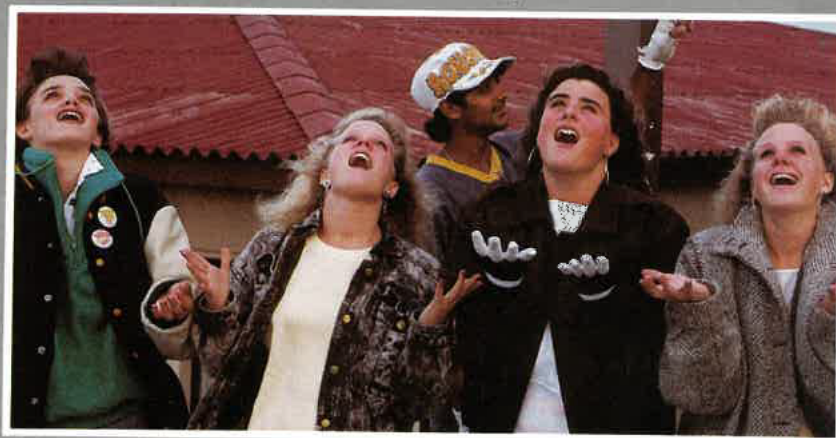

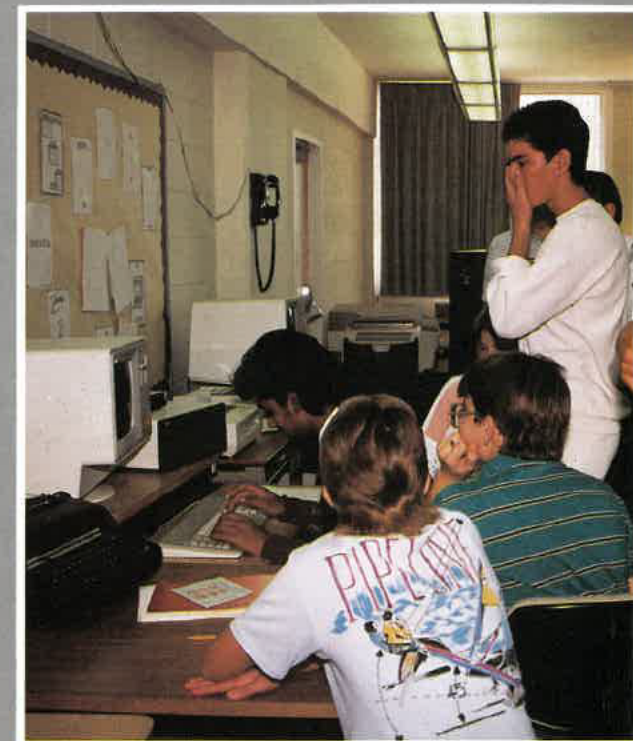

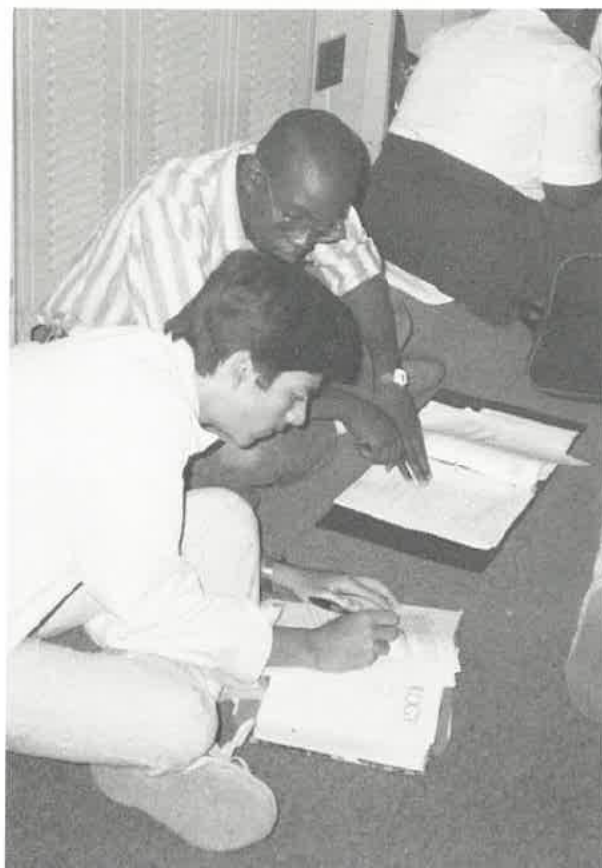

Each day had its share of monotonous regularity, such as riding the bus or eating