Cobblestones

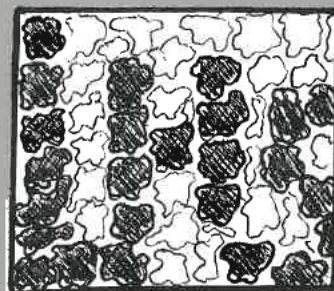
Lajes High School Azores, Portugal

"Just like the cobblestones that are individually hammered to form designs in the road, the student body of LHS is a myriad of stones in the design of history."



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When driving in Terceira, you may come across a weathered old man, kneeling among displaced cobblestones in the road. Carefully he selects a stone from the wheelbarrow by his side and taps it gently in place with a small hammer. This work requires precision to keep a continuous flow in the bed of rocks, while at the same time allowing separate designs to form.

Similarly, each individual at Lajes High School is a single cobblestone, differing from others in size, shape, and texture. Students move here having come from locations where fashions, slang, and customs are different.

While such a group of diverse personalities may seem to invite chaos, this assortment of

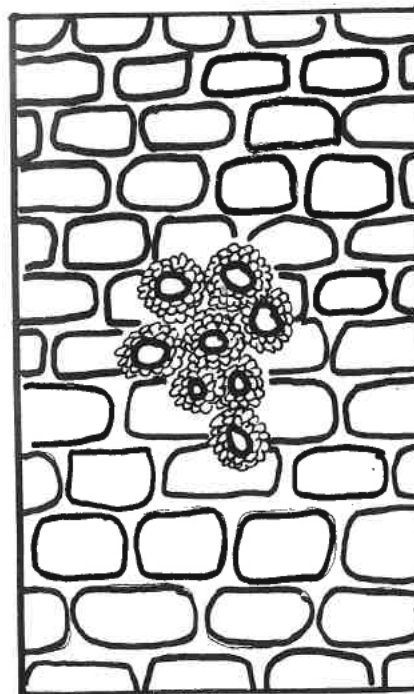
Living in the Azores is definitely an experience different from any other. When some Lajes High students were asked about what they think is the most "different" part of living in the Azores, they replied . . .

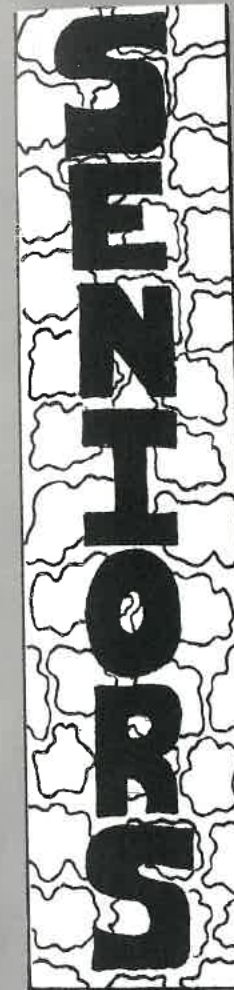

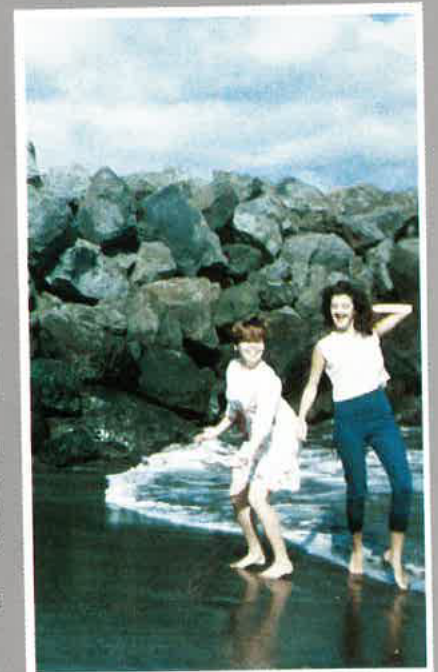

During the "Cobblestones" year of LHS, the class of '92 roamed through the year, casually considering new ideas and experimenting with new hobbies.

