When they arrived, they went immediately to Anne Frank's house, where they did rubbings of statues and name plates, sketched floor-plans, and wrote summaries for their scavenger hunts. From 11:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m., students surveyed the house, purchased souvenirs, and visited a nearby cafe for snacks. Half of the group then got onto one of the busses and headed for a playground across the street from a canal. They waited there for the other half of the They w
group.

When both groups were together, al of the students got onto a boat and were taken on a tour of the canal while they ate lunch. on a tour of the canal while they ate lunch.
The tour guide spoke sometimes in French and sometimes in English about the history of the city. After about an hour and a half, the tour was over.

The next destination was a cheese farm where students quickly noticed and commented on the familiar farm odors. As they toured the farm, they were able to pet and feed the animals, see the different stages of cheese production, and shop for more souvenirs.

"Beside the problems with the busses breaking down, it was exciting because it was overnight, and middle school students normally do not make overnight field trips," said Andrew Barnes. "I also learned about the hardships that the Jews had to go through. Hopefully, our civilization has advanced enough that we will never have to repeat such an incident."

The Fussgangerzone ( pedestrian zone) downtown Kaiserslautern, offers an alternative to the $B X$. When shopping for clothes, there are many options. If you want to buy sports wear, Runners Point is near the Stiftskirche. If you want a K-town look, then there is a F.C.K. 1 store that sells the Kaiserslautern soccer team jerseys and items with the team logo. Orsay is a popular fashion store for young women.

Shoe stores are found everywhere downtown Kaiserslautern. There are a lot of them, and there are a lot of platform shoes. Eram has probably one of the bigger selections of shoes.

Ice cream and pretzel stands are an even more frequent sight. Ice cream stands are open in the summer. The average cost is about 1 DM a scoop. The pretzel stands seem to be open year-round. I wouldn't suggest buying a coke at a pretzel stand, however. The prices on drinks can get a little steep.

Toy stores are easily found; just look in the display windows. They sell some American and German brand toys. Year-round they sell sparklers. Around eventful times of the year, you can find more fire crackers. If you plan on buying rockets, bring an older sibling or parent because they won't sell them to youth under the age of 16 .

Every Tuesday and Saturday mornings, there is a market located past the F.C.K. 1 store. At the market, you'll find everything from raw meat to fresh fruit, to flowers, and flower arrangements.

In December there is a traditional Christkindl Markt. This features gifts and decorations for the holiday season.

For those of you who miss hanging out at the mall Saturday afternoons, downtown is a kewl alternative!
