



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

Bending and Shaping Our Lives

Izmir High School is a living monument to the adaptability of the American student overseas. The different languages, customs, and peoples are strange, and sometimes formidable obstacles to overcome when a student first arrives in Izmir. By the time the student leaves, however, he has a multitude of experiences, both pleasant and unpleasant, which he will remember for the rest of his life. Izmir High School itself is unique. From the outside the school has the appearance of a warehouse, but the looks do not make the school. Inside, there is a school with proud traditions, high morale, and high academic standards. With all of these characteristics working, Izmir becomes a very unique school.



When a person lives in this area, he experiences many contrasts. There are contrasts between the past and the present, between the modern and the primitive, between the wealthy and the poor, and between the present and the future. The contrast between past and present can be illustrated by the ruins and Izmir, the modern and the primitive by the rural areas and the cities, the rich and the poor by the beggars and the merchants, and the present and the future by Izmir High School. The period of time that is spent in high school is our life for the present, and it shapes our life for the future.



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










We Probe the Unknown in Math, Science




The Sound of Music Everywhere




