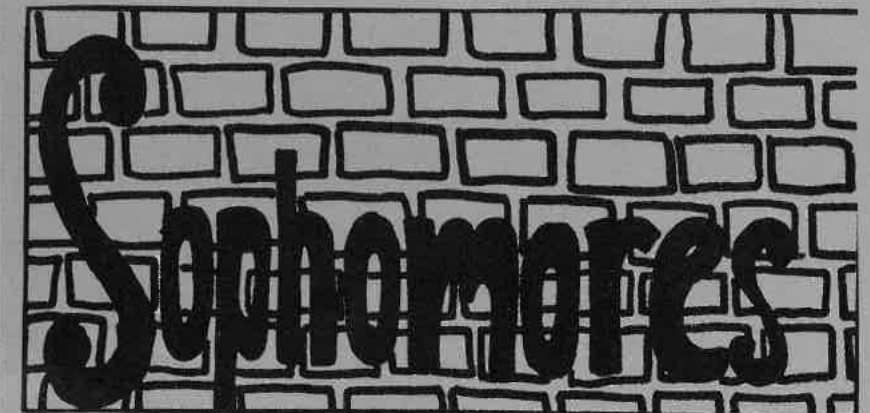
Plans for the future were usually only whims, nothing definite, because post high school life was still "far away."

Student Life: The Pattern We Chose To Live By

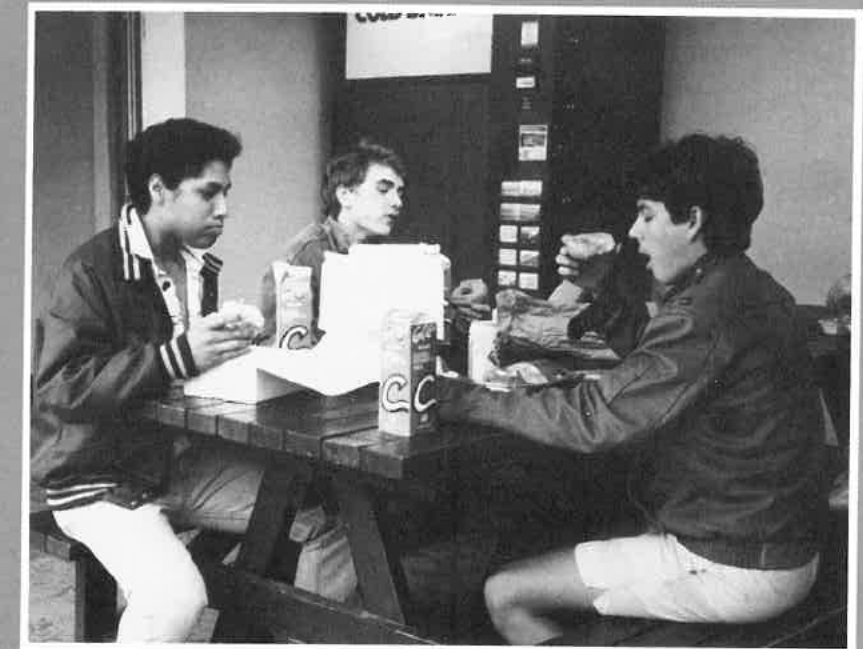


"Hey Peace, Brothers — it's the 60's revival," say C.D. and Gerald, while Shon says, "I can't figure them out!"

Of course no one can forget the cheerleaders whose rhythmic chants and smiling faces boosted players' spirits through games both won and lost.

