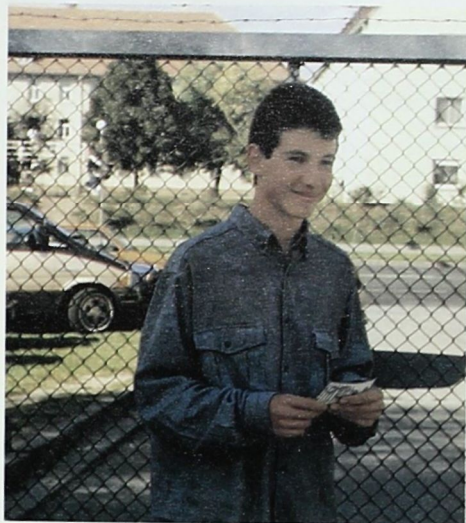

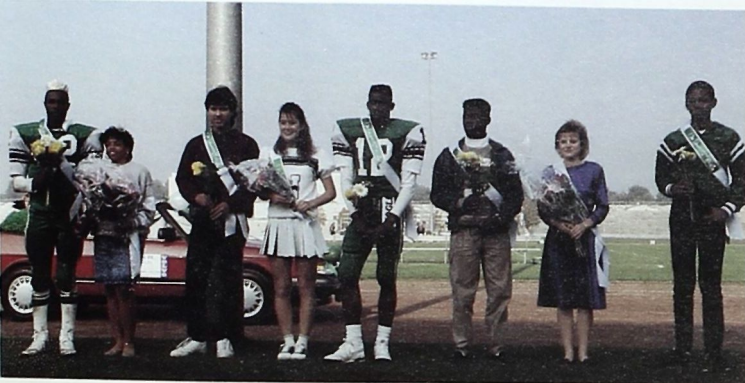

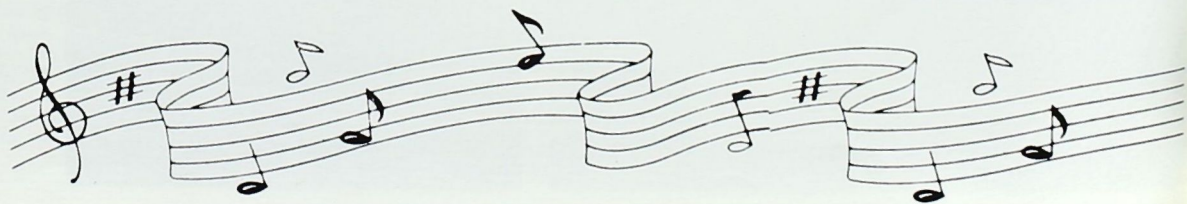

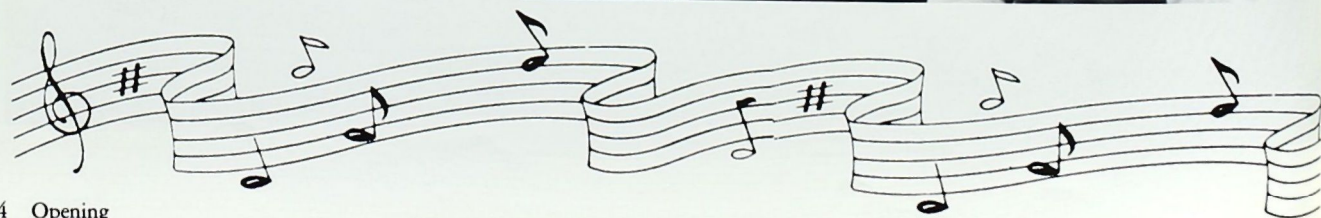

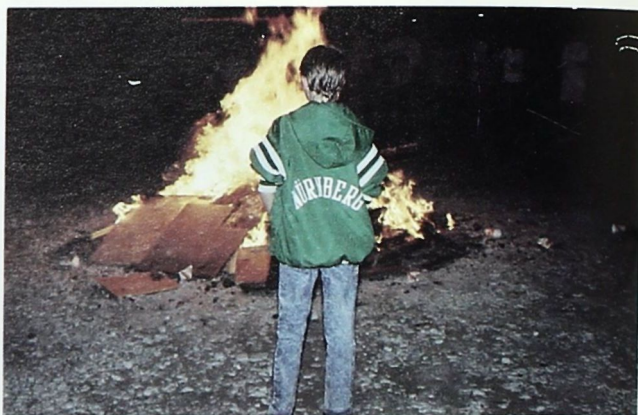

