## SPORTS SURVIVES SETBACKS

There is no adequate stadium, fieldhouse nor gymnasium for student use, yet determined teams met on the fields of Bayrakli or Cigli to carry on in the name of football. During the Winter lanky dribblers bounded across the floors of a makeshift, cold gymnasium at Sirinyer in the tradition of basketball.

There are no schools nearby to provide competition in athletic events. Teams had to turn elsewhere for a challenge. An intramural football program was set up with three schools pitted against each other. At the end of the season the all-star Sultan football team was formed from the best players from the three teams. A game was arranged between the Sultans and the dependent high school from Asmara, Ethiopia, After weeks of rigorous training and keyed-up spirits, the Sultans suffered a tremendous disappointment when the game was cancelled due to transportation problems. The basketball team found its challenge locally in the teams from various military and civilian groups.