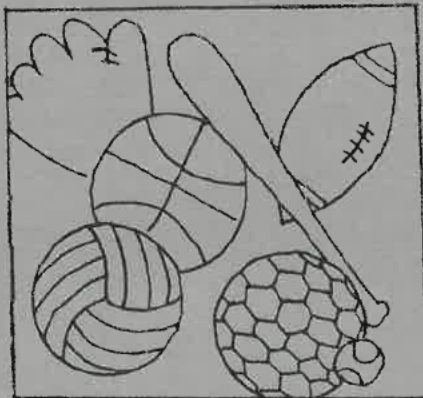
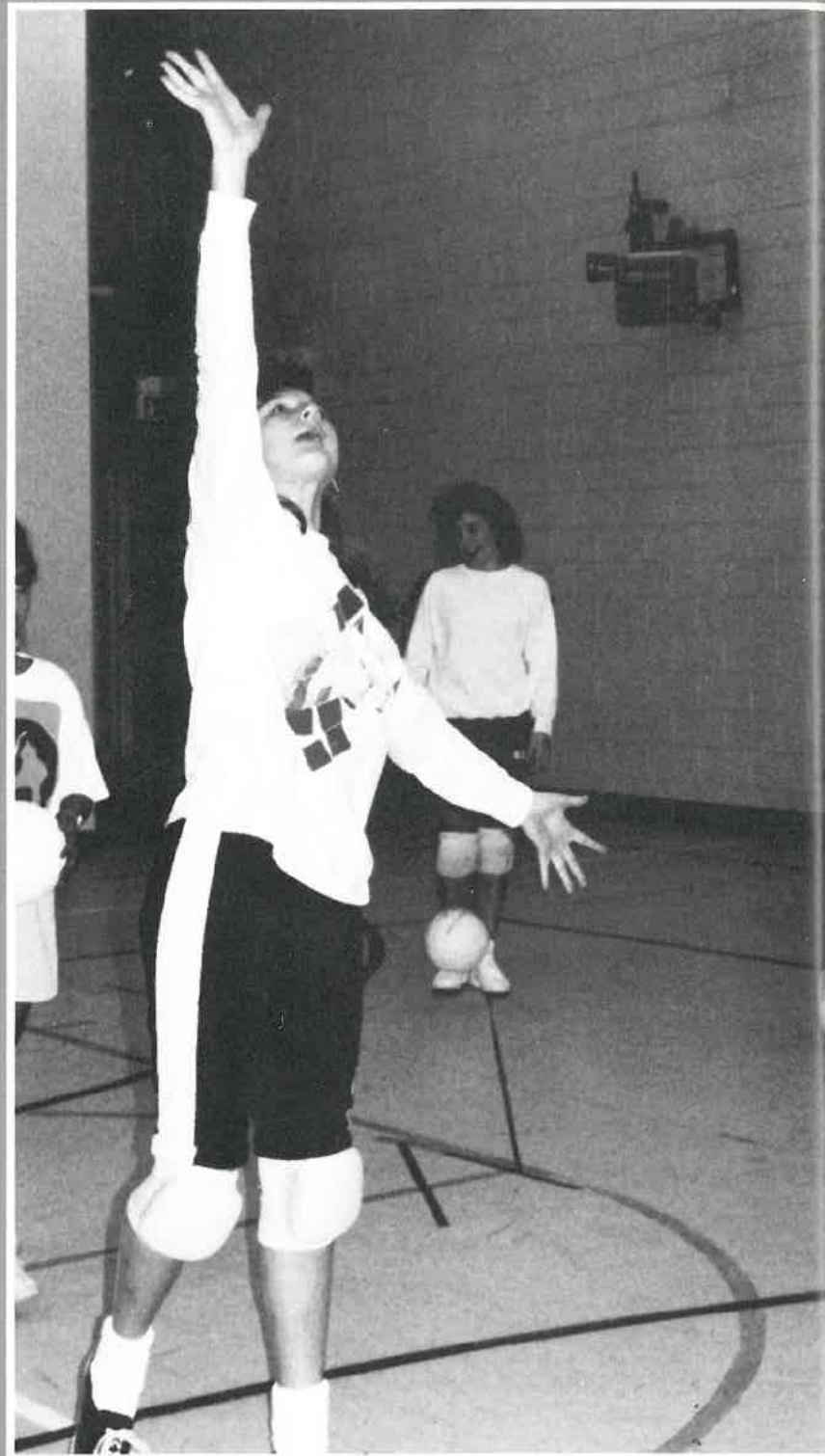

