6 children questioned in school vandalism

NUERNBERG (S&S) Six dependent NUFRNBERG (S&S) Six dependent children, aged seven to 11 years old, in-clinding an eight-year-old girl, were ques-tioned here Monday by Army officials in connection with the vandalism at the Nærnberg elementary and junior high schools Sunday night.

An Army spokesman said the children, who live in the Kalb housing area near the school complex in Fuerth, allegedly entered the facility through an open window and threw 30 bottles of food dye on the walls and ceilings of several administrative offices. Damages are being estimated.

They also said that several firms are assets.

They also said that several fires were started on the floor and on tops of desks and that the children damaged an experi-

and that the children damaged an experimental science project.


"We don't know yet who is actually guilty, but all six... have admitted to being in the building," a school official said.

He said that the alleged vandals poured food dye into a fish tank and killed one of the fish.

Also, \$50 worth of Christmas presents in a school counselor's office were taken or severely damaged by the vandals.

Authorities asid that the CID and military police are investigating the breaking.


- 1. No student should be in the building before 08:15 in the morning.
- 2. At 98:15, bus students may come in and wait in the lobby downstairs.
- 3. Walkers should plan to leave home at a time which will allow them to get to school about 08:25, not earlier.
- 4. Students will not go upstairs or down halls before 08:25 unless they have made special arrangements with the teacher and the teacher is in the room.
- 5. Students are not to wait on the stairs. Books and other belongings are not to be left on the stairs.
- 6. Students are to be in the first period classes before 08:35. Students who are not in by that time will be marked late or absent.
- 7. If a student is in school but has a good reason for being late to class, he should still let the first period teacher know where he will be. This should be done before class time.
- 8. Students who are late in getting to school (this includes late busses) are to report directly to regular classes meeting at that time.
- 9. All students are to report to classes to which they have been assigned throughout the day unless they have been excused ahead of time.
- 17. During class time, no student is to be out of the classroom without a pass.
- 11. Students are not to be in the building during lunch time unless they have made arrangements with the teacher and the teacher is in the room. There will be no waiting in the halls or stairs. As long as there is reasonable cooperation on the part of the students, they may wait in the lobby and use the restroom in this building at lunch time. Leave the building quickly at the beginning of the period and do not return to classes until the bell rings at 13:25 hrs.
- 12. Lockers have been assigned for your use, but they are to be used only at the following times:

Before 98:35 in the morning.
At 12:40, or the beginning of the lunch period.
At 13:25, or the end of the lunch period.
After 15:30, or the end of the school day.

13. Students should leave the building shortly after 15:30 in the afternoon unless special arrangements have been made with a teacher and the teacher is present.



We All Die

pessimism, cynicism, exaggeration. they are only viewpoints that pretend to provide the best, most complete explanations. what many other people are pretending, though, is that the opposites of those words—optimism, sentimentality, understatement—are somehow more qualified to serve as complete explanations and answers, though they too are only limited viewpoints. problems, from grandiose questions of great social and political significance to small personal anxieties, are hidden by a facade of cheerfulness and involvement by some, and by a mask of pessimism and apathy by others, every person walks through the hall in a plastic mask, afraid to speak out and show himself because everybody else is afraid; so we grow farther and farther apart, bigotry, hatred, war.

whatever we think is wrong with the world, it can never be repaired until we communicate among ourselves. not one of us lives in a vacuum, and nothing can ever change for the better until the false fronts are cleared away, and everyone asks the others what is happening. cynicism, pessimism, and exaggeration used here are not answers, only tools to help us perceive the many possible viewpoints. but we should not blindly accept this suggestion, we should try to understand ourselves first, and we will find ourselves closer to someone else doing the same.




