ENGLISH AND MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENTS
The English program this year was quite extensive. Students will certainly remember those delightful weeks of poetry study. Those were the days of dazed looks: "What's a nonce symbol?" In some English classes the word was: "... is this a dagger I see before me, the handle toward my hand..." And in the Speech and Drama class, students became more eloquent and so did their tempers. Seriously though, the English program at L.H.S. was greatly expanded in all fields. Honors English classes were conducted for the first time. More supplementary material for poetry, drama, and various other literary fields was provided.

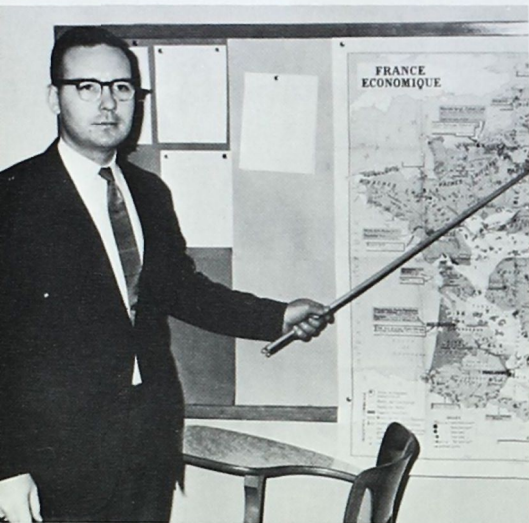

LANGUAGES, FINE AND PRACTICAL ARTS DEPARTMENTS

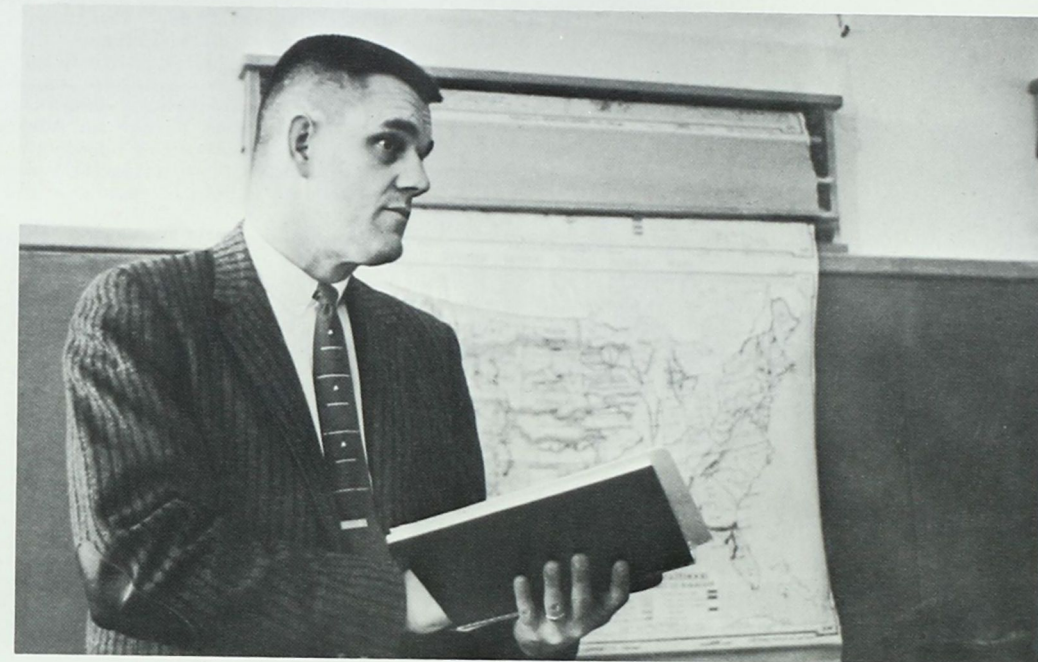
Since we are stationed in Europe, the study of languages has assumed a very important role in the school curriculum. Though the emphasis was on modern languages, students still contended with Caesar's "veni, vidi, vinci". They found that Latin grammar was a definite help in other language studies. During the year the language classes visited German schools to promote a better German-American understanding.

The band was especially active this year. It provided rousing music for many of the games. A Christmas program by the band and chorus was planned, but due to a change in personnel, the program was cancelled. The program was to have featured the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah.