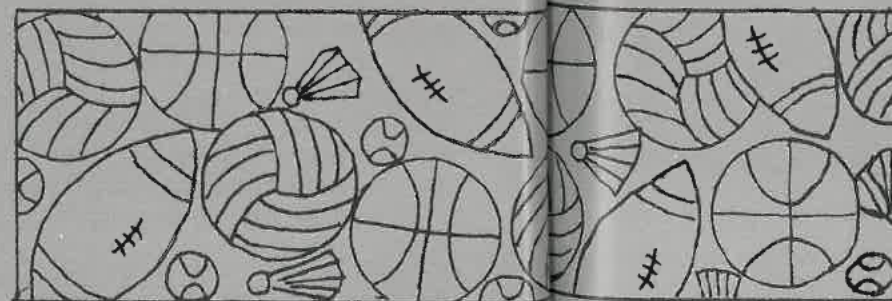

Because Lajes Field has only one high school, the teams opponents were the squadrons

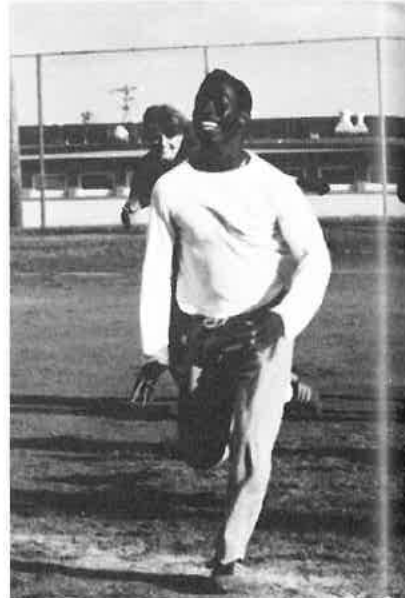
on the base. This was often times an interesting sight to see as the high school players were matched up to men who were sometimes twice their size.

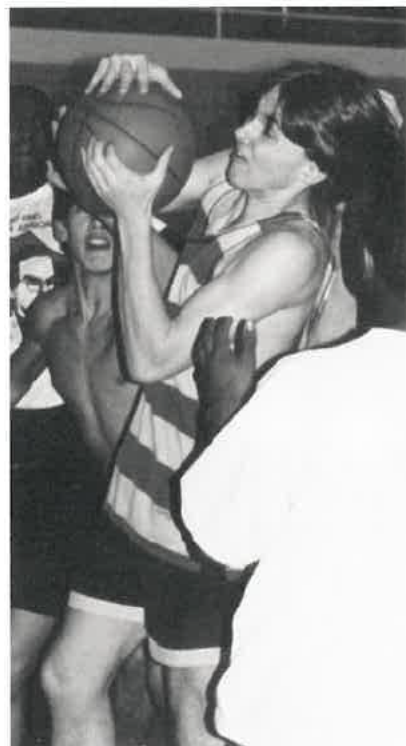

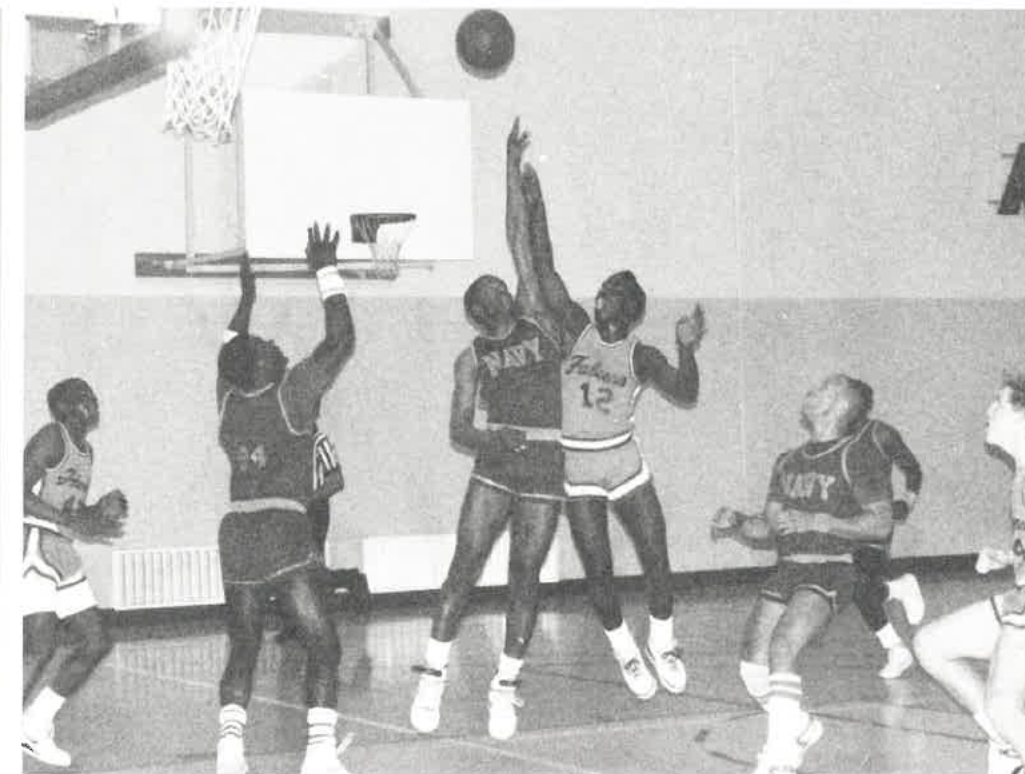
ration." The good sportsmanship of the players was also noted at all their games. The end of the season was spiced up by the rumors of a possible trip to Germany.