lunch at the Youth Center. And yet, there were also those special moments shared with friends.

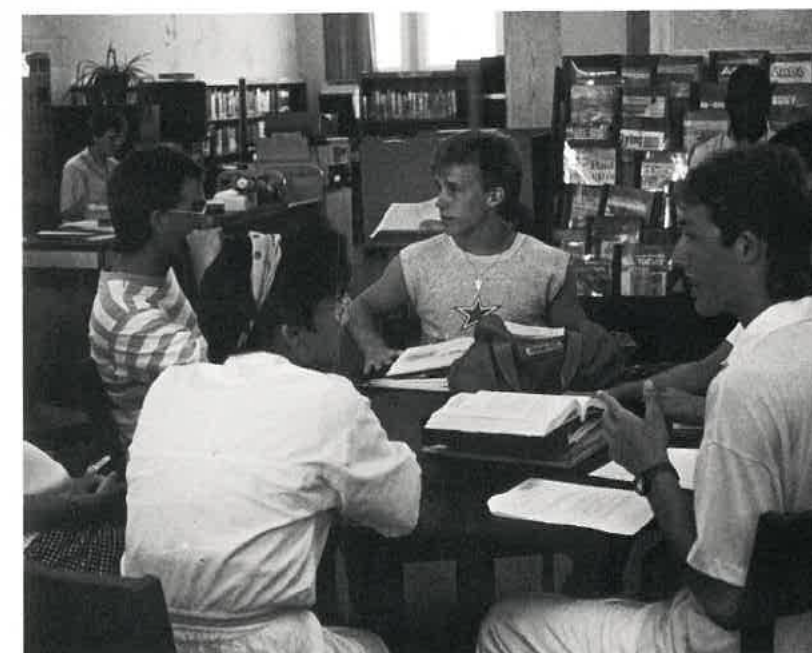

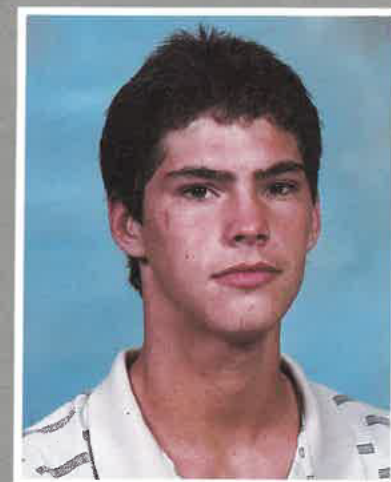
Why Wing It When You Can Walk It?