In the course of the year the Art Department put on its annual art exhibition, which was also highly successful. The work of developing young artists was presented. The Mechanical Drawing classes labored with precision drawing.

For the home bodies Home Ec. was a useful course. They picked up many tips on child care, home nursing, and the care and feeding of males. The boys in Shop also prepared themselves for the future, while the school gradually became accustomed to the sound of buzz saws and hammers.

The original thirteen colonies, who won the war of 1812, the functions of the different branches of our government, and many more facts are taught in Mr. Daniel's American History and Government classes.

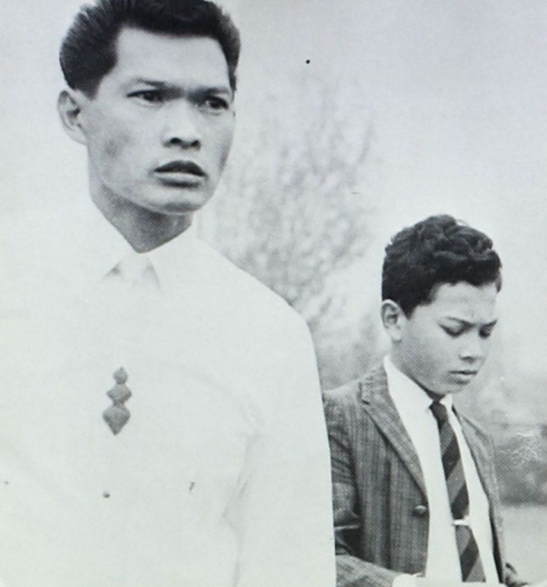

SCIENCE AND SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS
Due to the Space Age, much of the emphasis was on the sciences and related fields this year. New books were obtained for the chemistry and physics classes to keep abreast with the latest development in teaching methods and the changing scientific outlook. Thus, students found themselves taking PSSC Physics and Chemistry Study instead of the traditional courses. This change in curriculum occasioned confusion at first, but as the students became oriented, problems were ironed out. Eventually, moles and optics became almost second nature. Dissections in Modern Biology and Advanced Biology classes proved an interesting introduction to the anatomy of man. These courses were excellent preparation for those students interested in medicine and related fields.

The shrinking world and world's expanding headaches were dealt with in the Social Studies department. Social and economic problems, along with the functioning governments of the various countries of the world, were debated in the Contemporary Problems classes. In the American Government and History classes, the essentials of good citizenship, along with evolution of the thirteen colonies to the world power of today, the United States of America, were taught. The discovery and advancement of civilization was taught in World History and World Regions classes. Through Social Studies, we learned of those who laid the foundations for today.