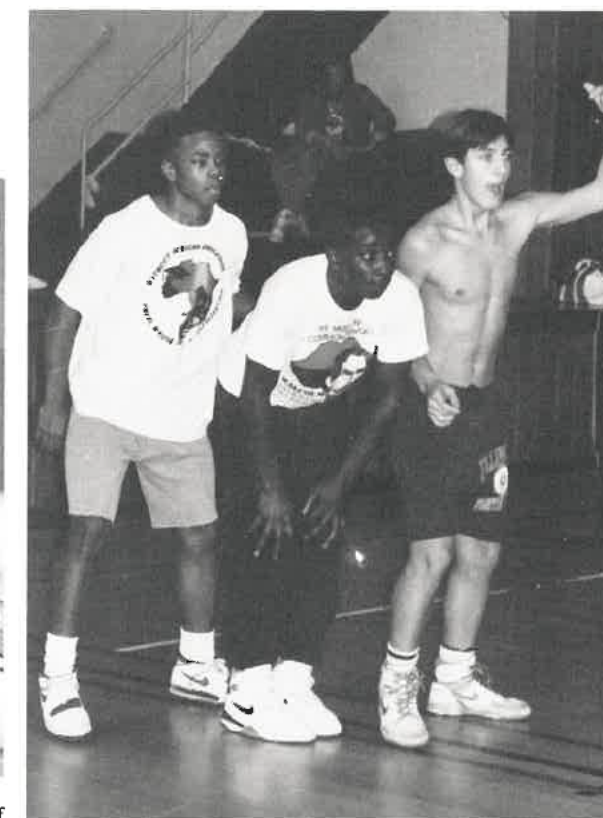

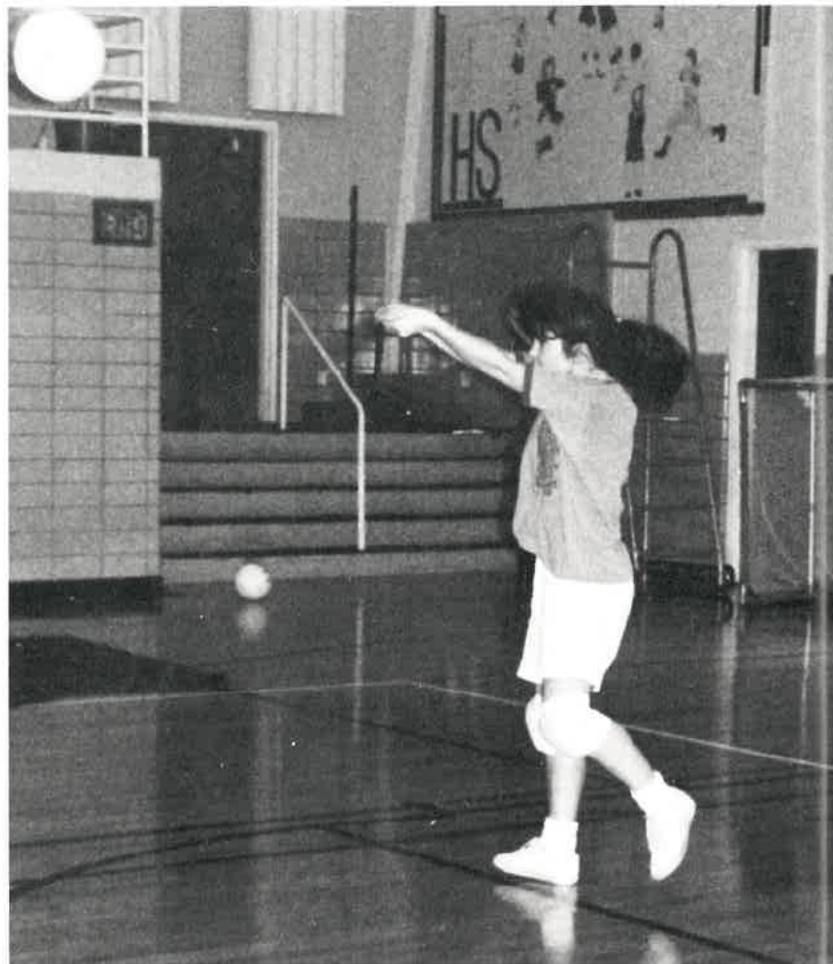

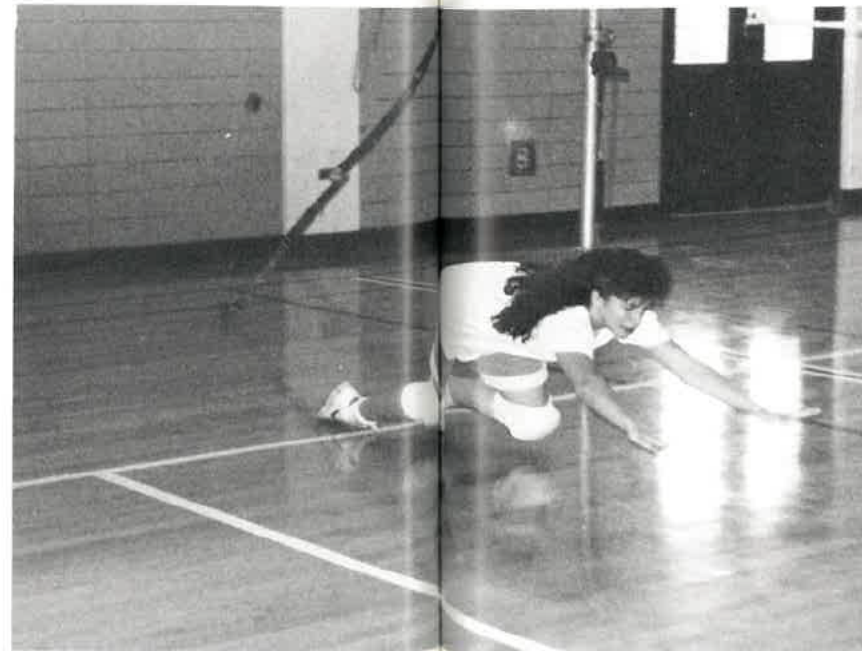