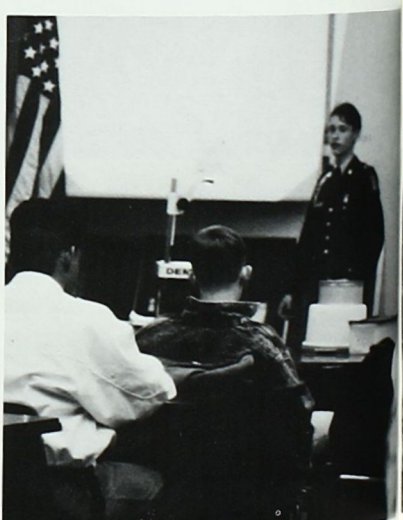

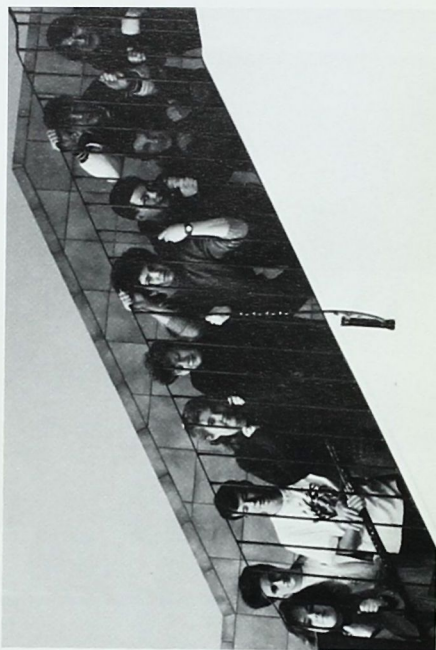

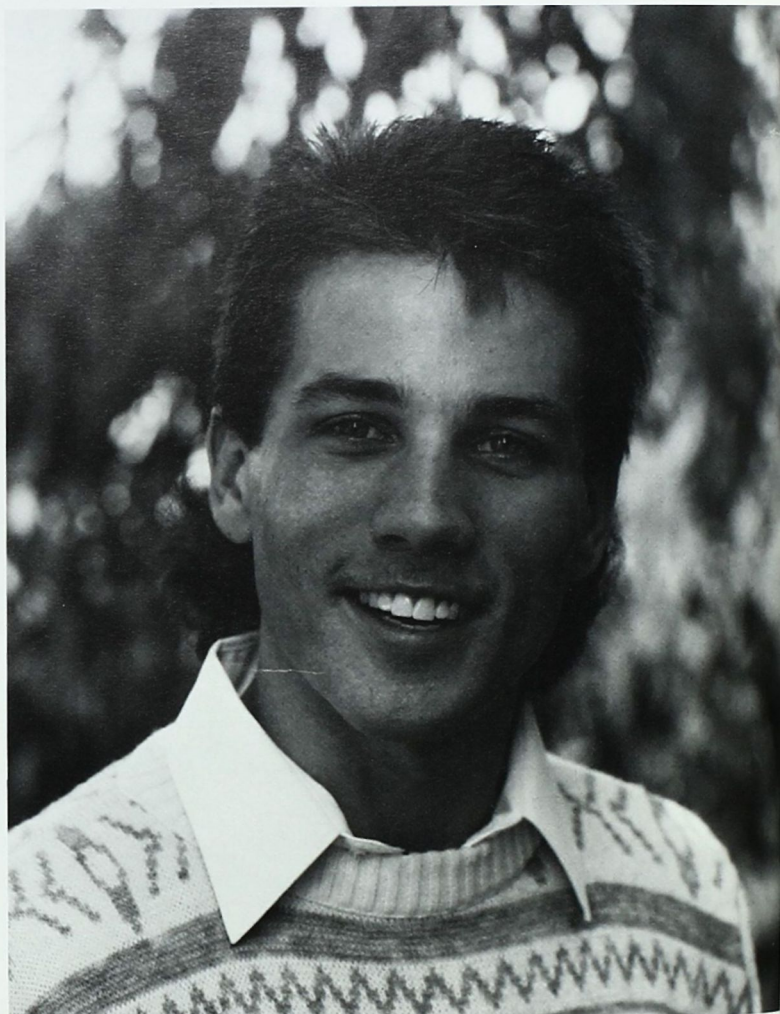
"HYSTERIA"

The 1988 cross-country team had twenty-five runners, thirteen of which were of the varsity team.