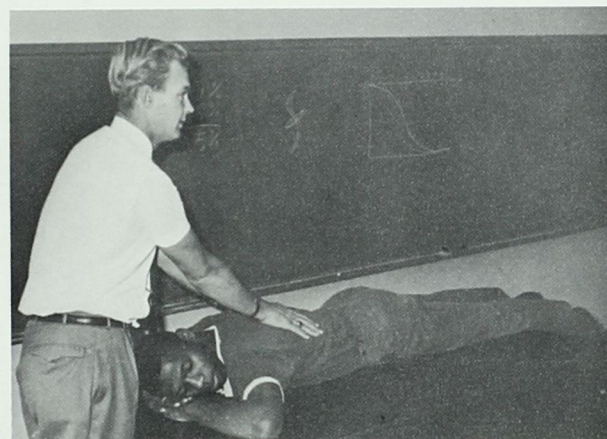

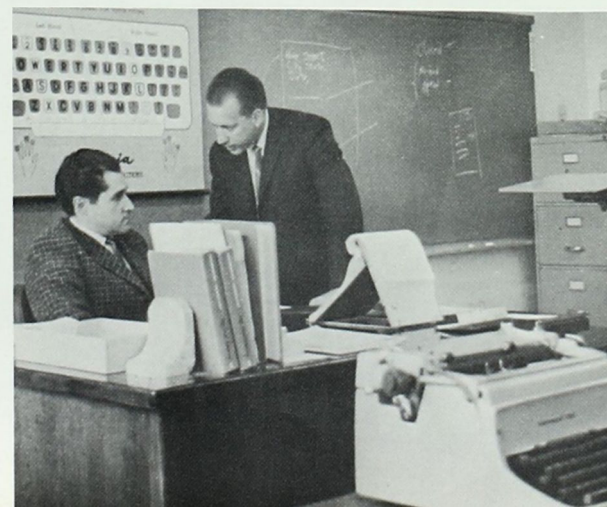

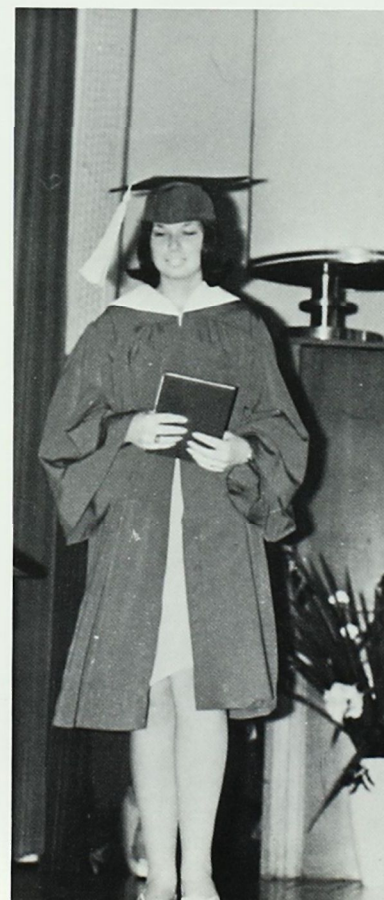

HOOFBEATS STAFF

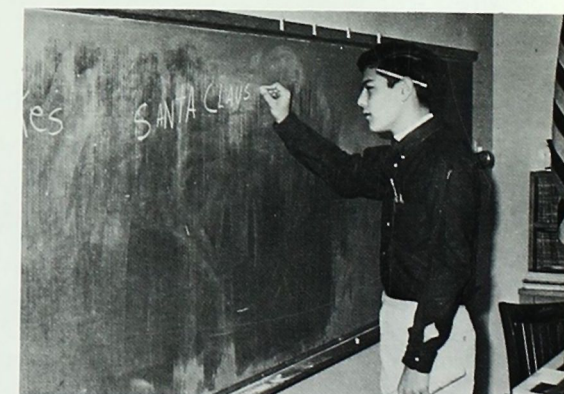

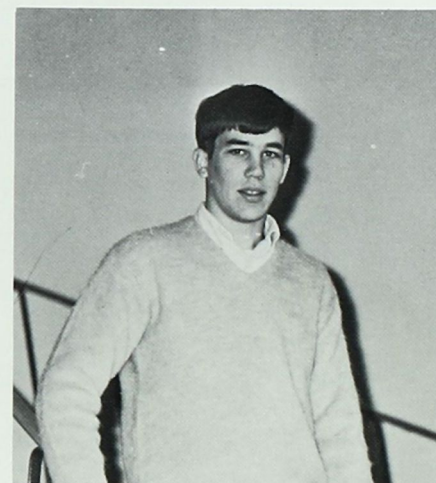

STUDENT COUNCIL

As the effective force of student government in Ludwigsburg High School, the basic functions of the Student Council are to be of service to the student body and to the school as a whole, and to act as the representative of student interest in school affairs.

The 1966-1967 Student Council began the school year faced with a \$600 debt, which was soon erased due to careful budgeting and several money-making activities. Bookcovers were sold, as were school sweatshirts and beer mugs. During the Christmas season, a food, clothing, and toy drive was held at school, and the results were donated to a nearby orphanage along with a 22-pound turkey and American Christmas candy. As a service to the athletes, hotdogs, cokes, and pickles were sold after school.

In March, an all-school hootenanny was held, and the nearby high schools and colleges in Germany were invited.

As we go to press, our four Student Council officers, Cirina Catania, John Becker, Sheila Anderson, and Anne Hochstedler, and the two newly-arrived--from Paris advisory officers are preparing to attend an all-Europe Student Council Forum in Berlin with sponsor, Mr. Rogers.