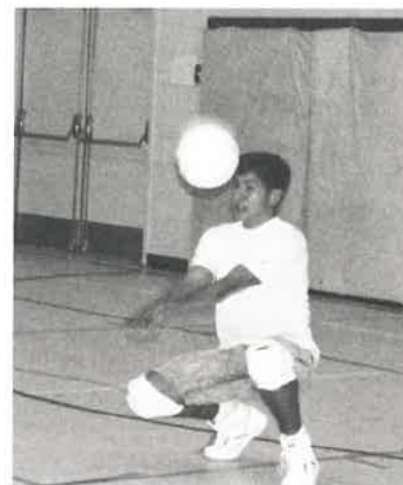

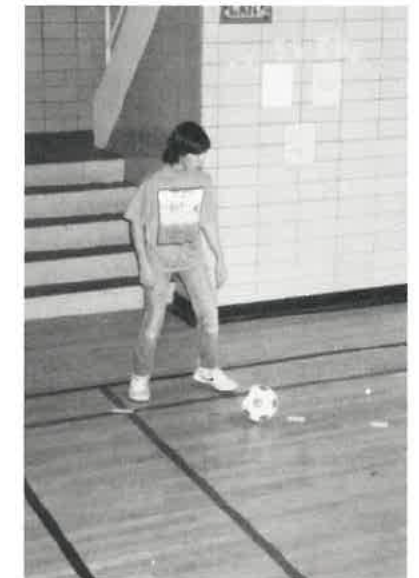

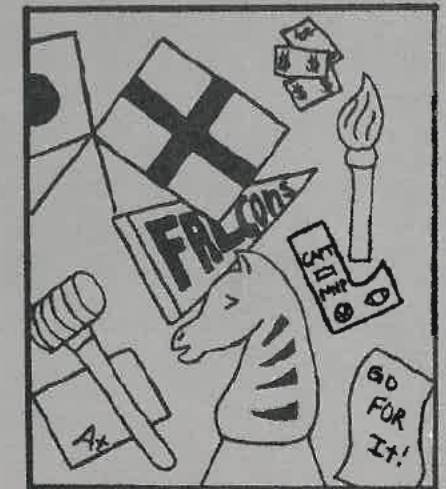