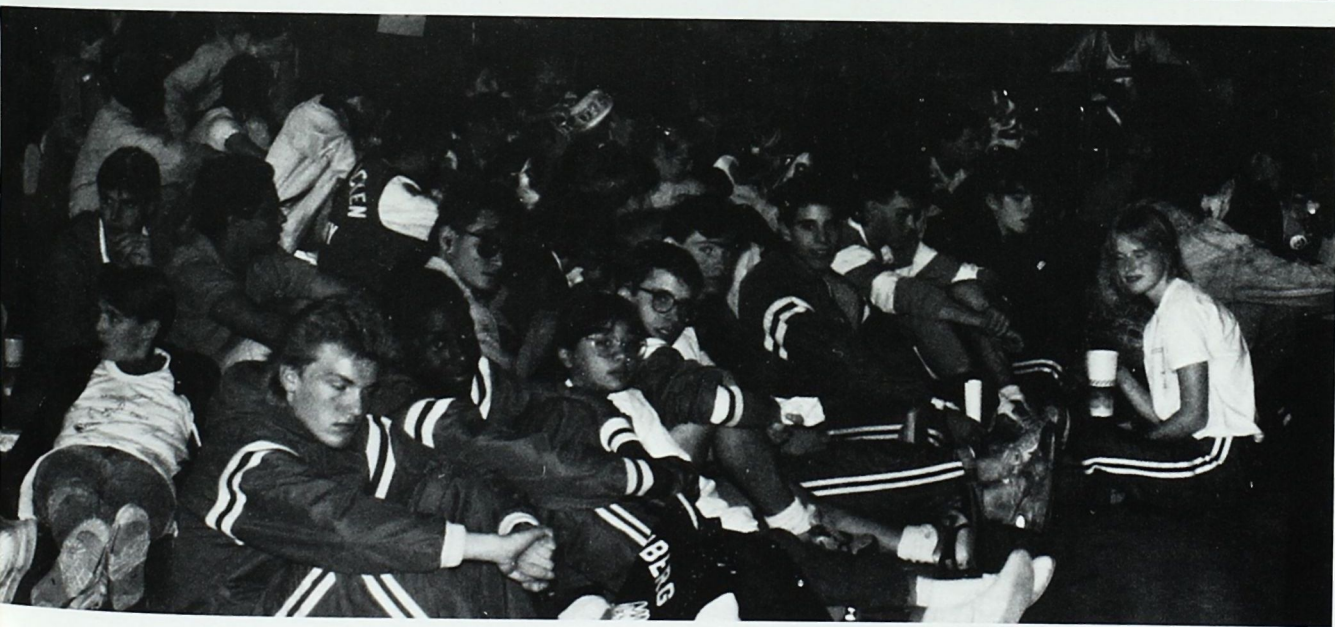
This year's team was relatively young, with only four varsity runners from last year's team. This was the largest team in NHS's recent years.