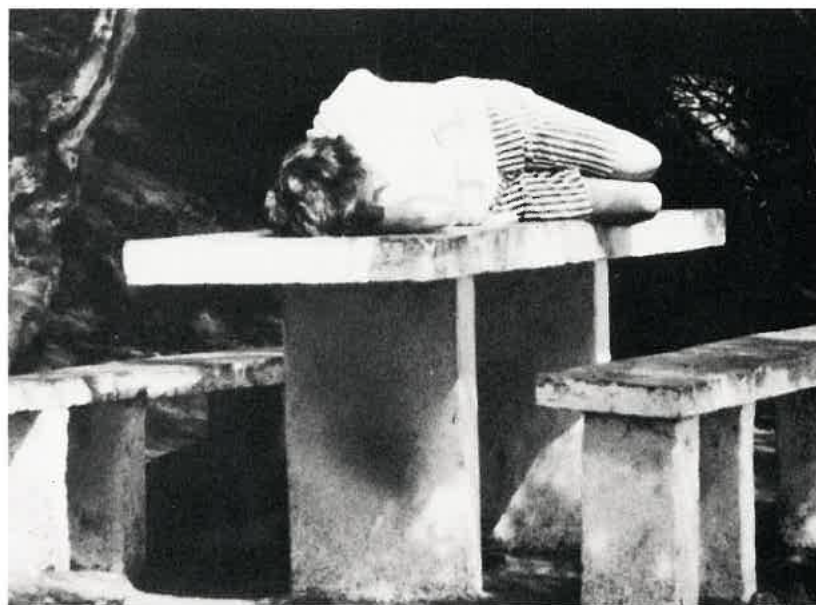

The class of 1990 showed their ability to live up to last year's juniors by their enthusiastic fundraising and planning for the 88-89 school year.