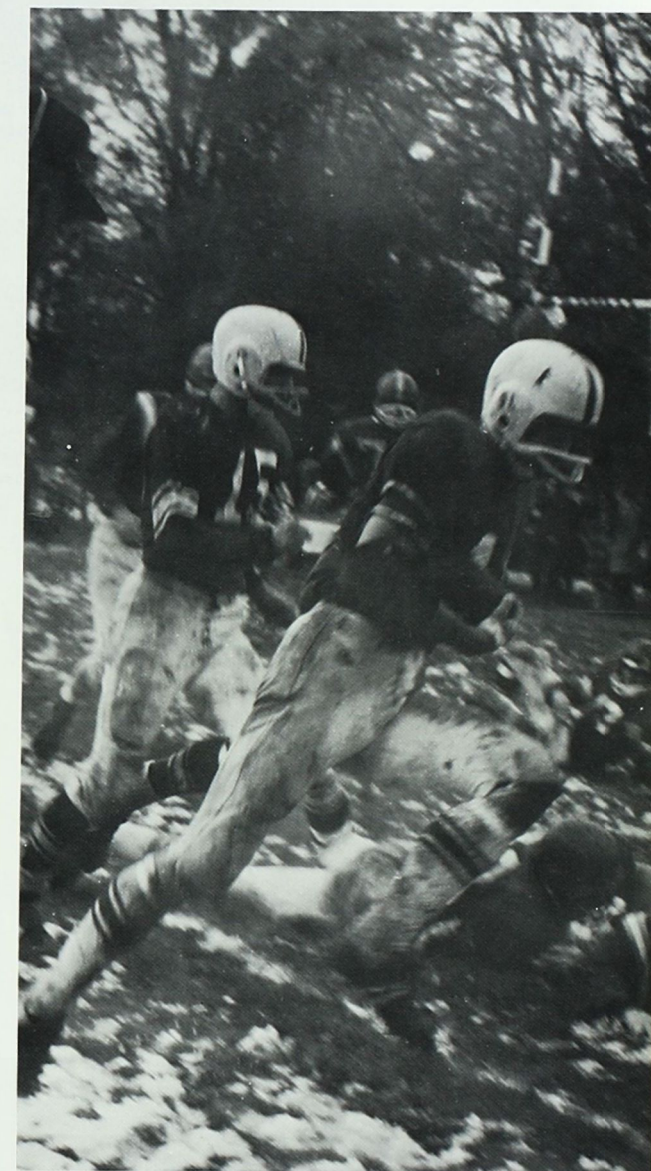

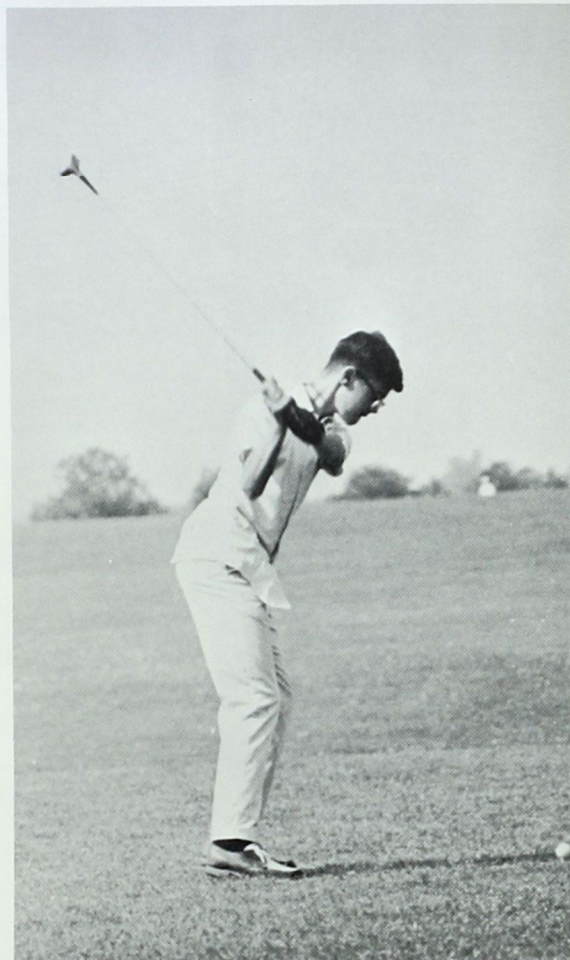
SKILL DISPLAYED BY EAGER NOVICES

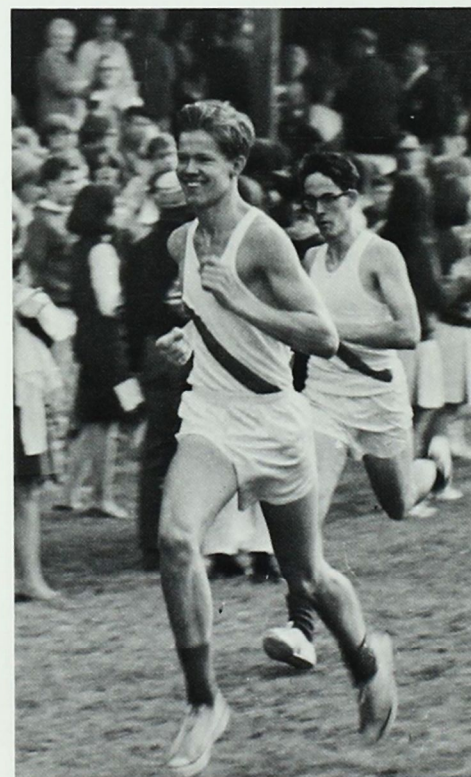
GOLF AND CROSS COUNTRY

Many of these fine boys showed a high potential