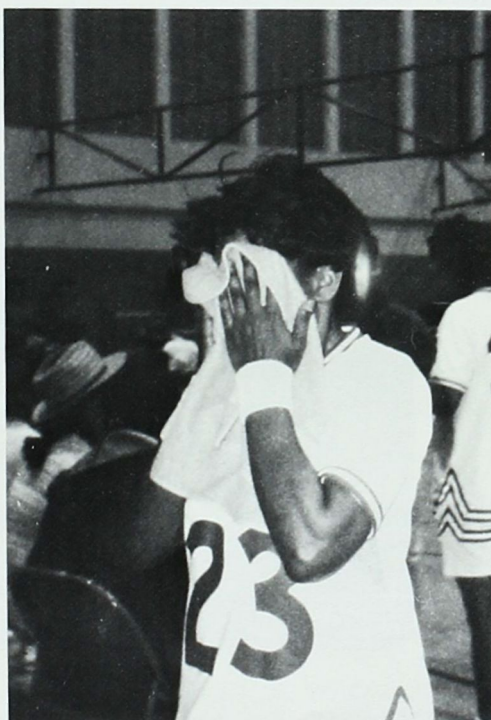

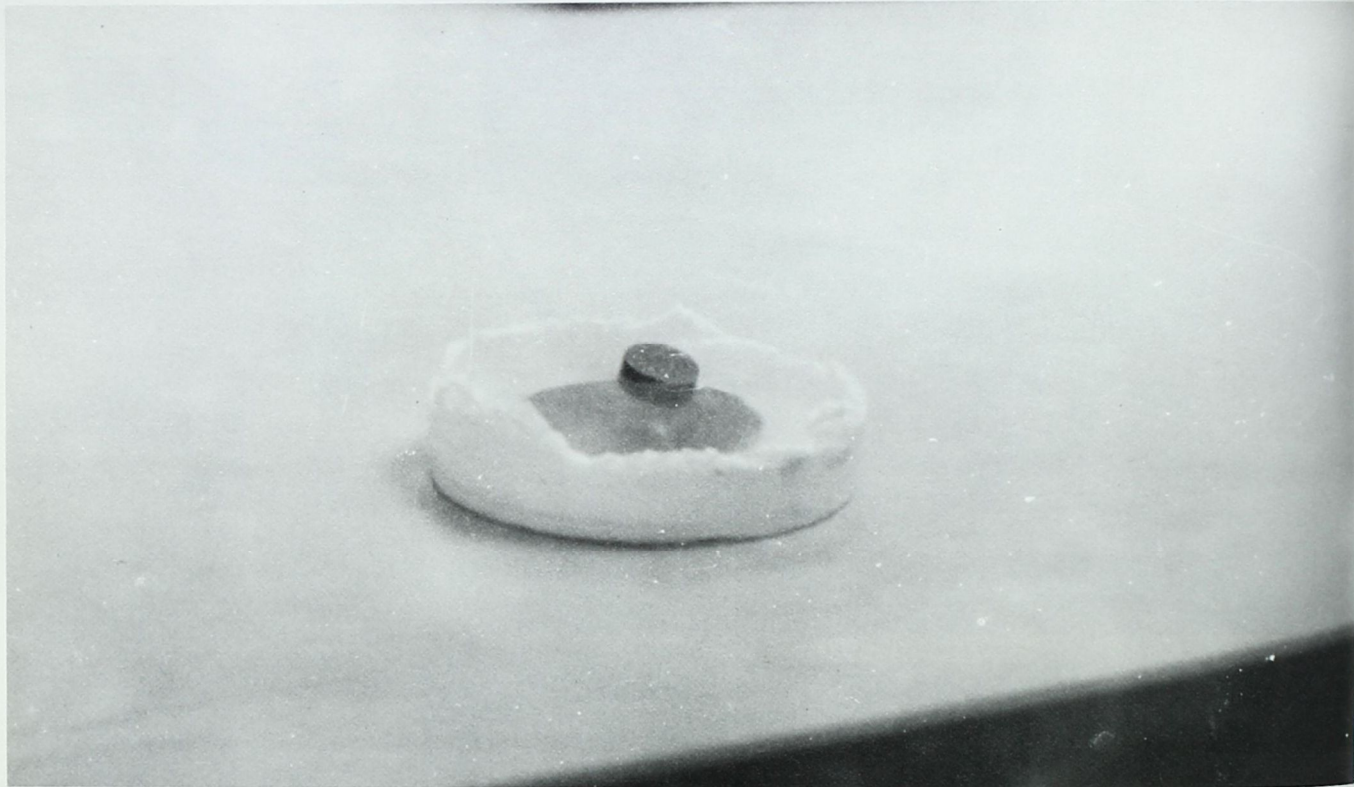

Superconductor — Our Homemade One Really Flies



Superconductivity is a "hot" topic in the news these days, thanks to a recent breakthrough in the development of new materials by Muller and Bednorz of IBM. This new material needs to be cooled to the temperature of liquid nitrogen in order to conduct electricity with no loss of current to resistance. This same chemical compound $\text{YBa}_2\text{Cu}_3\text{O}_7$ was made by students in the advanced chemistry class. They heated the compound, and pressed it under 8 tons of pressure. The disc levitates a magnet by creating a magnetic field that repels the magnet, thus causing it to float in air. After the initial success, Larry Broadwell and Michelle Rodriguez investigated specific aspects of superconductivity and presented their paper to the European Junior Science and Humanities Symposium in Heidelberg, Germany on March 30, 1989.