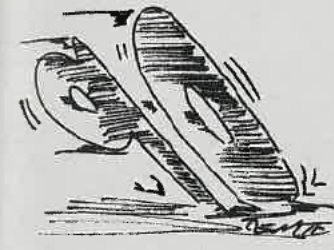

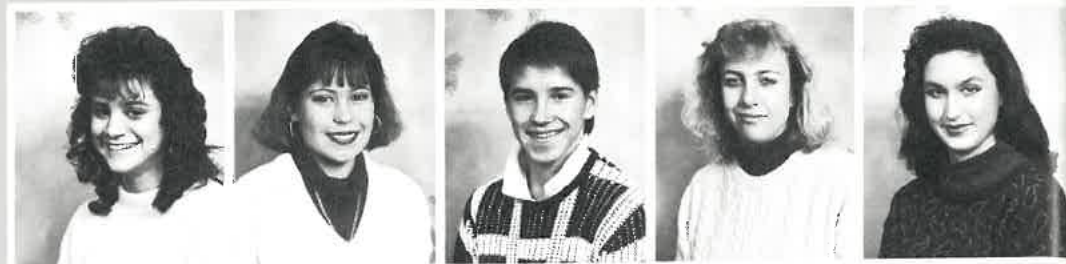

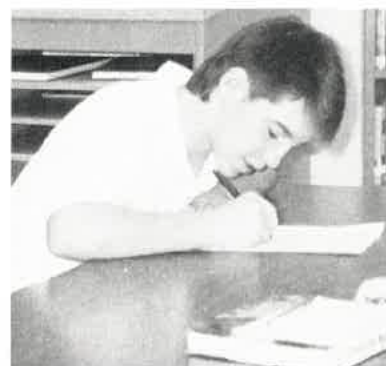

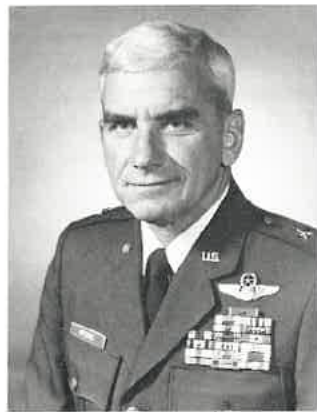

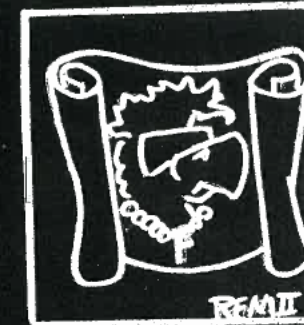
On the Wings of Victory

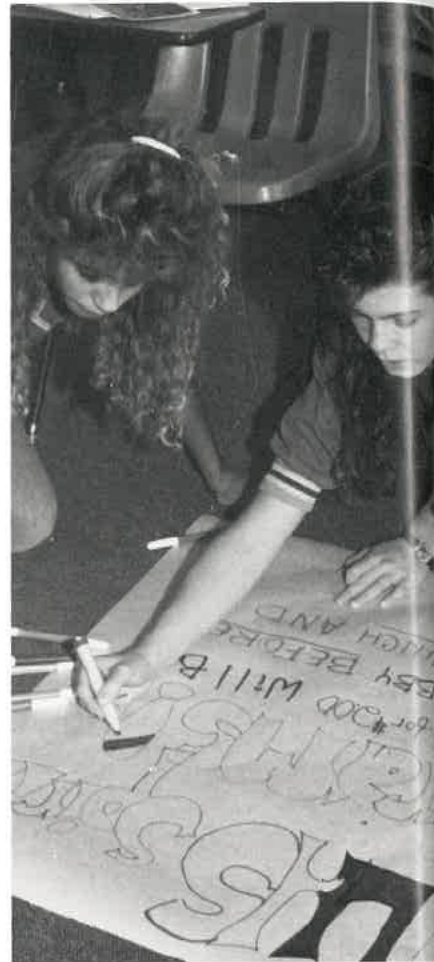
The Lajes cheerleaders worked hard during the '88 football season to support the 32 Falcon football players. They cheered at the total of eight games and two pep rallies.

