book, "A Tramp Abroad" in 1880.

M.T.E.S. was previously known as Dependent Grade School in the 1950's, then later became Heidelberg Elementary School #1, and by 1984 the school name was changed to Mark Twain Elementary School.


Danke, Mr. Bell






Heidelberg, a beautiful city located on the banks of the Neckar River is the largest German city never to have been bombed during World War II. The Heidelberg Schloss (Castle) ruins rank amongst the sights most worth seeing in Europe. The schloss was built between the period of 1400-1620 A.D. and combines Gothic, Renaissance and Baroque styles. Serenades, concerts and open-air theater presentations in the Heidelberg Schloss courtyard are added attractions. The greatest extravaganza is the illumination of the castle, commemorating the battles of the 17th century, which are generally accompanied by boat rides along the Neckar River. Floodlights flank the castle and fireworks explode in the sky!

Heidelberg is a very diverse town. It's the home of the University of Heidelberg, the oldest university in Germany, dating back to 1386. Included among Heidelberg's most famous landmarks are the Alte Brücke (Old Bridge), the Heiliggeistkirche (Holy Ghost Church), the Kornmarkt (Corn Market), the Marktplatz (Market Square), the Rathaus (Town Hall), Haus zum Ritter (The Knight's House/Ritter Hotel). Heidelberg also offers shopping, a zoo, libraries, schwimmbads, historical churches, a mountain railway (berg bahn), and nature trails.




Rain or Shine or ?


Another one for the Record Book!


They're the Fastest, the Toughest, the Winners...


Two of Baseball's Heroes Hang up their Cleats
