The Science department's major function is to educate students in the areas of physics, chemistry and biology. Courses offered deal with basics in introductory physical science and biology and with more advanced studies in AP biology, chemistry, and phusics. An additional goal of the department is to help students make the connection between the classroom studies and application to the real world. This is accomplished through projects and broadening the curriculum in the classroom. In particular, ecology is one course which deals directIy with science and the environment.

The foreign Language Department offers enrollment in French, Spanish, and German with four advancing levels for each language. The goal of each class is to learn the torget language intuitively through as much practice and repetition as possible. This goal is accomplished through a variety of instruction and media including listening, speaking, reading, and writing and intellectually through an understanding of grammar usage which is a lasting tool. furthermore, students have many opportunities for hands-on, realistic language use and cultural understanding through field trips and through peer contact with speakers of the target language, through family exchanges in the country of the target language. Beauty and creativity is in the eye of the beholder, not only the eye of the person who views the finished product but the eye of the creator as well. An unwritten prerequisite for both art and video production is an "eve" which can judge beforehand how the completed project will appear - a vision. High schoolers who attend the conference also have a chance to sign up for workshop seminars where they augment their classroom skills. They return to their respective high schools more knowledgeable than ever about the waves of the technological future. They truly have the power.

The class is a multi-material approach in the basics of cabinet making which means students use plastic, wood and metal to practice quality croftsmanship. Moterials Technology is a course for people who like to work with their hands. In one semester, a student can create a crofted project of value.

Photography allows NAHS students to view their world from a different angle, to get close up to the faces and places that will become great memories of their lives in Europe. Student shutterbugs are encouraged to use their imaginations and shoot the indelible images of what, to them, is important and memorable. Mr. Hrushka also teaches students to develop and print these black-and-white reflections of friends and scenes in as artistic a manner as possible making the images portraits, not just snapshots.

The Graphic Arts class, also taught by Mr. Hrushka, teaches students how to design, print, and reproduce printed material from labels to exquisitely formatted newsletters, certificates, and invitations. Students learn computer graphics design, tupesetting, and printing. One project the class completed this year was business cards for foculty members. Class members were also responsible for copying, preparing, and mailing the monthly school newsletter to parents called "Hilites." Students experimented with graphic design, fonts, and borders to produce appealing publications.

## Choosing coreers $\mathbb{\alpha}$ colleges

While administrators administer, teachers dispense knowledge, and the cafeteria serves the ever-present french-fry, the guidance counselors, Ms. Gilbertson and Mr. Irons, map the futures of future NHS graduates through educational and career strategies for these four years and beyond. One of the main services provided by the guidance office is maintenance of school records. The counselors and registrar, Ms. Hesch, receive new records from incoming students, update files of current students each quarter, and compile a record file for departing students. They administer achievement and other standardized tests including SAT and ASVAB. The counselors also compile a list of students who are on the honor roll and calculate whether seniors have enough credits to graduate.

The counseling center is the central facility for college and coreer research. Students can access two computer programs, the GSI and CHASE, for information about colleges, careers, and scholarships. The counselors also host guest career speakers who present information on fields ranging from psychiatry to law to acting to journalism.

## Catch the sights and sounds of Nuernberg

Nuernberg, one of the most important cities in the German state of Bavaria, began in 1050 as a castle built bu German emperor, Henry III. The castle, looking down on the Pegnitz River, dominated one of the ancient trade routes of Europe. Since the settlement contained few natural resources, it grew as a home for traders, merchants, and artisans By the 1400's, Nuernberg had also become a flourishing center for the arts thanks in part to artists like Albrecht Duerer, Veit Stoss, and Michael Wohlgemuth. By 1616, Nuernberg was at the pinnacle of its economic and cultural development but the shift of world trade routes from land to sea and the effects of the Thirty Years' War brought about the citu's decline. It was not until the industrial age, when Nuernberg became the starting point for the first German railroad, that the city began to reflourish.