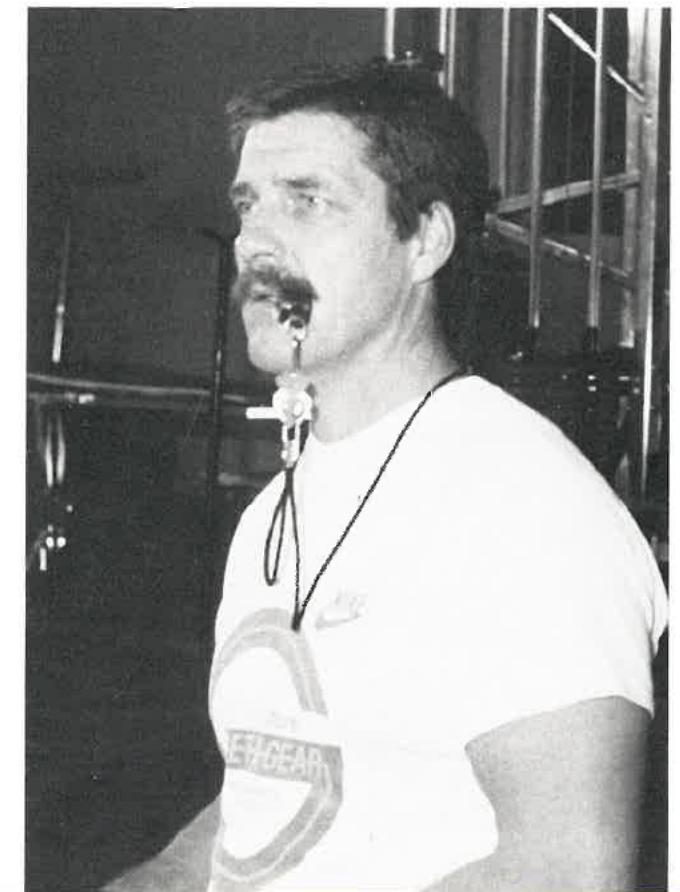

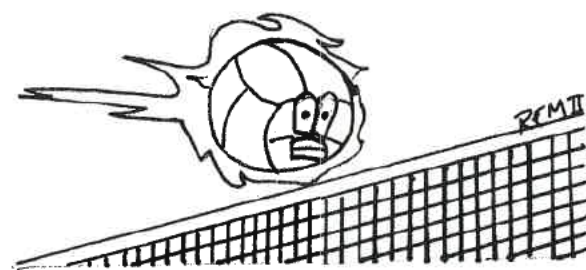

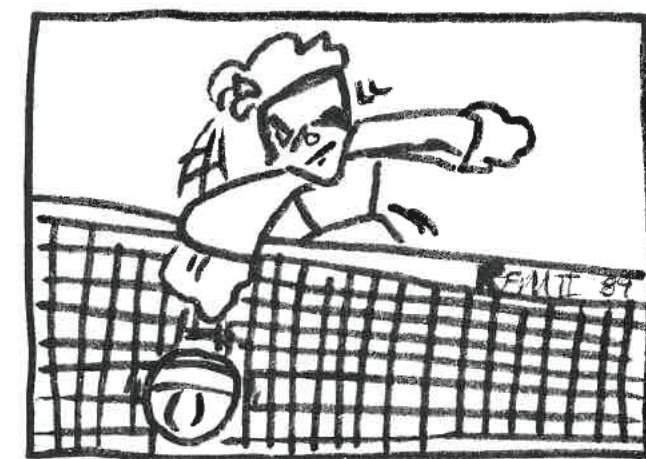

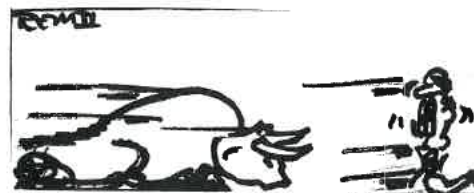

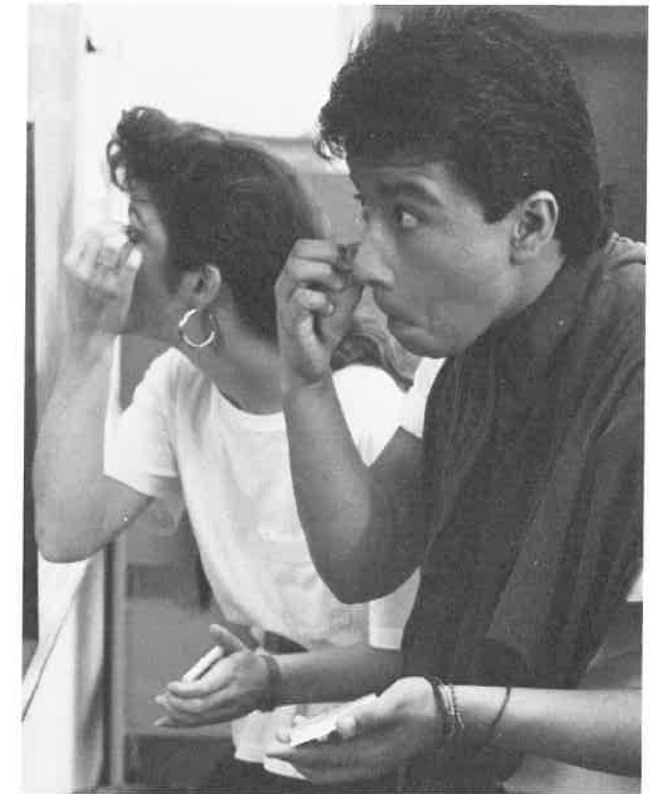

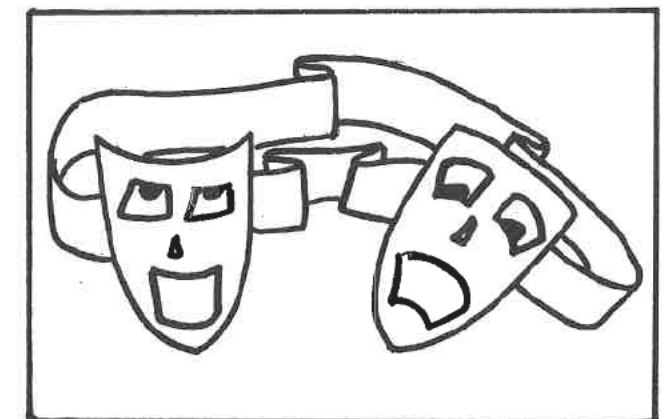