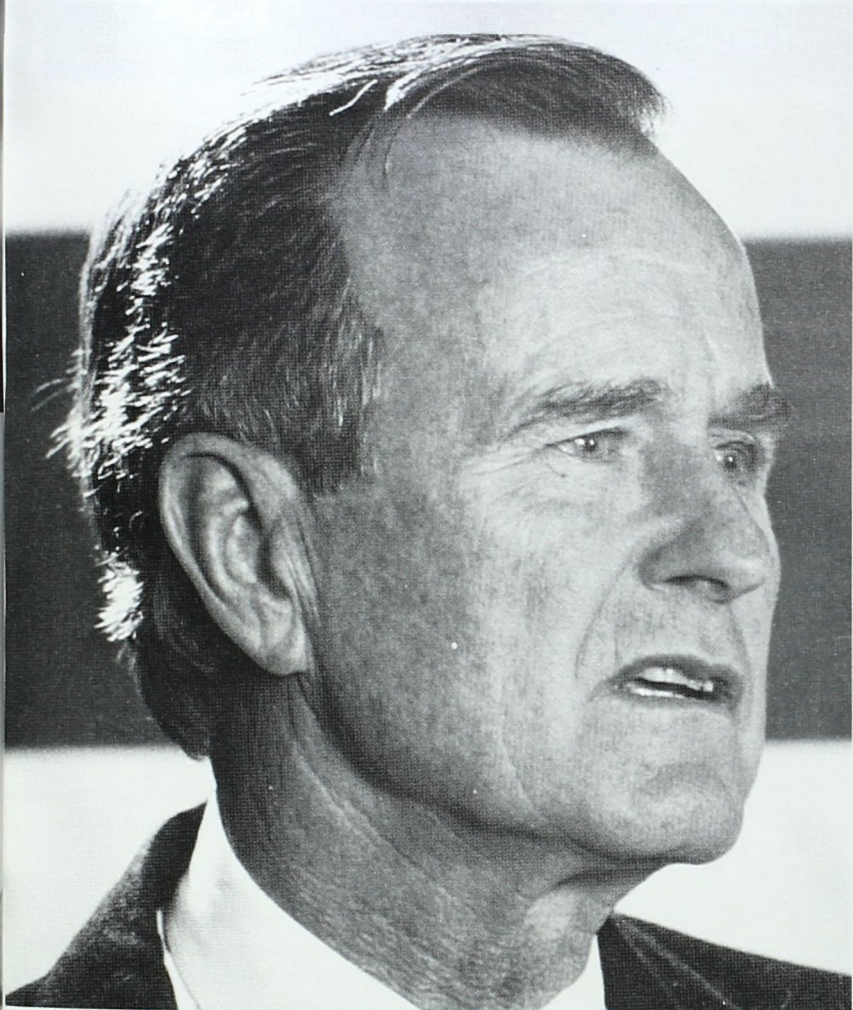








MEET THE PRESIDENT



Meet George Herbert Walker Bush, our new president formerly our vice president. He was born on June 12, 1924, in Milton, Mass., and raised in Connecticut.

George Bush was a star pupil and athlete at the Phillips Academy an exclusive prep school in Massachusetts. He was captain of the basketball and soccer teams, played varsity baseball, and was president of the Senior class. In 1942 he entered the army at the age of 18, he became the Navy's youngest pilot at that time.

In 1945, Bush married Barbara Pierce. In that same year he entered Yale University. After college Bush refused the job waiting for him at his father's Wall Street bank. Instead he left for Texas to make his own way. He then created his own company called "Zapata" in one year it grossed over \$2 million.

In 1966 and 1968, he ran for the U.S. House of Representatives, both times he won. President Richard Nixon asked Bush to run for the Senate in 1970. But he lost to Lloyd Bentsen. As a consolation prize, Nixon made Bush the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations. Over the next decade Bush proved himself an able diplomat and manager. Above all, Bush endeared himself to fellow Republicans by his strong loyalty to the party and to President Nixon.

In 1980 Bush joined the race for the Republican Presidential nomination, along with Ronald Reagan. Bush lost the nomination but Ronald Reagan picked him as his running mate.

As Vice President Bush has been a staunch supporter of Reagan. On behalf of the President, he has traveled over one million miles and visited more than 74 countries. Bush has headed Presidential task forces on terrorism and drugs. And he had been a key advisor to President Reagan.

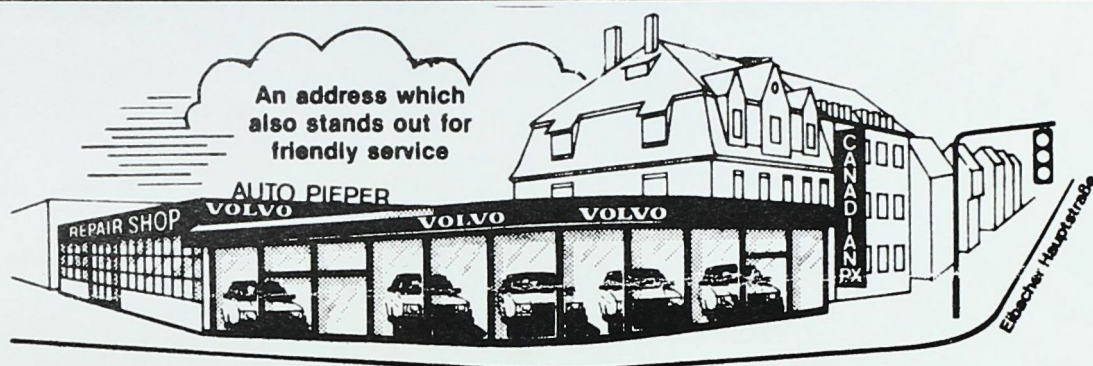