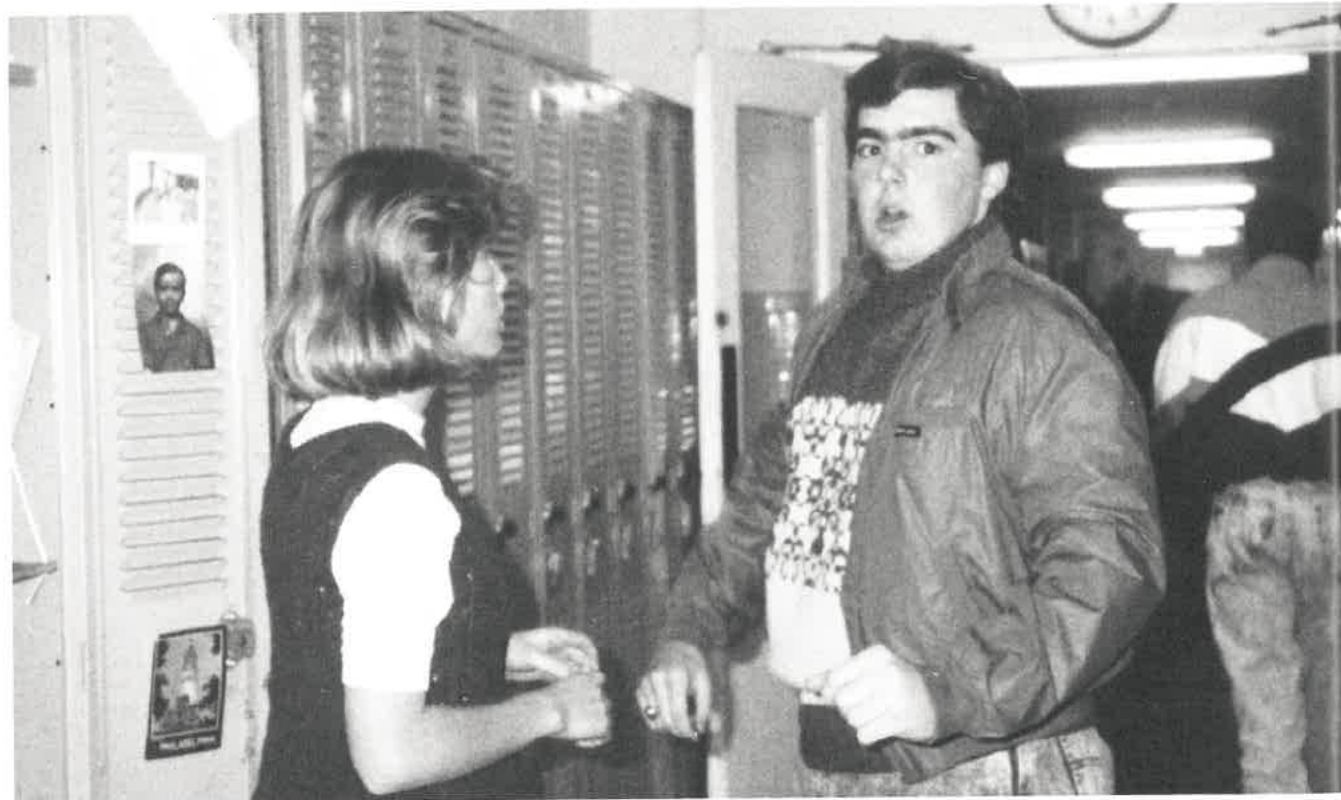
school janitors and during the second week, the goods went to the base donation basket.