and should add much to next year's Varsity squad.



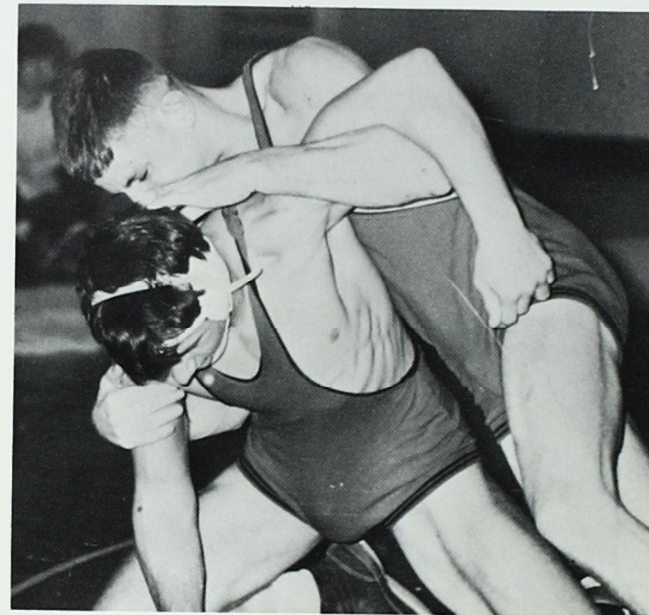
VARSITY WRESTLING

As this book goes to press the boys are leaving for the All-European Tournaments at Frankfurt with high hopes.

