




Origin of the Franconian



Have you ever wondered how the name Franconian came about? Franconia is the region of Germany surrounding the middle and upper Main River. It was created in the 9th century and named after the Franks. The area included the cities of Worms, Fulda, Heidelberg, Bamberg, and later Nuernberg. It was fought over by tribesmen until it became part of the Frankish kingdom in the 8th century. Franconia was later divided into two parts - western Franconia and eastern Franconia. The makers of the first yearbook for N.A.H.S. then employed the name Franconian to the yearbook. (by Gayle Hicks)
















A Night To Do "La Bamba"







VICTORY

Homecoming 1987 was a success with the Eagles rambling past the Wuerzberg Wolves with a score of 20-8. The halftime score was 14-8 and the Eagles knew they had their work cut out for them. Wu-erzberg's offense had many opportunities to score from inside the Eagle twenty, but was stopped short because of Nuernberg's great defensive stand. The defense was led by strong safety Jimmy Philpot, who was in on 19 tackles, and defensive ends Andre Metoyer and Vasaga Tilo, who were each in on 14 stops. The defense kept the Wolves to 127 total yards.

Our offense was led by the fancy footwork of Terry Golden and Freddie Headen. Both had over one hundred yards rushing and one touchdown apiece. The first touchdown was scored by Golden's 2-yard run which finished a 7-play, 78-yard first quarter drive. Jesse Bruce scored the second TD with a 1-yard plunge into the end zone. In the fourth quarter, Headen scored the final touchdown with a 47-yard dash. The Eagles finished the game with 230 yards on the ground and 75 more, passing. The passing attack was led by quarterback Bruce and Chris Person. This win boosted the overall season record to four wins and no losses. by David Slivka and Kim Pier

















United We Stand





The wrestling cheerleaders rooted for our wrestlers every chance they got and added a lot of spirit to the wrestling meets.










































AJROTC — A MAINSTAY AT N.A.H.S.





Both of these organizations require their members to exhibit leadership, knowledge, and represent our school favorably. by: K. Lumm



"I joined because the people are a lot of fun," commented Molly Laster.





Students who are identified as being eligible for this program comprise what is referred to as the "Talent pool," and most are enrolled in advanced classes. Enriched activities and experiences are brought to these students through the advanced classes, in the form of guest speakers, field trips, and mentors for students electing to do specialized projects.

Dr. Renzulli identifies a gifted student as having three traits in common and they are: 1) above average ability, 2) task commitment and 3) creativity. Students are identified through testing, classroom performance, teacher recommendation, peer nomination and self nomination.

Further enrichment activities offered to the gifted students are trips to other countries. One or two major trips are offered each year. Last school year, for example, a trip to France was taken in October and a trip to Italy was taken in May. These trips include specific assignments for the students on a daily basis and some in-depth research prior to the

trip.

This particular program is relatively new to DoDDS and NAHS. This is the second year that the Renzulli model has been in place at this school and each year it grows and expands to meet our gifted population.






There is no prerequisite for joining the journalism staff, other than having a little bit of creativity and interest n newspaper production and writing. This year's staff seemed to have just that!

A Fond Farewell

Mr. Josef Kerpen retired from his NAHS auto shop at the beginning of the 1987-1988 school year. When he arrived at Nuernberg High School ten years ago, Mr. Kerpen found an empty garage designated as his auto shop. There was only one building there at the time. After his arrival Mr. Kerpen worked very hard to build up the shop to current professional standards. His goal was to build the high school's auto shop into a professional mechanic's shop. To put this program together so well possible with only the support of the administration. For six years, he worked with the administration to convince shoool officials that auto shop students needed the chance to learn all parts of the business. It took many trips to Wiesbaden to fully supply and equip the shop. Last year's addition of the painting booth completed the

complex, Mr. Kerpen commented, "I am proud to have it accomplished. All the students who really wanted to learn made (all the work) all worthwhile."

Mr. Kepen led a very interesting life before he came to Nuernberg to teach. He was born in Trier, a city founded by the Romans in 15 B.C. During World War II, young Josef Kerpen was drafted into the German army. His first assignment was in Poland. In 1941, he was transferred to Russia with a Schuetzenpanzer Division (infantry, in a tank division). In Stalingrad, on February 10, 1943 he was captured and remained in a Russian prisoner of war camp for seven years. Of the 360,000 men in his division, nearly 96,000 were captured, and only 2000 ever returned home.

After his release Mr. Kerpen was appren-

ticed to French engineers. He later moved to Luxembourg eventually becoming a Master Mechanic. After 3.5 years in that position, he applied for an immigration visa to the United States. On January 13, 1960, he arrived in America with his wife, Ilse. He settled in New Carrolton, Maryland, where he owned and ran a very successful auto garage. After ten years of running his business, he returned to his home country and NAHS.


Over the last ten years, hundreds of students have profited from his experience and his hands-on guidance. His aim was to teach his pupils to diagnose problems and repair rather than replace the old with the new. His Prussian commands and twinkling eyes will be missed by all who knew him.






Nuernberg's "Bonn Bonn"




Doing Time








NO SCHOOL!



































The Other Half — J.H.

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
Restriction Gives Homesick a New Meaning