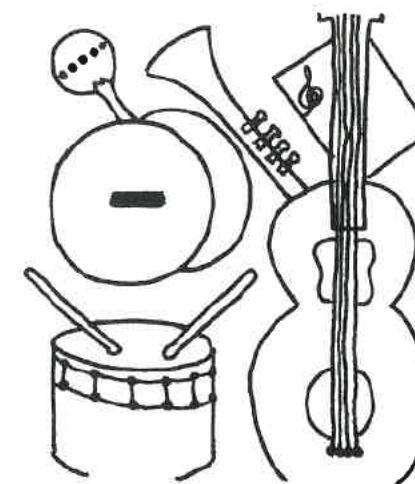

Overall, the band had a busy year full of harmony and dedication. "Forming Harmonious Notes, Making a Perfect Design," the Lajes band of 89-90

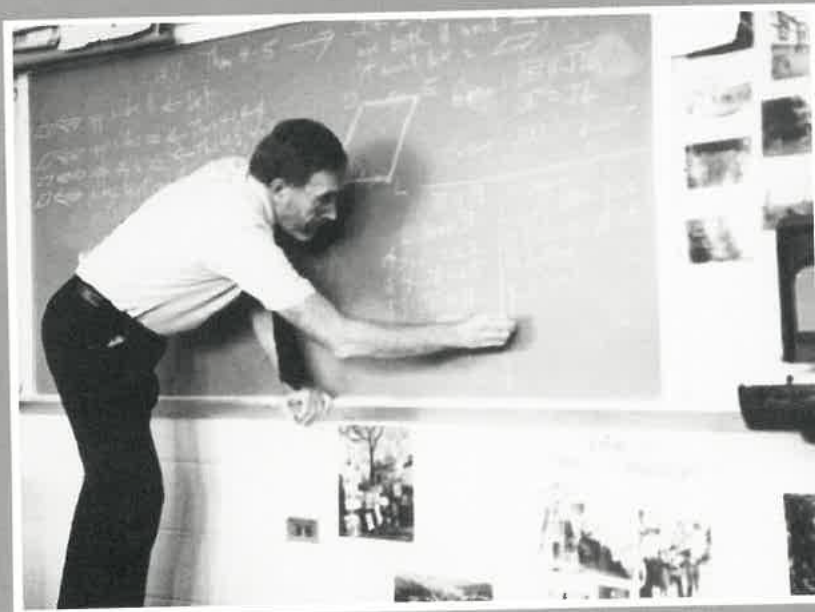
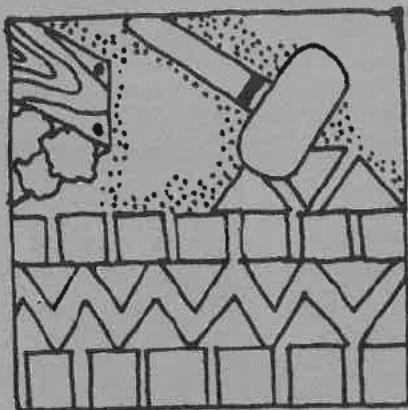