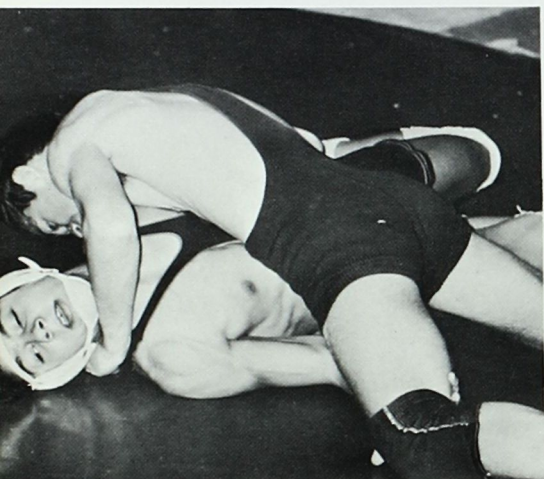

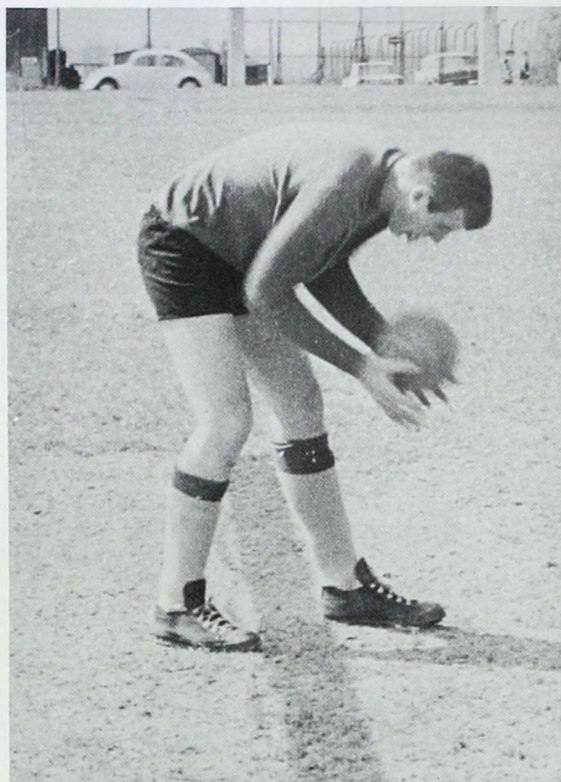
JUNIOR VARSITY WRESTLING

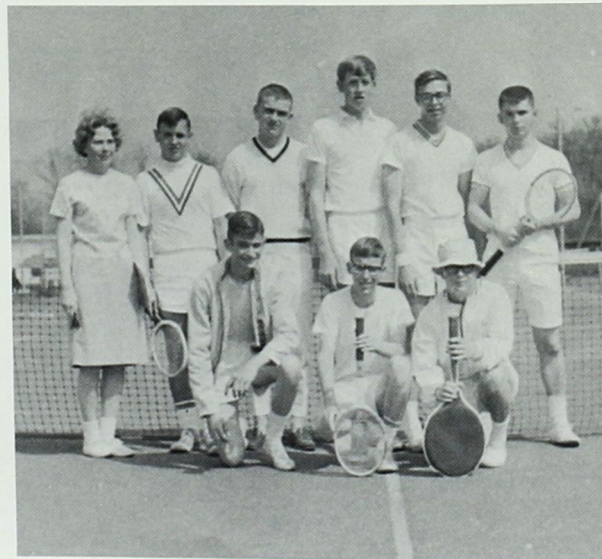

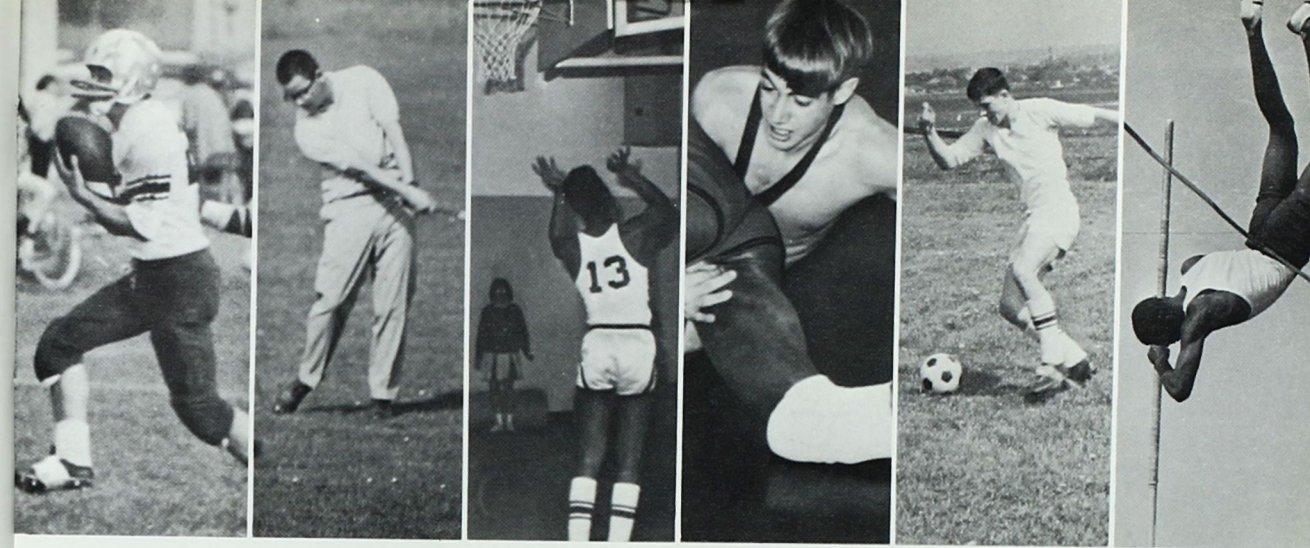


TENNIS
